Dirt is moving, concrete is being poured and oversized semi-loads of enormous machinery are rolling down Route 47 through Dwight.

Construction on Livingston County's first wind farm is well on its way with plans to complete 95 of the planned 150 wind turbines this summer.

Work first began on the Streator Cayuga Ridge Wind Farm South, which stretches east of Interstate 55 between Odell and Emington, in October. The remaining 55 turbines will be completed during phase two in 2010. Upon completion, the farm will generate 300 megawatts.

After a break for winter, road and foundation work resumed in mid-April.

Since, excavation of 44 foundations has been completed, of which 37 have had concrete poured. Workers have cut 69,655 feet of roads, and of that, 46,715 feet had been graveled, said

Jan Johnson, spokeswoman for Iberdrola Renewables.

An increase in the number of concrete trucks has been noticeable for weeks.

Additionally, large turbine parts hailing from all over the country and overseas as far as Indonesia began arriving last week. They travel Interstate 55 and get off north of Dwight at Route 47, where they head south.

Expect to see traffic stopped several times a day at the curve near Casey's General Store to make way for these oversized parts, as well as at the four-way stop at the intersection of Route 17 and Route 47. The parts are making their way to the staging area at Route 47 and Emington Road, where they will be stored until the sites are ready for construction.

What you can't see from a distance is the work going on underground at the construction sites. Each site, manned by two large cranes, has a gravel road leading up to it. Workers excavated a large hole, and in that workers ready long white rods called

anchor bolts for the placement of the impending tubular-shaped tower. Later, that pit will be filled with concrete.



While much of construction on the Streator Cayuga Ridge Wind Farm South project takes place in rural areas south of Dwight, the entire area will be impacted by the increase of truck traffic.

Just how many additional construction vehicles will be on the roads this summer? Let's break it down.

Workers are pouring concrete for six to eight foundaNarvick Brothers.

Ten complete turbines are arriving each week via Interstate 55 and Route 47. It takes eight 18-wheeler trucks to deliver the components to each complete turbine. Turbine components are the large parts that make up each wind turbine such as the tubular towers, blades and nacelles, which house the generators atop the towers.

The scheduled Administration Committee meeting June 1, called to hear information on refinancing of remaining village bonds, evolved into a forum for elected Dwight officials to air some issues regarding how the current mayor and board should interact and address village concerns going forward. The committee consists of newly elected Village President Bill Wilkey, along with the full Board of Trustees.

"It feels like the chain of command is a little cloudy right now," stated committee member and Village Trustee Jerry Curtis.

A number of Village of Dwight employees were in attendance at the meeting with apparent concerns regarding handling of personnel issues such as hiring and termination.

Curtis spoke to the matter and assured those in attendance that actions regarding personnel or most other issues cannot be taken without knowledge and consent of the village board.

was also discussed, with some members expressing concerns that they are not being properly informed regarding matters taking place within the village, while others questioned whether actions are being taken without established procedures being followed.

"Any idea is a good idea if it is going to save the village money," said Curtis. "But we need to follow proper procedures."

Among the topics discussed:

• Concerns that procedures for enforcement of village ordinances are not being properly followed. Specific concerns focused on actions taken to drain an abandoned swimming pool located on the corner of Franklin and South streets and mowing grass on private property that is in violation of village code.

• Proper efforts to ensure collection of an outstanding, disputed water bill were questioned.

• Police department practice range policies and whether there is a cost savings opportunity by reducing (continued on page 18)

Independent Living Facility Makes Progress

An assisted living facility on the east side of Dwight is taking shape.

Construction on much of the outer shell of the building, Heritage Woods of Dwight, should be done by the end of the month with a tentative opening date set for November 1.

The two-story, 68-unit facility located at 710 E. Mazon Ave., just east of the mini storage, will offer studio or one-bedroom apartments for residents 65 or older.

"It's moving pretty rapidly right now," said Bradlevbased Developer Blair Minton. "The weather has just been horrible, but we've actually been moving along very well given that.'

Workers plan to install windows and a roof in the coming weeks, he said.

Beyond construction work, a temporary sales office has been established at 212 E. Mazon Ave.



Board members present at the IMPACT Dwight meeting were: Mary Carpenter, Rodney Connor, Justin Eggenberger, Sue DeLong and Jane Anderson. Bret Heinrich was absent.

Officers were picked: Director, Rodney Connor; secretary, Jane Anderson; and treasurer, Sue DeLong.

Mary Boma, who is not on the board, agreed to serve as a public relations liaison.

The board discussed how many members we would like to have to complete the board. It was agreed that nine members would be the goal for a complete board, waiting until after the Town Meeting to add additional members.

The decision was made to have the calendar added to Impactdwight.org. This will give the community access to all of the activities for Impact Dwight. This will help avoid duplication of events and dates for fundraising. It was suggested that this calendar be open for all community organizations. Jane will handle the calendar updates. Rodney will have the calendar added to the website.

(continued from page 1) Officials from Iberdrola Renewables, the project's parent company, want to remind the public that these sites are under construction and can be dangerous. They are private property and off limits.

They thank residents for dealing with any inconveniences caused by the influx of machinery this summer.

"We appreciate everyone's patience and emphasis on safety during the construction of the project," Johnson said.

This wind farm project appears to be just the beginning for wind farms in Livingston County.

The county has received two formal proposals to put additional turbines in Livingston County.

Cincinnati-based Vision Energy wants to put 76 turbines near Emington and Kempton as part of a larger development, named K4,

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which would stretch into Ford, Iroquois and Kankakee counties.

Two weeks ago, Navitas filed an application for the Minonk Wind farm that would put 25 wind turbines west of Flanagan as part of a bigger 103-turbine project that would stretch in to Woodford County, said Chuck Schopp, Livingston County regional planning commission administrator.

Three other proposals exist that call for hundreds more turbines, including the northern half of the Streator Cayuga Ridge project, but have not been formally submitted to the county for consideration.

FINANCIAL FOCUS "Cutting Losses" Can Be More Painful Than You Think

Why do stock prices fall? Various factors are involved, but in a nutshell, prices drop when more people want to sell stocks than buy them. Conversely, the more people who buy a particular stock, the faster that stock's price will rise. If you've studied basic economics and the law of supply and demand, you've already got a pretty clear sense of why stock prices move the way they do. And yet, while the process sounds fairly logical, the behavior of many investors isn't which gives you some good investment opportunities right

To understand why so many investors have acted in a way that may be counter-productive, let's look at consumer behavior in another context. Suppose a hypothetical couple, Mike and Mary Ann, bought a house five years ago for \$200,000. They liked everything about the house, and it was the right size to meet their family's needs for many years to come. However, the sharp decline in the housing market has caused Mike and Mary Ann such concern that they decide to sell their house, even though they can only get \$160,000 for it. By selling now, they reason, they can avoid further drops, and when the market stabilizes, they can buy another house in the same neighborhood.

To sum up: Mike and Mary Ann took a \$40,000 loss on a house they didn't even need to sell. In essence, they were betting that the housing market, against all historical evidence, would not recover enough to compensate them for staying put. Most people would question the rationality of this type of behavior. Yet many of these same people do the same thing when it comes to investments.

Specifically, over the past year and a half, they have sold investments - even quality investments - that still met their needs for growth, income or a combination of both. And when they've sold these investments, they've taken losses sometimes, big losses. Just like Mike and Mary Ann, they thought they must sell now to avoid bigger setbacks later.

Don't make that mistake. If you weren't planning on selling your investments before the market decline, why sell them now, when you'll just be locking in a loss? Many successful investors hold the same investments for 20, 30 or 40 years - in fact, sometimes they pass these investments on to their children, who also hold them for decades. Are you so sure that your investments, which may indeed have declined 40 percent or more over the past couple of years, won't recover those losses and climb to new heights in the years ahead?

You may someday need to sell, but do so for the right reasons – a change in your goals, a need to rebalance your portfolio or a fundamental change in the companies in which you've invested. In the meantime, not only should you hold on to the investments that that still meet your needs, but you should also consider adding new investments while the price is so low. The more shares you own, the better your financial position will be when the market turns around.

This type of behavior takes patience, discipline and faith in our markets. But over the past century, the investors who have demonstrated these traits have been well rewarded – and there's no reason you can't attain the same results.

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Getting Through Tough Times: 10 Ways to Save Money on Gas

Gas prices are going up again, but there are ways consumers can cut spending at the gas pump, said a University of Illinois Extension consumer and family economics educator.

"Here are 10 tips on how to get more for your gas dollar," said Patricia Hildebrand.

1. Buy gas during the morning or evening hours when it's cool, or you'll be buying gas when it's expanded, thus getting less.

2. Keep extra weight out of the trunk. The car loses about one mile per gallon in fuel economy for every extra 250 pounds your engine hauls.

3. Follow the recommended maintenance schedule to keep your vehicle fuel efficient.

4. Keep tires properly inflated, balanced, and aligned to save fuel and unnecessary wear on tires.

5. Don't top off the gas tank. Gas can slosh or seep out if

it's too full. Make sure the cap is tight.

6. Reduce heavy acceleration and heavy brake use to improve fuel economy.

7. Drive 55 miles per hour rather than 65 miles per hour. It will improve the fuel economy by two miles per gallon.

8. Use air conditioning carefully. It can lower your fuel economy by 10 to 20 percent.

9. Remove snow tires in good weather. Deep tread and big tires use more fuel.

10. Make sure the price on the pump matches what's on the sign and that the gas pump starts at the \$0 mark.





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

The possibility of expanding the Kurtz Ambulance Service district to incorporate a larger area in an effort to supplement the cost of the service.

• Fees assessed by new Village Attorney Gary Neville. Neville's fees will be \$130 per hour, and an itemized bill, along with who requested the service, will be provided.

In other matters:

The committee heard recommendations from Kevin Heid of First Midstate regarding refinancing the remaining \$1,165,000 on the 1994 Water Bonds and the \$630,000 remaining on the 1997 Public Services Complex Bonds. According to Heid, and using a minimum two percent savings as a guideline for determining if re-funding is appropriate, refinancing the 1994 Water Bonds was not recommended at this time.

"Just for savings, I am not sure if it is the best move at this time on this issue," said Heid.

However, recalling the 1997 Public Services Complex Bonds may produce significant enough savings to prompt action.

More discussion will take place before the matter comes to the board of trustees for a final decision.

Three engineering firms

made presentations to the committee. The village is looking at alternative engineering firms. Currently, The Farnsworth Group, headquartered in Bloomington, is contracted by the village to provide engineering services. Additional firms interviewed were M. Gingerich, Gereaux and Associates from Bradley, and Christopher B. Burke Engineering of Rosemont.

The committee received an overview of road and water main concerns that may lead to improvements considered by the village. Trustee and Public Property Committee Chairperson Jared Anderson developed the list to "stimulate the minds and thoughts of all."

In Anderson's report, he stated, "All of us need to work together and come to a conclusion on the types of improvements we need to make. If all of us work together and continue to be progressive, we will have a complete systematic plan to carry us through...and set up the future boards with a larger and continuous plan.

"We still have about three to four miles of water main that is older than 60 years old; in order that Dwight can continue to serve the health and welfare of the people, we absolutely need to establish imminent projects and conclude which projects should be held off," stated Anderson.
