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## Another Successful Year for Dwight Harvest Days

The carnival, vendors, bassets, entertainers, games and hot dog-eaters have come and gone for another year, as Dwight Harvest Days was held September 17 through 20.

Despite rain showers during Sunday's parade and a record attendance by little green aphids, the festival was a success.

I think it was another great Harvest Days celebration, minus Mother Nature

opening up on us on Sunday, said Harvest Days Chairman Jerry Beier.

After the carnival opened Thursday, entertainment kicked off Friday evening with a high-flying performance by the Jesse White Tumblers. Crowds lined East Main Street to see the tumbling team perform acrobatic stunts.

That was amazing, Beier commented.

The craft show and flea market returned to the downtown area Saturday, and New Life Assembly of God once again hosted children's games and prizes in Harmony Park.

They had more kids than ever I think, and they ran out of prizes, Beier said. That whole setting out there was one of the best things at Harvest Days, I thought. He said the children's games served a big purpose as they allowed children whose parents may not be able to afford carnival rides to participate in free activities such as running an obstacle course and jumping in a bounce house. Church also provided puppets at the event.

The downtown stage Saturday was the scene of the first annual Junior Karaoke Championship, which replaced the Lip Sync Contest. Ten contestants ranging in age from seven to 16 sang for cash prizes.

I thought they were great, said Beier, who pro-

vided the karaoke tunes for the event. Longtime Harvest Days host Jim Enger announced the contest.

First-place winner Alex Smith won \$250, Amanda Brickey won \$150 for second place, and Lauren Black took \$100 for third.

Following junior karaoke, the second annual Hot Dog Eating Contest packed the

bleachers with fans and the stage with hungry contestants.

The Hot Dog Eating Contest was a huge hit, Beier said.

The first phase of a half a million dollar project to put a new roof on Dwight Township High School is expected to wrap up this week.

The high school board of education approved the project this spring and expected work to construct a green metal pitched roof over portions of the second floor to be completed before students returned Aug. 24.

Instead, work is running more than a month behind schedule and the project has run into some snags along the way including numerous roof leaks into the second floor of the school.

Workers for Kankakee-based Langlois Roofing spent the last week fastening up side areas of the pitched roof and finishing the ridge vent along the seam at the peak.

Superintendent Dale Adams said he believes delays might have been caused by materials that didn't come in on time and

changes to the original plans, particularly how the skylights in the library were flashed in.

Beyond that I hope they're just taking their time and doing a quality job, Adams said.

The project has had some bumps along the way.

Rainwater that would normally run off the flat roof puddled as workers screwed the steel beams that would serve as the base of the project down into flat roof. Instead of the water running down the flat roof's peaks and valleys, the beams created little dams, backing water up into big standing puddles.

As a result, any place where workers attempted to screw the beams into the ceiling but missed their mark created leaks into the ceilings.

The leaks damaged ceiling tiles in almost every room and hallway on the second floor, Adams said.

It's kind of ironic, Adams said. We're replacing a flat roof with a pitched roof and at this stage we haven't had a lot of leaks. As

soon as we start putting on the new roof, we have a bunch of leaks. But it'll be fine once they get it all tightened up.

Tiles were promptly removed and the ceilings allowed to air out to prevent mold.

Adams also said he was under the impression that a couple of crews of workers would be there working on the project, although school officials said they've never seen more than five or so people working on the project at once.

Beyond that, workers

also hit a junction box and shorted out electricity to an upstairs hallway near the auditorium balcony.

Any damages will be fixed by the company at their cost, Adams said.

Anything that they've done, they've been pretty good about repairing, he said.

Both School Board President Irv Masching and Adams said they would rather have a quality product that takes longer than a rushed project hastily done to meet a deadline. (continued on page 3)

## Strong DTSHS Budget Allows Projects to Continue

The Dwight Township High School Board of Education approved its 2009-10 budget following a public hearing on September 21.

While the proposed budget reflects an estimated \$424,000 deficit for the year, DTSHS District #230 is projected to end the year with positive balances across most funds and boasts an anticipated Education Fund balance of \$2,866,409.75 and an overall end balance of \$4,621,144.66. The only fund not reflecting a positive end balance is the Tort Immunity Fund.

Superintendent Dale Adams pointed out that the budget shortfalls are planned deficits and acknowledged a solid financial picture for the district.

We did not cut into any

programs, Adams told the board. We are in good shape.

Leading to the expected budget deficit are continued planned improvement projects. As phase one of the three-year roof replacement project nears completion, phase two of the project is being carefully mapped out.

On hand at the meeting were representatives from BLDD Architects out of Bloomington which has been handling the project planning and design. In phase two, the board is considering a 1,640 foot expansion to the existing cafeteria at an estimated cost of \$1,158,387. A second option to this expansion would also extend the band room area. Option two — a combined expansion of both areas for a total of an additional 2,660 feet of space — is projected at \$1,472,322. Projected costs for both options include

\$460,200 for completion of roof replacement over the remaining west portion of the building with \$66,000 designated to recoat the gym's roof. Timelines for the project include seeking bids in February with work beginning in April and completing in August 2010.

We have money coming in to pay for these projects, Adams told the board. We just need to be creative with our cash flow.

A recommendation by Adams is to make a loan from, or possibly cash out, the district's Working Cash Fund to help pay for next year's project.

We act as a bank for ourselves in order to get the projects done, suggested Adams.

But help to replenish the funds is on the way as wind farm revenues begin to be realized.

Thirteen Iberdrola wind

turbines in the DTSHS district are expected to be on line at the end of December and an additional 51 will come online in December, 2010 for a total of 64 turbines in the Iberdrola project. These 64 turbines will have \$16 million of assessed value and will create in excess of \$200,000 of revenue per year beginning with the 2011-12 school year through the 2014-15 school year. This will create a total of \$941,000 over the five-year Enterprise Zone period. Revenues during this period can be directed to funds designated by the district. As the Enterprise Zone period ends, revenues from property tax values are realized.

Another 54 Horizon wind turbines falling in the DTSHS district will add \$9.8 million of assessed value. Two more wind farm projects are currently in the planning stage (continued on page 20)



The only thing disparaging is the timeline. I thought we had arrangements to have it done sooner, Adams said.

That said, I would rather they be late and have a quality project when they're finished and that tends to be what's happening.

The district hasn't paid the bill for the roof in full yet and won't until repairs are made to any damages that occurred and until they get final architect approval, Masching said.

It's taken longer than we expected and hopefully it's done in a workman-like manner, Masching said. It will be inspected by our architects to make sure everything is done correctly.

Despite all that's going on overhead, students and teachers haven't been too distracted, Adams said.

Much of the pounding overhead took place before school started, he said, but students and teachers have endured watching and listening to the workers go up and down the lifts right outside the classroom windows.

Teachers and students have been outstanding throughout this process, Adams said.

Talks about the next phase of the project will begin in the following weeks. The second phase will include putting a pitched roof over the auditorium, cafeteria and band room area, with a possible addition to the cafeteria and band room.

Phase three will be roofing the south end of the two-story building above the shop, biology, home ec and Spanish and chemistry rooms.

Long-term it ultimately should save the district and taxpayers' money, Masching said. We won't have the problems of having leaks here and there over the course of the life of a flat roof. There's more money up front, but hopefully over the long term it's going to be saving the district money.







## Dwight Mini Storage Wins Harvest Classic



Morris Hospital Funds Verona-Kinsman Lifesaving Projects

The Morris Hospital Foundation is enhancing lifesaving capabilities in the Kinsman and Verona communities by providing the Village of Kinsman and the Verona-Kinsman Fire District funding for lifesaving projects.

The Village of Kinsman received \$1,500 toward the purchase of an automated external defibrillator (AED) and first aid kit for the Kinsman Community Building. AEDs can be used by lay persons to deliver a shock to restore the heart s normal pumping rhythm in the event of sudden cardiac arrest, which strikes approximately 340,000 people in the United States each year. According to the American Heart Association, studies have repeatedly shown that immediate bystander CPR plus defibrillation within 3-5 minutes of collapse can improve survival from sudden cardiac arrest.

This is the first time the Village of Kinsman has had a community building, said Melissa Dunning, Kinsman village clerk and EMS coordinator for the Verona-Kinsman Fire Protection District. The AED and first aid kit will allow bystanders to assist before first responders and EMTs arrive on the

scene.

In a separate gift, the Morris Hospital Foundation presented the Verona-Kinsman Fire Protection District \$2,000 toward training and equipment for its first responder program. The first responders respond to all emergency calls and often are the first to arrive at the scene. Having the proper training and equipment enables first responders to begin providing lifesaving measures before emergency medical services personnel arrive.

We want to provide the members of our communities with the utmost care possible, said Dunning. The funding from the Morris Hospital Foundation will assist in providing this.

The gifts to the Village of Kinsman and Verona-Kinsman Fire Department are a result of the Morris Hospital Foundation s 2007 annual appeal, which focused on raising funds for critical lifesaving equipment for emergency medical services, rescue squads and other organizations throughout the community. A total of \$14,000 is being awarded to six community organizations this year through the Morris Hospital Foundation s lifesaving fund.

**In other business, the board:**

¥ accepted a retirement notice from Social Sciences Teacher John Wille effective with the close of the 2012-13 school year.

¥ approved an FFA request to attend the FFA National Conference in Indianapolis on October 21 through 24.

¥ set the 2009-10 mileage reimbursement at 55 cents per mile.

¥ approved liability insurance renewal through Indiana Insurance for the 2009-10 school year at a cost of \$34,043 with several coverages being increased.

¥ approved roof replace-

ment project pay request #2 of \$325,275.65.

¥ learned that salary compensation reports for every employee holding an administrative certificate and working in that capacity will be available on the district s website beginning October 1.

¥ approved all co-curricular and coaching recommendations for the 2009-10 school year.

¥ increased pest control services at the school from two to four times per year.

The next regular DTHS Board of Education meeting will be Monday, October 19, at 7 p.m. in the school s board room. Board sessions are open to the public.

GSWHS Board Questions  
Future of Agricultural Program

The Gardner South Wilmington High School District #73 Board of Education held a regular meeting Wednesday, September 16.

Chris Irvin and Dr. Decman went over the board policies prior to the last BOE meeting. There are just a few grammatical corrections. The BOE received a summary of these BOE policies and was asked to approve them at the September 16 meeting.

Dr. Decman reviewed the actual enrollments K-12 received from Gardner, Braceville and South Wilmington grade schools. The GSWHS enrollment is going to decrease over the next five to six years, followed by an increase. There is a very high transition rate among GSWHS students, and thus, this projection could be greatly affected by people moving in and out of the area.

GSWHS is now at a crossroads with its agricultural program. If the program is to continue, Dr. Decman believes the board must do at least two things: hire a full-time ag teacher and build some type of garage to house the program. There are currently about 20 students taking ag classes, and if the board chooses not to continue the program, these students may attend Dwight Township High School for these courses. The consensus of the BOE is to continue with the Intro to Ag class but look to see if GSWHS students can attend DTHS for further ag classes.

Due to the change in by-laws of the cooperative agreement with Grundy County Special Education and the result of some districts that voted no to these changes, the executive board felt it was important to note

in a resolution approved by all the boards of education in the co-op the intent of these changes. Specifically, the intent of the changes in the co-operative agreement is not meant to stop smaller districts from sharing resources. However, to do this, the smaller districts must petition the BOE for approval. Dr. Decman reviewed a draft of the actual resolution that each district is being asked to approve by the executive board of the GCSEC.

The BOE discussed many of the issues of summer athletics at the last meeting. It was decided to table many of these items until the September meeting. The BOE agreed that it wants guidelines enforced, a formalized budget, accountability and a detailed agenda from all the summer programs.

Dr. Decman reviewed the legal firm s letters discussing the issues related to the mineral rights on the recently purchased property.

Action taken by the board included: approval of the fiscal year 2010 budget; approval of board policy changes; approval of the posting of the 2008-2009 administrative salaries; and cancellation of the second board of education meeting of the month of September.

Superintendent information items included board and administrator notes, audit letters and a school profile. In legislative updates, Dr. Decman shared with the BOE that per state law, GSW has posted on its website all administrative contracts, the teachers contracts and salaries for all employees. 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
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
