Three beloved former teachers wrote a new chapter in history after passing away within two weeks of one another. Adam Gross, Anton John

Kresl and Kathleen "Kate" Sullivan dedicated more than 100 years combined to education and taught thousands of students who passed through the halls of Dwight Grade School and Dwight Township High School.

School officials, members of the community and former students alike have paused to think about those teachers and reflect on their influences throughout the

"I will tell you the mood

schools has been rather somber and very quiet the last week or so," Superintendent Dale

Adams said. "All three "Kate" Sullivan have left their footprint in the Dwight school system and have touched an awful lot of our

kids and adults."

The high school cancelled classes Tuesday, Feb. 24, so colleagues and students could attend the funeral services for Kresl. And the grade school cancelled classes Friday, Feb. 27, for Sullivan's funeral. Gross passed away Feb. 9.

Additionally, the community lost another former





teacher when Tim Hall passed away November 12,

To have three former teachers pass away in two weeks is unprecedented, Adams said.

"It's unusual to have even this many people you know die so close together, let alone have them all be associated with the school system," Adams said. "It's very unusual."

The districts located sub

open. Throughout the years, countless students passed through the science labs, performance risers and basketball courts of these three teachers.

Adam Gross, 76, taught in Dwight schools for 33 years. He taught junior high school social studies and coached a variety of sports including junior high boys basketball and track, high school golf and tennis, and high school girls basketball in Coal City. His junior high

basketball team finished second in the state tournament in 1964. He also coached the DTHS state championship Class A boys golf team in 1980-81.

Former students remember his words of encouragement and the celebrating that he did alongside of them when they excelled.

Adams never worked with Gross, but in going through board minutes from years past, Adams said he discovered records of many of Gross' athletic successes.

"I ran across his name quite often," Adams said. "His name was quite prominent for his athletic successes several years in a row."

Anton John Kresl, 67, died Friday, Feb. 20. He



Vaupel starts new job with a plan

Much like the president of the United States, Larry Vaupel begins his new position as the leader of economic development in Livingston County during tough times.

Both Vaupel, a 16-year veteran of economic development, and President Barack Obama inherited a difficult economic situation. Both have vowed improvement. Only Vaupel's resources

as the first CEO of the Greater Livingston County Development Economic Council don't run quite as deep as the leader of the free

"I don't have a trillion dollars like President Obama," he joked at a press conference to introduce him to members of the media and the GLCEDC executive commit-

Regardless, he has a plan for his first 100 days in Livingston County that includes meeting and greeting and strategic planning.

Vaupel, 40, of Plainfield, was selected after a nationwide search. His resume includes public sector work such as city planning for the city of Peoria and directing economic development for three Chicago suburbs, and private sector work such as consulting for two different economic development firms and heading the planning and entitlements for a Wheatonbased land development firm.

His first order of business in Livingston County is to become oriented with the county by meeting stakeholders and working on strategic planning to determine the strengths and weaknesses of the area.

"One of our greatest assets in this county is an outstanding quality of life," Vaupel said. "It's something we need to focus on in bringing new businesses to this area.'

He cited the county's various highway and interstate interchanges as a big attraction for businesses.

He sees the greatest challenge currently as the economy nationwide.

"(One of the greatest challenges is) the economic climate that we're working with right now and that's not going to last forever," he said. "What we're starting to see is that there is a light at the end of the tunnel."

GLCEDC Chairman Mike Stoecklin, who is mayor of Saunemin, said hiring Vaupel gives Livingston County a seat at the table when companies are looking to site a business. Before, each community needed to do its own work to attract new businesses. With Vaupel, the entire county will have one resource to provide that information.

"We're in the game. When they get a call at least we're going to have a chance," he said. "Before that, we didn't have that."

In addition to his other experience, Vaupel has also served as an adjunct faculty member at Joliet Junior College, is currently a village trustee in Plainfield and is working toward his PhD in political science from

Northern Illinois University. Vaupel said he's excited to

work for an area that is already moving in the right direction. He praised the recent TIF district talks in Dwight, among other things.

"These guys have really gone out and laid the groundwork," he said. "We need to invest in economic development in order to see some gains." Vaupel said the area

should be seeing some money from the federal stimulus plan that recently passed, but he's not sure what that amounts to for Livingston County at this point.

Stoecklin said some Route 116 improvements that have been previously shelved are now back on the table as a result of the stimulus plan.

The GLCEDC has more than 80 members representing the public sector and private business and industry in Livingston County.





New Play Equipment for Dwight's Renfrew Park

As days get longer and spring weather draws closer, projects in preparation for warmer days are taking shape. At its February 23 session, the Dwight Village Board approved two new pieces of playground equipment for Dwight's Renfrew Park and agreed to allow an area of village property to be used as a new ball field.

After 25 years of use and damage from vandals two years ago, the Properties Committee recommended that the large piece of play equipment near Dwight Renfrew Park's west shelter be replaced. In addition, a second piece of equipment will be placed near the park's rocket ship. Committee Chairman Jerry Harris presented the \$27,548 proposal to the board.

According to Harris, the equipment purchased from Let's Go Play, Inc. will feature climbing and slides and will have improved safety features. The west shelter equipment will be geared toward children ages two to

five and the new play area near the rocket ship will provide an activity site for older children ages five to twelve.

Money for the equipment will come from the Laurie Stitzer Estate. Stitzer's estate donated money several years ago to the Village of Dwight specifically intended for use at Renfrew Park and for the children of Dwight. Village of Dwight Public Works will install the equipment for use this summer.

Other donated money will be put to use for a new ball field. Gary and Carol Quigley donated \$5,000 last year to Dwight Youth Baseball to be used for building a new ball playing field. The Village Board approved allowing the grassy area at Washington and William street to be used as the field's site. The field will be used for T-Ball and for the Pinto Boys and Minor Girls leagues.

According to League President Chris Mortensen, the donated money should be enough to get the field playable. Add-ons such as bleachers and dugouts can be looked at as future projects. It is anticipated that the field will be ready for use this season

Mortensen told The Paper that the new ball field should alleviate scheduling conflicts. Currently, T-Ball games are scheduled at 4 p.m., which creates complications for many working parents.

To provide a safer environment in the busy Garret Park ball field area, Washington Street from William to the grade school will be closed to all through traffic during game times. Parking will be allowed along William Street.

In other Village business, the board approved a recommendation to increase the fine rate schedule for village parking violations. Beginning April 1, 2009, parking fines will increase from \$5 to \$25. However, fines will be reduced to \$10 if paid within ten days.

The board accepted the resignation of newly-hired Police Officer Wayne Haley. A misunderstanding regarding the status of Haley's PTI certification led to Haley's personal decision to resign as a full-time officer.

John Hoy of Thawville was approved to fill the open full-time officer position pending successful completion of pre-employment requirements. Hoy comes to the Dwight Police with eighteen years of law enforcement experience in various communities, plus experience as the former chief of police in Gilman. Trustee Angie Airgood voted "no" to the hiring move.

The board also approved a proposal to add an additional part-time officer to the force. The move was presented as a cost-saving measure while offering flexibility to the Dwight Police Department.

In other business, the board approved:

• Dwight Veterans of Foreign Wars Buddy Poppy Drive for May 15 - 16 at the corners of routes 17 and 47.

• Dwight's Annual Cruise Night for Saturday, June 20, from 4 to 6 p.m. in the downtown area.

The next Village Board meeting will take place on Monday, March 9, at 6 p.m. in the Public Services Com-



He retired in 2007 after 43 years of service, during which he coached high school football and boys and girls basketball. He was a National Honor Society sponsor, and a class sponsor, and he participated in the Dwight Education Association. He also served on the school board after retirement.







FINANCIAL FOCUS Retirees Must Make (At Least) Five Key Financial Decisions

When you're working, you have a financial strategy that is largely based on one goal: saving money for a comfortable retirement. You'll likely have to make many adjustments over several decades to ensure that you stay on track saving and investing. But once you retire, a new goal arises — investing so you can remain retired. To help yourself achieve this goal, you will need to make a number of investment decisions.

Which of these decisions are most important? Here are five

· How much will you spend each year? Before you can pursue an appropriate investment strategy, you'll need to know about how much you'll spend each year. Estimate your costs for housing, food, travel, entertainment, insurance, gifts everything. Keep in mind that your expenses will likely change annually, especially for items such as health care. Don't forget about inflation, which will likely cause your expenses to increase over the years.

How should you balance your investment portfolio to provide sufficient income and growth opportunities? Clearly, you'll need your investments to provide a source of income during your retirement years. At the same time, you will need some growth potential to overcome the effects of inflation, which can erode your purchasing power. Consequently, you will need a mix of income- and growth-oriented investments, with the proportions depending on your risk tolerance and your lifestyle.

· How much should you withdraw each year from your investment portfolio? The answer depends on several factors, including your retirement lifestyle, the size and performance of your investment portfolio, inflation, your estimated life expectancy and the size of the estate you'd like to leave. This decision is important, because the amount you withdraw each year will directly affect how long your money lasts

· From which accounts should you begin taking withdrawals? You may have built three different types of accounts: taxable, tax-deferred and tax-free. It may be a good idea to take withdrawals from your taxable accounts first, thereby allowing your tax-deferred accounts, such as your Traditional IRA and your 401(k), more time to compound and potentially increase in value. If you have a tax-free account, such as a Roth IRA, save it for last to maximize the compounding on money on which you will never pay taxes. (Roth IRA earnings grow taxfree if you've had your account at least five years and you don't begin taking withdrawals until you're at least 59-1/2.) That said, this is just a rule of thumb.

When should you take Social Security? You can begin taking Social Security as early as age 62, but your monthly checks will be considerably larger if you wait until your "normal" retirement age, which is likely 65 or 66. But if you need the money, you may be better off by taking Social Security at 62 and giving your tax-deferred accounts more time to poten-

As you can see, you'll need a lot of expertise to successfully manage your financial and investment situations during retirement. If you don't already work with a financial advisor and a tax professional, now would be a good time to start. Once you've got your financial strategy in place, you'll be better prepared to enjoy an active, fulfilling retirement.

Small Talk

I think I may have just discovered the original scrap booker. This person was chronicling her life in scrapbooks long before it was fashionable, long before the practice turned into a multi-million dollar industry.

I'm referring to my grandmother. I just returned from a train trip down to the southern tip of Missouri, the place where my mother was raised and the place I've been countless times throughout my life to visit family. It's a long old haul down that way and I don't make the trip as often as I'd like. A whole lot of miles and daily life get in the way.

I was there to attend a funeral and to take some time out to visit with my grand-mother. She's 90 and had a rough go of it the last few months. She just moved from the house she called home for 45 years into a smaller apartment. Then she took a serious fall that's landed her in a nursing home until she regains her strength. We had some good visits and I was encouraged to see for myself that she's down, but not out. Her body's taken some hits, but mentally she's as sharp as a tack and even a little bit sassy when she needs

One of the evenings I was there, my mother and I went through some of Grandma's scrapbooks. Let me get something out of the way right off the bat. These aren't the fancy, color-coordinated, themed kind of scrapbooks that many of today's young whippersnappers are putting together. The truth is, Winnie's scrapbooks are falling apart. Some of the paper is disintegrating and discolored. They've been so crammed full of things she found worth saving that a couple of them have split in half. These books aren't pretty, but they reveal a lot about my grandmother her life and what's important to her. As far as I'm concerned, they belong in a museum, under protective

Let me share just a few of the items my mother and I found between the pages.

We came across some important pieces of family history: the flag that she and her three daughters hung in the window to signify that my grandfather was fighting in World War II; his discharge papers and hankies he sent to them while away from home. She taped one very worn-outlooking wedding band, as well as the original setting of the engagement ring she accepted from my grandfather when the two of them were so very, very

There are probably thousands of cards of all kinds. spanning decades. I'd venture to say that every card my grandmother ever received has been pasted into one of these books. Christmas cards, birthday cards, anniversary cards, sympathy cards, thank you notes, the little cards that come enclosed with flowers and many, many cards scrawled on paper by her children, grandchildren and greatgrandchildren—all of them are in there. What this tells me is that my grandmother has enjoyed many friends and family during her lifetime and that she has been loved.

Winnie's scrapbooks are full of letters and notes. Some are neatly printed on pretty



stationary; others are quick notes scratched out on napkins or a torn paper towel. Some of my cousins lived close by all of their lives. Often, they'd scratch a note that said, "Stopped by to borrow three eggs and your paring knife," or "We needed to borrow your plunger. Will bring back soon." I'm someone who would have pitched notes written on napkins, but I can see why this was important to her. The notes prove that at one time in her life, she was in the thick of everything. Her home was a hub of activity, a place people came to not only for the special occasions, but also for everyday living.

We found matchbooks, fortunes from fortune cookies and newspaper clippings. If you were in any way related to or friendly with Winnie, chances are your birth graduation announcement, announcement, engagement and wedding announcements are in one of her scrapbooks. She also has kept the invitations, programs and even the napkins from every wedding she ever attended. Wedding and baby shower invitations

are also well represented. Over her lifetime, my grandmother has probably attended hundreds of school programs and concerts, piano and dance recitals, Eagle Scout inductions, funerals, graduations and birthday parties. She has documentation of every single one. What all of this tells me is that Grandma was interested in the lives of other people. She still is. For her, the celebration doesn't need to be about her to be important. She's always been interested in what other people are doing and wants to come along for the ride.

I started feeling a little bit ashamed of myself after we were just a few pages into these scrapbooks that my grandmother has put together over the years. Sure, I've saved a lot of pictures and plenty of my children's artwork, but how many wedding invitations and cards have I tossed in the trash? How many little notes and everyday missives have I crumbled up and forgotten? Probably too many to count.

I rode the train back to my everyday life and looked at the paper clutter on my counters and all over my desk with less disdain than usual. The stacked up newspapers bothered me less, and I've started looking more carefully through the school papers my kids bring home. All of it is proof that we're living and that every day counts.

More Borrowing Not Beneficial to Dwight

I was at the January 26 Dwight Village Board meeting and it was reported that they could refinance the present \$1.8 million Water Bond Loan at a lower rate than the present 5%, which I thought was a good idea. Then they started talking about borrowing \$2 million more to bring water in town from a well east of town. I thought these were two dif-

ferent issues. Well I read in The Paper where they've combined the two to make it a \$3.8 million loan with \$1.8 million going to pay off present loan balance. I started looking into this and what I found is very costly to the Dwight residents

First of all, the rate for the current loan is 7.250% and will be going up in June to 7.375%, not the 5% that was stated! We can borrow the \$1.8 million to pay off the current loan at 3.25%, keep the current payments of \$370,000 and pay this loan

off sooner at great savings! But by not refinancing this loan in January and waiting till the Public Hearing in March, it will have cost us over \$12.000 in interest! They don't need a Public Hearing to refinance this loan!


Here comes the smoke screen – a couple trustees want to borrow this money to bring the water to town from the well east of town, then build a filtration plant to treat the water. They're going to try and convince you they can do this at no additional cost to you by borrowing and keeping the payments the same as now, but for an extended period of years! Our grandchildren can pay the loan off in 20 or so years. This shows they are fiscally irresponsible! If this does not pass the full Board of Trustees, they will have wasted thousands of dollars.





One town, two people featured in cancer book --

(continued from page 1) to benefit Team Taylor and Relay for Life.

The Cancer Book is a different spin to the other Chicken Soup books, said the publication's editor David Tabatsky. Other books focus on a myriad of issues from divorce to loving pets and sports.

"Those are real and important things, but when you mention cancer, you're in different territory," Tabatsky said. "None of those things are life threatening. There's nothing intrinsically painful or nothing about suffering or about truly life changing experiences that cancer automatically represents."

The notion of cancer is immediately frightening, Tabatsky said, but he's learned there's an incredibly tight knit community within cancer patients, their families and medical care providers.

"That I think is part of what will define this book and confirm its unique place in the Chicken Soup library, as well as on a bigger stage with other books," he said. "The voices in this book are amazing."

Gary.

That's the name Gettinger, 17, gave the growth in her head that she detests calling a tumor.

"We'd talk about kicking Gary's butt and a lot of funny other stories," she said. "That makes it easier that it has a funny little name and not quite as scary when If you go:

it's Gary."

Gettinger's essay - originally written as a coming of age story for a high school English class - focuses on being in the moment and living each moment fully.

has a "Everybody moment when you know nothing is going to be the same ever again, when one part of your life ends and another begins," Taylor's "These essay begins. moments are what makes us who we are, and I know I wouldn't be quite me without mine."

She concludes with: "Everybody has a moment, and a lifetime to make the most of it."

Gettinger's words lend an incredible support, Tabatsky said, to the nearly forgotten age group of cancer patients: teenagers, who are treated in pediatrics and are too old to be babies but too young to be adults.

"It's a remarkable discovery for someone her age to be forced to learn and only because of the horrific realities of cancer was she smart enough and supported enough by her family and medical staff to get it and live with it in a positive way," Tabatsky said. "It's unfortunate that cancer needs to be our teacher for things like that and we don't just get it anyway."

Gettinger currently travels to Chicago once a week for her treatments with every fourth week off. She said she's thankful for the outpouring of support that led Team Taylor to be the top fundraiser with \$19,000 at last year's Livingston County Relay for Life.

"Blessed."

That's the name of Heinrich's essay, which begins with the unlikely sentence: "My family ended up in a better place because of cancer."

Heinrich originally worked with Tabatsky on the 2006 release of Marlo Thomas' "Right Words at the Right Time, Your Turn! Volume 2." She paired him with Gettinger for the proj-

For Heinrich's part, her essay tells the story of her family's decision in 2002 to uproot their three children from Chicago city life after learning that her mother-inlaw Carol had lung cancer. Moving to rural Dwight was a life altering decision. Both she and husband Bret risked professional repercussions, and the kids had to leave behind friends.

After Carol passed away, the family contemplated a move back to the city, but they realized they enjoyed the niceties of small town life – a friendly wave from everyone you pass and getting to know their children's friends and their parents.

"All this time we were sure that we were the ones doing Carol the favor. We

were the ones doing the giving. We were the ones making the sacrifice," Heinrich concluded in her essay. "But three years after her death, we know that the opposite is true. Carol's struggle with cancer pushed us to think less of ourselves, and in the process we've been blessed over and over again."

Anne's story says in a quiet way that small town America isn't a myth, Tabatsky said.

"She honors small town America and pulls the curtain back off and says this is real," Tabatsky said. "(She says) these values and the white picket fence and all those films with Jimmy Stewart – they do exist. We found them, and we're glad that we did. And cancer in our family is the reason that we found it."

"Chicken Soup for the Soul: The Cancer Book," hits book stores everywhere March 3.

Both Gettinger and Heinrich will appear at the book signing from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, March 7, at the Prairie Creek Library, 501 Carriage House Lane, in Dwight. Books will be on sale for \$14.95. A portion of the proceeds will benefit Team Taylor and Relay for Life. The Dwight Woman's Club will serve refreshments.
