

DTHS Declined for **Conference Membership**

The controversial subject regarding a conference change for the Dwight Trojans may not be an issue any longer. A request by Dwight Township High School to be considered for membership in the Heart of Illinois Conference has declined by HOI.

Sparked by concerns that DTHS has lost its competitive edge due to significant population growth in many of the current Interstate Eight schools, a committee began investigating options and putting together proposals for possible alternative conference opportunities. Two conferences were being considered based on criteria of proximity, size, culture and similar offerings with HOI being the number one

"They (HOI) were not looking to expand in any of the sports with the exception of football," DTHS Athletic Director Clark Reamer told The Paper. "Their conference did not feel like adding another member school at this time."

The Sangamon Valley Conference was also considered, but a decision on whether to pursue this conference, or any other, is pending.

"We are going to be eval-

uating the situation and determining if we want to pursue any other conference connections," said Reamer. "At this point, we want to stop, evaluate, and if there is a next step, determine what the next step would be. There has not been any official contact with the Sanga-

mon Valley Conference." While many Trojan fans are reluctant toward the possibility of ending the longstanding relationship with the highly regarded Interstate Eight Conference, many others feel that a change is necessary in order to be competitive.

One apprehension toward changing conferences is travel time and distance.

The HOI Conference includes schools such as Fieldcrest/Minonk, Gibson City, Lexington, Flanagan and Tremont, which has an 89-mile one-way distance.

Tri-Point, Clifton Central, Momence and St. Thomas More in Champaign are some schools that make up the Sangamon Valley Conference. One-way travel distances reach 74 and 85 miles.

Currently in the 12school Interstate Eight, Westmont and Lisle tie for farthest one-way mileage at 60 miles.

Former DTHS Wrestler Wins Nationals

An incredible work ethic established during his days at Dwight Township High School propelled 2007 graduate James Nakashima to success on a much larger level, his family and coach-

The 174-pound grappler won the junior college nationals in Rochester, Minn., on February 28.

Nakashima, a sophomore at Lincoln College in Lincoln, Il., was ranked third in the nation heading into the weekend's event and upset the No. 1 seed to make it to the finals. He beat Bradley Banks of Iowa Central College in an exciting 3-2 overtime victory to become first in the nation.

His parents and former coaches say years of hard work and dedication to the sport pushed the Dwight native to become a national champion.

"He wasn't a natural. He worked hard. He sustained. He never quit," said father, John Nakashima of Dwight. "It's a beautiful thing. I'm glad the kid finally got what he deserved."

Nakashima is a two-time

a 4.0 GPA. His record this year was 31-4, with a 54-18 college career.


Nakashima's long list of accomplishments includes being named Central Illinois Wrestler of the Year; he went to state all four years; he was all conference all four years; and he won the Prairie Central tournament all four years.

News of his success at nationals did not surprise former DTHS head coach Josh DeLong.

"It did not come as a surprise at all to me to see James excel at the next level," DeLong said. "He always has had a great amount of talent and an unprecedented work ethic. Watching the film of his national title match it was evident that his work ethic and aggressive style haven't changed. The box score shows that it was a close match, but James physically and mentally wore his opponent out start to finish."

Lincoln College Head Wrestling Coach Dave Klemm praised Nakashima's efforts.

"I am very proud of James for his accomplishments," Klemm said. "He has worked very hard and

accomplishments should catapult him on to the next level."

Nakashima, who is pursuing a career in law, plans to transfer to a four-year college and could know where he'll go in a couple of months. He's considering Illinois or Iowa, his father said.

"He wants to get beat up by the best so he can become the best. That's his (continued on page 3)



Saunemin gym construction begins

Construction began on Saunemin's new gymnasium and fitness center.

Workers broke ground on the \$1.5 million, approximately 13,000 square foot gym in December.

Some sections of siding and insulation have been put on the south wall of the budding structure, said Mike Stoecklin, Saunemin Grade School athletic director and mayor.

'We're still hoping that we'll get it turned over to the school toward the end of August," Stoecklin said. "You can only do what the weather will allow you to."

Talks for a new gymnasium first began after the

school's current gymnasium, which stands alone across the road on the north side of Route 116 from the grade school, sustained significant water damage during heavy rains and flooding in January 2008.

The school board decided last June that it would sell revenue bonds and liquidate about \$400,000 in assets to finance a new gymnasium to be built on the south side of the building - that would include locker rooms, restrooms, a mechanical room and a lobby and concessions

Plans for the fitness center include an office, a storage area, a separate community room and about 1,500 square feet of floor space for fitness equipment.

The school's current gymnasium, which used to be attached to the old Saunemin High School before it was torn down in 1987, is only used for sporting and special events. The school's approximately 145 students in grades pre-K through eight currently exercise in a small multi-purpose room that doubles as the school's lunch room.

The fitness center will be owned and operated by the school, and will include a membership fee to help defray operating costs. Additionally, members of the community may be able to walk at the gym a few times a day when students aren't using it.

Tock arrived at Victory Lanes to find an overflowing parking lot and a full house of spectators ranging in age from seven to 77.

"When I walked through the door, it blew me away," he said. "I'm definitely doing something far left from anything any Dwightite is doing. I know a lot of people around Dwight don't like our music, but they're coming out and supporting us and seeing that we're trying to do bigger things."

Beyond a variety of ages, the show brought a mix of races

"Diversity in Dwight, that's almost taboo," Tock said

That scene was not lost on Tock as he and the Prelude fam began recording their upcoming album. A bio track aptly titled "Tic Tock" says "I'm the one who brought diversity to Dwight, made you forget about the fact that you were racist for one night."

Group members were pumped to see so many people rapping their lyrics back at them at the last Dwight show, Tock said.

Unlike many hip hop artists who rap about money and material possessions, Prelude keeps it real, he said. "We talk about my crappy Bravada and working at Jimmy Johns for minimum

wage, and I think that's why people are so interested because they can relate to that," Tock said. "We don't lie and talk about stuff we don't have or things we're not doing. We talk about real stuff. That's what I'm all about."

In the future, Tock hopes to slip away from the performance side of the business and into more of a managerial role.

For now, the Prelude family plans to celebrate the release of their first album with the goal of putting on 150 shows this year. In the coming weeks, Prelude's first single, "No. 1," which features beats from the Three Dog Night song, "One," will hit radio stations and media outlets.

Before Tock gets to live out the dream started by the Fresh Prince ("I looked at my kingdom, I was finally there, to sit on my throne as the Prince of Bel Air"), he knows there's a lot of hard work to be done.

"We're all good people. We're just ourselves and I think that's going to help in the long run as far as how our music goes," Tock said. "Plus we're all hungry. Being broke is a good motivator."

FINANCIAL FOCUS Create a Strategy for Maturing CDs

Some things, like fine wines, get better with age. But a certificate of deposit (CD) is not one of them. If you have a maturing CD, you need to decide what to do with it - and the earlier you make this decision, the better off you'll be. So if you've got one or more CDs coming due in the next few months, start planning now.

Of course, if you had a specific goal for a maturing CD such as a college tuition payment - your decision has already been made. But if you've purchased a CD for another reason, you'll have to choose whether to renew it or invest the proceeds elsewhere.

If you bought the CD for the income it provides, you may want to renew it. If prevailing interest rates are the same, or higher, than the rate on your maturing CD, you can purchase a new CD without worrying about reducing your income stream. But if rates have fallen, you may have a dilemma: How can you reproduce the income you received from your nowmatured CD?

Here are a few alternatives to consider:

Purchase a bond that pays a higher rate. Instead of buying another CD, you could possibly purchase another fixedincome instrument, such as a bond, that pays a higher interest rate. Be aware, though, that if you find a bond that pays a higher rate, you may be taking on more risk, so make sure any bond you purchase is considered "investment grade quality" by the independent rating agencies.

Buy a longer-term CD. Generally speaking, you can get a higher interest rate when you purchase a longer-term CD. Your money will be locked up for a longer period of time, but it will help provide you with a more stable income stream over

• Create a fixed-income "ladder." To combat interest-rate concerns, you might want to build a fixed-income "ladder" by buying several CDs or bonds with varying maturities - shortterm, intermediate-term and long-term. When market rates are low, you'll still have your longer-term vehicles earning higher interest rates. And when market interest rates are high, you can reinvest the maturing short-term bonds and CDs at the higher

Thus far, we've talked about replacing a maturing CD to protect your income stream. But if you bought a CD for another purpose - such as removing some of your money from a volatile stock market - then the CD's maturity gives you a chance to re-evaluate your investment strategy. As you know, 2008 was a tough year for the stock market, so, at the time, diverting some of your money to a CD might have seemed smart. But history tells us that even the worst bear markets don't last forever, and that the biggest gains in a rally often occur at the early stages.

Consequently, you may want to take this opportunity to rebalance" your portfolio, and, if appropriate for your individual situation, look for ways to invest the proceeds of your CD into quality equities or other securities.

By planning ahead, you won't feel rushed to make a hasty decision when your CD matures or, even worse, be tempted to spend the money and have little to show for it. Your maturing CD can help you achieve your financial goals – if you give it






whether or not there was a letter?" Think about it!
