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Wilkey Elected in Dwight; Other Villages Stay the Course

In Dwight's three-way race for village president, newcomer Bill Wilkey split the vote between two long-time trustees to slip into the mayor's seat.

While all vote totals from the April 7, 2009, election remain unofficial until a canvass later this month, Wilkey took 437 votes to lead trustees Jerry Curtis, who garnered 419 votes, and Gilbert Nielsen, who secured 215 votes.

Voters also ushered in two new faces to the village board along with one incumbent: Michael Woods, who had 539 votes. Newcomer Justin Eggenberger secured 806 votes, while newcomer Jared Anderson took 718 votes.

They defeated incumbent Trustee Jerry Harris, who had 324 votes, and challenger Nick Kester, with 509 votes.

Village Clerk Patricia Drechsel ran unopposed.

Wilkey takes over as village president at the first board meeting in May.

"I feel great about being the next mayor. As I said before, I think Dwight needs to go in a different direction,

and I think I'm the person who can lead them in the direction," Wilkey said. "A little better spending of our money and improvements in town is what I'm looking forward to doing."

With campaign promises that included a freeze on spending and borrowing and no raises for village employees, Wilkey plans to make hiring a new attorney and engineering firm his first order of business.

He said he's already asked local attorney Gary Neville to take over for Village Attorney Irv Masching.

Beyond that, he plans to make mapping out a plan for street repairs and water issues a first priority.

He encourages village residents to visit his website to keep up with the happenings in village government. Wilkey's website is www.billwilkey.com

"I just want (people) to know that my decisions are going to be based upon our residents. I think our present administration has their own agenda and they're not looking out for all of the residents," Wilkey said. "When there's decisions to be made, I want it to (continued on page 22)

Mediacom's Dwight Office to Close Its Doors May 1

Mediacom, the cable service provider for Dwight and many other area communities, will close its Dwight office Friday, May 1. The office is currently located at 122 S. Franklin St.

Dwight Village Administrator Kevin McNamara said the village recently received a letter announcing the closure. He did not know why the corporation decided to close its Dwight office.

Mediacom will still provide cable service in Dwight. Some residents and businesses also use Mediacom as their Internet and landline phone service provider. McNamara said customers who do not wish to mail their bills will now have to conduct in-person business through the Pontiac Mediacom office, located at 903 E. Howard St.

According to McNamara, Mediacom has a contract with the Village of Dwight to provide cable service through approximately the year 2019; however, nothing in the contract specifies that an office must remain in Dwight.



Herscher Author Ridings Garners Special Book Award

Herscher author Jim Ridings will be among those honored at the annual awards luncheon of the Illinois State Historical Society on April 25.

Ridings will be given a special book award for his 2008 book "Cardiff 2: A Further History of The Ghost Town On The Prairie." The book is a history of the former coal mining town of Cardiff, located in

Ridings' first book on the town, "Cardiff: Ghost Town On The Prairie," also won an award from the state historical society two years ago. It also won a Studs Terkel Award from the Illinois Humanities Council.

The Cardiff 2 book is on sale at Campus State Bank and State Bank of Herscher.

Sales Tax Woes Continue into This Year

The State of Illinois, somewhat tardy in its day-to-day work, only recently announced sales tax receipts for calendar year 2008 and for the final quarter of 2008.

The report showed Dwight received \$66,803 less in sales tax revenue during 2008 than it did in 2007.

The 2007 sales tax revenue for Dwight was \$864,019. For 2008, it totaled \$797,216, a decrease of nearly 8%.

Sales tax revenue from that part of Dwight which lies in Livingston County actually fell \$86,310, but the Grundy County part of Dwight increased its sales tax receipts for the year by

\$19,507.

While not yet available on the internet, Village Administrator Kevin McNamara told *The Paper* that Dwight received \$43,445 for January of this year, compared to \$51,933 a year ago, a decrease of more than 16%. (Dwight has averaged about \$50,000 in sales tax receipts for January over the past six years.)

Fourth quarter results for Dwight in 2008 showed a slight increase: \$179,429 for 2008; \$176,878 for 2007.

The village budgeted a 12% decrease in municipal sales tax revenue for the coming fiscal year.

No Major Shake-ups in Area School Board Results

Election results show voters must be pleased with local

school boards, as many incumbents were voted into another term.

The April 7 election results

remain unofficial until each county holds a canvass later this month.

In Dwight, voters brought back three incumbents and one newcomer to the Dwight Township High School District 230 board. Five people sought four open seats. Winning incumbents were Amy Hansen, who garnered 992 votes; Kathy Perry, who secured 963 votes; and Gerald Earing, who had 992 votes. Newcomer Brian Perschnick took 1,068 votes.

They defeated incumbent Paul Ferrari, who had 591 votes. School board members will vote to fill a fifth open seat, vacated by the recent passing of A. John Kresl, possibly sometime this month.

Voters re-elected all four incumbents to fill the four open seats on the Dwight Grade School District 232 school board. They are incumbents Ron Colebank, who secured

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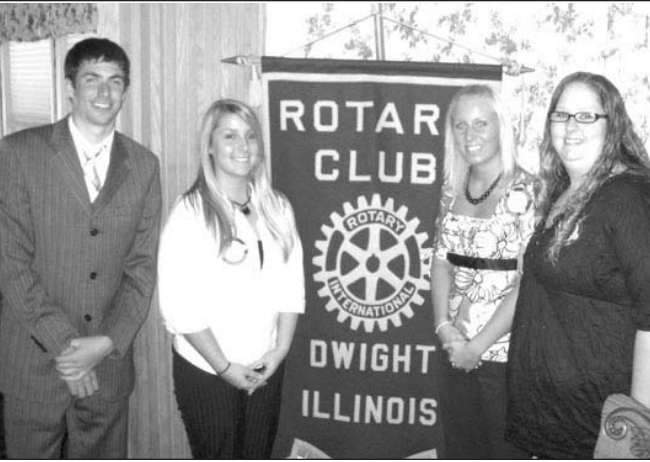

Zack Landers Takes Third in Regional Chemist Challenge

After hours of intense questioning, three Illinois Valley students emerged as the regional winners and became state contestants in the "You Be the Chemist Challenge," a national scholastic bowl-type of competition for middle school students.

Zack Landers, an eighth grader from Coal City Middle School and the grandson of Frances "Earline" and Harry Landers of Dwight, took third place in the regional competition, which involved ten schools from three counties. The regional took place at Seneca Grade School South Campus on February 21.

Zack advanced to the state contest, competing with four other challenge sites from the Chicagoland area on April 1. Although his team put up a good fight, it did not place. 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Your Tax Refund: Invest Today for Tomorrow's Goals

The tax-filing deadline arrives this week. Will you be getting a refund? If so, take the time to consider how best to use it – because, when used wisely, your tax refund can give you a few added steps on the road toward achieving your financial goals.

Of course, if you filed your taxes weeks ago, you might have already received a refund. But given the current economic environment, you might have kept the money in a "holding place" while you waited for an uptick in the financial markets. - Help fund your IRA. In 2008, the average federal tax refund was \$2,429, according to the Internal Revenue Service. If you were to receive that amount, it would cover almost half of your IRA contribution for this year, as the annual limit is \$5,000. (You can put in \$6,000 if you're 50 or older). A traditional IRA grows tax deferred, while a Roth IRA grows tax free, provided you have held your account for at least five years and don't take withdrawals until you reach age 59-1/2. Your IRA may have taken a hit last year, but if you fund it with quality investments and avoid making withdrawals until retirement, you can take important steps to help rebuild your portfolio.
- Help build an emergency fund. You could use part of your refund for an IRA and part to help build an emergency fund. Ideally, you should have six to 12 months' worth of living expenses in a liquid account to help pay for unexpected costs, such as a major car repair, a new furnace or a costly medical bill. Without such an emergency fund, you might be forced to dip into your long-term investments to pay for these costs – and that can hurt your progress toward your financial objectives.
- Help rebalance your portfolio. Based on your risk tolerance, time horizon and long-term goals, you may have decided to put a certain percentage of your assets in "growth" vehicles and a certain percentage in income-oriented investments. At that point, your portfolio was in equilibrium. But during the long bear market, your portfolio may have sustained enough losses to become "unbalanced." In other words, some of your investments may have lost so much value that they no longer make up the percentage of your holdings that you had originally intended. Of course, you could wait for these investments to bounce back – and they may, given enough time – but if you wanted to speed up the rebalancing process, you could use your tax refund to add the right types of new investments to your mix.

Ironic as it may seem, there may not be a better year in which to invest your refund. You can find many quality investments at reasonable prices today, so your refund can help you add extra shares to your accounts – and the more shares you own, the better off you may be when the market turns around. So put your refund to work soon.

Thursday, April 23, 6 p.m., Dwight High School cafeteria — 50 or so people will again tackle the task of deciding how to make the Dwight community a better place in which to live.

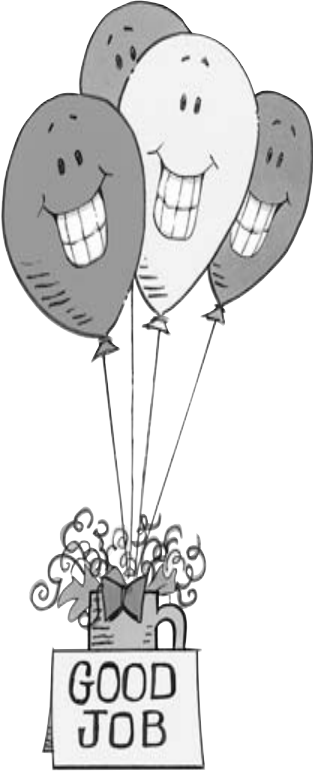

Get a Good Night's Sleep for Better Health

In today's fast-paced, on-the-go society, it's difficult to find time to relax, let alone sleep. But studies have shown that getting a good night's sleep not only makes you feel better and more rested, it prevents a number of health conditions as well.

There are five stages of sleep which occur cyclically. The first cycle ends after the completion of the first Rapid Eye Movement (REM) stage, which is the most active period of sleep. It is characterized by intense brain activity and rapid bursts of eye movements. In this state, muscles may twitch, heart rate and respiration increase and dreaming occurs. Each subsequent cycle lasts longer as its respective REM stage extends.

A normal person may complete five cycles during a typical night's sleep. While

eight hours of sleep per night has become the standard recommendation, everyone is different. Some people truly do not need that much sleep.

According to Verena Van Fleet, PhD, associate professor in the College of Chiropractic at Northwestern, there are numerous benefits to getting an adequate amount of sleep. Getting enough sleep can help reduce blood pressure; there is a correlation between the amount of sleep you get and your immunity; with decreased sleep, higher-order cognitive tasks are affected early and disproportionately; sleep enhances learning and memory; sleep deprivation increases your risk for developing Type 2 Diabetes; sleep deprivation leads to increased cortisol production; and adequate amounts of sleep are crucial for successful weight loss.

A Different Port Every Night

When people reach a certain age, they often have regrets about things they wanted to do but never did. If the one thing you wanted to do was take a cruise, what's stopping you? Can't come up with a logical reason? Then stop trying and get on board that ship.

There are a variety of cruise destinations to choose from. Do you want to cruise to Alaska, Mexico or Europe? Check out the Web sites of some of the major cruise lines to see what port destinations are offered. Once you have an idea of where to go and which cruise line to use, you can start

looking at cruise terminal locations, amenities and ticket prices. Check out cruise review sites and speak to your travel agent.

When booking a cruise, you will have a number of accommodations to choose from. Inside cabins are cheaper but offer no views. Outside cabins have port-holes or windows. Outside balcony cabins have a small, private balcony. Suites are the largest, most expensive cabins on the ship. They sometimes have a balcony and junior suites. If you don't plan on spending much time in your cabin, go with an interior room.

After you have booked

your cruise, you should get all your travel documents in order and make extra copies of your passport, driver's license, travel documents and credit cards. Leave a copy with someone at home and pack a copy separately from the originals, preferably in your carry-on. Invest in an under-the-clothing moneybag to store your cash in and keep it out of sight.

If you need to buy luggage before your cruise, invest in something plain. Thieves often associate expensive luggage with expensive things. Make a list of everything in your luggage and take a picture of its contents. Don't put your full

home address or home phone number on your luggage tag. If you want to make your luggage extra secure, use a self-locking plastic tag or duct tape. Mark your luggage in a way that allows you to quickly identify it when it's on the conveyor belt. When you get to the ship, make sure you know how many pieces of luggage you have and stay with it until the porter has it and it's on the ship.

Once you get on the ship, you will be issued a cruise ship ID card. This will allow you to purchase items not included in your cruise package, such as drinks and gifts. It will also allow you to get on and off the ship. Every time you leave and return to the ship, you will have to insert the card into a kiosk. The card will also verify dining times and table assignments and can be used for casino credit if the ship has one.

Safety is essential, even on a cruise ship. Upon arriving to your room, you should check your closets and bathroom with the cabin door open. Don't leave valuables lying around; put them in either the cabin or purser's safe. Lock your door at night and don't open the door to strangers. Don't give out your cabin number and keep your cabin key in a safe place. Stay in the public areas of the ship. Travel with a group and only use shore transportation and tour companies approved by the cruise ship.

You want to relax on your vacation, so don't try to do all the things offered. Pick and choose, be safe, and have a good time.



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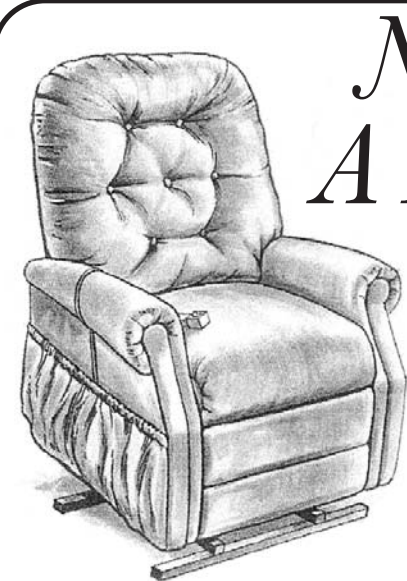
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Planning a Trip? Check with your Doctor First

Just because you reach a certain age doesn't mean your traveling days are over. Depending on your situation, you may just need to do a little more preparation and take a few extra precautions. Before going anywhere, make an appointment with your doctor. Find out if there are any medical issues that will prevent you from taking the trip. If you have heart problems, for example, flying may add to the stress on your heart and your doctor may advise you not to go. If you require oxygen, you may have to obtain approval for transporting the tank.

If you take any medication, leave it in the original bottles with the labels on it and place it in your carryon. That way, if your luggage gets lost, you will still have your medication with you. Create a list of the medications you take, as well as the name and number of your doctor in case of an emergency. Bring a spare pair of reading glasses or a copy of your prescription.

If you have mobility issues, don't be afraid to let others know. Call ahead and make special arrangements for boarding the plane in advance. Find a hotel with

specially equipped rooms and reserve one in advance. If you need a scooter or an oxygen tank, look for a company that rents them and will drop one off at your hotel or cruise ship. Don't exhaust yourself by overdoing your sightseeing; take it slow.

Like any other traveler, you need to be careful about the food you eat. The risk of food contamination will vary according to the countries you are visiting. Developing countries will have a higher risk of food contamination than countries like Canada or Japan. Don't eat food prepared with contaminated water, like raw fruits, vegetables or salads. Only eat food that has been thoroughly cooked and is still hot. Don't eat food from street vendors. Stay away from drinks made with contaminated water, both alcoholic and non-alcoholic. Drink bottled water, carbonated water or water that has been boiled and served hot. Get a hepatitis A shot if you plan to eat fish or shellfish on the trip, as undercooked or raw fish can be dangerous.

Once you've made all of the arrangements, you can turn your attention to packing. You don't want to over or under pack. You should make a list of everything you will need and stick to it. Bring loose-fitting, durable clothes you can mix and match. Select clothes that will dry quickly, such as lightweight cotton and synthetic fibers. Roll clothes so they won't wrinkle. Hang up clothes as soon as possible upon arrival. If they do wrinkle, steam the wrinkles out while you take a shower.

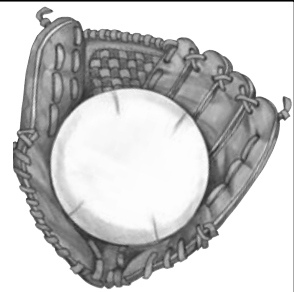

be for the betterment for all the people of Dwight and not just one or two."

Voters in other villages in *The Paper* circulation area predominantly re-elected incumbents, staying the course for their towns.

Essex - Village President Gerald Hakey was elected for another term, securing 171 votes and beating out challenger Glenn A. Kirchner Jr., who received 137 votes.

The three open Village of Essex trustee seats went to incumbents Kenneth Soren-sen, 188 votes, and John Lord, 168 votes, as well as newcomer Joe Silvey, who garnered 179 votes. Challenger Michael Masulis brought in 149 votes.

Mazon - Residents elected two incumbents, Kristen Webster and Robert Breisch, and newcomer Daniel Mehochko to fill the three open seats on the six-seat board.

Webster secured 70 votes; Breisch brought in 64 votes, while Mehochko drew 73 votes. Challenger Timothy Harty took 58 votes.

Don R. Plott ran unopposed for village president. Incumbent Village Clerk Kimberly Marques also ran unopposed.

South Wilmington - Voters chose to bring back three incumbents. Charles Harvey garnered 68 votes, Ralph Countryman brought in 89 votes and Norman Lardi Jr. took 86 votes.

Challenger Steve Claypool secured 25 votes. Clerk Barbara McGurk ran unopposed. The village president wasn't up for re-election.

Herschler - Ray Schneider ran unopposed for village president. Of the three positions open on the village's six-member board of trustees, only two people filed petitions: incumbents Michael Krygowski and Joseph Buono.
