Clausen's Lincoln takes off

One never knows where Dwight Artist Cathee "Cat" Clausen's rendition of Abraham Lincoln might turn up.

Since being licensed for use on souvenirs at the Abraham Lincoln Memorial Library in Springfield in March 2008, Clausen's Lincoln has taken on a life of his own, gracing everything from covers of magazines, to T-shirts, to street banners in Chicago.

"Lincoln has reached his arms out broad and is hugging everyone it feels like with his image," Clausen said. "It was just what I was hoping for when I wanted to be able to share the image,

and licensing is such a great Chicago. vehicle to do that."

People can currently find Clausen's work on the front Springfield's annual of Capital City Visitor magazine, a free guide to Springfield published by Illinois Times magazine. The Capital City Visitor 2009-2010 has a circulation of more than 60,000.

After the magazine came out, St. John's Hospital in Springfield held a Lincoln Memorial half marathon and used Clausen's Lincoln on participants' T-shirts.

Then, an art show in Chicago selected Clausen's Lincoln as part of a public art project. He's currently being featured on street banners along Addison and Broadway streets in

Billboard-size pictures of

Clausen's Lincoln also rode on a recent parade float in Chicago, and 10,000 magnets of him were handed out along the route.

"I'm just having so much fun with this," Clausen said.

She originally painted Lincoln in 2005, and he became the first of many in a collection that features her signature style - ribbons of color.

"He looked like nothing else I was doing at the time. I was doing almost fantasy type work then," she said. "I was a little intimidated by Lincoln. In November of last year, I thought, 'I'm going to dive in and try George Washington, Thomas Jeffer-(continued on page 16)

Dwight's Harbor Under Watchful Eye of NFL Scouts



Dwight Township High School graduate Clay Harbor starts his senior year football season at Missouri State with high expectations upon him.

Sixteen of the NFL's 32 teams have sent scouts to watch Harbor during the first two weeks of practice and more are expected as the Bears' football season kicks off Saturday, September 12, against Tennessee-Martin.

"Anybody who has played football, that's a goal," Harbor told the News-Leader in Springfield, Mo. "If they said it wasn't, they would be lying."

DTHS Summer Projects Near Completion

It has been another busy summer at Dwight Township High School as projects totaling over \$700,000 have kept workers busy.

'The DTHS stimulus package is in action," Superintendent Dale Adams told the board during its August 17 meeting.

A healthy budget allowed the district to move forward with several endeavors, some which are still in process but expected to wrap up in the coming month.

The largest project will alter the appearance of the more than 50-year-old building, as portions of the current flat roof are being replaced with a sloped roof. The estimated \$1.5 million roof replacement project will take place in phases over a three-year period. This year's first phase totaled approximately \$550,000.

Several areas in the athletic field area also received attention this summer. Replacement of the brick stadium wall has been completed at a cost of \$36,750, and support pillars under the bleachers are in process of being replaced. The pillar replacement will take place over two years at a total cost of \$55,300.

The track surface was removed, and a new 1.5"

put down. A new rubber surface will be applied in the coming weeks. Cost for the track replacement and resurfacing totaled \$118,000.

Resurfacing of the school's tennis courts has also been completed. The courts will be lined for tennis, but the current basketball poles will remain to allow for recreational basketball use. Cost of tennis court repairs was approved at \$17,800.

Other projects completed over the summer break include painting of the gym/weight room, addition of new weight and cardio equipment, new lockers for the girls locker room, automatic faucets throughout the building and three security cameras installed on the building second floor.

In another matter, the proposed 2009-2010 budget was presented to the board.

> \$4,555,800 positive balance. The Education Fund, which carries the largest balance, is projected to end the year positively by \$4,373 for balance of an ending \$2,700,764.

> More than 75% of the district's revenues are from local sources such as property taxes and school fees, with the remaining income generated from State and Federal sources. The proposed budget will remain on display in the District #230 office for 30 days. A public hearing will take place at the September 21 board session prior to final approval of the

243-pound senior tight end graduated from MSU in May and is working toward a master's degree in sports management and business. He was named preseason Football Championship Subdivision all-America.

What happens next year isn't a main concern of Harbor's, as he focuses on this season.

"Personal goals always take a second place to the team," he told the News-Leader. "I want to work as hard as I can to make the team successful."

As football season kicks off nationwide, Harbor's relatives and his former high school football coach say they're not surprised by his successes.

"He has the size, strength, and athleticism to play at the next level," said Cory Harbor, Clay's older brother who also played four years at MSU. "He puts in an extra

amount of hard work and dedication."

A typical year at MSU draws one or two NFL scouts, said Cory, who graduated and is now pursuing a master's degree in sports management.

"It's really rare to have that many scouts," Cory said. "But it's widely known that Clay is an NFL prospect. We anticipate he'll go sixth or seventh round. Worst case scenario - he'll at least get a tryout."

In a long list of accomplishments since playing college ball, Clay Harbor was named to the Associated Press All-America teams in both 2007 and 2008, as well as all-conference and Missouri State offensive player of the year both years.

Last year, Harbor finished with 40 receptions for 457 yards and two touchdowns, despite an early season ankle sprain, according to the News-Leader.

In 2007, he finished with 45 catches for 647 yards and three touchdowns.

Gardner The South Wilmington High School District #73 Board of Education held a regular meeting Wednesday, August 19



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

FINANCIAL FOCUS Are Socially Responsible Funds **Right for You?**

Over the past several years, you might have heard about socially responsible investing, sometimes known as "sustainable investing" or "ethical investing." Probably the most common way to take part in this type of investing is through socially responsible mutual funds - but are these funds suitable for your overall financial goals?

Before you can answer that question, you need to become somewhat familiar with how these types of mutual funds operate. Basically, the managers of socially conscious funds seek to own companies that, in various ways, may promote such things as human rights and environmental and consumer protection. These managers also typically "screen out" those companies involved with the military, tobacco, alcohol and other industries involved with products or services that may be controversial.

So you may ask yourself, after these qualifications are imposed and screens are applied, can socially responsible mutual funds still find the right investments to earn a reasonable rate of return? And the answer is yes - the performance of many of these funds has been comparable to that of non-screened funds.

Furthermore, the performance of socially responsible funds can be tracked and measured against other funds with similar objectives. Socially responsible funds even have their own index - the Domini Social 400 Index. While this index is not managed, and you can't invest directly in it, you will find it a useful tool should you decide to invest in socially responsible funds.

Yet, despite these factors, there is at least one potential drawback to investing in socially responsible mutual funds: lack of diversification. The problem isn't so much that an individual socially responsible fund may not be properly diversified, although that could happen, given the necessity to screen out entire industries. The bigger issue is that the universe of socially responsible funds is much smaller than that of other funds, and socially responsible funds, by definition, resemble each other to a certain extent. Consequently, you may have a hard time achieving a diversified portfolio of socially responsible funds across different asset classes - small, mid-size and large companies, "value" stocks, international stocks, etc. - that is so important when investing.

Of course, diversification, by itself, cannot guarantee a profit or protect against a loss. However, the more asset classes you can diversify into, the better opportunity you have to help reduce the effects of volatility on your portfolio. This helps explain why socially responsible portfolios tend to have more volatile returns and are more susceptible to sharp downturns during bear markets than non-socially responsible mutual funds.

Before you invest in a socially conscious fund, or any mutual fund, for that matter, be sure to read the prospectus carefully, because it describes the fund's investment objective, risks, charges and expenses. In the investment world, knowledge is power.

Ultimately, in evaluating socially responsible funds, you will have to decide just how much your sense of social responsibility will affect your investment choices. So take your time, evaluate all the factors involved, consider the alternatives- and make the decisions that are right for you.

When you're out driving around, do you notice how many senior citizens are behind the wheel? Do you think it's cool that they can still get around at their age, or do you think they have no business being behind the wheel? Whatever your viewpoint, keep in mind that people age differently. While some people are perfectly capable of driving well into their 80s, others experience difficulty when they hit their 60s and have to stop driving.

With driving, it's not so much a case of age but ability. There are several factors that can impair a senior's ability to drive, including poor vision and hearing. As the body ages. the eyes lose the ability to process light, resulting in more sensitivity to light during the day, a decrease in night vision, a change in depth perception and difficulty judging the speed of oncoming traffic. Seniors may not be able to see or read road signs and markings. Hearing also declines

with age. Seniors may not be able to hear sirens or horns honking as well as they once did.

The onset of conditions like diabetes, heart disease, rheumatoid arthritis and sleep apnea can cause a loss in range of motion, which can slow response time. Brain impairment or dementia can also cause delayed reactions to confusing or sudden situations that may occur while driving. The side effects of medications can impair a senior's ability to drive, as can lack of rest. Sleeping gets harder with age and this can lead to fatigue and a tendency to doze anywhere during the day, even in the car while driving.

If you know a senior whose driving ability is questionable, don't be rash and take action right away. Monitor their driving skills and find out first if they really need to stop driving or just need a refresher course. Signs that their ability to drive might be too impaired include:

• Driving on the wrong side of the road or on the shoulder

Making abrupt lane changes or drifting into other lanes
Accelerating or braking

abruptly • Reacting slowly to

changes on the roadForgetting to use the turn

signal or leaving it onMissing exits or backing



up to exits after missing them • Having difficulty navigating directions or reading signs

• Having difficulty looking over their shoulder or moving their hands or feet

• Having difficulty moving their foot from one pedal to another or getting the two pedals confused

• Frustrating other drivers and directing frustration toward other drivers

• Experiencing an increasing number of close calls (almost crashing) or scrapes or dents in the car

• Feeling nervous while driving and being tired after driving

• Receiving several tickets or warnings from the police

When approaching a senior about giving up driving, expect some resistance. Most will not do so willingly in fear of losing their independence. Keep your emotions in check

Inform them of other transportation options and let them know you will be available to take them places on a regular basis. Get someone to confirm your opinion and emphasize the money they will save by not having a car.

If the senior continues to drive after you have suggested they don't, you may have to take more drastic measures like hiding their keys or disabling their car or removing it from their property.

You may also have to get a prescription from their doctor saying they are not to drive and have a police officer explain what will happen if they get caught driving.

To make the transition from driver to passenger only easier for the senior, set up a schedule of the places they need to go and make sure they get there. Drive them yourself, find someone else to drive them or help them find an alternate means of transportation, like the bus. Keep their routine running smoothly and use home delivery services when possible to alleviate some of the burden on you.

If you know a senior who needs to give up driving, put yourself in their shoes and imagine what it must be like for them. That should make it easier for you to help them. Just remember, one day it could happen to you.





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Three Impact Dwight Projects Moving Forward

Leaders stepped forward to begin plans for three Impact Dwight projects at a recent organizational meeting

About 25 Impact Dwight members met at the Dwight Village Hall on Wednesday, August 19, to regroup after a hugely successful town gathering earlier in the month that drew more than 200 people.

Plans are underway to begin three projects: the Pinecone Path walking trail extension, the Dogtown public art project and an E-recycling event to recycle electronics.

Members are divided into five groups: business development, tourism, beautification, parks and recreation and infrastructure.

Ideas discussed by the business development group included a "shop locally" campaign, business brochures at tourist stops and points earned for money spent in Dwight.

The tourism group discussed proposals that included a train tour, a point of interest kiosk at the old Texaco station, a dog sculpture public art project, restrooms at the train station and playing up the town's windmill and basset ties.


The beautification group talked about ideas that included a walking clean sweep of the town, naming house of the month, a mass planting of the town flower, painting run-down public

Parks and recreation members discussed extending Pinecone Path, a dog park, fixing the Renfrew Park sidewalk and adding flowers to the parks.

Ideas infrastructure members will tackle include WiFi access in public places, flood control, fixing bad sidewalks and develop-

"I want people to worry less about money and more about the idea, and the money will come," Connor said.

Other discussions at the meeting centered on finalizing the group's not-for-profit status and taking advantage of a national service program.

also plans to capitalize on a national service through ac AmeriCorps that provides a Dwight full-time volunteer to man-

age Impact Dwight's projects. The VISTA - Volunteer In Service To America – will work out of the Planning Associates building in downtown Dwight and will

serve as a liaison between different village entities and managing the website. The VISTA will be paid a

\$12,000-a-year stipend by the state and work a minimum of 40 hours a week. Money to pay for an annual \$800-a-year fee has already been donated, in addition to office space at Planning Associates and phone and computer access. A computer is still needed.

The person in that position would likely be a retiree or someone looking to build a resume.

"It's kind of like a Peace Impact Dwight member Corps position," Impact

Dwight member Jane Anderson said. "They're giving back to their country."

An open discussion at the meeting included how some of the projects that overlap with services typically provided by village employees will shake out.

In some instances, such as repainting areas in need of a new coat of paint on public property, the group may photograph the offensive area and present it to the village board for them to handle.

Upcoming opportunities to volunteer include a downtown cleanup organized by Main Street at 8 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. Saturday, August 29.

Next month, Impact Dwight members have organized an E-recycling for free program on Saturday, September 26, next to the downtown Farmer's Market. Recycle old computer equipment, electronics, TVs and stereos rather than sending them to a landfill. People will be on hand to unload items from vehicles.

The Impact Dwight board meets at 6 p.m. the first Wednesday of every month in the Village Hall board room. The public is invited to attend.

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





The BOE was mainly concerned with the use of the Panther bus, gas money, payment to officials, fund-raising and school uniforms being used for summer leagues. The Athletic Committee feels that a majority of the issues can be resolved with a wellestablished athletic boosters club. A list of possible fundraisers was suggested.

Dr. Decman discussed the idea of eliminating the July BOE meeting. The BOE would pre-approve all the

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July bills, and the district (except the custodians) would close down over the month of July. He thought it was a very interesting topic and asked the BOE to think about it for next year.

Action taken by the board included approval of the following:

The tentative fiscal year 2010 budget; the decentralization of a social worker from the Grundy County Special Ed Co-op; application for Recognition of Public Schools; the transfer of \$71,000 from the Educational Fund to the

Transportation Fund; the abatement of \$29,434 from the Working Cash Fund to the Transportation Fund; the resignation of Guidance Secretary Christine Anderson; the employment of Assistant Volleyball Coach Marla Eltrevoog; the employment of school Secretary Tiffany Berger; cancellation of the second board of education meeting of the month of August.
