Dwight LSC Closing at End of Year *Hundreds to Lose Jobs*

LSC Communications in Dwight, formerly R.R. Donnelley, is shutting its plant at the end of the year.

Village Administrator Kevin McNamara said Mayor Jared Anderson was told about the closure on Thursday, and employees were notified on Friday.

John Ray, of the Illinois Department of Commerce and

Economic Opportunity, confirmed LSC submitted a WARN report. The Illinois Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification Act (WARN) requires applicable employers to provide advanced notification of a plant closure or mass layoff.

LSC Dwight employs 390 and is one of Dwight's top employers.

"We are certainly sad that this day had to come," McNamara said. "LSC and Donnelley

changed this community in 1969 when they came to Dwight -- for the better."

With it, Donnelley brought a housing boom and stores and restaurants opened in its wake. They have contributed perennially to the village, including the Community Chest, McNamara said.

The impact of LSC closing will be felt by gas stations, stores and restaurants patronized by employees. The village will lose out on water and

sewer funds and property taxes once it closes. The village's portion of their tax bill is \$17,500, McNamara said.

LSC Communications, headquartered in Chicago, filed for Ch. 11 bankruptcy in spring after an "unprecedented" drop in print demand. It came less than a year after calling off a \$1.4 billion planned merger with rival printing firm Quad/Graphics. LSC employs more than 15,000 employees in the U.S.

In January, LSC announced it was closing manufacturing facilities in Strasburg, Va.; Glasgow, Ky.; and Mattoon, Ill.

In 2018, R.R. Donnelley celebrated 50 years in Dwight.

When R.R. Donnelley decided to erect a new plant in Dwight, it changed the village forever, instilling pride and putting thousands to work.

One of the main jobs was to publish the telephone book. From gathering the information, setting the type, printing

the pages, assembling and binding the books, trimming them and delivering them to countless homes, it was an enormous and complex task. And in 1968, that task was given to the citizens of Dwight when the R.R. Donnelley plant was constructed along Illinois Route 47. It was, and remains, Dwight's largest employer.

2018 marked 50 years of printing in Dwight, 48 as R.R. Donnelley and two as LSC (continued on page 3)

Immigration Detention Center Back on the Table Feds Proceed with Environmental Assessment

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security and Immigration and Custom Enforcement will be in Dwight to conduct an Environmental Assessment for a proposed contract to build the privately owned and operated detention center.

The controversial detention center, which would be used for detainees facing deportation proceedings, appears to be back on the table -- even though Gov. J.B. Pritzker signed into law in June 2019 a ban of private detention centers.

Village Administrator Kevin McNamara said the village received a letter from the DHS and ICE dated July 23. In it, the letter describes a 127,000-square-foot center to house up to 1,000 male and female detainees. The previous plan was to house only males.

It asks the Dwight Village Board to provide any concerns or issues pertaining to the environmental assessment. The village board approved an annexation agreement in spring 2019 that moved the plan forward.

McNamara said the board was under the impression that the state law banning private im-

migration centers brought the plan to a halt a few months after that vote, and was unsure if Homeland Security and ICE could usurp state law. He also said he is unsure if the village board would need to take any further action.

The plan calls for a detention center on 40 acres east of Interstate 55 with outdoor recreation, administrative, legal and other support spaces. Operation would include a minimum of 362 employees, up to 1,000 male and female detainees and approximately 85 visitors a day. It would take 12 months to complete, although there was no indication on when construction

could begin.

McNamara said he believes the center would be operated by Immigration Centers of America, the same private contractor involved in the original plan.

According to the letter, DHS is in need of a new detention facility within 180 miles of the ICE field office in downtown Chicago. The environmental assessment and a period of public comment and review would need to be completed before construction begins.

State Rep. Tom Bennett, 106th District
Silence Is Corruption –
A Call For Special Session On Ethics Reform

As you know, last week Speaker Madigan was implicated in a bribery investigation involving the electric utility ComEd. Speaker Madigan has not been indicted or accused of a crime by prosecutors, but this latest incident shows that the need for ethics reform in Illinois would not be more clear.
Many members of the House, including me, have introduced ethics reform bills this year and for many years before. They never seem to go anywhere. Speaker Madigan controls which bills make it out of committee and which bills never see the light of day. Even before this latest scandal, the General Assembly had been rocked with ethical violations, including a state representative who had to resign earlier this year after he was caught on tape offering a bribe to a state senator.
The House is not scheduled to be back in session until November, but we cannot wait that long to start cleaning up the ethical mess in state government. Under the Illinois Constitution, there are two officials who can call a special session of the House of Representatives: the Speaker of the

House and the Governor.
I do not expect Speaker Madigan to call us into special session to pass real ethics reform, so we are asking Governor Pritzker to do so.
Governor Pritzker said in his State of the State address at the start of this year, “it’s no longer enough to sit idle while under the table deals, extortion or bribery persist. Protecting that culture or tolerating it is no longer acceptable. We must take urgent action to restore the public’s trust in our government.”
Join with me in encouraging Governor Pritzker to back up his words with some action.
Updated list of highway projects released. IDOT has released the latest Multi-Year Plan for highway projects around the state between now and 2026.
Area projects included: bridge reconstruction on Illinois 17 and ADA improvements to Illinois 23 in Cornell in Livingston County; and pavement rehabilitation on Illinois 47 in Ford County.
How much do we owe? As of the time of this writing, the State of Illinois owes \$4,875,009,378 in unpaid bills

to state vendors. One year ago, the backlog stood at \$6.4 billion. This figure represents the amount of bills submitted to the office of the Comptroller and awaiting payment. It does not include debts that can only be estimated.



It's a Scam!

In an effort to combat pandemic-related scams, State Senator Patrick Jorice (D-Park Forest) is urging residents to look out for potential unemployment fraud.
Some Illinoisans have reported receiving a KeyBank debit card and an unemployment letter from the Illinois Department of Employment Security (IDES), despite never having applied for unemployment.
“If you get a notice of unemployment benefits in your name even though you haven’t filed, notify the authorities immediately,” Joyce said. “Your personal information could be at risk – if you believe you could be a victim of fraud, act now to spot and stop scammers.”
IDES confirmed individuals who have not filed for benefits but received a debit card or unemployment letter could be the target of fraud. Anyone who has received a debit card without filing is encouraged to contact their local police department and report the incident with IDES.

There were other Donnelley plants that came before Dwight, but the Dwight Manufacturing Division was to be something unique: the site of “the world’s most modern telephone directory printing plant,” with both letterpress and, later, offset printing equipment, according to a 1969 booklet the Donnelley plant printed for their customers.

For consumers, that means encyclopedias, inserts for newspapers and millions upon millions of telephone books for more than 1,100 cities and towns, including Chicago, St. Louis, Indianapolis and Milwaukee, all created, printed and bound by a workforce of dedicated employees.

At its peak, Donnelley employed more than 1,000 people. As Donnelley grew, so did the village. In came new subdivisions, a lively downtown and a community that holds itself up, proud to call it home. Donnelley fostered hometown pride, encouraging workers to partake in the community. Many served

on school and village boards, coached sports and were involved in church activities. Donnelley encouraged hard work and rewarded that with plenty of opportunities for advancement. It fostered a culture that made you want to get up and go to work in the morning. Teamwork and camaraderie helped sustain a massive workforce.

I would like to thank my children for my wonderful 90th birthday.

Thank you to everyone who sent flowers, gifts, and cards. No two cards were alike.

Hey, 90 isn't so bad.

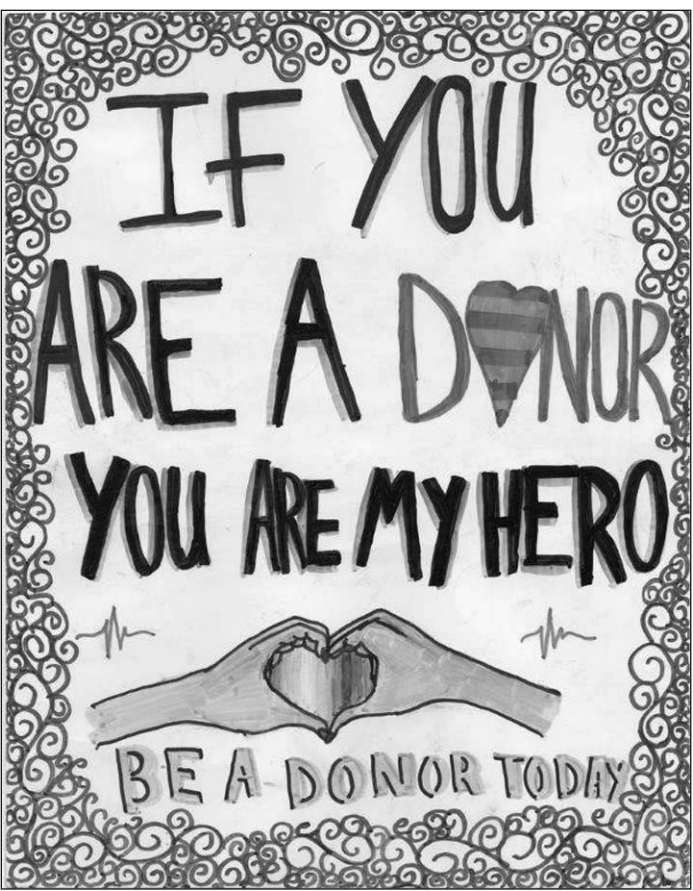

Create Strategies to Help Achieve Your Financial Goals

The connections between your different investment accounts and your goals should be consistently clear to you.

Understand trade-offs. Your various investment goals may be distinct, but they don't exist in isolation. In fact, your strategy for achieving one goal may affect your ability to work toward another. For example, would significant investments in your child's education change your funding for retirement? If you decide to buy a vacation home when you retire, will that alter the legacy you'll be able to leave to your family? Given limited financial resources, you may have to prioritize some goals and make some trade-offs in your investment moves.

Track your progress. Each of your strategies is designed to achieve a particular goal, so you need to monitor the performance of the investments within that strategy to help ensure you're making progress. If it seems that you're lagging, you may need to explore ways to get back on track.

To manage these tasks successfully, you may want to work with a financial professional – someone who can look at your situation objectively, help you identify and quantify your goals, and suggest strategies designed to help you achieve them.

Trying to achieve multiple financial goals can seem like a daunting task, but by saving and investing consistently through your working years, following a clear strategy, being willing to prioritize and accept trade-offs and getting the help you need, you can help yourself move forward.

Of all things to not be good at, golf is one that’s very frustrating because it’s basically the only sport that can be played into later life because it doesn’t require too much movement.

Tennis is another one that can be played later in life, too, I’ve been playing that a lot lately, but to a more degree of success than out on the fairways, or lack thereof.

If anyone has any tips, I’m all ears, I’d love to be better, and preferably not play when it’s 100+ degrees.

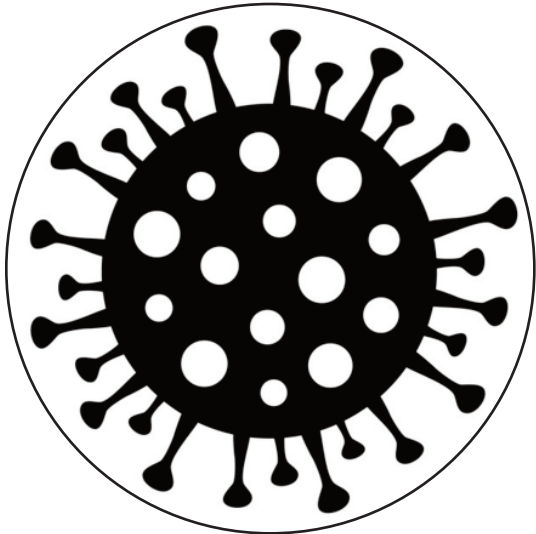
Three New COVID Cases in Livingston County

There are now 76 cases of Covid-19 in Livingston County, the health department reports.

Three new cases were reported Monday. They include a female in her 40s and two females in their 20s all of whom are recovering in isolation.

The Livingston County Health Department has received 4,105 Covid-19 test results. Aside from the 76 positive cases, 4,029 tests confirmed negative. Sixty-one of the previously reported confirmed cases have been removed from isolation and 13 cases remain active. Of those individuals who have tested positive, 16 were asymptomatic at the time of testing. Two people have died from the disease in Livingston County.

Individuals who travel to hot spots in the country, those areas where higher rates of confirmed COVID-19 cases are reported, are strongly encouraged



to get tested for COVID-19 five to seven days after returning from their trip or sooner if experiencing symptoms.

People can track confirmed COVID-19 cases in Illinois by county and zip code by visiting IDPH's COVID-19 statistics site: <https://www.dph.illinois.gov/covid19/covid19-statistics>, and may also track confirmed

cases nationwide by using CDC's COVID-19 tracker tool: <https://www.cdc.gov/covid-data-tracker/#cases>.

For those Livingston County residents who test positive for COVID-19, the LCHD will reach out to them individually and all of their close contacts (anyone the confirmed case has been within six feet of for at least 10-15 minutes in the 48 prior to either experiencing symptoms or receiving testing) within 24 hours of receiving notification.

HARVEST DAYS CANCELLED

Pandemic Forces Festivities Closed

For the first time in its 40-year history, Dwight Harvest Days has been cancelled, another victim of the coronavirus pandemic.

“We’ve been working since October 2019 on this,” said organizer Randy Irvin. “It just wasn’t feasible to have Harvest Days.”

It was an agonizing decision for the committee, he said. The decision was made Monday, July 27, after careful consideration for public health and safety.

Thousands of people converge on downtown Dwight each year for the three-day festival.

“Due to health and safety concerns for our vendors, volunteers and attendees we are cancelling the 2020 Dwight Harvest Days,” the committee posted on the Harvest Days website. “Please remember this is a hard decision to make. ... We would have wanted nothing more than to bring you the 41st Dwight Harvest Days and help support our local businesses and organizations, but unfortunately that is not the case this year.”

Other factors were working against them. The carnival by Skinner’s Amusements of Marengo couldn’t operate. Illi-

nois has apparently stopped inspecting carnival rides during the pandemic. The state is also not giving authorization to shut down state roads for festivals, Irvin said.

Their insurance also went up significantly, Irvin said. Insurance companies have reportedly increased premiums during the pandemic over concerns of lawsuits.

Costs also increased, particularly for porta-potties, hand sanitizer and hand-washing stations as demand has increased during the pandemic.

And when it came to the parade, schools and bands would most likely not be able to participate.

“We’re not here to make a profit but you have to have something to carry on to next year,” said Rhonda Branz, who’s also on the committee overseeing the craft vendor show. Vendors had the opportunity to get their fee back or have it carry over to next year. Sponsorships will be carried to the 2021 Harvest Days.

“We are looking toward 2021 and will make 2021 even better,” Irvin said. The dates are Sept. 16-19.

The Short Film Festival will continue. If you’ve been working on a short for this year’s festival, continue working on it. Because some started working on their projects

months ago, films will still be judged and awards will be mailed / delivered. 2020 entries need to be postmarked by August 1, 2020.

But all may not be lost. Irvin said they are going to meet in September and talk about perhaps doing something small to celebrate. Someone also mentioned on Facebook about the commemorative pins and they will talk about having a pin despite the cancellation.

Larry Little of the Guardian Angel Basset Rescue said his committee will also be meeting to talk about a virtual Basset Waddle. The waddle is a huge hit for Harvest Days fans, with basset owners coming from all over the Midwest to participate in the parade. Little said they are thinking of having a virtual type walk where owners can waddle individually around their own neighborhoods.
