Odell Food Mart Changes Hands

The new Odell Food Mart owners want to keep grocery shopping local.

Dan and Colleen Barrett, along with daughter Natasha, 21, took over ownership of the grocery store at 100 S. Waupansie St. on Feb. 16. "We're trying to carry a larger quantity of stuff at a lower price to keep business local," said Colleen, of Odell.

Former owner Chet Patel, who ran the business for four years, planned to close the store if the Barretts hadn't bought it.

Closing the town's only grocery store would have been unfortunate for many people in the village, Colleen said.

"It would have been bad," she said. "We've always tried to shop here just to keep a grocery store. There's a lot of people who can't get out of town."

Changes to the store include a wider variety of foods, especially snacks and cereals.

The supplier for meat — one of the store's most popular items — remains the same.

"Meat is our biggest draw," Colleen said. "We're trying to keep more produce."

Hours are 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Sunday.

Starting in late April or early May, the Barretts plan to extend hours until at least 7 p.m. during the week.

Mapping Program Gets Underway for Dwight

The Dwight High School cafeteria provided the setting Thursday evening, April 2, for the first of five MAPPING sessions designed to discuss the past, present and future of the Dwight community.

MAPPING stands for Management And Planning Programs Involving Non-metropolitan Groups.

Approximately 50 residents of the community were present out of some 135 who had been invited to attend the sessions. Also in attendance were members of the Dwight Economic Development Commission, program sponsors.

Loka Ashwood and Jeffrey Nemeth, community outreach specialists from Western Illinois University, Macomb, conducted the April 2 session, which was concerned with "Where Are We Now?"

The program began with local participants being asked to give a brief description of themselves. This was followed by a description of the MAPPING process, its core concepts, and what it was designed to accomplish.

The community participants then filled out two sides of a card, one side stating: "We love our community because . . ." and the other,

Negatives: Coil factory closes; Tyler GM dealership closes; Gleason children murdered; empty storefronts as businesses leave downtown; meth and other drug issues.

The positives and negatives of Dwight were discussed at length, with the background put into place for

the meeting Wednesday, April 8, (tonight) at 6 p.m. in the high school cafeteria. The topic will be: "Where do we want to be?"

Seating will be available for anyone interested in attending the future MAPPING sessions. A formal invitation is not required, but one's intent to attend should be expressed by calling 584-3077.

Sessions last about three hours. Refreshments are served.

Three additional sessions will be held: Thursday, April 23; Wednesday, April 29; and Thursday, May 7.

Area WWII Veterans to Travel to Memorial in Washington

Two area World War II veterans will soon be honored with a free trip to Washington, D.C. to see their names on the World War II Memorial and visit other historic sites.

Dr. Oliver Zivney of Dwight and Bill Finn of Coal City, father of Dwight Village Clerk Patti Drechsel, will be among about 80 veterans to embark on the journey Wednesday, April 15. They will spend one long but memorable day visiting the WWII Memorial; Korean, Vietnam and Iwo Jima memorials; and other Washington sites. The trip is provided free of charge by Honor Flight Chicago, a program established in early 2008 to honor veterans of the United States Armed Forces, especially those who served in WWII.

Bill Finn served with the 101 Airborne Division and was captured on D-Day by German troops. He spent eight months in a prison camp before being liberated by the Russians.

His daughter, Patti Drechsel, sent the application for her father to participate after

the family saw a newspaper article and television clip about the program. She explained that several people go on the trip as "guardians" to assist the veterans with needs such as medications and wheelchair transportation. As Finn cannot walk very far without a walker or other assistance, Honor Flight Chicago is providing a wheelchair for him to use during the trip.

Although Drechsel said she would love to see her father's expressions throughout the day — family and friends typically aren't allowed on the trip — she said she felt it was important for WWII veterans to experience the memorial alongside those who truly understand its meaning.

"I'm just glad for this opportunity for Dad to be able to share this with other veterans who went through the same things he did," she said.

Dr. Oliver Zivney served with the Navy and Marine Corps as a Fleet Marine Corpsman in the 1st, 2nd and 6th Marine Division during World War II. He said he is (continued on page 16)

Benefit for Darian Hamilton, Odell, to be Held April 18

A benefit for St. Jude cancer patient Darian Hamilton will be held Saturday, April 18, from 3 to 10 p.m. at the Odell Community Building. There will be food, an auction, raffles, live music, a 50/50 drawing and more.

Darian, an eighth grade honor student in Odell, was diagnosed January 19 of this year with Ewing Sarcoma, a cancer of the bone. She is a St. Jude patient currently undergoing chemotherapy treatments at the Children's Hospital in Peoria.

"Darian's mass is about the size of a tennis ball and is surrounding part of her pelvic bone," explained her mother, Patti LaBorence of

Odell. "We are praying the chemo will decrease the size of the mass and the doctors will be able to remove it with

only minor surgery. Because the pelvic bone cannot be replaced, there is a chance this sweet girl will lose her left leg."

Darian's family described her as an energetic, outgoing girl who loves to play sports. "She is always so full of life and such a happy girl," said LaBorence. "She is thoughtful and kind, a good team member, a great role model and a great friend. She has always brought pride, charisma and courage to all of the softball and volleyball teams she has been on."

Darian is also a role model at school, maintaining honor-roll grades and volunteering (continued on page 3)

Can P/E Ratio Help You Make Smart Investment Choices?

Many stocks were pummeled by the long and severe market downturn. As a result, you can now find plenty of good, quality stocks selling at low prices. On the other hand, some companies belong to industries whose near-term future looks uncertain – and even though these stocks, too, may be inexpensive, they aren’t necessarily good deals. So, how can you tell the difference between good stocks selling at temporarily low prices and not-so-good stocks selling at deservedly low prices? One tool that may help you is the price/earnings ratio, or P/E.

When looked at mathematically, P/E is a simple concept – it’s calculated by dividing the current stock price of a company by its earnings per share. So, for example, a stock that is now priced at \$40 and has \$2 of earnings per share will have a P/E of 20. Generally speaking, a stock’s P/E reveals how much investors are willing to pay per dollar of earnings. So, for the stock mentioned above, its P/E of 20 implies that investors are willing to pay \$20 for every \$1 of earnings that the company generates. It follows, therefore, that the higher the P/E, the more “expensive” a stock is perceived as being.

Because the average P/E in the stock market has been around 15 over the past 50 years, one might say, in a broad sense, that a stock with a P/E of 20 is neither terribly expensive nor particularly cheap.

Overall, the P/E ratio is a typically a good indicator of a stock’s value – and a much better indicator than the price alone. To illustrate: A \$20 stock with a P/E of 70 may actually be much more “expensive” than a \$100 stock with a P/E of 20. As an investor, you’re paying much more for the future earnings of the \$20 stock than you are for the earnings of the \$100 stock. So, in the present-day situation, with the market still down so much, you might be able to use P/E to get a clearer sense of which stocks are really priced attractively and which ones are expensive, despite their low market price.

Keep in mind, however, that a low P/E doesn’t automatically mean that a company is undervalued. One way of interpreting P/E is as a measure of the market’s optimism about a company’s growth prospects. So, if a company has a P/E that is lower than average, it could mean that the market has low expectations for this company.

Furthermore, just looking at a stock’s P/E in isolation can’t always tell you if it’s a good deal. For that, you also need to compare its P/E with other stocks in the same industry. That’s because some industries, such as utilities, typically have low P/Es, while others, such as technology, generally have higher ones.

As you can see, you’ll need to consider a few “wrinkles” in P/E before using it to evaluate whether a stock is priced attractively. Consequently, you may want to get some help from a financial advisor. But one thing to keep in mind: Right now, you can find attractive prices on quality stocks – and the correct use of P/E may well help you find the best ones.

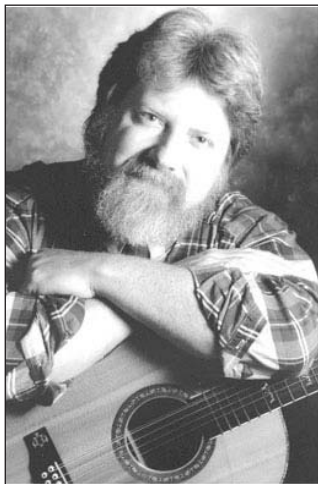
Lee Murdock to Perform for Dwight Historical Society

The Dwight Historical Society will meet Wednesday, April 22, at 7 p.m. in the Community Room at Prairie Creek Public Library. Note that this is a departure from the usual meeting night of Monday to accommodate the appearance of Lee Murdock.

Murdock will perform "From the Auld (Old) Sod to the New Prairie: Songs of Irish Immigration in Illinois." Weaving music with stories, Murdock presents a compelling story of Irish immigrants in Illinois. As they came to America to build their new lives in a foreign land, they were also essential hands in building the canals, railroads and towns that became Illinois and America. Both traditional ballads and modern historical songs are featured in this presentation.

Noted as a fluent instrumentalist on the six- and 12-string guitars, Murdock's musical influences span 15 generations to combine ragtime, Irish, blues and folk styles with his flair for storytelling in songs.

"There is a real wealth of songs and stories from the Irish-American heritage of this country which have not yet been explored," said Murdock, who blends his



contemporary musical tastes with these old songs.

Audiences across the North American continent have a growing fascination with his stories and music, and Murdock has toured from Oregon to Ontario to Orlando. His 12 recordings are aired on radio stations across the land and have been consistently rated in the top 10 or top 25 recordings of folk music programmers.

This program is made possible in part by an award from the Illinois Humanities Council, the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Illinois General Assembly.

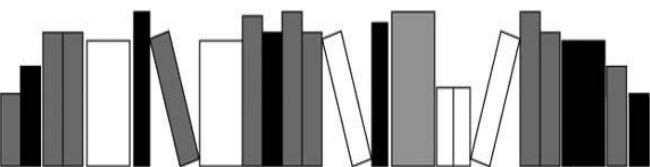

Gardner Village Board Discusses Planning and Zoning Recommendations

The Gardner Village Board opened their regular meeting Monday, March 23, with a discussion of the Planning and Zoning Board recommendations for the village zoning map.

Commissioner Dick Hileman remarked that he had spoken to Village Attorney Scott Belt and Belt suggested reviewing the map but not taking action until he completes research into one of the zoning classifications. Commissioner Mike Serena motioned to table the map pending response from Belt.

Commissioner Gary Cox inquired about the zoning of the property at Railroad St. and Rt. 66. Hileman reported the property was the subject of a past lawsuit the village was successful in winning and the wording in the letter concerns finalizing the results of the suit. Other items in the letter are the subject of Belt's request to table the proposal.

Commissioner Hileman reopened discussion of the abatement of village real estate taxes. Hileman reported that research indicated that another village in the state attempted a similar rebate, resulting in legislation that prohibits the abatement of one hundred (100) percent of the taxes in a TIF district. The village is allowed to rebate fifty (50) percent of the village tax. Hileman stressed that only the portion titled "Village of Gardner" would be subject to the rebate, but no other portions, including the "TIF" portion.

Commissioner Cox indicated that he is opposed to the rebate because he believes it is not equal to all taxpayers because taxpayers in the TIF district will not receive a full fifty percent do to the TIF portion not being refundable and not all residents are in the TIF. As an alternative, Commissioner Bill Gerrish suggested abating the base water rate, approximately \$40.00 per household per month, for

one or more months.

During discussion, Hileman reported the Water and Sewer fund can borrow monies from other funds but other funds cannot give money into the Water and Sewer fund. Commissioner Serena estimated the cost to the Water and Sewer fund at \$23,000.

Village Attorney John Bates pointed out to the board that due to the outstanding bonds for the current water main repairs, the board must bill at least enough each month to cover the bond payments. After some discussion of various methods of rebates, the board elected to table the discussion until the next meeting to allow Gerrish and Village Clerk Barb Bexon to review the numbers involved in the Sewer/Water abatement.

Commissioner Gerrish presented the bids from 13 contractors from \$47,105.80 to \$89,000 for the Wilmington St. water main project. The board awarded the contract to the low bidder, Stott Contracting of Morris, with a low bid \$20,000 below the estimate.

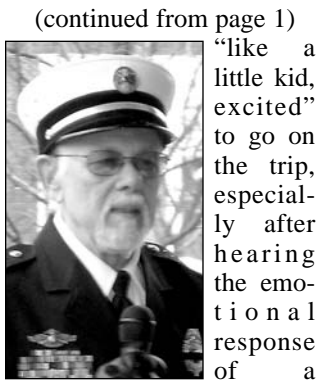
The National Association of Conservation Districts has been providing resources for Soil Stewardship Week since 1955. The church appreciates the materials provided by the Livingston County Soil and

"like a little kid, excited" to go on the trip, especially after hearing the emotional response of a friend and fellow veteran who took the Honor Flight trip last year. Zivney said he didn't think he would be able to experience such an honor because "you hear about these types of things, but they never get down to the little guy." He said, "I was really surprised when I got a telephone call saying, 'Are you still available to go?'"

Zivney said the program is "terrific" because most veterans would never be able to visit the memorial in Washington, D.C. without a free program and the assistance of guardians.

Drechsel added that, though the National World War II Memorial was "a long time coming," it's an important expression of gratitude to the veterans.

Finn agreed; his wartime experience brought him on a trip around the world, and he said he is grateful to receive the trip to Washington this year.

"It's quite a deal, quite a momento for anyone who's been to World War II," Finn said of the memorial.

As his daughter

remarked, "This is kind of their parade and thank-you for their service," adding, "I think it was a generation that truly saved the world."
