

### Prather Hired as Superintendent at GGS, Preparing for Upcoming Academic Year

Every grade school sees new faces annually as a new kindergarten class starts the academic year. This year, however, Gardner Grade School has one more new face joining the crowd, and he's not from the kindergarten crowd.

Jim Prather has joined the administrative team of GGS, having been hired as school superintendent at the end of May 2009. This summer, he is settling into his new surroundings.

## **Dwight Trustees** Favor Increasing Loan; Mayor Opposed

Water Rates to Rise for Large Users

After much controversy, the Dwight Village Board of Trustees has weighed the concerns with regard to the Village's aging water lines and approved a motion to move forward towards refinancing the 1994 Waterworks Bond and possibly adding up to two million dollars to the Village's debt. This action would extend the current loan presently due to expire in 2014.

The action, taken by the board at its July 13 meeting, was opposed by Village President Bill Wilkey. Wilkey has been campaigning to find other means to finance the needed repairs and does not want the Village to assume additional

"We need to use some other avenues." Wilkey told the Trustees prior to their decision.

Some suggestions previously offered by Wilkey include raising water rates for industrial and governmental agencies with large usage which he estimated could add an approximate \$140,000 to village coffers. Wilkey also suggested that by holding off until 2014 to proceed with larger repairs, the \$350,000 currently being used annually to pay off the bond would be freed up to put toward water-related repairs.

However, many board members feel waiting any

longer to begin repairing the deteriorating water mains could ultimately be more costly and many would like to act now while interest rates are low and the current economic climate may provide significant cost savings.

Trustees Angie Airgood, Jared Anderson, Jerry Curtis and Justin Eggenberger voted to move forward with necessary actions to refinance the bond and borrow the additional money with Mike Woods opposing the move. Trustee Ron Skinner was not present at the meet-

Final action in the form of passing an ordinance is necessary to proceed. However, Mayor Wilkey indicated he may exercise his power to veto such action. Final actions regarding increasing the Waterworks Bond will take place at a future Dwight Village Board meeting.

Following up on Mayor Wilkey's suggestion to increase water rates for the Village's largest users, the Utilities Committee recommended to the board that an increase of ten percent be implemented for governmental properties and industrial properties using more than 500,000 gallons of water per month. Affected by this decision will be RR Donnelley, Fox Developmental Center, and Dwight Correctional Center.

The recommendation came following a review by the committee of water rates, the Village cost to produce water, and the water rate history. According to a report, in the past fiscal year 220,186,000 gallons of water were pumped from the three active wells. During that time, water department expenses totaled \$695,488 for a cost of \$3.16 per 1,000 gallons. Currently, large users over 500,000 gallons pay a rate of \$3 per 1,000 gallons. The ten percent increase will raise the large user rate to \$3.30 per 1,000 gallons.

According to the Utilities Committee report, "the committee is cognizant of the fact that the big users are also the big employers and, on the industrial side, big sales tax generators for the Village, but also believes the Village cannot continue to sell water to them at a loss."

However, a contract entered into with the Dwight Correctional Center in 2005 to purchase water from the Village has raised questions as to whether an increase in this particular facility's rates is allowed. An interpretation Dwight's Village Administrator of the fifteen

year Correctional Center agreement suggests that rates for the facility cannot be raised or lowered without a proportionate increase or decrease for all users, including residential users. Mayor Wilkey indicated to the Utilities Committee that he believes this interpretation is incorrect. Dwight residents currently pay more than the (continued on page 3)





## **Dwight Trustees Favor Increasing Loan; Mayor Opposed – -**

(continued from page 1) industrial/governmental large usage rate. The matter has been given to Village Attorney Gary Neville for review.

The board approved the large user increase effective September 1 with all present trustees except Mike Woods in favor of the move. Trustee Skinner was absent.

In other business, the board voted to appoint Christopher B. Burke and Associates as the Village's new engineering firm. Burke and Associates will replace Farnsworth Group which had provided engineering services to the Village. Mayor Wilkey recommended a change and three firms had previously given presentations outlining their services to the board. The motion passed by a three to one vote with Trustee Curtis opposing the move. Trustee Woods passed on the vote and Skinner was not present.

An Ordinance Committee report was presented to the Board. Ordinances were reviewed regarding prohibit-

ing golf carts on village streets along with an ordinance which does not allow cargo containers to be allowed for structural use in residential or business districts. It was recommended that the current ordinances prohibiting these items remain unchanged.

Janice Lauritzen of the Dwight Main Street Program informed the board that in May and June, 750 visitors representing 25 states and 15 countries have registered at the historic Ambler/Becker Texaco gas station on Route 66 in Dwight. This May/June time frame includes only four open hours per day with weekends only in May but daily through June.

- a donation of \$2,000 to IMPACT Dwight
- a \$600 donation to the Harvest Days Kiddie Carnival
- a sound amplification permit for 421 E. South Street on July 18 from 6 to 11 p.m.

• a sound amplification permit for Harvest Days Festival, downtown area, September 18 through September 20 from 9 a.m. to midnight

- a resolution to allow designated Harvest Days street closures and parade route
- a Liquor License for Mac's Convenience Store
- the transfer of the Dwight EMS 1997 ambulance to the Public Works Department to be used as a utility vehicle
- the purchase of three Minitor V pagers at a cost of \$440 each for Dwight ESDA
- a change to the Police Officers range policy allowing quarterly participation with attendance only once per quarter
- a motion to refer a subdivision request to the Plan Commission regarding 10 acres in the proposed Love's Subdivision with intended use for a travel center / truck stop.

# Schools Hurt by Lack of State Revenues by Madelyn Fogarty jection, the year closed with on time. The Education

As the 2008-09 fiscal year closes, Dwight School Districts realized the concerning effects of not receiving State revenues as promised.

At the high school, despite not receiving promised revenues from the state, the district ended the year with a surplus in all its funds mainly due to a large beginning balance. Dwight High School District #230 relies on approximately 25 percent of its revenues from the State. While the Education Fund ended far short of pro-

jection, the year closed with a \$217,000 Education Fund balance and positive balances across all other funds.

At Dwight Grade School District #232, the lack of State funds painted a financial picture called "bleak" by Dale Adams, Superintendent of Dwight Schools.

Approximately 48% - nearly half - of the grade school's revenues are from state funding. With \$165,000 in grants and mandated categoricals not realized, the district fell short in all funds. With the exception of the Education Fund, all funds would have been positive had State monies been

on time. The Education Fund ended the year with a \$248,000 deficit.

"If we can get past this year, help is coming," Adams told the DGS Board. "This year's budget is going to have to be as tight as we can make it just to get by."

Anticipated wind farm revenues are still a year away from realization, but are expected to offer the Dwight school districts some relief from the tight economic situation.

"With both budgets, each district cut back on spending to offset some of what was not taken in," Adams told *The Paper*.

### GSW HS Board of Education discusses budget cuts, improving math scores

The Gardner-South Wilmington Township High School Board of Education met Wednesday, July 15 to discuss new items of busi-

Superintendent Dr. Richard Decman requested that health insurance broker Wells-Fargo bid out the insurance. Teachers prefer not to change providers and are instead willing to pay approximately an extra \$60 per month for individual insurance.

Decman also received a bid from Heartland Disposal for garbage removal. Decman did not recommend changing waste management providers since the new bid is similar to the rate the school pays to its current service provider.

The board is investigating the possibility of placing a cell phone tower on recently purchased property. It has a also arranged a committee to seek solutions to summer athletic issues the school faces.

Though the school is receiving \$60,000 less in General State Aid, largely due to decreasing enrollment, the board is discussing alternative routes to compensate for the reduction, including elimination of two part-time positions and the sharing of Technology Director Ben Seeman with South Wilmington Grade School. The board discussed increasing Seeman's schedule from a half day to a full day. Other budget cuts are being examined as well.

Because tentative results from PSAE/ACT testing scores show that only 47.7 percent of students met or exceeded expectations in math, Decman has contacted

# **DGS Board Works to Keep Pre-K Programs**

Lunch Rates to Increase

Full day kindergarten and the district's pre-K programs were the main topic of discussion by the Dwight Grade School Board of Education when it met on July 15.

Conversations around offering full day kindergarten at Dwight Elementary have been taking place with advantages being carefully weighed. With next year's Kindergarten class currently projected to be only 49 students, the full day option could easily be viable with the current Kindergarten teaching team. However, State grants that provide the majority of funding for the current Pre-K for All program are on the State's chopping block raising concerns that available money for this program may soon be lost. The Pre-K programs target three to five year olds. To enter Kindergarten, a child must be five before September 1.

With programs reaching at-risk students at an early age getting very positive results, the board put their heads together to find a solu-

tion that would not mean any loss to current programs offered to the youngest of DGS students.

Opening the path to a solution came in the resignation of Pre-K for All and Developmental Kindergarten teacher Katy McCormick, which was approved by the board at the July 15 session. With the position open and uncertainty regarding funding for the Pre-K for All Grant, the board opted to offer 3 half-day Kindergarten sessions (2 - AM; 1 -PM) freeing up the option to keep the Developmental Kindergarten (PM) even if the Pre-K for All Grant does not come through. If the State grant is realized, the board is expected to move forward with filling the Pre-K for All and Teacher Aide/Parent Coordinator positions.

In other business, the board approved an increase in school lunch fees for the 2009-10 school year.

Parents can expect to pay an extra ten cents for their child's plate lunch bringing the cost to \$2.10 for a student lunch and \$2.60 per adult lunch plate. Several



A change that may effect the calculation of a student's GPA and class rank was approved by the Dwight Township High School

July 13 meeting.

Board of Education at its class was not given a graded value. Now, for the classes of 2010 and 2011, students passing a pass/fail course will be credited with an A and earn 4 credit points. Then, beginning with the

were previously pass/fail courses will be graded on an A through F scale.

For students receiving all their credits from graded academic courses, pass/fail classes can skew the GPA and class rank results.

"The goal is to make the grading scale equitable for everybody," Superintendent Dale Adams told *The Paper*. "By taking pass/fail courses, it can reduce the divisor and increase GPA. This change will level the playing field."

A review of students in the Class of 2010 with a GPA of 3.5 or above shows the move is expected to have an effect on more than half of these students.

School officials will be taking steps soon to present the new plan to students and parents.

In another action, the board moved forward with filling the boy's varsity basketball coaching position. The opening came after the board responded to parent concerns and took action in May to not renew the contract of Mark Porter who had led the team for the past seven years.

Stepping into the varsity position will be Chris Gibson, an accountant for Caterpillar in Joliet, comes to the Trojans with ten years of coaching experi-

coach at Pontiac and Coal City High Schools, head coach and athletic director at Midland, and most recently as assistant basketball coach at Olivet Nazarene Univer-

"My true passion lies in teaching the game of basketball," Gibson's profile states. "There are so many outstanding lessons to be learned from this great game.'

Gibson currently resides in Bourbonnais, but according to Adams, he is planning to relocate to the Dwight

The board also approved hiring Phillip Taylor to fill the open Technical Coordinator position at the high school. The position opened last month following the resignation of Chuck Butterbrodt who has accepted a teaching position at Dwight Grade School.



I know I am well overdue for the D-Day update, so here it finally is.

The two weeks I spent in Normandy, and the week of the celebrations specifically, was the best week of my military career. I cannot even begin to describe how proud, and humble, I felt while walking the battlefields and drop zones, meeting the local people and spending time with the veterans we were there to honor. It was an amazing experience that I will not soon forget.

All told, more than 750 soldiers from all over the world participated in the commemoration, living in one of two temporary camps built on the edge of Saint Eglise and at the Mere

at Omaha Beach. My unit, the 173rd Airborne Brigade, was in charge of all ceremonies and the airborne operation. Soldiers from U.S. Army Europe, Special Operations Command Europe, U.S. Air Force Europe, the U.S. Army Reserve Component and Air Force Reserve Component all played a key role in making the events a success. We also had participation from historical units from the U.S., namely the 82nd Airborne Division, 101st Airborne Division, 75th Ranger Regiment, 1st Infantry Division, 29th Infantry Division and the 1/507th Parachute Infantry Regiment (Airborne School). Combined, we participated in 30 ceremonies over five days to

### **Prevailing Wage Ordinance**

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the State, county, city or public body or any political subdivision or by any one under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended (Illinois Compiled Statutes, (820 ILCS 130/1 et. seq.) as amended by Public Acts 86-799 and 86-693) and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Act requires that the Essex Fire Protection District investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of said Essex Fire Protection District.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY Board of Trustees, of Essex Fire Protection District:

SECTION 1: To the extent and as required by "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by any one under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the Essex Fire Protection District is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in Kankakee County area as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June of the current year a copy of that determination being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. As required by said Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the Essex Fire Protection District. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance which are also used in aforesaid Act shall be the same as in said Act.

SECTION 2: Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of the Essex Fire Protection District to the extent required by the aforesaid Act.

SECTION 3: The Essex Fire Protection District Secretary shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of the Essex Fire Protection District this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifi-

SECTION 4: The Essex Fire Protection District Secretary shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employers who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

SECTION 5: The Essex Fire Protection District Secretary shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with the Secretary of State of Index Division.

SECTION 6: The Essex Fire Protection District Secretary shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a notice that this Ordinance has been adopted and such publication shall constitute notice that the determination is effective and that this is the determination of this public body.

The largest ceremony was at Omaha Beach, in the Normandy American Cemetery, which was attended by President Obama and French President Sarkozy. We also took part in important ceremonies at Utah Beach, Point Du Hoc, Carentan, Saint Mere Eglise and Picouville. Whenever possible, historical units who

fought the battle were represent-

ed by current Soldiers from that

unit.

The people of SME and the surrounding communities also invited us into their homes. Local families hosted more than 400 soldiers one evening, treating each to a traditional French meal. Mine included five courses, including appetizers, salt crepes, veal (raised on the farm where we were eating), potatoes, cheese and ice cream for dessert. Many bottles of wine were also consumed, as well as home made Calvados (the regional drink, similar to cognac). It was an excellent meal which was also

Every day, I had French men and women come up to me and thank me for my service. Little kids would run up to me, point to my maroon beret, and ask 'Parachuti?" Many asked for my autograph, something I'm definitely not accustomed to. I can't even count how many people asked to have their pictures taken with me and my friends. To them, we were all heroes simply because of the uniform we wear, and the traditions and history we

accompanied by great hospitality

by the family who hosted us.

Normandy to honor the veterans who served so vigilantly; but we were also there for the locals, to show our appreciation for their continued support. I was offered more food and beer than I could possibly have consumed and really was overwhelmed by the hospitality of the locals.

On June 7, more than 350 paratroopers from the U.S., France, Britain and Germany conducted an Airborne Operation onto Iron Mike 2 Drop Zone near the La Fiere bridge, a key objective of the 505th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 82nd Airborne Divison, on D-To jump into the same fields as the veterans, 65 years later, with several of the vets in attendance to watch, was an opportunity of a lifetime.

After the jump, soldiers from all four countries marched to the Iron Mike Memorial for a ceremony to recognize the sacrifices of D-Day but also to recognize that former enemies are current friends and showcase the reconciliation that has occurred in Europe since the war. To have U.S., French, and German Soldiers standing together as brothers in arms, on the same field they fought against each other on 65 years prior, was a triumphant experience.

After the formal ceremony was the most memorable event of the week for me personally. I had recently earned my Master Parachutist Wings, a huge milestone in the career of a paratrooper. The Master Parachutist

Wings signify not only that you are a jump master, but that you have a breadth of Airborne experience to include at least 65 iumps, many of which must be with combat equipment and at

night. I had the great honor of having Major (retired) Duke Boswell, who completed four combat jumps in World War II (Sicily, Salerno, Normandy and Holland), pin my Master Wings, then pound them into my chest in the Blood Wings tradition of the Airborne. After he pinned me in front of the Iron Mike statue, he turned me around, put his arm around my shoulder, and pointed to a tree off in the distance in the middle of a field. He said "Do you see that tree?" "Yes, sir," I replied. "I landed about 100 yards behind it in 1944," he said. Wow. Sullie Sullivan, another vet who jumped into Normandy, and Julius Esher, a pathfinder who jumped in before the main airborne assault, also punched the blood wings. I can think of no better way possible for a paratrooper to earn Master Wings. I honestly felt like a little kid meeting Michael Jordan or Tiger Woods to be in the mere presence of these heroes, much less

have them pin me.

Throughout the week, I spent many hours talking to vets. To sit with them and listen to their stories first-hand was an unforgettable experience. Each one was thankful for the service of our current soldiers and very verbal in expressing that thanks. But I did feel very out of place receiving thanks from true American heroes who sacrificed much more than I during their time in service. Three nights I spent on the back porch of Howard Manoian, a vet who moved back to Normandy after he retired. His first hand accounts left me in awe and admiration, and many of them had me rolling in laughter. Every day I felt like I was living a History Channel documentary with the people I met and the stories I heard. To drive through the hedgerows, to walk the battlefields, to read the memorials and commemoration plaques, was all a surreal experience many can only dream about. I am extremely grateful that I was able to live it, during what was likely the last major anniversary celebration of one of the greatest victories in military history.





Holtz-Fazzini chose the externship at CMT after hearing another student's positive remarks about a similar externship the previous spring.

Though mostly job shadowing in four different departments during the externship, Holtz-Fazzini decided to lend a helping hand during her stay.

"One of the days they let me go on a shoot for a show. At the end of the day I helped clean off a table, and one woman said, 'I can't believe you're doing that.' Right away I thought I did something wrong," she said.

As it turns out, she did something right. Holtz-Fazzini's initiative to assist led to CMT staff encouraging her to apply for an internship, even though the application deadline had passed 10 days before.

Holtz-Fazzini was given an extension for her application. Once submitted, she was approved to start an internship with *CMT Insider* in May. The internship runs through the second week of August.

Her work at *CMT Insider* largely entails assisting with the shoots, though occasionally she has the opportunity to talk to the country music artists. Still, Holtz-Fazzini prefers to avoid the stage and camera lights.

"I'd rather be behind the scenes than in front of the camera," she said.

Currently, Holtz-Fazzini is in Nashville, TN working with CMT. When her internship concludes in August, she plans to look for work in broadcast.

She is not limiting her

horizons, either. "I'm considering staying down here, but I'm not really sure. And I like both radio and television. So we'll see what happens."
