No User Fee Increases for Dwight Residents; **Loan Extension Being Considered**

Village of Dwight residents will not see any increase in user fees for the coming fiscal year – that was a key message as the Dwight Village Board approved the 2009 – 2010 fiscal year budget during its March 23 session.

Village Administrator Kevin McNamara presented the \$9,046,155 balanced spending plan. According to McNamara, the budget reflects the Village's financial condition and its slow rate of economic growth along with the continued turndown in the National and State economies. Sales tax revenues, the largest revenue source for the Village, are projected to be 12 percent lower than the past year.

Despite the sagging economy, residential garbage rates will remain frozen and no increases are planned for water rates, sewer rates, ambulance rates, property taxes, permit fees, swimming pool and recreation

Also reflective of the tight economic picture, and in an effort to keep village finances stable, full-time village employees will not receive any pay increases this year.

Two new funds totaling \$55,000 are included in the General Fund budget for programs intended to stimulate small business retail growth. The funds are designated for a rent subsidy program to encourage new retail businesses to occupy vacant buildings and a commercial rehab loan program intended for the redevelopment and revitalization of the Village's central business district. The programs have not yet received board approval.

Prior to budget approval, a public hearing took place to consider borrowing \$2 million at the same time the current 1994 Water Bonds are refinanced. Refinancing of the remaining \$1.8 million water improvement loan balance could reduce the interest rate by more than 3%. The proposal to add an additional \$2 million to the loan would not increase the current yearly loan payment, but would add eight more years (continued on page 3)

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

Sighting current low interest rates and the possibility of lower bids given the struggling job market, McNamara recommended adding the \$2 million additional debt now so as not to incur even more cost at a later date when interest rates return to a higher rate. As an McNamara alternative, explained that the village could wait until 2014 when the current loan is closed, to do any type of water project. However, with eight water line breaks last year, moving forward with replacement of the aging lines now would be most cost effective.

Three residents offered public comment at the hearing and questioned the timing of borrowing additional money and expressed concern about the need for fiscal responsibility. One resident questioned what benefits would be received from replacement of the water lines. The Village water

operator was on hand and explained that new lines would improve water quality and fire flow while reducing the need for continued repairs.

The board will make a decision on the water bond and additional loan recommendation at a later date.

In other business, the board

• amended the 2008-09 budget to reflect using savings to bring the sewer and water funds into balance so as not to levy a tax increase

• passed an ordinance increasing Village parking violation fines from \$5 to \$25 effective April 1. However, fines will be reduced to \$10 if paid within ten days

At the March 12 Livingston County Board meeting, County Board Chairman William Fairfield announced that there was a vacancy in District #1 due to the death of Frank Deninger. By statute, this vacancy shall be filled within 60 days by appointment of the chair of the county board, with the advice and consent of the county board.


The appointed individual shall be someone from the same political party, shall

committee has been tentatively set for Thursday, April 2, at 6 p.m. in the County Board Room.




MIXEN **SUPPORTS NIELSEN** FOR MAYOR



Small Talk

A young couple allowed me to hold their baby a few weeks ago. It was good of them. I was a stranger to them, to this baby. But I have to admit, the experience was a little piece of heaven.

I'm a seasoned baby holder. I think this particular baby, and most babies, can tell right away that I know what I'm doing. I've got the whole thing down pat. Instinctively, I know just how to support little wobbly heads. I know when to start swaying back and forth, and when to stop. I'm totally on top of when to shift an infant from one hip onto the other. And, I'm pretty proud of the fact that I'm nonplussed about spit-up and drool, and all of those other secretions that come out of babies. What can I say? I'm a mother.

I don't get to hold babies as much as I'd like to these days. My own have moved way beyond the infant stage. Two of them are physically bigger than I am, and the third, well, she's just pretty offended to be called a baby.

When I do get my hands on a baby, I find myself remembering all of the things I like about them. They're just so cool. I love the way their little arms are still in sections. I love their chubby little hands that always feel kind of damp on the inside. I love their rounded, perfect feet and the way their chubby tummies pooch out there without any shame. They've got no qualms about putting any and everything into their perfect, pink little mouths. They look people over with wide open eyes, without apology, until they've figured out if they like you or

My own babies had enormous cheeks, almost from birth. I nursed all of them by moonlight and in broad daylight, in just about every possible position imaginable. I spent at least six years of my life with a child attached to my chest. I've nursed babies at the mall, in restaurants, at family gatherings, in my van, in my backyard, while working on the computer, in an art museum, while watching an Omnimax, 3-D movie, even while we toured a cave several hundred feet below the

Earth's surface. The first night we came home with our firstborn, Bret and I were nervous, exhausted wrecks. The poor little baby we'd brought home had to know that she got stuck with two of the biggest bumblers imaginable. We were blearyeyed newbies, truly not equipped to handle a newborn,

not even between the two of

But we got better. Just like any parents, we caught on fast. By the time our third and youngest daughter arrived, we were diaper-changing, droolwiping, binky-wielding mavericks. We were parenting machines. Nothing spooked us. We could handle teething, fevers, raisins smashed into the carpet, gummy, gommedup graham crackers, temper tantrums, projectile vomit and some diapers that could have been classified as hazardous waste. Our son liked to eat rocks and throw whatever he could find in the toilet. One of the girls' favorite pastimes was to pull all of the books from the shelves, over and over and over.

All of that part is a blur, and unfortunately, so are many of the warm and perfect moments as well. Our babies smiled at us with gummy, juicy grins. All three of them liked to pat my face as I rocked and nursed them for one last time before tucking them into their cribs. They reached their chubby arms up toward their daddy, so he'd pick them up. Occasionally, they fell asleep on Bret's chest. They all had deep, belly laughs and liked sitting on our laps. Sometimes, they cried when we left the room and they looked like sweet angel babies when they slept.

When I get the chance to hold a baby, all of that comes rushing back at me, and I get a lump in my throat because it all went by too fast. I realize that part of life for me is over, and I hope I held my babies enough. Did we savor it all like we should have? Did we realize as we tiptoed out of their rooms after tucking them into their cribs that it would all be a blur one day? Maybe not.

"Every resident of the Village wants a better road in front of their house or a better alley on which to drive. Everyone wants new and improved water lines and sewer lines. The question is where will the money come from to pay for these projects? sounds good to say we're going to get money from the government or get stimulus money, but we've already been told we are too small to get any stimulus money from the Department of Transportation. Dwight's share of that money went to the county. One of my opponents says he is going to spend \$2 million repairing roads and another \$2 million fixing water lines. Sounds good, but where's the money coming from? The roads in Odell (where he was Mayor for 14 years) aren't anything to write home about, and 'You can't rob from Peter to pay Paul' with the Village budget.

"In January, as chairman of Dwight Economic Development Council, I called a meeting of the EDC, the are doing a good job, and we Dwight Chamber and Dwight Main Street to address the eco-

nomic condition of our business community, including the 17 empty store fronts downtown. That group is currently working on suggestions and has given a proposal to the Village Board that works on improving and promoting Dwight to keep our downtown alive.

"For a community our size, I feel Dwight offers many fine services to its residents. We have small town values and a charm that is an envy of communities far and wide. Our Police Department, our Public Works Department, our EMS and ESDA Departments have been operating the past few years with less people and less operating funds, but they continue to provide us with fine services. We have good people in charge of our departments in the Village and I plan to keep these people. I love Dwight and want to make it the best small town in Illinois. I feel I have the leadership qualities, the educational background and the business experience to guide Dwight in the future."

In response to a question about plans to address the deteriorating economic and physical situation downtown, Wilkey said, "This is another problem that needs to be evaluated and see what would be the best way to improve the downtown area.

Wilkey stated that he believes "our public services need to continue to serve the Dwight residents."

"The most important issue facing the district is doing what is right for the students including having a balanced budget.

"It takes two years to learn the school board system. I have had to make hard decisions in the interest of maintaining a balanced budget - not always following the recommendation of administration. A community without a sound school system will not improve or grow.

'We need to maintain and improve our current assets, improve textbook rotation, and take it slow. These changes are needed and doing them without raising taxes is a priority.

We cannot start spending the money from the wind farm irresponsibly. We need to keep a close eye on the budget and maintain enough working cash so that delayed or missed state payments don't put us in the

"This year we implemented part-time social worker to help deal with many needs of the school. A current member of the board has brought up a program of educating new parents on the needs of their child's education that has worked in other districts. This program will only be available if we have the proper resources.

"I feel that the board must use the money from the upcoming wind farm project to improve the longevity of the district. This money can be put towards many useful upgrades that will reduce utilities and improve facilities. A new field house would be a nice addition to Dwight if the timing is right. At this time I don't feel the timing is right. There are too many unknowns in the current economical environment.

"The single most important issue facing our school district is addressing the economic concerns of the families of our community. Students are affected by extra stresses that can be added to their families and this stress is reflected in their performance at school on educational, behavioral and social levels. Our challenge is to address student issues while being conservative within our budget and by using the resources we already have that maximize benefits to the fami-

lies and students of our district. "We need to focus on keeping class sizes small. Educators would then be better able to serve the needs of the individual student. That may mean providing more challenging work for a child who is thriving academically or referring a child to a social worker to gain skills needed to deal with issues they might be experiencing outside of school. As a school board, we must be fiscally responsible so as to ensure that we have the resources to send our kids out into the world with the best pos-

sible education available. "Our first investment should be in the education of our children. New wind farm revenues could be used to help further that goal. Additional teacher education and the use of current technological based curriculums are two avenues that should be explored when considering how to best utilize these wind farm revenues. Teachers and students alike would benefit from updated curriculums, textbooks, online resources, teaching methods and technology that we can provide through wise spending of current revenues. Also, we should explore full day kindergarten. This has been on the agenda of the school board for quite some time and new revenue, such as the wind farm money, may be an excellent way to see that goal through to fruition without needing even more tax dollars.

"As a board, we need to carefully prioritize our needs by keeping a focus on the quality of education for all of our students. The board must be fiscally conservative and financially accountable in handling taxpayer dollars while keeping the focus on our students' education and welfare."

"The single most important issue facing the school district is the potential deficit in the education fund.

My wife and I have four children in this school district ranging in age from 17 to 4 years old. Some of them love school and want to get there early. Some of them can't stand school and don't want to be there any longer than they have to be. For some of them, good grades come easy, for some, they have to study very hard to keep their grades up. We have some I think the teachers enjoy having in class and some not so much. We have athletes that are starters and athletes that have been bench warmers. With this diversity in attitudes and experiences with the school, I feel I can see the whole picture and can see the needs of a wide variety of parents' concerns when it comes to issues with the school.

"I think 80 percent of it should be put towards the education fund. If we can't keep the education fund in the black, we can't educate. The other 20 percent should be used for something fun for the students. I don't have any ideas about what that is, but I feel the students should have fun at school in addition to getting an education.

"I think Dale Adams does a great job of trying to keep the budget in order. Like most people, I feel the school must remain diligent in its efforts to prevent wasteful spending and to get the most out of every penny it spends.

"Every student, no matter what their financial situation, deserves the same educational opportunities. Evervone deserves a chance to succeed. We need to do whatever we can to help them with their educational needs. I would have to investigate this further to understand the differences a lowerincome student has with their educational needs as opposed to middle-income and upperincome students.

"During the last board meeting, there was discussion of reducing the number of classes in the lower grades from four to three. I believe the class sizes in the lower grades, first through third or fourth, should be under 18 students. Here are my thoughts behind this.


"First, think about the chaos of 19 to 25 first, second, and third graders in a classroom. I realize the teachers in these grades have training for dealing with smaller children's issues, but there seems to be an increase in ADD, ADHD, and Autism diagnosis lately which is adding to the chaos of the classroom. I think if the class size is smaller, the teachers can address the needs of the students that need more attention and get them to understand their behavior to help them learn at an early age to recognize and control it.

"Second, I believe it would be easier for the students to learn the basic fundamentals of reading, writing, and arithmetic. This will give them a strong base for the rest of their educational career. The teacher would be able to give more help to children having difficulty grasping the basic concepts if there are fewer students in the classroom.

"Finally, the teachers should

be able to instill good study habits earlier in the students educational career with fewer students in the classroom. They would be able to determine if their students are studying in the correct manner. This will ensure success throughout the students' time in school. I chose the number of under 18 students from current enrollment numbers and comments I heard from teachers during the school board meeting. My impression was their classrooms were more manageable with the current numbers than with more. The four to seven more students, although doesn't seem like many, would lessen the educational opportunities for all of the students because they wouldn't get as much individual attention as needed. I know these teachers have had the bigger classes, and they are on the front lines so they know first hand what works well and what doesn't. They know they need the smaller classes to be effec-Name:





"The single most important issue facing the school district now is managing the anticipated funds that the wind farm will bring to the district. The main focus of the wind farm funds should be used for funding the district so to relieve, not eliminate, the tax burden of the citizens. If the wind farm funds do materialize to the extent that is expected, another focus of funds should go toward building maintenance and asset preservation.

"My idea for managing the school's financial situation is simple: Make sure the district lives within its means. Every family has to live within a budget, and we expect it from

our government entities as well. "I don't believe that "lowincome" students have different educational needs than other students. All students need to have a learning environment that allows them to have an understanding of how the real world works. All students need to be taught that they can achieve anything. "Funding concerns based on the economy and state of Illinois' financial situation is the single dominating issue facing our school districts. Though the high school district is currently in a favorable financial situation, it can change quickly should spending not be kept in check, budgets not be reviewed closely or state payments not come in as committed to by our state legislature. Working to keep both school districts strong financially is critical to the educational future of our children and the well being of our community.

"I believe that my past experience on school board (8 years split between the Dwight High

School and Grade School boards), my college education (Masters in Business Administration, Bachelors in Teaching Education - Math and Physical Education), coaching experiences at multiple levels (college, high school and private club) and 23 years of work experience in manufacturing (past 12 years in supervision) gives me a stronger and broader background allowing me to understand the financial, technical and educational aspects of school board membership. As a leader and member of successful teams in both the business world and community, I understand the importance of good communication, goal setting, sound budgeting, ongoing process improvement, recognition and team work to accomplish the work that needs to be done by our school boards and school administration to ensure success for our students.

"With schedule delays and decreases in the number of turbines that each wind farm project had planned initially announced in the last four months and the current economic climate, committing any of this money to a large scale project (fieldhouse) at this time would be foolish and fiscally irresponsible. My belief is that the wind farm money should be devoted to the current school facilities in each district to enhance and improve the educational environment of each district's student body. Once the money is actually available, each district would review and prioritize the critical building needs identified by school administration and board mem-

"At the high school, building needs such as cafeteria and kitchen upgrades and expansion so that all students can eat in the cafeteria during the lunch period; band/chorus room soundproofing and improvements; upgrades and expansion of the outdated locker rooms used by all students; gym updating and increased space for student physical fitness areas; continued ongoing improvements to the auditorium; technology

upgrades; building security improvements and upgrades. To clarify for some in the community that are confused, phase one of the high school roof project scheduled for this summer is the only portion of this four phase project that has been approved by the board. This particular phase had been planned for in the budget the last four years and will be covered by money already in the district funds - no additional cost to taxpayers. With the leaks in the current roof, this phase cannot wait any longer with further damage to the second story of the building. The remaining three phases of the roof project are proposals subject to change since they have not yet been approved or committed to by the board.

"For the past four years, I

have been a strong voice on the high school board regarding budgeting and planning for large projects in smaller portions over multiple years. By doing this, the impact is less to the taxpavers as it is spread out over more time rather than all in one year. This philosophy also allows for money to be built up over time allowing the money to be moved to other more pressing projects should needs change at the school or state funding changes happen. Through my years on the board, I have been conservative with regards to tax levies and have focused on ensuring that our students were getting the best education they could for the money that we had available.

"Ensuring that the district is offering programs (free and reduced meals, student fee/ activity fee assistance and scholarships, computer check out, after hours internet availability, credit recovery courses, student assistance classes) are keys to making sure that students in this population have access to the same things as other more fortunate students. Having processes in place that help identify these students quickly and without calling them out in front of their peers is critical to ensuring that they (continued on page 14)

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

"There is no single or simple solution to the school finance and funding dilemma. These are extremely tough economic times. The flow of state aid is an issue for school districts. The Board of Education relies on the superintendant and administration to identify emerging issues. After determining anticipated revenues and expenditures, he provides us with the information we need to make operational and financial decisions I believe we need to work closely and cooperatively to stay "ahead" of budgetary debt while also remembering fiscal responsibility to the citizens and taxpayers of our district."

To meet the educational needs of the growing lowincome student population "is an issue that needs to be researched thoroughly on an ongoing basis, but some of my thoughts are: I feel we need to have high expectations and accountability for all students, they must know we believe that they can achieve and be successful. We must focus on and reinforce core subjects to strengthen student knowledge and confidence. Early prevention and intervention need to be available for students when necessary. Monitoring and accountability of student progress is Recruiting and important. retaining teachers, strong in both curriculum and instruction must be considered. Also, opportunities for staff interaction, professional development and, for newer teachers, peer coaching/mentoring. Lastly, parents must realize how important they are in their child's education. We need to clarify expectations for parents and involve them so students are encouraged at home as well as at school."

(continued from page 14) tened to by the Village board. I fully understand that I work for you, not them. I have a vested interest in the success of Dwight, not because of personal gain, but because I have a son who lives here, and goes to school here, and I don't want an uncertain future for him.

'I will not be a bobble-head on the board, quietly nodding assent to everything that comes across. Anything that smells of waste, I will strongly challenge and oppose.

"I believe those who strongly favor the TIF want to brand those who have strong reservations against it as 'anti-growth.' I am one of those in the concerned group, and I assure the citizens of Dwight, I am not anti-growth. I believe we need growth in order to ease the burden of property tax from our weary shoulders. I fear that this TIF may increase property taxes to help pay for the off-set going into the TIF fund. In today's economy, I realistically do not see any businesses just waiting at our door for the TIF to be announced in order to relocate and build. I do agree something should be done to attract good paying industry jobs, but I want to be sure it's the right thing for everyone.

"It's a big order. Anyone who is able to say that they can solve this problem in two years or even four years is not only a magician, but probably needs medical attention. We supposedly had somewhat of a solution for the flooding of Brewster Creek issue. Eleven years ago, after a particularly bad flood, it was agreed that the railroad culvert was too small and needed replacement. Twenty thousand dollars was supposed to be saved each year to cover the cost. That fund today would be \$220,000. How much is actually in that fund? Probably nothing. So here we are 11 years later and nothing to show for it.

"Another failure is that we should have been making calls upon calls to get something from President Barack Obama's stimulus plan for infrastructure. Over \$1 billion was given to the state of Illinois. How much did we get? I think they matched what's in the Brewster Creek fund. So what will it take? Decrease frivolous spending, paying off our debt, and saving. We need to be patient and make smart repairs in as big of bites as we can realistically afford. We need to start planning for the future, and this means saving for the future. We also need to start being proactive in looking for grants, not reactively looking for them. We need to focus on attacking the problem, not on attacking the people.

"One way to improve the deteriorating economic and physical situation downtown is to improve the economic situation in Village Hall. We need money to improve the physical situation. Some ways I think we can help solve that problem is the answer to the second question: improve the emphasis on economic development. One way that can be improved is

is a tool used to visit like-sized communities that are working and take back ideas and plans that work for them and modify them to use here in Dwight. The key word here is like-sized. We have to compare apples to apples, not apples to oranges. What works in a town of 50,000 may not work well with a town of 4,000. We also need to think outside of the box to help develop tourism. Tourism not only helps retail, but can help in developing real estate and potentially, industry.

"I have no plans and will strongly oppose any plan to village revenue increase through any increase in any form of taxation or fees.

I rate our public services as good. Police Department, Fire and EMS, as far as I know are performing well. Public works, such as water and sewer, need some attention. I don't think any expansion of the water and sewage is needed at this point and pursuing that is money not well spent. I would like to find ways to decrease the water and sewage bills we pay each month. I believe what we currently pay is bordering on outra-

"I believe we have several issues of importance at this election, first and foremost is the economy and the financial well being of the village of Dwight. We need to review the effects of what has happened and what may happen to the village in these challenging economic times. We certainly need to address the downtown area and try to establish some sort of retail businesses, though I acknowledge that the reality of businesses being successful in our small town is dependent upon the support of the community. "I have concerns with the proposed TIF district. My primary concern is that the proposed north end of the TIF district happens to fall into a flood plain. I absolutely cannot and will not approve the proposed TIF district as it is currently drawn up. Eleven years ago the residences on the north end of town, in Milbauer subdivision, experienced terrible flooding. Flooding has happened several times since then. The proposed TIF is connected to Brewster run creek. When flooding happens the overflowing creek bed finds release in the acreages the proposed TIF is located. If we go on to develop this area all residences and land downstream could potentially have a catastrophic event the first time it would flood.

"My priority is to help them fix the existing problem and not create a potentially catastrophic event by blocking the creek flow, or altering the landscape. I would have to offer a guess that some of the proponents of the TIF do not understand the events that could happen if this TIF district in the current state is accepted. The notion that I am against the concept of the TIF and TIF districts, in general, is absolutely false. I am for a TIF district, but not in the way the current proposal is written. The facts are that just because we create a TIF, it does not change the demographics of the

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village. What we have to offer is the same now and the same as it has been: we possess a very strategic location for businesses to locate and create a presence. If we already have the property to attract businesses and the proper personnel marketing these areas, we haven't changed a thing to it except said it is now a TIF district. I find a concern that there is a general thought that the mere creation of a TIF district, let alone a flawed one, will automatically create business to come.

"I have stated above that our infrastructure is in decay, but the question is why? For too long we have not done the proper upkeep and the necessary preventive maintenance. Now instead of each year spending a little bit to keep things up, our past leaders and board members have put us in the situation to spend millions to replace.

"If we want to plan for the future then we actually need to plan, not say the words. The Village of Dwight needs to have elected officials that are proactive, because the reactive approach you have seen is going to cost the town millions of dollars now. We may need to borrow money, we may have to operate some bonds or perhaps we may have to cut spending somewhere.

"The bottom line is the continued neglect for improvements and preventative maintenance by our past elected officials has put this town in decay. The board members need to either understand that they are accountable for these actions or decide where the accountability lies. For too long, we have as a whole allowed this to happen and now is the time for the people of Dwight to voice their displeasure. I will work with the other board members and the new Mayor to establish a oneyear, five-year, 10-year up to a 20-year systematic infrastructure plan.



- quate screening, including fencing, landscaping, or appropriate means, in order to minimize visual impact. E All Cargo containers located on a single lot (or

adjoining lots owned or controlled by the same

- person) shall be painted a uniform color. All Cargo containers located adjacent to a building shall be painted to match the color of the build- \underline{F} All Cargo containers shall be placed so as to con-
- form to applicable set back requirements for accessory structures.
