Two-year-old Isaac Wargo Throws First Pitch for Cardinals

A little boy with local ties got a big honor when he threw out the first pitch at the August 2 St. Louis Cardinals game at Busch Stadium.

Isaac Wargo, who turned two last Monday, tossed the ball as part of the National Children s Cancer Society Family Day at the ballpark. He was diagnosed with Infantile Fibrosarcoma when he was three weeks old.

Isaac is the grandson of Steve and Carole Shields of Dwight and Dave Wargo of Streator and the nephew of Todd Bean and Tracie Wargo of Dwight. He is the son of David and Lisa Wargo of Jerseyville and has three brothers: Jacob, eight, Matthew, six, and Zachary,

I don t think he knew what was going on, Lisa said of Isaac s throwing the first pitch. Because Isaac is so young, she said he wasn t aware it was a big deal.

With his father at his side, Isaac tossed the pitch to Cards infielder Joe Thurston, gave himself a round of applause and received a high-five from the Cardinals

Soon after his birth, Isaac s family noticed a lump on his neck. Doctors removed the lump and found it to be cancerous, leading to Isaac s diagnosis at three weeks old. Just months into his life, Isaac and his family dealt with the return of tumor cells, surgeries and treatments.

When we first found out, it was a big shock, Lisa said. I mean, when you hear cancer over the phone...

Lisa said that she and David tried to keep things as normal as possible for their sons while Isaac underwent chemotherapy treatments, with David taking days off work to stay home with the three older boys while Lisa and her mother took Isaac to the hospital.

Still, life had changed, which is where the National Children s Cancer Society came in.

They helped us out financially as Isaac was going through treatment, Lisa said. She explained that the society also provides seminars for caregivers and explains what families can expect after a child has been diagnosed with cancer.

There are a lot of things that families go through that

you think you might be the only one, she said. The NCCS provides reassurance that those feelings are common, Lisa explained.

Isaac is no longer undergoing treatment and has been in remission since November of last year.

In addition to getting to throw out the first pitch at a Major League Baseball

Dwight Rent Subsidy and Loan Programs Intended to Boost Business

Board Overrides Mayor's Veto

Finding ways to revitalize downtown Dwight and encouraging new businesses to occupy vacant buildings is the challenge and steps toward the goal taken when the Dwight Village Board approved a Rent Subsidy Program and a Commercial Rehabilitation Loan Program during its August 10 meeting.

The motivation to get into this is that in November there were 19 vacant buildings and most of them were in the greater downtown area, said Stephen Wilkey of Dwight who helped to present the programs to the board. Mr. Wilkey, who is President of the First National Bank of Dwight, said many groups and committees have met to try and answer the question, What are we going to do about this?

Subsidy The Rent Program will allow a new downtown business owner a subsidized rent option for a limited time. Through the program, the tenant would receive a significant reduction in the rent of a downtown business building for one year, with the majority subsidized by the village and a portion subsided by the landlord. The tenant would reimburse the village a portion of their gross receipts for the first year. Each quarter, as the business becomes more established, the subsidy amount decreases as well as the tenants reimbursement percentage. Landlords maintain the right to not participate in the program and the Village would have the right to refuse an applicant. \$15,000 in funding for the Dwight Rent Program Subsidy included in this years Village budget.

We are going to help these people to get started, because it is always hard to get started, and eventually the money is going to come back into the village, said Gibs Nielsen who explained

the Rent Subsidy Program. The idea is if you occupy a building, you may create a job, you may create activity downtown and, if successful, it does recoup your sales tax, said Mr. Wilkey.

Dwight Mayor Bill Wilkey raised several concerns regarding the program including village funding and possible failure along with concerns from a few local downtown business owners who fear possible competition.

But, what if it is a success? questioned Alex McWilliams, President of Dwight s Main Program. If you don t do it, nothing is going to happen. In the real world competition is good for everyone, it is good for the customer, it is good for the business because it brings more peo-

ple in town you need to look for something to keep Dwight alive.

McWilliams also stressed the importance of turning things around by bringing businesses downtown and supporting local operations.

We need to look at buying in Dwight very seriously from now on or we are going to lose whatever is here, warned McWilliams.

I think it is something we need to try and see if we can generate some downtown activity, said Trustee Jerry Curtis. If we want economic development, we have to be the lead as the Village - we have to put our money where our mouth is. I think it is worth the invest-

All board members present agreed to the Rent

Subsidy program. Trustee Mike Woods was absent from the meeting.

The Commercial Rehabilitation Loan Program is open to commercial building owners in the Village and is designed to provide low rate loans for the purpose of rehabilitating aging buildings in an effort to attract a business for occupancy. The Village, in conjunction with participating banks, would work together to secure the lower interest loans which come with a maximum term of 10 years and can only be used for capital projects. The Village has budgeted \$40,000 this year for the Commercial Loan and Rehabilitation program.

You most likely need to save and invest for retirement. But if you have children, you also may want to put money away for their college education. Are these two goals mutually exclusive?

Can You Invest for College and Retirement?

They don t have to be — but achieving them both can be challenging. Over the past generation, the responsibility of paying for retirement has largely shifted from the employer to the employee. And if at all possible, you ll want to max out your IRA, which offers significant tax benefits. Your contributions to a traditional IRA may be tax-deductible, and your earnings grow on a

Depending on your income level, you may be able to contribute to a Roth IRA, which provides tax-free earnings, provided you meet certain conditions. In 2009, you can contribute up to \$5,000 to your IRA, or \$6,000 if you re 50 or older.

tax-deferred basis

Once you ve earned your employer s 401(k) match and then, if possible, contributed the maximum amount to your IRA, you can begin looking more closely at college savings vehicles, such as a Section 529 plan or a Coverdell Education Savings Account, both of which offer tax-free earnings and withdrawals as long as the money is used for qualified education expenses. (Withdrawals for other types of expenses may be subject to federal and state taxes plus a 10 percent penalty.) Also, Section 529 plan contributions may be tax-deductible in certain states for residents who participate in their own state s plan. To make sure you understand the tax ramifications of a Section 529 plan, you ll want to consult with your tax advisor.

By committing yourself to regular investing, and by taking advantage of the various investment accounts available, you can make progress toward your retirement goals while still tackling the high costs of higher education. That s a win-win situation.

Gardner Board Discusses **Upcoming Projects**

The Gardner Village Board opened its regular session Monday evening, August 10, with a discussion of the contractor registration brought up at the last meeting. Commissioner Mike Serena reported that he spoke with the village of Coal City concerning its contractor registration and presented the board with a copy of Coal City s registration form and fee schedule. Serena suggested a fee structure that would cover the cost to the village to process the paperwork.

Commissioner Bill Gerrish suggested following the current fee schedule of \$50 per contractor and \$100 for a general contractor, noting that the present structure is an annual fee rather than a per-job fee. Serena noted some of the neighboring towns have additional fees but did not suggest adopting additional fees at this time. Gerrish, who presented a copy of the Wilmington registration at a past meeting, commented that he preferred the Coal City version for use in Gardner. Gerrish stressed that following the same guidelines for all contractors is the most important aspect and that the mayor and board are responsible for enforcement in the village. The registration issue was tabled until the next meeting.

Village resident Don Phillips addressed the board and presented an article from the National Fire Protection (NFPA.org) Association

concerning lightweight construction and sprinkler systems. Phillips urged the board to review the article and the referenced study prior to approving the codification of the village s zoning code and ordinances.

Village Attorney Scott Belt presented the board with two versions of the village s codification and stated that he would like to return with one and asked the board to review the changes.

Dick Commissioner Hileman reported that the beautification committee was hosting the Dixie Rose band on August 15. Hileman noted that he did not get home to review the information in time to place the item on the agenda and asked the board members to consider the expense for the band to act on reimbursing the committee at the next meeting.

Commissioner Gerrish reported the village is seeking an additional bid for storm sewer upgrades in conjunction with Wilmington Street resurfacing project. Gerrish also commented to the board that the village will be starting a valve exercising project as many of the village s water valves have not been exercised in some time. Gerrish is seeking the cost for an automatic valve exercising machine and may have pricing for the board at the next meeting. Commissioner Serena suggested renting a machine to try out before buying to ensure it is what the village needs.

Serena reported he has 7:35 p.m.

done additional research on the proposed salt building and reported that he believes concrete blocks could result in significant savings to the village over wood construction and would provide an anchor for the dome cover. Serena reported the blocks are \$20-25 per block and the village would need 95-100 blocks, with the covering section costing an additional \$15,000. Serena reported that having the building installed would cost \$8,000; however, the company that manufactures and installs the building believes the village employees should be able to install the structure. Serena hopes to have final cost estimates soon.

Hileman suggested paving the pad at the same time as the Jackson Street project. Serena and Village Engineer Guy Christensen reported some gas lines will need to be relocated in connection with the Jackson Street project. Serena has been contacted by some residents requesting a speed bump for the area, and the board will consider this option following the completion of the paving.

Mayor Tom Wise reported the 2010 census process has begun, and Wise has been contacted by the area churches concerning the process. The village will put together a committee to coordinate the census effort, including flyers to advise residents of the importance of the census to the village.

The board adjourned at



DGS Approves Extended Day Kindergarten Option; **Budget Projection Presents Continued Challenges**

With the start of school just days away, the Dwight Grade School Board of Education approved changes to the kindergarten model that will allow some students an opportunity for more classroom time through an extended kindergarten class

After much discussion, several factors drove the late change, including approval of the State s budget which included grant monies allowing for the continuation of current Pre-K programs, a smaller projected class size and the board s desire to reach the varying academic and social needs of as many students as possible.

This school year, under the new plan, there will be two half-day sections of kindergarten with one Extended-Day Kindergarten option offered to some students who meet criteria established by the district. The new plan will allow the district to offer 18 students a year-long extended day option, along with four to six students who rotate in and out of the developmental kindergarten program. Between the two programs, the school will be able to offer Extended Kindergarten services, of some manner, to 24 students. Approximately 54 kindergarten students have been registered for the 2009-10 school year.

While some board members and teachers present at the meeting were apprehensive about implementing a change so close to the year s start date, and with several details still needing to be ironed out, the majority of the board felt the benefits outweighed any concerns.

Board President Deb Christoff, and members Tim Harris, Bret Heinrich, Rob Pulver and Steve Tock, voted to move forward with the extended day model, while Citizens is welcome. The next Ron Colebank and Stacey

The kindergarten extended day plan will be subject to a year-by-year evaluation to determine effectiveness, need and feasibility.

In another matter, the proposed 2009-10 budget was presented to the board by District Superintendent Dale Adams.

With projected State Aid monies still uncertain, the struggling district s proposed budget reflects a nearly \$500,000 deficit in the Education Fund while ending the year with less than \$400,000 across all funds.

Our decision to keep class sizes small has had a compounding Adams told the board.

A temporary solution to alleviate the Education Fund deficient could be to nearly abolish the approximate \$600,000 Working Cash Fund. Adams discussed longer term solutions with the board, including exploring consolidation with the financially solid Dwight Township High School District.

The Board will be studying various options for closing the gap over the next several months, Superintendent Adams told The Paper.

However, Adams told the board that there is light at the end of the tunnel with anticipated wind farm revenues expected to begin next

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

Smart Foods for Smart Kids: Good Food Choices Keep Kids Focused in the Classroom

children throughout the day, starting at breakfast, can affect their test-taking skills, focus, and performance in school.

Just like adults, kids need carbohydrates, protein, fat, vitamins, and minerals only in different amounts based on where they are in their growth and development. The amount of nutrients needed depends on the age and gender of the child. Eating organic is also a good way to avoid harmful herbicides and pesticides.

Kids should always start their day with a nutritious meal. Studies have shown that kids who eat breakfast perform better in school, have more focus, and less behavioral issues. According to Stephani Waldron-Trapp, ND, naturopathic practitioner at Northwestern Health Sciences University s Natural Care Center in Bloomington, Minnesota, it is important for kids to eat breakfast within a half hour of waking up in the morning. They should have some sort of protein eggs, meat, bean dish, or oatmeal with

Waldron-Trapp legumes. also emphasizes the benefits of fish oil supplements, which encourage brain func-

There are a variety of nutritious snacks that will give children the nutrition needed to keep them energized and focused throughout the day. Waldron-Trapp recommends a snack with protein and simple carbohydrates every two to three hours. Some healthy snacks for kids include a banana with almond butter; celery stalks with almond butter and raisins; a handful of nuts: fresh fruit: avocado sliced on crackers; plain yogurt; and hummus on crackers or vegetables.

Nutritious meals benefit kids in many ways. There are many things parents can do to encourage healthy eating habits in children.

1. Have regular family meals: These meals are often more nutritious and kids are less likely to snack on unhealthy foods.

2. Serve a variety of healthy foods and snacks: Instead of large portions, serve a variety of small por-Waldron-Trapp encourages eating proteinrich meals every 2-3 hours.

3. Lead by example: Parents should eat healthy as well.

4. Avoid battles over food: Provide a variety of healthy choices and let children choose to eat what they like. This allows children to feel like they are in control when parents are actually offering nutritious choices.

5. Involve kids in the process: Have them help pick meals, grocery shop, and help to cook.





deployed to Fort Polk, Louisiana from 2004 through 2005. He was deployed to serve in Afghanistan as part of Operation Enduring Freedom in August 2008.

Holland is currently in dwell time status and is scheduled to be home for two years, although he may be called back sooner.

I m home til they need me again, he said.

During his tour in Afghanistan, where he was stationed in Mehter Lam, My job was to oversee the gathering, discernment and distribution of intelligence as it affected the battalion s battle space, Holland said. He said he ran a military intelligence cell in support of an infantry battalion that also supported Provential Reconstruction Teams and Marines and Navy, worked hand-in-hand with the Air Force and supported Police Mentor Teams and Emmersion Training Teams. They also worked with the Afghan National Police and Afghan Army.

I s nice to be able to take these soldiers with you and be able to stand beside them and Yeah, he s Dwight, he said.



Board members overpowered Mayor Wilkey s attempt to reverse an earlier decision to proceed with borrowing up to an addition-

al two million dollars for water related repairs. This additional money will be in addition to the current

loan balance.

At the July 27 session, Mayor Wilkey had vetoed the action taken by the board on July 13 to proceed with refinancing and also extending the 1994 Water Works Bonds. However, in the final move at the August 10 session, Board members stuck to their original decisions and the majority felt securing the funds needed to move forward with critical repairs now is in the best interest of the Village.

Mayor Wilkey maintained his opposition to borrowing additional money and suggested that by securing a loan the village may not qualify for available Federal grant monies and that there could be additional costs to borrowing the money.

These pipes did not break overnight and if we wait it is not going to be a catastrophe, argued Mayor Wilkey. I think we should wait and see what the economy is going to do.

Board members Angie Airgood, Jared Anderson, Jerry Curtis and Justin Eggenberger voted to secure the additional monies, while Ron Skinner opposed the move. Mike Woods was not present.

The decision will extend the expiration date of the Water Bond. The amount of the additional loan amount will be determined as key projects are established. Firms for underwriting the loan refunding and extension are being considered.

In other business,
Dwight Attorney Fred Strufe
spoke to the board on behalf
of a client who purchased a
parcel of excess village
property on East Waupansie
Street in 1996. According to
Strufe, a lack of access to the
property was not clearly
communicated at the time of
purchase. Strufe requested

that the Village return the purchase price of approximately \$9,000 and retake possession of the property. The matter has been sent to the Administration Committee for review

A proposal for a teen center was presented to the board by Dawn Sutton of Dwight. Sutton s proposal is to utilize two adjacent downtown buildings to form a supervised place for area teens to gather while offering programs and activities. The proposal requests village support and assistance. The proposed teen center will be discussed at an upcoming Administration Committee meeting.

Chief of Police Tim Henson reported to the board on the recent rash of thefts from vehicles. Henson indicated that police patrols have been increased and asked citizens to report any unusual activities or suspicious individuals.

In other business, the board approved:

¥ the IDOT Obligation Retirement Resolution regarding the Waupansie Street Bond for the purpose of receiving Motor Fuel Tax money.

¥ a Knights of Columbus Tootsie Roll Drive request at the corners of Routes 17 and 47 on September 12 and 13.

¥ the VFW Buddy Poppy Drive at the corners of Routes 17 and 47 on October 30-31.

¥ A sound amplification permit for the 300 block of W. William Street on August 22 from 7 to 11 p.m.

The next meeting of the Dwight Board of Trustees will be Monday, August 24, at 6 p.m. in the Public Services Complex.


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
