Heroin. Addiction. Overdose.

The words may bring to mind stereotypical images of rough inner-city neighborhoods, back alley drug deals, homeless addicts. Tucked away in the serenity of cornfields, many feel the rural small town is protected from this social danger. The reality is different. Heroin today has a familiar face. And that face can be found right here in our community.

Heroin abuse has moved to the forefront of the drug concern in this area.

"We ran across heroin maybe twice a year at the most back in the '90s," Dwight Chief of Police Tim Henson told The Paper. "Now, if we go a week without having a heroin-related incident, we are calling it a good week."

"Heroin has been our

major issue going on about three years," stated an investigator with the Livingston County Proactive Unit. "It is the most heightened problem. We still have the cocaine and marijuana users, but the drug that is killing the most in our county is heroin, right next to prescription drugs.

Livingston County Coroner Mike Burke confirmed the concern with an eyeopening fact.

"In 2008, there were only two alcohol-related deaths in Livingston County, but there were four deaths due to heroin overdoses," Burke told The Paper. According to Burke, the heroin deaths occurred in Pontiac, Fairbury and Dwight.

However, more reflective of the problem is the use of Narcan, a drug administered to overdose victims to stop or reverse the effects of the narcotic opioid found in heroin. When administered, Narcan immediately blocks

opiate receptor sites and is responsible for saving lives that might have otherwise been lost to the drug. Last year, it is estimated that between three Livingston County EMS services, Narcan was administered approximately 80 times.

"The reason Dwight is having such an issue with heroin is we are close to the source city being Chicago, we have I-55 which is a source interstate, and these kids going up there are craving that drug and are pretty much fearless," said the investigator.

Highly addictive, heroin is accessible and relatively inexpensive - for only 10 dollars, a user can purchase a small packet of heroin powder called a bindle or foil, which will provide a quick high. After taking heroin just once, a person starts to become addicted.

"That's what is so amazing about this drug," said the (continued on page 3)

Dwight Grade School students can read, and their teachers know so, but sometimes they need a little get up

and go. At least, that's the philosophy behind a current reading incentive program themed "Read to Succeed: 'The fun never ends . . . from there to here, reading takes you everywhere!" by Dr.

Prizes for the six-week program that runs through March 20 include books, a \$50 gift card or an iPod Touch.

The program is designed to "motivate students to read and inspire our reluctant readers," said Librarian Leta Leach.

Students must read a certain number of books that varies from grade to grade, and then they must pass an accelerated learning quiz after each one.

All students will have an opportunity to win books for participating, but two students will win a larger prize: an iPod Touch or a \$50 gift

"Mr. Pagel had an iPod donated to the school to use in any way possible," Leach said. "He wanted to use it to inspire reading." At the elementary level,

the top five readers in kindergarten through fifth grade get a chance to win a \$50 gift card to Barnes and Noble or Best Buy.

In the junior high, the top five readers in each grade get a chance to win the iPod

Leach said the program is good practice for the upcoming ISAT tests.

"We're hoping to work on students' reading to understand - reading to make sure they understand what's being asked of them," Leach said. "(Sometimes) they're answering questions before they've fully read them. (We want them to) slow down and read the question."

When students don't do well on the tests, it brings

down the entire school's scores, she said.

She hopes parents will get on board with the program and push their children.

"If you struggle to read, you struggle in all areas of academics, really," Leach said. "This is something to encourage the kids to read more on their own.'

More Major Renovations Planned for DTHS

Following last summer's completion of a two-year asbestos removal project, more major facility renovations are on the horizon for Dwight Township High School. The school's Board of Education has authorized BLDD Architects of Bloomington to put together construction bid documents for phase one of a proposed roof replacement project. Dan Steider and Barbara Meeks of BLDD were present at the February 16 board meeting

to present plan options. Continual problems with the current aging flat roof have led the board to move toward replacing the current roof with a metal, pitched roof. The project is expected to take place over three years with the first phase to be completed this summer. Phase two is expected to include a cafeteria expan-

Phase one of the project will include an approximate 19,000-square-foot area encompassing all second floor areas, the roof over the office areas and three business classrooms. Estimated cost is advertised to kill bacteria,

for phase one is \$577,000. mold and MRSA on contact. Funding for the initial phase will come from the school's Operations and Maintenance Fund, with \$950,000 earmarked in the fund's balance at the end of this fiscal year for the project. The threephase roof replacement is estimated at nearly \$2 million, with an additional \$570,000 for the cafeteria expansion. Cost to replace the exist-

ing roof with a pitched roof style rather than the current flat roof is double the cost, but board members feel it will provide the best investment, with a life expectancy almost three times greater. "Initially, it will be more

expensive, but in the long run, over the next 50 years, it will be cheaper," said Superintendent Dale Adams.

Two other summer improvement projects received approval to move forward. Replacement of the girls' locker room lockers was approved at a cost of \$44,882. The accepted bid was presented by Division 10 Supplies of Wood Dale. An antimicrobial product will be embedded in the plastic of the lockers, which Cost includes installation.

Faucets for 37 sinks in the building will be replaced with an automatic version at a cost of \$11,500. The school will provide the installation

A proposal to approve a debit card system was tabled by the board pending a decision on use of the same system by the Dwight Grade School District. The Pointof-Sale system would provide a cashless means for student purchases. The "Meal Time" system was recommended at a cost of \$9,607.50 with an additional \$2,769 required for setup equipment. Initially used by students for cafeteria transactions, the system would have the capability of being expanded to include other school purchase needs, such as textbook rental and other fees. The system allows parents the ability to monitor and manage the student's account electronically. The proposal will be reviewed next month.

The next DTHS Board of Education meeting will take place on Monday, March 16, at the high school.

(continued from page 1) investigator. "More often than not, you talk to someone that has smoked cannabis and they can go weeks without it. You talk to somebody that might be a recreational cocaine user and that is how they classify it; they do it on weekends or every other weekend or special occasions. But talk to heroin addicts and that is what it clearly is – an addiction. It is more physiological in its effect – they crave it. It is all they think about."

Heroin can be taken by several means, such as snorting, smoking or injecting. The stronger the addiction, the stronger the need to get the drug quickly into the system. Injection provides the quickest high. Discarded needles found in local parks, downtown and other areas indicate a growing problem.

"I don't remember getting called to the park in 2001, like I did today, to pick up a syringe found by a family just trying to have fun on a relatively nice day," said Chief Henson.

While finding a syringe is a more obvious indication of drug activity, a discarded heroin foil can easily be overlooked and mistaken for a gum wrapper.

Locally, about 25-30 individuals are thought to be responsible for the majority

of the heroin problem. But a problem like this can spread if not eliminated. Pinpointing a target group that might be drawn to the drug is difficult – no social group is immune

"In today's society, you don't know if it's the policeman's kid, the teacher's kid or the preacher's kid," said Chief Henson.

The predominant age group of users in this area currently ranges from 13 to 26. Availability and cost lead some to be more likely to "dabble" with drugs. Add that to the extreme addictiveness of heroin and the problem has explosive potential.

Many times, an increase in crime is directly related to drug use. Henson estimates that as many as five calls per week may be related to drugs, either directly or indirectly. For example, a reported "smash and grab" when a purse is stolen from a vehicle might be due to the need for cash to fund a drug habit.

Police are moving from a reactive approach to a proactive approach in combating drug use, and the help of everyone is critical. Bringing awareness to the problem is key to fighting it.

Be watchful for signs of drug use in your children, friends and family members. Changes in behavior, drop-

ping grades, a shift in social groups or significant mood or attitude changes could signify drug interaction. In general, people need to be aware, cautious and take care in keeping valuables and cash out of sight and

securely locked away. And

reporting suspicious behav-

ior is very important.

"I don't want to get people in a panic mode, but we need to make people aware of the problem," Henson told The Paper. "I don't want people to bury their heads in the sand and think our community is immune to this problem.

"The law enforcement community in general whether it be Dwight, Fairbury, Pontiac or the Sheriff's Department - we cannot conquer this problem by ourselves. We need the help of the citizens who, when they see suspicious activities, they call and report it. They should not feel it is being a burden on the police."

Schools Enter into Tax Abatement Agreement with Iberdrola

Dwight Public Schools have entered into a property tax abatement agreement Saunemin Grade School, Odell Grade School, Pontiac High School and wind farm developer Iberdrola. The agreement will provide an estimated \$4.5 million in additional funding to these five school districts.

Per the agreement, property taxes are abated at 100%. In return, one half of the savings are passed on to the school districts. For Dwight Common (Grade) School District, this is an additional \$434,203, and for Dwight Township High School District, this is an additional \$941,452 in revenues over building the turbines with no abatement during the term of the agree-

turbines are assessed at \$360,000 per kilowatt. The Iberdrola wind turbines will be 2.2 kilowatts. Therefore, they will have a property tax value of \$792,000 per tur-

The turbines are depreciated out over a 25-year span. There will be 150 turbines

Iberdrola's Streator Cayuga Ridge South wind farm with 75 turbines being constructed in 2009 and another 75 during the 2010 second phase. Of these, 36 will fall in the Dwight Grade School District and 64 will be in the Dwight High School District.

In phase one, four turbines built in the Dwight Grade School District will produce a wind farm EAV of \$1,008,000. For the Dwight High School District, phase one will include 13 turbines with an EAV of \$3,276,000. In phase two, 32 turbines According to a new state will produce an EAV of DeMarse.

law effective last year, wind \$9,036,720 for the grade school and 51 turbines will produce an EAV of \$16,013,340 for the high school.

> Superintendent Dale Adams reported that this agreement is the result of six months of negotiations among Iberdrola and the five participating districts. He stated that "this agreement will produce additional tax dollars for the schools while reducing the burden on the local taxpayers. It is a good deal for the schools, the taxpayers and Iberdrola."



FINANCIAL FOCUS Time May Be Right to Convert to Roth IRA

you're taking an important step toward building financial resources for retirement. But it's possible that you could take an even bigger step- by converting your IRA to a Roth IRA. And you may have two especially good opportunities to make this conversion in 2009 and 2010.

Before we examine why this may be so, let's take a quick look at the differences between a Traditional IRA and a Roth IRA. Depending on your income level, your contributions to a Traditional IRA may be tax deductible; regardless of your income, your earnings grow tax deferred. With a Roth IRA, your contributions are never deductible, but your earnings grow tax free, provided you've had your account for at least five years and you don't start taking withdrawals until you're 59-1/2. However, if your modified adjusted gross income exceeds certain levels (\$120,000 per year if you're single and \$176,000 per year if you're married and filing a joint return), you can't contribute to a Roth IRA.

Here's another distinction between the two types of IRAs: With a Traditional IRA, you must start taking required minimum distributions (RMDs) when you reach 70-1/2. But if you own a Roth IRA, you are never required to take distributions, so you can let your money grow as long as you can afford not to touch it.

Which IRA is "better"? There's no one right answer for everyone. Generally speaking, though, the combination of potential tax-free earnings and no RMDs might make the Roth IRA an attractive choice for most people. Additionally you have access to the money you put into the Roth tax-free and penalty-free at any time, as long as you are not withdrawing earnings. So, if you have a Traditional IRA, you might wish to convert it to a Roth - if you can. If your adjusted gross income is more than \$100,000, you can't make the conversion in 2009. Also, keep in mind that any conversion will require you to pay income taxes on your pretax contributions to your Traditional IRA and any growth in your account's value.

If you meet the income limits for a conversion in 2009, you might want to consider doing so, because your tax obligation for a Roth conversion might be lower in 2009 than it would have been in previous years. Following last year's steep market decline, the value of your IRA may be down significantly – and, generally speaking, the lower the value, the lower the tax bill upon conversion. Furthermore, if your income is somewhat dependent on the state of the economy, you could end up with lower earnings in 2009 – another factor that could lessen the tax impact of a Roth IRA conver-

Even if you don't make the conversion in 2009, though, you may still want to consider this move next year. In 2010 and in 2010 only - you can convert your Traditional IRA to a Roth IRA regardless of your income level. Furthermore, the income taxes due on conversion can be spread over two years -2011 and 2012

So contact your financial and tax advisors to determine if a Roth IRA conversion is appropriate for you. Over the next two years, you've got a good window of opportunity to make this move — so you'll want to act before that window



Beth Lawless, GSW social worker, was in attendance to present some information to the BOE about what she has accomplished this year and what some of her plans are for the future. She had a short PowerPoint presenta-

Dr. Decman recommended the approval of next year's school calendar. GSW should be very similar to the other schools in the area; however, GSW is starting earlier next year in an attempt to balance its two semesters. The other high schools in the area have very similar calendars. GSW's feeder schools have chosen to start later and take a couple different days off during the year. Some changes in next year's calendar are: School will be in attendance on December 22 and 23, and spring break will be in connection with Easter in April.

Dr. Decman recommended that GSW set its graduation date for May 17 at 2 p.m. Hopefully, there will not be any more snow days. Also, James Fair, former GSW faculty member, will be the speaker on graduation day.

Dr. Decman, Ms. Spiezio, Craig Male and Don Pfeifer will review the more than 100 applications on March 4 for the maintenance/custodial position. The plan is then to interview the following week and hopefully recommend a candidate at the March, or at the latest, the April BOE meeting.

Dr. Decman reviewed a summary of the recent recommendations from GSW's liability insurance provider and the regional superintendent. a few of the recommendations. The BOE plans to finish the remainder over the summer.

Dr. Decman reviewed the lease agreement for the farming of the recently purchased land. He has contacted Brian Christensen, who has agreed to pay \$180 an acre to farm the land. Christensen has already signed the agreement, and now the BOE has to approve and sign.

The topic of consolidation has long been on the back burner. In the effort to provide the highest quality of education to their communities in the most cost-effective way, the four superintendents agreed to ask their respective boards of education to pass a motion to approve a "reorganization feasibility study." Fortunately, most of this study can be paid for by a grant from the Illinois State Board of Education. Dr. Decman distributed all the information about this opportunity.

Dr. Decman has received a bid from Joe Hollis for about half the price that GSW is currently paying Fatlan's for snow removal. He recommended that the BOE accept this bid beginning next year, unless Fatlan's can match the bid. Dr. Decman will contact Fatlan's to see if it will match the lower bid.

Action items included: Approval of the Gardner South Wilmington High School graduation date of May 17, 2009; approval of the lease agreement for land; approval of the Reorganization Feasibility Study; acceptance of the resignation of Shane Tucker as athletic director; approval of Attached Resolution regarding honorable dismissal of a cer-

tified employee, Dan Jerbi; approval of the employment of a secretary for maternity leave (Tiffany Berger); cancellation of the second board of education meeting of the month of January.

In superintendent information items, Dr. Decman reviewed the latest legislative news from Springfield. He also reported that he met with the Policy Committee to review the newest changes to board policy.

The BOE received an invitation to attend a BOE professional development clinic and received the monthy newsletter from Dr. Decman.

Brian Mendler, a former special education teacher, will address the faculty and staff of the three local grade schools and high school Friday, February 27. His topic will be "Motivating Students to Believe, Achieve and Succeed."

The germ fighting feature comes at an additional cost of \$5,994.

Ideal Environmental is evaluating the cafeteria floor to determine if asbestos is present in the floor tile. Replacement of the cafeteria floor is a maintenance project being considered. However, suspected asbestos significantly increases the cost and scope of the project. More information is being gathered before a recommendation is made.

A proposal to approve a debit card system was tabled by the Board. Two systems were reviewed with Meal Time being recommended at a cost of \$9,607.50. The Point of Sale system would provide a cashless means for student purchases. Initially used by students for cafeteria transactions, the system would have the capability of being expanded to include other school purchase needs such as text book rental. The system would allow the parent the ability to monitor and the student's manage account electronically. While the Board was interested in the proposal, Education Fund monies would be required to purchase the system. uncertainty of pending State Aid monies and a tight Education Fund budget, the Board agreed that right now was not the appropriate time to pursue the project. 

Lincoln responds to Mark Carley, who apparently asked Lincoln to speak to Illinois Governor William Bissell about installing Carley as a county judge. In November 1857, Carley ran for the office amid questions about whether or not he met the minimum residency requirements. Lincoln writes that he spoke to Governor Bissell "to day." Lincoln explains, "He thinks you had no legal residence in the precinct when you were elected; clearly you were not entitled to vote in the precinct, and therefore he thinks you could not be lawfully voted
