# **DTHS Board Outlines Co-Curricular Expectations**

Protocol for handling cocurricular issues and ensuring that expectations of coaches, players, parents, and administration are clearly defined and the role of the school board is understood was the basis of a special meeting called by the DTHS Board of Education May 26.

Recent concerns raised to the Board that resulted in a coaching change for the Boys' Varsity Basketball team prompted the board to take action and establish clear guidelines and expectations for all involved.

"When you are out as an

individual in the community, you are just Joe Citizen,' Superintendent Dale Adams advised the board. "It is not until you are around this table in the collective body of seven that you take on the role of a board member."

To that point, Adams discussed with the board proper ways communications to and from the board should be handled, and the boards' expectations of coaches/ sponsors, participants and parents were defined.

According to the guidelines, to ensure fair and proper communication, staff members, parents and comcation to the school board through the Superintendent. If contacted individually, the board members will refer the person to the appropriate channel of authority except in certain unusual situations. Board members will not take private actions that might compromise the board or administration

However, the proper avenue for directing communication or resolving issues should begin at the level of the coach/sponsor.

"Without addressing the point of contention there is no problem," explained Adams. "If you are not is not an issue."

A scheduled meeting will be the accepted method for discussion. If necessary, the school will provide a facilitator for the meeting.

If an issue cannot be resolved at the coach/sponsor level, it can then be raised to the Athletic Director, followed by the Principal, the Superintendent and, finally, the Board of Education.

Adams also gave direction on acceptable items to discuss with a coach. Questioning the amount of playing time a participant is allowed is not appropriate.



## **Dwight Police Give Report on** Number, Types of Calls Received

In April 2009, there were 251 calls for service to which Dwight Police responded. These are calls that were answered by the patrol units. Patrol currently consists of one sergeant, four full-time officers and three part-time officers. These statistics did not include the chief, detective or the officer assigned to the Livingston County Pro-Active Unit.

Not included in these 251 calls were officer-initiated activity. Officer-initiated activities include traffic enforcement, business building checks, house watches and building searches resulting from business checks.

Of the calls, 170 consisted of complaints that did not result in arrests. Included in these calls were domestic disputes (with no arrest due to lack of probable cause), neighborhood disputes, thefts, burglaries, vandalism, suspicious persons, 911 hang-ups, drug information, burglar alarms and similar calls.

## Seabert Retires After 17 Years with Chamber

by Meta Machulis Dwight Area Chamber of Commerce Program Administrator Shirley Seabert has decided to retire after 17 years with the chamber.

"After 32 years at Donnelley's and so many years serving with the chamber, I just decided it's time to fully retire," said Seabert, who retired from RR Donnelley three years ago. Chamber of Commerce board members and officers held a retirement luncheon for Seabert at The Country Mansion on the date of her retirement from the chamber, May 28. She has served as chamber president, board member and has spent the past two years as program administrator.

Among Seabert's proudest accomplishments with the chamber was the implementation of the annual Dwight Area Chamber of Commerce auction.

"We've been charging the same membership fee for so many years that we had to do something different to maintain our status as an office," she explained.

Seabert has also spent many hours cooking for chamber events. She said she has spent a lot of time "over potato salad and barbecue and baked beans and hot dogs and hamburgers that I cooked - I had a woman come to me and say, 'The only time I ever see you, not what you're getting out you're under a tent selling food for the chamber!"" Seabert added that "Anytime we have an event, we always have a really fun time together, and we all work well together."

However, Seabert noted that the seats she has filled in the chamber also require hard work and dedication.

"I think a lot of people really don't understand how much work is involved in being on the chamber board and being a part of it," she said. An example is Dwight's annual Fourth of July celebration, which requires weeks of planning.

"That day, we're out there from 8:00 in the morning to 11:00 at night, and it's usually 95 degrees and 90 percent humidity," she said.

Seabert also stressed that businesses should area become members of the Chamber of Commerce.

"Chamber membership is a necessity for the success of Dwight," she said. "I've had many people say, 'What do I get out of it?' and I think the answer to that has to be,

'Support.' You're supporting other businesses, and other businesses are supporting you." Seabert added, "It's of it; it's what you're putting into it."

In a similar vein, Seabert explained the importance of the Dwight Area Chamber of Commerce's relationship with the Greater Livingston County Economic Development Council, which she helped to form.

'By representing Dwight, along with other Dwight businesspeople, we will make sure that Dwight is well represented in the county's economic development," she said.

Following her retirement, Seabert will continue her service as part of IMPACT Dwight and the Greater Livingston County Economic Development Council. Her other plans include trips to California and Sweden and spending winters in Florida. But "mostly this summer, I just plan to enjoy my backyard pool with my kids and grandkids," she said.

Seabert and her husband, Larry, are the owners of Tech-Ni-Kolor AutoCrafters in Dwight.

The Macks and Daniels decided to team up because they have similar restaurant goals. As Melvin put it, "He's got good ideas, I've got good ideas, and together, they should be great ideas."

Some of those ideas include new menu items, such as rib dinners, steakburgers and hand-tossed thin or deep dish pizza. Pizza toppings are freshly prepared daily, and the sauce and dough are made at the restaurant. The cost of pizza has also been reduced.

"We know everybody else is out there struggling, so we've lowered our pizza prices a little bit," Daniels said.

The owners have also

begun a Big Fella Dollars program for free pizza.

Specials include summer items such as hot dogs; everyday draft beer specials; nightly specials; Friday fish fries; and an everyday speical for a large two-topping pizza, homemade breadsticks and two liters of pop.

Although the eatery includes a bar, Melvin Mack said Big Fella's is "first and foremost a family-friendly restaurant." The restaurant is decorated with memorabilia from his days working at Coca-Cola. He said the "nice atmosphere" is important because families "don't have to deal with the typical bar things.'

As of June 1, the restaurant is also open for lunch on weekends. Hours are Monday through Thursday, 5 to 9 p.m.; Friday and Saturday, 11 a.m. to 10 p.m.; and Sunday, 11 a.m. to 9 p.m.

# Small Talk

time to break out the shorts and flip flops, to catch a few lightning bugs and leave the windows open so the house can breathe.

The kids have long been on the countdown. They are eager to be sprung from school and from the weekly, daily grind. As an adult, I'm not nearly as giddy about summer vacation as I once was. Like most, I work vear-round to keep the cash flow flowing. And as blessed as I am to have the freedom to work from my home, there are drawbacks, especially in the summer, when all three of my children are hovering, inviting me to share in what they perceive to be the Promised Land of the calendar year.

It's pretty challenging to write anything worth reading when there's a steady stream of interruptions: screen doors slamming, constant requests for playdates, turf wars over the telephone and the trampoline in the backyard and my attention. When summer comes, I find myself shifting into a different mode of operation to preserve my sanity and frankly, their happiness. I save most of my work for when the kids have passed out. It's just much easier to surrender to the season and tuck my work in around them, rather than the other way around. I've tried the alternative-holing myself up in my office and letting the kids fend for themselves. The results are always, always disastrous.

My summer surrender tends to be less painful if I can manage to transport myself, at least in spirit, back to my own childhood. I'm not very good at this, but I try.

It's been a long, long time since I was genuinely excited about going swimming just for the sake of taking the plunge. I find myself so preoccupied with covering up my lessthan-perfect body, that I'd rather take a beating than go to the beach or the pool. But I'm not so old and weathered that I can't recall feeling pure, undiluted joy at the thought of going swimming when I was a kid myself. I remember being carefree, wanting to be immersed in water as long as possible, hardly being able to contain myself if I thought the possibility of swimming for an entire afternoon existed.

I met other summer experiences with the same kind of euphoria: making s'mores,



having sleepovers, blowing bubbles and riding my bike with abandon. As long as I was home in time for supper, each summer day was an expanse of wide-open freedom. I think my kids, all kids, deserve to know and savor that sensation like they might a popsicle that's bound to melt and trickle down their arms.

There is very little about childhood pleasure that satisfies me like it used to. My adult mind keeps drifting back to the laundry that awaits me, the deadline that looms, the bills that need to be paid and meals that must be planned and prepared. Peter Pan has to grow up sometime. I suppose that Wendy must do the same.

It's one of the reasons I don't think kids should be overscheduled during the summer. So much of their lives are already filled up and planned for them. Summer is one of the only times they're going to be worry-free. Already, they are just a splash away from being tugged right out of childhood by the demands of a grown-up world.

For me, the best time to drift back to my own carefree past is on a summer evening, when the crickets are chirping and the air is a little bit cooler. I can sit on my porch and listen for the train to whistle in the distance. I imagine myself hopping on for a ride, hoping it will take me back to a time and mindset that I left behind what seems a lifetime ago.

I'm usually brought back to the here and now by the sounds of my own children. They remind me that I don't need that train after all. I've got them. And they're the best possible way to be reminded that summer is supposed to be fun and that this life's most profound pleasures are free, but fleeting.







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## **Dwight Administration Committee Discusses Protocol**

Issues brought forth during a June 1 session of the Village of Dwight Administration Committee reflected concerns of, and towards, Dwight's new governing body.

The Administration Committee consists of newly elected Dwight Village President and Committee Chairman Bill Wilkey, and all of the Village Trustees including three new members. While some members expressed apprehension that they are not being properly informed regarding matters taking place within the Village, others shared fears

that actions are being taken without proper procedures being followed.

"It feels like the chain of command is a little cloudy right now," stated Committee member and Village Trustee Jerry Curtis.

Curtis addressed the several village employees and others who gathered, assuring those in attendance that actions regarding personnel or most other issues cannot be taken without knowledge and consent of the Village Board.
