## A Christmas Past -- 1943

While the joys and trials of 2008 remain fresh in our minds, and the challenges of 2009 lie ahead, we might take a short time-out to revisit December of 1943 sixty-five years ago — when America and the rest of the free world faced life and death challenges far exceeding those of today.

Two years had passed since the declaration of war by America against Imperial Japan and Nazi Germany.

It was a December when the editorial staff of *The* Trojan News at Dwight Township High School put extra effort into the producthe high school newspaper. A sent far and near to former students who were then in the service of their country.

## **Grundy County Climatological Data**

The December 2008 climatological data has been furnished to The Paper by Jim Lutz, Director of the Grundy County Emergency Management Agency Weather Data Division:

Highest daily temperature, 61° on December 27; lowest daily temperature, -6° on December 21.

The average monthly temperature was 24°, and all 31 days, the temperature dipped below 32°. Two days had temperatures below 0°.

A wind gust of 45 mph on the 31st was a peak speed.

7.07 inches of liquid precipitation were received in December, for a total of 46.93 for the year. The total snowfall for the month and season was 13.2 inches.

There were eight days with measurable rain and nine days with measurable

The highest 24-hour liquid precipitation amount was 1.76 inches on December 27.

The highest temperature in 2008 was 93° on September 2, and the lowest was -8° on Januarly 24. The average temperature for the year was 49.8°, with the average high at 59.2° and the average low at 40.4°. The temperature reached over 90° four days of the year and fell below 32° 131 days of the year. Nine days saw temperatures below 0°.

The total snowfall for the year was 41.40 inches. The highest amount of precipitation in a 24-hour period was 2.86 inches on January 8. There were 126 days with measurable precipitation.

The peak wind gust for the year was 64 mph on July 21. The average wind speed for the year was 6.2 mph.


In the coming year, I'm resolved to pray more than I ever have before.
