by Sara Peters sjhpeters2@gmail.com Brad Trainor remembers when new Wishing Well Café owner Misty Owen was a cook at his restaurant the Old Log Cabin in Pontiac.

"What's your end game?" he asked his young chef, who was 16 at the time. "What do you want to do with your life?"

"'I want to own my own place, better than this," Trainor remembers Owen saying. "It was funny. Then (realizing what she said) she said 'oh, oh!' I laughed. The Old Log Cabin is what it is."

Now, as the new owner of the Wishing Well Café, she has the opportunity to make her restaurant as great as she wants through hard work and a little help from her friends, including her old boss.

Owen, 21, of Odell, purchased the restaurant, at 110 W. Tremont in downtown Odell, and reopened its doors Jan. 1. The restaurant has sat empty since September.

The new job title completes a life-long dream for the young business owner. Owen says she knew early on that she wanted to one day own a restaurant.

"I've been cooking since I was real little," she said. "I always loved watching cooking shows."

A 2005 graduate of Pontiac Township High School, Owen finished a double associates' degree from Joliet Junior College in culinary arts and hospitality in December.

While she was finishing

Although fresh from college, she already has an accomplished resume that began during her high school days as a cook at Trainor's Old Log Cabin.

"She was a good worker. You could just tell – she was seeing things that a 30-yearold would see at 16 and 17 years old," Trainor said.

Owen went on to work as a chef at Harrah's Casino in Joliet for two years. While in college, she held down two jobs: one in hospitality at the Hampton Inn in Joliet, and the other on the wait staff of Bolingbrook Golf Club.

"She has culinary abilities that are in her heart," Trainor said. "If you can't do it from the heart, it's going to hurt you. This business is tough."

Owen says she's ready for the challenge, and has already personalized the restaurant to a new momand-pop style of home cooking.

Breakfast remains similar to what patrons may remember from previous ownership, but she's added daily specials and entrees to the menu. Chili is served daily, in addition to daily specialty soups

"There's a lot more to choose from now - homemade food," she said.

Entrees range from the pot roast special on Monday to a half baked chicken and some sea foods, including the tilapia special on

"I really like the tilapia and I think if people try it, they'll like it," Owen said.

Trainor said she'll bring experience and expertise to her restaurant that is hard pressed to find these days.

"(She has) culinary skills - you don't see that a lot any-Trainor more," said. "Everybody's opening a can or getting something that's frozen. She'll do a lot of scratch baking and cooking."

"Is Dwight committed to growth?'

This was the key question Mike Vigna, co-owner of Vigna Real Estate, posed to the Dwight Village Board during its January 12 meeting.

Vigna's question came on the heels of his request for the board to take actions that might help to attract residential growth.

"We are trying to take a vacant lot that we aren't getting much tax revenue on and bring in people that want move to Dwight," to explained Vigna. "I am trying to find a way to assist people rather than slapping them away from town."

One concern that Vigna has repeatedly expressed to ordinance.

"Is there any way we are looking at backing these [impact fees] off because of the times that we have got going right now?" Vigna asked the board.

Impact fees have been a controversial subject in Dwight since being adopted in 2006. The fees are assessed to residential developers and builders and are designed to protect the local supporting infrastructures such as the schools and fire protection district - that would be adversely impacted by sudden growth. With Dwight's schools near capacity, growth would mean additional building space required to accommodate an increase in students. Without impact fees to help offset the potential cost, the

the board is the impact fee financial responsibility could fall to the general taxpayers.

> Dwight has seen little to no growth for some time, leaving many to question the need for the fees. However, some builders have already paid impact fees, and concerns for future financial protection remains.

> "We can't start and stop," said Trustee Jerry Curtis regarding fairness to those who have already paid fees and ensuring potential future needs are met.

> The tax base in Dwight was also cited by Vigna as a discouraging factor. He compared Dwight to Coal City and nearby northern communities and suggested that encouraging growth might help to reduce taxes.

Tax Rate Held Steady in Gardner

The Gardner Village Board opened its regular meeting Monday night, January 12, with a request from resident Mike Pokornicki that the village trim the trees on the village right-ofway adjacent to his property. Pokornicki reported that several large limbs fell during the recent ice storm, and several others appear to be damaged and ready to fall.

Village attorney Scott Belt reported that activity concerning the billboard south of town has again

begun, following up on action by IDOT started in 2006. The court is requesting information from the village concerning the case, and Village Clerk Barb Bexson has provided all of the information requested to date. Belt reported the information requests actually refer back to the 1996 annexation of the subject property into the village. Belt advised that there is a possibility that persons from the village could be called to testify, and the case is at a summary judgment stage with the two parties at

"opposite ends of the spectrum" and the case likely to be decided in the courts.

Belt has not completed the review of the codification, and when he completes his review, he will have several questions, comments and suggestions for the board, although he believes the process is going well.

Belt suggested a special meeting or workshop for the board to concentrate on the revisions. Commissioner Bill Gerrish requested a working copy of the docu-(continued on page 15)

As the Dwight Grade School Board of Education works on finalizing district goals, Superintendent Dale Adams identified curriculum, maintenance and miscellaneous needs and presented a summary of options for consideration to the board at its January 14 meeting.





Don't Forget About Inflation When You Retire During your working years, you put money away, hoping that it will grow enough to help provide you with a comfortable retirement. But once you retire, haven't you reached your goal? You don't still need to invest for growth, do you?

Actually, you do. You may be retiring, but the cost of living marches on. In fact, even with a relatively mild inflation rate of three percent, you'll pay about twice as much for goods and services in 25 years as you do today. And since you could easily spend two or three decades in retirement, you need to be prepared for these costs.

At first glance, you might think that this situation presents you with a daunting challenge. Historically, stocks are the only financial assets that have significantly outperformed inflation. Yet, as a retiree, you may be nervous about investing in equities, especially given the stock market's performance last year. How can you stay ahead of inflation without taking on too much risk?

Unquestionably, you'll have to manage your investment portfolio very carefully during your retirement years. But it's important to realize that you do have options. Here are a few suggestions:

Consider dividend-paying stocks. By doing some research, you can find stocks that have paid — and even increased — dividends for many consecutive years. Obviously, a source of rising income can help you in your battle against inflation — and many dividend-paying stocks also offer the potential for longterm growth. Keep in mind, though, that a company can decrease or eliminate its stock dividend at any time.

Create an inflation-fighting withdrawal strategy. During your retirement, you will probably need to take withdrawals from all your resources - your taxable brokerage and savings accounts; your tax-deferred accounts, such as your Traditional IRA and your 401(k); and your tax-free accounts, such as your Roth IRA. (A Roth IRA's earnings grow tax-free if you've had your account for at least five years and don't start taking withdrawals until you're 59-1/2). Obviously, the longer you can preserve your tax-advantaged growth potential, the better off you'll be when it comes to staying ahead of inflation.

Consequently, you may want to take withdrawals from your taxable account first, tap into your Traditional IRA and your 401(k) next and save the Roth IRA for last. (If you're 70-1/2 or older, however, you need to take required minimum distributions from your Traditional IRA and your 401(k).) That said, this is just a rule of thumb, as your actual strategy may change from year to year, depending on your expected tax burden.

Think about some TIPS. Most types of Treasury bills or bonds pay a fixed rate of return, which makes them susceptible to inflation. However, you can also invest in Treasury Inflation-Protected Securities, or TIPS. The principal of a TIPS increases with inflation and decreases with deflation, as measured by the Consumer Price Index. When your TIPS mature, you are paid the adjusted principal or original principal, whichever is greater. Be aware, though, that you'll be taxed on the annual inflation adjustments, even though you won't receive this money until your bond is redeemed. Consult with your tax advisor to determine if you should put your TIPS in a tax-deferred account, such as a Traditional IRA.

You'll have to cope with inflation throughout your retirement years. But by making the right moves, at the right time, you can greatly boost your chances of enjoying the lifestyle you've envisioned.

The health department provides a wellness clinic to help adults identify their risks for heart disease and stroke, diabetes, liver and kidney diseases and metabolic syndrome. Screenings are also available to determine risks for prostate cancer in men and osteoporosis in women. A bequest from Michael Hubert in 1988 allows the wellness clinic and additional screenings to be offered for a very minimal fee.

Free Screenings for Vascular Disease Today and Tomorrow

Peripheral vascular dis- non-invasive. ease (PVD) is a dangerous medical condition that could screened if they have one or cause a serious stroke or more risk factors, such as even death. Many people smoking, being over age 50, could be at risk and are not even aware. To help identify those at risk, Dr. Forrest Rubenstein of St. Mary's Vascular and Thoracic Surgery is offering free screenings for PVD. Dr. Rubenstein is a board certified vascular and thoracic surgeon. The screenings will be held today, January 21, and tomorrow, January 22. Screenings are painless and

Knowing our risk factors in and of itself does not improve health. our However, if knowing our risk factors motivates us to take action, it can improve our health. Health department programs designed to help reduce risk factors include: the Diabetes Management Program for people with elevated glucose (sugar); the Life Smart for Women program, which can help women reduce their risks for developing diabetes, heart disease, osteoporosis and other health problems; and smokers may join a smoking cessation program.

Yes, quitting smoking, even during the golden years, has many health benefits. Quitting smoking not only helps people live longer; it also helps them live with fewer health problems and live more active lives. Health Department Offering Shingles Vaccine

The Livingston County Health Department administers immunizations that can improve seniors' health. Annually, influenza (flu) and pneumonia vaccination clinics are conducted throughout the county. The health department has depleted its supply of influenza vaccine for the 2008-2009 flu season, but the vaccine may still be available at local pharmacies or doctors' offices.

The pneumonia vaccine can be given at any time of year. The CDC recommends that all

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adults 65 years of age or older for Shingles. Shingles may may result from Shingles needed. Anyone age 60 or ment cannot bill Medicare for be vaccinated. Medicare reimbursement guidelines for the pneumonia vaccine are available at the health department. Zostavax is now available

to persons age 60 and over to prevent or reduce the seriousness of Shingles. Anyone who has had chickenpox is at risk

lead to pain that lasts for months or even years in some people, due to nerve damage caused by this virus. For many people with long-term nerve pain, even the touch of clothing against the skin can be painful.

ments for the board to of the street. review prior to and during the special meeting, and Belt stated that the copies would not be a problem and he hopes to be prepared for the meeting in March at the earliest. Commissioner Dick Hileman suggested sending a letter to the codification company to advise them of the target date for the special meeting and completion, as there are still some documents outstanding to be delivered to the village. During conversations, Belt suggested that the village's zoning and subdivision codes were fairly up to date; however, he suggested that the village update the zoning map to create a color version to better indicate the zoning for various areas and verify the correctness of the man Belt indicated that he had provided a sample copy of the map to the zoning board.

Commissioner Hileman asked if the zoning board had scheduled a meeting and when the map was delivered. Belt stated the map was delivered the past week, and Bexson reported the zoning board is hoping to meet within the next two weeks.

Belt asked for follow-up on a memo he sent to the board concerning Main Street. Grundy County is seeking to have the village take responsibility for the street. Hileman stated that he is of the understanding that the village is not interested in incurring the expense

Commissioner Mike Serena asked Belt if there were any documents indicating that the village had taken control of the street. The only document currently known to the village was a request from IDOT to pave the street at the time the Route 53 railroad overpass was rebuilt. At that time, the village became aware that it did not have control of the street and forwarded the matter to the county. Belt did locate documents from March of 1972 indicating the county had sought to turn the street over to the village, and the village considered the matter; however, there is no record of the action having ever been executed. Belt suggested reviewing the statutes from 1972 to determine if the mayor at that time had the authority to act independently of the board in this type of action.

Commissioner Hileman opened a discussion concerning rebates for businesses and homeowners in response to concerns that have been raised to him by residents about not being able to cover their expenses in the current economy. Hileman requested that the board forego the current tax abatement for 2008 to be paid in 2009 and not collect the monies. Hileman reported that the village's frugal actions concerning the general fund will allow the vil-

lage to allow the citi-

zens to keep the \$78,000 that this would eliminate the village from collecting. In a note of clarification, Hileman's suggestion is that the village waives the entire real estate tax to be collected in 2009.

Commissioner Serena asked if Hileman truly believes the village can afford this move with the possibility that the economy has not yet reached rock bottom. Hileman responded that this would be the 2008 levy only, and that based on the balance currently in the general fund and the projected expenses for 2009. he believes the village can afford this as a one-time move to assist the residents. Hileman further reported that he was unable to determine a fair method of assisting the businesses due to the varying levels of taxes paid by the businesses. Upon questioning from board members, Belt reported that it has been his experience that the board does have the authority to abate the levy in full or at any level based on percent-

In discussion of the property north of town recently purchased by the Gardner South Wilmington High School, the board raised concerns that the property is zoned industrial, possibly making it unsuitable for a school. The board has further concerns that the property can no longer be used for agricultural purposes after being sold, based on the origi-

(continued from page 1) comes into the tax base, the less pressure it is on the individual tax payer," said Vigna.

Village Administrator Kevin McNamara pointed out that the schools generate the majority of the tax bills and suggested nuclear power plant revenues are the reason some communities are able to keep taxes lower.

Trustee Ron Skinner, acting mayor at the meeting, suggested that it might take more than just a change in village policies to attract residential growth.

"Maybe the realtor and the person selling the lot ought to back off a little bit on what they are charging and it would balance out," suggested Skinner. No change to current policies is expected.

In other business, McNamara announced that a Public Hearing to listen to citizen comment regarding the proposed adoption of a TIF district for Dwight will be held on Monday, February 9, at 5:30 p.m. in the Public Services Complex.

Dwight Village Clerk Patti Drechsel announced that petitions are still available for the April 7, 2009, consolidated election. Opening positions include village president, three trustee positions and village clerk. The filing period begins on Monday, January 19, at 8 a.m. and ends

Monday, January 26, at 5 p.m.

The board also:

• accepted an Illinois Law Enforcement Training Board Grant of \$5,000 for the purchase of a squad car video camera.

• approved Annexation Agreements and Ordinances for The Charles McWilliams Trust (46 acres); McPart LLC (62 acres), and LIMRA786 (1 acre).

• approved general bill payments totaling \$148,421.68 (December '08) and \$142,450.19 (January '09).

Dwight Township High School students are living up to their school color and "going green" through Teens 4 Green, a new environmental awareness and action club at the school.

The club, which currently has 33 members, recently completed a magazine and newspaper drive, which challenged students to bring in waste paper items to see which homeroom could collect the highest stack. The winning homerooms received candy bars as prizes. In two weeks' time, the students collected a 61-foothigh stack of papers to be recycled, amounting to two truckloads that were saved from a landfill.

However, DTHS biology teacher and Teens 4 Green adviser John Atchley noted that the waste paper project was only the beginning. The club is currently working on creating a plastic bottle and aluminum recycling program; a program that will work to reduce and re-use food waste from the cafeteria; and a program to increase paper recycling in the school and the community

"The ultimate goal of the club would be that it gets into a feel of environmental responsibility for everyone in Dwight, but especially for the kids in the group," Atchley said, noting that the club not only benefits the environment but also the students who learn how they can make a difference in their school and community. "We want to wake people up in this town; we want to wake people up in this school to say, 'Yeah, this is something I care about

doing."

Teens 4 Green formed earlier in the school year, following football season. Atchley said there had been talk last year of forming such a club, but it kicked into gear when DTHS junior Nicole Rosales, now the club's president, approached Atchley this year with solid intentions.

"I wanted to do something before I went to school, because I see (environmental problems) all around, and nobody's really doing anything about it," Rosales said. "So if it was something that I believed in, I should probably be the one to do something."

The club now meets weekly to discuss various environmental issues affecting the community and world and to learn how they can make a difference.

"It's helping teach kids how to save the environment," said junior Kate Tock, secretary of Teens 4 Green. "It's good for kids to start caring about the environment again, because for a while, people stopped caring."

Atchley said the students are very involved in the club, conducting their own research and coming up with new ideas such as "25 ways to reduce your carbon footprint." Club members also expressed their interest in environmental issues such as global warming, animal endangerment and pollution.

"I don't want to leave the world in bad condition," explained junior Stephany Small, Teens 4 Green researcher. "Also, I think it's good to be a role model for other students." She said she hopes the club will soon be able to hold a presentation explaining environmental issues and concerns to the entire school. "A lot of people are just really uninformed, and that's why they don't care," she said.

One way the club's members are showing they care is through a plastic bottle recycling program, which will now include four collection cans placed throughout the school. Students in the club are responsible for emptying the cans when they are full. Atchley then takes the bottles to Ottawa to be recycled.

"We're still seeing people who are throwing away a lot of plastic bottles, which is kind of absurd," Atchley said of the reason for having the cans in strategic locations throughout the school. He noted, however, that the one or two bags collected during the first two weeks of the program has improved to four bags in one week.

Rosales agreed that students are beginning to warm up to Teens 4 Green's missions.

"Awareness is kind of hard at first, but it's getting better," she said.

As DTHS junior and club member Taylor Gettinger put it, "People are starting to really care."

This week, Teens 4 Green is starting a vermicomposting program in the cafeteria. Vermicomposting involves depositing leftover food scraps in large plastic containers, wherein red worms digest the scraps and produce a compost to be used as organic fertilizer for plants. The club hopes to eventually use the fertilizer as a fundraiser. Atchley explained that vermicompost programs are very popular at universities, and almost all foods that are not meat or liquid can be vermicomposted.

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The club is also currently running a fund-raiser, selling reusable shopping bags made from recycled plastic pop bottles. The bags are 100 percent recyclable, and 100 percent of the proceeds from the bag sales go back to Teens 4 Green to increase environmental projects and recycling programs in Dwight. Atchley said the goal of the bag sale is to reduce the amount of shopping bags wasted from grocery shopping, noting that on average, eight to 10 percent of the waste in a landfill is composed of plastic grocery bags. And because the bags are made from recycled plastic bottles, "We're putting to use a product people are using all the time and then throwing in a landfill," he said. Students may also use the bags to carry their books or lunches to school as a way of showing other students their commitment to the environment. Although the Teens 4 Green club is still small in relation to the high school's total enrollment, it is already doing big things. "I'm proud of us, because we don't have many people in the group right now, and at the paper drive before Christmas break, we had piles and piles of paper," Small said. "I'm really proud of all the people who contributed."
