# **Dwight Mayor Vetoes Board Action; Deciding Vote August 10**

Dwight Village President Bill Wilkey has submitted an official, written objection to the motion passed by the Board of Trustees on July 13 to refinance and extend the 1994 Water Works Bond which could allow the Village of Dwight to borrow up to an additional two million dollars for needed water main repairs. The veto was presented at the July 27 regular meeting of the Dwight Village Board of Trustees. In a memorandum presented to the board by Village Attorney Gary Neville, the process for overriding a veto was outlined. At the next regular board session, Trustees will be given the opportunity to

reconsider the matter and override the veto. At that time, the resolution to proceed with the refinancing and loan extension must pass the board by a two-thirds vote which means it would take the vote of four trustees

23 Administration Committee meeting, Trustee Jared Anderson spoke in favor of moving forward with securing funds and addressing the water concerns.

"It's going to come to a point where everything is completely broken. Then, instead of borrowing two million we are going to have to borrow 15 million," Anderson had argued. "The life expectancy of any infrastructure is 50 years...we have water mains that are 100 years old. Do we keep deferring infrastructure until we turn on a faucet and can't get any water and we have an even bigger problem? Do you pass on debt or do you pass on the problem?"



**Herscher Bar Getting New Owners and New Name** 



When Mike's Wildlife Inn in Herscher closes on Friday night, it will open Saturday morning with a new name and owners.

Brent Olson of Herscher recently purchased Mike's Wildlife Inn, one of the local bars, with his longtime friend Marion Ferrari.

Olson changed the name of the business to The Shed, which was christened by his daughter, Randi Olson. Though the name complements Ferrari's South Wilmington bar, The Garage, the similarities in names was not intentional.

"My daughter picked the name, and it just seemed to fit. Herscher is a farming community, so it made sense," Olson said.

# Bins used to collect, recycle household textiles

They don't look like the blue tubs we drag out to the curb each week, but the owners of the red and white Used Again bins that have appeared in Dwight and Gardner said they have the same purpose.

The Used Again bins collect household textiles for reuse and recycle, said Used CÉO Mattias Again Wallander.

"In the city of Chicago, of course, there are lots and lots of options if you don't want to throw out your clothes," Wallander said. "What we've found is that there are less options for recycling your clothes the further out you get. We're one of the few companies that are offering this service when you get out in more rural areas. We're trying to make it convenient.'

Used Again is a commercial company based in West Chicago that sells donated items to thrift stores or converts them to cleaning rags and insulation materials.

Items that can be dropped off include household textiles such as clothes, shoes, bed linens, curtains, towels and blankets.

Household textiles are just as recyclable as the paper, aluminum, plastic and glass we set out near the trash, he said.

Three Dwight locations along Waupansie Street, and one in Gardner, are now offering people that option.

About 85 percent of all clothing will be worn again within one month. Wallander said. The company has a goal of throwing out less than five percent of items.

Most people don't connect reusing clothing as a good way to help reduce greenhouse gasses, he said.

"It's a very energy and resource intensive process clothing,' to make Wallander said.

To make clothing, you must spin fibers, make the cloth, cut it, sew it, dye it and ship it. Much of the cot-





St. Paul Grade School in Odell has recently hired Dan Schmitt as its new principal.


For the past 25 years, Schmitt has worked in the Prairie Central school district, first as assistant principal and athletic director and later as the principal of Prairie Central High School. He also spent 13 years as a guidance counselor for grades K-12 in the Scales Mound school district.

Though Schmitt retired from PCHS in June of this year, he is already out of retirement and preparing for another school year.

The board next reviewed the fiscal-year 2010 appropriations ordinance, highlighting the changes in costs compared to fiscal 2010. Overall the village's funds saw a decrease of just under 1.2 million dollars with the new fiscal year total for all funds being \$4,673,750 compared to the old total of all funds of \$5.822.750. These numbers are based on allocations rather than actual spending and the final difference in funds could change by the end of the fiscal year. The appropriations ordinance passed unanimously.

The board next discussed the repeal of the contractor registration ordinance based motion on а by Commissioner Dick Hileman. On questioning, Hileman reported his motion was based on the letters received by the board concerning the ordinance not being evenly enforced. Commissioners Bill Gerrish and Gary Cox argued that the ordinance should be reviewed and revised, if necessary, and then properly enforced. Hileman questioned the definition of a contractor, and Cox suggested the existence of a federal employer ID number. Hileman responded with a suggestion of setting a dollar value to a job for the requirement. All of the commissioners agreed that the current ordinance is creating problems. Cox also suggested the need for a permit should be a deciding factor in registering the contractor, with Gerrish suggesting the difference being if the contractor pulls the permit rather

**Gardner Village Board Meets July 27** 

Attorney John Bates reported the codification committee has ordered a draft of the final codification and will be reviewing the draft as a whole. Bates presented the garbage contract bid packs to the commissioners for their review prior to opening the bid process. Bates hopes to open the bid process the week of August 7, hold the pre-bid conference on August 24, deadline for bids of September 14 with a qualification meeting to follow for the potential winning bidder. The current contract expires on October 31. Hileman would like the bidding contractors to come before the commissioners to qualify their bids prior to awarding the contract. Bates explained that past practice has been a pre-bid conference and the conference could be followed by a board meeting.

Commissioner Hileman reported a \$700,000 CD was pulled with \$200,000 going to savings to allow for payment of the upcoming sewer

opened than the home owner. The project and \$500,000 going into a CD at First National Bank of Dwight at a 1% increase in interest rate over the previous CD. Several other CD's will be coming due for roll-over.

Commissioner Mike Serena reported they are preparing to purchase a salt storage facility to be constructed by the village employees and will have additional information at the next meeting. Commissioner Gerrish reported he has begun pricing fencing to place around the new generator at the lift station and requested the village clerk place the item on the agenda for the next meeting.

The board entered closed session at 7:50 p.m.

# **Odell Public Library Receives Grant from Illinois State Library**

The Odell Public Library has been awarded a "2009: A Tech Odyssey" grant for the amount of \$4,000. Funding for this grant was awarded by the Illinois State Library (ISL), a Division of the Office of Secretary of State, using funds provided by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), under the federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA).

The "2009: A Tech Odyssey" grant is designed to provide a vast array of technology for the residents and small businesses of the Odell community. With this

grant, the library purchased five Dell laptop computers, which will be used to help train individuals and small businesses to use software and hardware technology. In addition, one laptop computer will be available to use to interview veterans via the Veterans History Project. To facilitate these services, a scanner, color printer, video camera and digital camera were purchased. A microfilm machine was purchased to help provide access to the defunct Odell newspapers for genealogy purposes. An LED display has been purchased to provide informa-

tion on upcoming library and non-profit community events, and a laminator is now available to help protect important documents such as Social Security cards. Finally, several desktop computers have been purchased which will help provide even faster and safer Internet access for the library's patrons.

Eric Colclasure, the director of Odell Public Library, stated "The Odell Public Library is ecstatic about this grant-the library will provide an Open House on Monday August 24 to display the new technology and explain how these items will be used for the library. We envision providing a variety of computer training programs-for example, training on how to create personal websites or how to use Microsoft Publisher. With this technology, we feel we can help Odell's residents not only become more techno-savvy but we can help provide the means to help our residents and small businesses succeed."

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



Millennials, Gen X and Baby Boomers Should Invest for Growth

Is there a "generation gap" today? In some ways, it's possible. While many baby boomers are happy just to understand the basics of Facebook, "Millennials" are busy texting and twittering. And yet when it comes to investing, baby boomers (born between 1946 and 1962), Generation X (1963 – 1981) and Millennials (1982 – 2001) may have a lot in common.

Specifically, to achieve their long-term goals, these groups should structure their investment portfolios to provide some growth potential. However, due to their age differences, they may need to take different approaches in how they invest for growth. Let's take a look at all three groups:

• Millennials - One of your biggest objectives may be to save enough money for a down payment on a house. For this short-term goal, you may want an investment whose value won't fluctuate too much. At the same time, don't ignore the need to save for retirement, even though it's likely decades away. Contribute as much as you can afford to your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored plan, and if you still have money available, consider opening an IRA. And you may want to fund these accounts with an appropriate amount of growthoriented investments, such as stocks or stock-based vehicles. (Keep in mind, though, that the value of these investments will fluctuate over time, sometimes significantly, and there's no guarantee you won't lose any principal.)

• Generation X – Retirement is becoming more of a reality - so if you have been underutilizing your 401(k) and IRA, now may be a good time to ratchet up your contributions. And although you have less time to make up for market drops than your Millennial co-workers, you're not out of time, either so you still need to invest for growth potential. Nonetheless, you may want to include a higher percentage of bonds and other fixed-income vehicles in your portfolio, especially if you're an older Gen X'er.

• Baby Boomers - Retirement is coming at you pretty quickly. And it's both a short-term and a long-term goal, because even though you may be leaving your career in just a few years, you could spend two or even three decades in retirement, starting a new career, going back to school or pursuing other interests you haven't had time to pursue. So you're faced with a paradox: On one hand, you don't want to invest too heavily in high-growth vehicles, because these are the most risky - and a market downturn could cause the value of your portfolio to drop just when you need to start tapping into your investments. But you can't become too conservative and put all your money in fixed-income vehicles, because over time these investments may lose value to inflation which means you'll lose purchasing power. Consider investing in quality stocks, which have growth potential, along with a good mix of bonds, Treasury bills, certificates of deposit and other vehicles that may offer the potential for both current income and preservation of principal.

Your need for investment growth never really disappears. But at different stages of your life, you'll have to balance this need against competing interests – so review your financial situation regularly, and make the right moves at the right times.

# Small Talk

by Anne Shaw Heinrich

Back before I was a wife and mother, I had all kinds of preconceived notions about how family life looked and felt. My projections were based on a flimsy and quite naïve belief that perfection was achievable. I remain hopeful.

From my humble perch in this world, it seems like just about everybody else is at least ten steps ahead of me and my brood. This isn't a criticism of my family. I don't expect that of them. Like many women, I tend to carry the whole burden of "keeping it together" on my shoulders. It is, after all, what I signed up for, right? Right.

It always seems like other women are doing a better job than I can manage. Their bathrooms are cleaner. Their upper arms are less flabby. They seem to have times and dates of important meetings mastered. Their Christmas cards are out on time. They've paid their bills on time.

Their dogs are well-groomed. Their kids are well-groomed.

They get their leaves raked and their weeds pulled. They know what they're having for supper.

Other mothers seem to be able to find their checkbooks, their keys, their sunglasses. In short, they've got their ka-ka together. And me? I'm looking through my windows that have been smudged with finger prints and dog slobber, determined that today is the day that I'm going to turn the corner. Today is the day I'm going to be more patient with my kids and husband. I'm even going to cut the dogs and the guinea pig some slack. And I'm going to do it all wearing lipstick.

Recently, I learned about a great, great, great-grandmother on my mother's side. As the story goes, this woman asked her husband to lock her up in a bedroom while he was out working in the fields. She made the request because she feared she might hurt the children if left alone with them. Her husband must have shared her fears, because he honored her request. She spent nearly five years holed up in her bedroom, before finally being committed to an insane asylum. I guess the children fended for themselves while their mother checked herself out.

There's nothing funny about this story. The woman probably had severe clinical depression. This was before Prozac and Oprah. This was before people aired their dirty laundry. You just didn't talk about these things. It just wasn't done. I suspect that my poor ancestor wasn't all that different than me. I can guess that she found herself surprised at how challenging it was to pull off the wife and mother gig. It didn't look and feel and sound like what



she pictured as a young girl. It was her responsibility to keep it all together, and she obviously didn't believe she was up to the task.

Sometimes I fantasize about locking myself up in a room, too. I just want to collect my thoughts. I just want to relocate my own tenuous hold on sanity. I feel like I'm chin-high in waters that are too choppy for the skills and energy that I bring to the equation.

There's one comfort to which I cling: I'm not alone. About ten years ago, I was relieved to discover that one of my friends had plenty of cracks on her veneer as well. Sure, her dishes were always done and her toenails were always painted, but she had a daughter who picked her nose and a son who was a biter. She was chronically overdrawn on her checking account and her kitchen counter was heaped with enough old school papers and bills and outdated coupons to start a fire. She admitted to me that she envied me my freelance writing career and the fact that my four-year-old could read. She wished she'd had the patience to breastfeed her children like I had. An acquaintance had clean kitchen counters, but a crumbling marriage and a drinking problem to boot.

I started feeling pretty good about my smeared windows and the head of lettuce that was rotting in the bottom of my refrigerator. I still push against the machine. I still expect more of myself, and sometimes my family, than is humanly possible.

But I'm getting better about forgiving others of their faults and flaws. I'm more forgiving of myself. I'm starting to understand that everybody's got cobwebs somewhere. If they aren't in their living rooms, they're probably in the attic or the basement

(continued from page 1) ton in items is grown in the United States, shipped to China to be produced and then shipped back to this country as clothing. Some cloth and synthetic fibers use pesticides that are made from petroleum.

Used Again saved 350 million pounds of greenhouse gasses in 2008, Wallander said.

That's seven pounds of greenhouse gasses saved per pound of clothing, which is double that of the weekly recyclables of paper, glass, plastic and aluminum. Those save between one and three pounds per pound of material, he said.

At the three Dwight locations, people are donating 300 to 500 pounds of textiles per week. That means 2,100 pounds to 3,500 pounds of

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greenhouse gas that area residents are saving per week. Used Again has locations

in St. Louis, Minneapolis, Wisconsin and Seattle. The company donated \$250,000 last year to the Children's Miracle Network.

"Everyone knows that it makes sense to recycle whether its paper or textiles, but it's all a matter of convenience," Wallander said. "Convenience is everything. We make these convenient drop boxes specifically for dropping clothes where people will go in their daily routine to drop off clothing."

Dwight locations are along Waupansie Street at Berkot's, at the old Coils factory and near the intersection of North Chicago and Waupansie Street. In Gardner, a donation bin sits at Vigna Real Estate.
