A group of cyclists riding

from St. Louis to Chicago stopped in Dwight on Tuesday, September 1, to publicize and promote development of Illinois' Route 66 Trail bicycle route. About 30 riders commit-

ted to spending six days biking the 375-mile route, said Ed Barsotti, executive director of the League of Illinois Bicyclists. In conjunction with the ride, an event was held at the historic Ambler/Becker Texaco station in Dwight, where cyclists met with village officials and the public.

Barsotti said there is currently an "interim route guide" of the Route 66 Trail which includes many diversions onto country roads to ensure rider safety. He said the long-term goal is to develop more off-road trails along Route 66, and "where roads should be more bike- Dwight, the cyclists also friendly, make improvements" to the roads.

The St. Louis to Chicago ride included 25 events to encourage towns along Route 66 to "get onboard with this effort," Barsotti said. Dwight is already onboard, as Village Administrator Kevin McNamara is a member of the Route 66 Trail Committee, which is led by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. At the Dwight event, Barsotti presented McNamara with a T-shirt in recognition of his efforts as part of the committee.

National Park Service gave a short speech about the Route 66 Trail, stating, "This is of national significance." With the ride raising awareness of the trail and gaining cooperation from towns like Dwight, Banta said, "It's a great day for Illinois."

The event also included a drawing for two helmets and a bicycle. Destiny Connor and Tyler Drechsel were the winners of the helmets. Marla Gursh of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, a cyclist on the ride, won the bicycle. Gursh decided to donate the bike back to Dwight to be given to a local child. The bicycle will be given away through Dwight Grade School.

Following the event at the Ambler/Becker station. cyclists were invited to a dinner provided by The Country Mansion and spent the night at Super 8 Motel.

Prior to their arrival in stopped at the historic Standard Oil station in Odell, where they met with village officials and received refreshments.

"Viewed today from a bicycle rolling down the mostly rural, two-lane pavement, Route 66 takes on a different perspective – a slow savoring of nostalgia," Barsotti said. "What was once known as the Mother Road has become the Grandmother Road, with loads of stories to share with all those who travel it."

Dwight residents may be preparing for the 30th consecutive year of the Harvest Days festival, but there are several firsts lined up for this year's events.

New happenings include pre-selling tickets Thursday's carnival wristband night, the return of the car show and the first annual

## **Pipeline Construction Underway from** Ransom to Manhattan

by Meta Machulis Land has been cleared and construction is underway for a petroleum pipeline from Ransom to Manhattan.

The 46-mile pipeline is part of Enbridge's Southern Lights Project, a \$2.2 billion expansion that will ultimately bring light petroleum called diluent to Edmonton, Alberta in Canada, according to Dave Henderson, community relations consultant for the project.

Although construction of the 20" diameter pipeline began recently, Henderson said, "We got on the ground and began this in probably late 2007. It takes years to do one of these projects, but it

only takes months to build the pipeline." He explained that time-consuming preliminary work includes planning, making easement agreements, and getting various permits from federal, state and local authorities, including road crossing permits for every road the pipeline runs under. "We would expect most of the pipeline construction would be completed around the end of this year," he said, noting that the line is scheduled to begin operating in mid-2010. The diluent line has the capacity to transport 180,000 barrels of petroleum



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


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## Fr. Cedric Pisegna to Present 'Come Encounter Jesus'

I can wash their laundry, and even show them how to do their own. I can help with math homework to a point, but once they hit high school, they'll have to call on Dad, or better yet, the teacher. I can show them how to write a solid essay, I suppose.

I'm good at paying for stuff, and I do have years of cooking experience to feed them. I'll try not to pry, but remain informed. I'll try to dress like a mom should: one part tasteful, one part classy, two parts invisible. I'll try not to draw attention to myself or to them, except for this column. Sorry, friends. You have made my life so rich and interesting; you're bound to show up in a line or two. You can bet your boots I'll watch with interest when all of my children fall in love, and I'll be there to pick up the pieces when their hearts get broken.

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## FINANCIAL FOC Keep Your Money Working Hard for You

We honor the contributions of working men and women in other words, people just like you. Of course, it doesn't have to be Labor Day for you to be aware that you work hard for your money — and you'd like to know that your money is working just as hard for you.

How can you keep your money employed? Consider these suggestions:

• Keep your money working for the future. The financial markets have been through some difficult times over the past two years. · Make it easier for your money to work harder. By making these moves, you can help your money work harder for you. For starters, defer enough of your salary into your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan to earn the employer's match, if one is offered. Here's another step to consider: Reinvest any dividends you may receive from your investments back into those investments. You probably won't miss the money because you never actually had it in your pocket, and by automatically reinvesting dividends, you'll increase the number of shares you own.

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

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

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

In 1897, the water tower was given to the village by the Keeley Institute as a monument to be cared for and kept for generations to come. At a later date, when the tank was removed, they decided to preserve the base instead of tearing it

Little did those three gentlemen, the village officials, or the residents of Dwight of that time, know that just 112 vears later, on August 24. 2009, the village board would vote five to one to spend \$62,400 to demolish

Does the village need to spend more than \$60,000, at a time when they are trying to find money to do street and sewer projects that they say need to be done? Put this \$60,000 with the \$100,000 that they spent last year to purchase Mazon Grain on Columbia Street -\$160,000. How many feet of sewer would that have paid

The water tower is a piece of Dwight history that has been standing there for

Just a few years ago, the village board wanted to demolish the windmill, until someone decided to stand up and stop it from happening.

Who knows what may be next!

I hope that I am not the only one in town that cares about the future of this water tower. If you care, let someone know. Call the village hall, the mayor, your board members and the historical society, and express your opinion.

Let's look at some other options.



Construction for the line began west of Ransom and is moving toward Manhattan, but Henderson said the diluent petroleum in the lines will run in the opposite direction.

"The initiating pumping station for the Southern Lights project is located in the new terminal that is being constructed Manhattan," he explained.

The Manhattan terminal will have two 250,000-barrel receiving tanks, he said, noting that there are 42 gallons to a barrel. The tanks will receive diluent from three existing pipelines carrying petroleum from suppliers TEPPCO, ChiCap and BP. After going through the Manhattan station, the diluent will move through the line toward Ransom; continue through a line that runs to Superior, Wisconsin; and eventually reach the oil sands of Alberta. There, the diluent will be mixed with crude oil, thinning the crude oil so that it can be transported by pipeline to Chicago refineries and beyond, Henderson said.

"Those refineries supply the majority of fuel used. . . in this area by businesses

and consumers," he said. According to Enbridge Expansion website, "Enbridge's Southern Lights Project is designed to bridge the gap between the available supply of ... diluents from U.S. refineries and supply centers and increased demand for diluent by petroleum producers in the oil sands and heavy crude oil production regions in Western Canada." The project will "Enable recycling of diluent between refinery and production centers" and 'lessen reliability on overseas sources."

As Henderson put it, This will help provide a more secure, reliable and economical supply of crude oil to this area to serve businesses and communities in the area." He said shipping by pipeline is also "the safest mode for shipping large amounts of petroleum" versus using ships or tanker

"This is unusual, for us to have a pipeline that originates in the Chicago area goes to Canada,"

Henderson said, explaining that it usually works the other way around. He said the majority of crude oil in the Chicago area is transported to Chicago from Canada through Enbridge system.

"The United States has enjoyed a very good trade relationship with Canada for many years," Henderson said. Canada is the #1 importer of crude oil to the U.S. and is not a member of OPEC, he said.

Once the Manhattan to Ransom pipeline is operational, the line "will employ hundreds of workers, a large percentage of which will be employed out of local union halls," Henderson said.

At present, though, construction of the line may not seem especially beneficial to the local economy.

"The vast majority of the land that we're going through is prime agricultural land," he said. Because portions of fields have been cleared to facilitate pipeline construction, Henderson said Enbridge uses "a multiplicity of techniques" to handle and restore land to ensure quick restoration of productivity. He explained that Enbridge has an Agricultural Impact Mitigation Agreement with the Illinois Department of Agriculture, and the company also follows Best Environmental Management Practices. For example, Henderson said, topsoil and subsoil are placed in separate piles along the route so that the subsoil can be replaced before the topsoil following completion of the pipeline.

"It should result in farmers being able to enjoy the same crop productivity over the pipeline as in other parts of their field," he said. "There are a lot of steps that are taken to ensure that the land is properly restored."

Henderson also said, "It's important to understand that we are not an oil company. We are a common carrier pipeline company." He said Enbridge is paid a tariff for transporting the petroleum through the lines, but that the product itself belongs to the oil companies. The shipping process is regulated by Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

According to the compa-


ny's website, "Enbridge operates, in Canada and the United States, the world's longest crude oil and liquid petroleum pipeline system."


