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More than 200 want to Impact Dwight

Sure, maybe somebody else will do it. But what if they don't?

Impact Dwight Chairman Rodney Connor challenged people with that thought, and more than 200 responded to say "yes, I want to Impact Dwight" at a town gathering Thursday, August 6, at the Dwight United Methodist Church.

"I'm blown away by the turnout, especially in the summertime when it's almost impossible to get that many people together," said Connor, after the meeting. "By that many showing up, I feel like we've already done something."

Adults met in the sanctuary to hear five goals that will hopefully lead to one "big, hairy, audacious goal" of making Dwight the hub of Livingston County.

"You involve a community and a community thrives," said Jerry Beier, emcee and an Impact Dwight member. "We're all in love with Dwight and that's why we're here tonight."

Thursday's meeting was a culmination of several MAP-PING meetings organized by Western Illinois University consultants earlier this year. Those meetings helped articulate how they envision

Dwight's future, brainstormed ideas and put in place goals for how they could happen.

Those goals are: One, is to make Dwight a business-friendly community where new and existing businesses are supported with shopping locally encouraged.

Two, is to make Dwight a well-known tourist and historical destination with accurately restored storefronts and regulatory guidelines for restoration.

Three, is to make community pride evident in the village's clean, beautiful and inviting appearance.

Four, is to make Dwight meet the social, recreational, cultural and leisure needs of the community.

Five, is to create a state-of-the-art infrastructure that meets the growth demands of the village.

Group members then unveiled some specific plans to meet those goals, which include creating a marketing plan for the village; starting a public art project; beautifying Renfrew Park and creating a village walking path by extending Pine Cone Path to Lions Lake; developing a town clean up program; researching grants and exploring incentives for certain projects.



Livingston Landfill Sponsors Open House

Keeping public informed on operations, environmental efforts

Livingston Landfill held an open house Friday, August 7, in which Allied Waste Industries Inc. took visitors on a tour of its 730-acre waste service facility.

Local officials and area residents had the opportunity to view firsthand how the landfill operates, ranging from demonstrations of its ground water testing programs to a bus tour of the active and closed cells of the site.

During the open house, attendees had the opportunity to speak to R. Russell and Associates Engineering Technician Kevin Moore,

who detailed the facility's efforts to protect the environment. R. Russell and Associates is the third-party engineering firm working on a new 13-acre cell on the site.

The landfill design incorporates barriers to assure that leachate, which is water that drains through the waste materials in the landfill and contains potential contaminants, does not impact groundwater. In order to prevent leachate from contaminating groundwater, the landfill engineers implement several safeguards to prevent impact from the leachate.

To contain the leachate drainage, the landfill has a

liner and leachate collection system beneath the waste that includes:

- four feet of low permeability clay at the lowest level, constructed in six-inch thick compacted and tested layers at a time before adding the next layer;
- a high density polyethylene plastic liner overlaying the clay;
- a layer of eight-ounce fabric overlaying the plastic liner;
- one foot of sand laid atop the fabric, with a perforated collection pipe in a trench to collect the leachate;
- an additional layer of fabric atop the sand;
- an automated leachate

pumping system, which pumps any leachate from the bottom of the landfill;

• and finally waste material on top.

As a requirement of the City of Pontiac and an additional precaution, the facility has a waste water treatment plant on site that pre-treats leachate before going to the Pontiac Wastewater Treatment Plant.

The open house bus tour, guided by R. Russell and Associates Senior Project Engineer Michael Friend, viewed a recently closed portion of slope on Parcel D, as well as the in-progress construction of the new 13-acre cell, costing \$150,000 (continued on page 3)

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


(continued from page 1) per acre to construct. The tour also viewed currently operational cells in Parcel ABC.

During the tour, Friend called attention to the above-ground pipes that indicate either a ground water or gas migration monitoring system. The monitoring systems can be no more than 50 feet from the landfill waste boundary and spaced no more than 500 feet apart along the waste boundary.

Livingston Landfill spends approximately \$154,000 annually for the monitoring of groundwater.

Each day, approximately 250 truckloads of waste material come to the site, disposing approximately 5,000 tons of waste in a 20-foot thick layer, Friend said.

Twenty-two acres of the landfill recently reached its maximum grade at 170 feet in height and has been closed to future waste disposal.

Restoration on Albert Cashier House in Beginning Stages



Restoration begins for the Albert Cashier House.

The Village of Saunemin has begun restoring a piece of history this year.

Restoration of the Albert Cashier House in Saunemin began this summer. For years, the residence of the famed Civil War and Battle of Vicksburg veteran was stored in Pontiac, but now it's coming home.

Cashier was born as Jennie Rodgers, an Irish woman who traveled overseas to the United States

and donned a man's identity in order to enlist in the Union Army. She moved to Saunemin in 1869, where she remained until entering the Soldiers' and Sailor's home in Quincy for medical care in 1911.

Her hidden identity was not discovered until she was 68 years old, when two male attendants at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home in Quincy attempted to bathe her and subsequently discovered she was not a man. She posed as a man for more than 50 years.

She was buried in Sunny Slope Cemetery in Saunemin, and now her home is coming back to the village as well.

Not much of the original structure remains. While some of its siding as well as its window frames and a doorway have survived, the majority of the building is being constructed from the ground up, particularly its new framework.

"We're trying to incorporate what we can of the existing structure into the new building," said

Saunemin mayor Bob Bradford.

The restored Albert Cashier House stands approximately 50 feet from where the original structure stood. Otherwise, it is on the original plot of land inhabited by Cashier.

The Village of Saunemin is selling paver blocks that businesses and individuals may purchase to have inscribed and set in an outdoor brick walkway. Funds raised from the paver block sales will go towards the restoration project.

The village eventually hopes to utilize the home as a museum coupled with a war memorial.





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
