

An alcohol-related crash exactly three months earlier that killed a Dwight woman and her two young children; a surreal moment of bigotry and hatred towards a visiting Muslim exchange student from Afghanistan; some special heroes from several area high schools; and the realization a couple of weeks earlier in Washington, D.C. of a dream expressed in that city by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. nearly 46 years ago.

These are among the issues that were addressed by the MWAH! Performing Arts Troupe (acronym for Messages Which Hopeful!) during a performance as part of a Section 11 meeting of the FCCLA (Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America) held Friday, February 6, at the Dwight United Methodist Church.

Discussing the November 6 crash that killed Amanda Jahn, her three-year-old son, Ryan, and her 11-month-old daughter, Kaitlyn, was Grundy County Coroner John Callahan and Josh Jahn, husband and father of the victims. This commentary followed the story of another alcohol-related crash that killed five teenagers two years ago in Oswego.

The troupe combines real life drama with various genres of both cover and original songs and capped off with a touch of signature hip hop dance.

Rev. Elisha A. Hoffman was pastor of Cabery Presbyterian Church from 1911 to 1916 and from 1918 to 1922. He was internationally known as a writer of hymns, including "Leaning On The Everlasting Arms," "Are You Jesus," "Is Your All On The Altar," "What a Wonderful Savior," "Enough for Me" and "No Other Friend Like

More than 2,000 of his compositions are in print, and he assisted in the compilation and editing of 50 different song books. Information on Rev. Elisha Hoffman is available on several web sites today.

Rev. Hoffman was born in Orwigsburg, PA, in 1839. His father was an Evangelical preacher for more than 60 years. Music was a part of the household, and he was self-taught in writing church music.

Rev. Hoffman served a number of churches in his career, including Cabery. The Cabery church is now a Methodist church.

He died in Chicago at the age of 90 on November 25, 1929.

The Herscher Museum has a display on Rev. Hoffman. One of the items is an "Anti-Saloon Campaign Songs" booklet. Many of the songs in the booklet were written by Rev. Hoffman.

The museum is open on the first Sunday of each month from 2 to 4 p.m. Admission is free.

LaSalle County Illegal Gambling Operation Uncovered

Attorney General Lisa Madigan and Illinois Department of Revenue Director Brian Hamer announced two Streator individuals have been charged for operating an illegal gambling operation from which agents have seized more than \$146,000 in proceeds.

Richard A. Smith, 54, faces one count of gambling and one count of keeping a gambling place, and Julie A. Simmons, 46, faces four counts of gambling and one count of keeping a gambling place. All charges are Class A misdemeanors that carry a potential sentence of 364 days in jail and a \$2,500 fine.

In the course of an investigation, agents for the Illinois State Police, the Illinois Department of Revenue and the Illinois Liquor Commission uncovered evidence of gambling at Simmons' sports memorabilia store, Julie's Victory Lane at #7 Danny Drive, Suite #2, and at Smith's bar, Smitty's Tap, 502 E. Main St.

Undercover agents received illegal payouts for credits won on video slot and poker machines and also placed wagers on professional sports games at Julie's Victory Lane. During the arrest, they seized more than \$24,000 in illegal gambling

proceeds as well as 11 video poker and slot machines. The machines are licensed to Smith. At Smitty's Tap, agents confiscated more than \$122,000 in proceeds on sporting events, including wagers placed at Smith's establishment on this year's Super Bowl.

"Following an undercover investigation, agents determined that employees were issuing illegal payments to players using machines that are for entertainment purposes only,' Madigan said. "We take these cases seriously and will prosecute them to the full extent of the law."

"Illegal gambling is a problem the state takes seriously," said Hamer. "Today's actions are a good example of state officials working together to enforce the law."

Simmons was released on a \$5,000 bond. Smith was released on a \$1,000 bond. Both will appear in court on March 23.

Assistant Attorney General James Rustik is prosecuting the case for Madigan's Special Prosecutions Bureau.

The public is reminded that these are merely charges and that the defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty.



If you have a 403(b) retirement plan where you work, you may notice some differences this year. Take the time to become familiar with these changes — because some of them may work to your advantage as you seek to achieve the retirement lifestyle you've envisioned.

One significant 403(b) change affects your ability to invest money with different providers, or "vendors." Previously, your 403(b) may have allowed you to invest with several vendors.
