Sale Pending for Dwight's Dempsey Dodge Chrysler Jeep

The sale of the Dempsey Dodge Chrysler Jeep dealership on west Route 17 in Dwight is expected to be announced within a few weeks, according to owner Tom Dempsey.

Dempsey told *The Paper* in a phone conversation last week that he preferred not to publish the name of the prospective buyer, but negotiations have reached the point where he expects the necessary legal papers to be signed "in two to three weeks."

The business will remain a Dodge Chrysler Jeep franchise.

Earlier this year,

Chrysler LLC announced in a restructuring plan that it would eliminate 789 of its 3,200 dealerships nationwide. Dempsey Dodge Chrysler Jeep, which opened its doors in Dwight more than 25 years ago, was selected to remain open for business.

Tom Dempsey also owns another five-star Dodge Chrysler Jeep store at 1000 East Highway 34 in Plano.

Dempsey said that the times indicated he should concentrate his efforts on his Plano dealership, and that selling the Dwight store was in the best interests of the local dealership and the Dwight community.

Dwight Rent Subsidy Program Request Raises Questions

*Several New Stop Sign

The first request received by the Village of Dwight from a prospective business owner wanting to take advantage of the Village's new Rent Subsidy Program raised questions among Dwight's mayor and board regarding parameters of the program.

The Rent Subsidy Program, approved by the board in August, allows a new business owner a subsidized rent option for a limited time. Through the program, the tenant would receive a significant reduction in the rent of a business building for one year, with the majority subsidized by the village and a portion subsidized by the landlord. The tenant would reimburse the village a portion of their gross receipts for the first year. Each quarter, as the business becomes more established, the subsidy amount decreases as well as the tenant's reimbursement percentage. Subsidies are in the amount of up to \$800.

Landlords maintain the right to not participate in the program and the Village would have the right to refuse an applicant.

However, the rent subsidy request under consideration by the board at its September 28 session was for a prospective business outside of the downtown district raising questions as to the intent of the program. Wording of the ordinance indicates the program is for downtown businesses and the understanding of some was the program was intended to revitalize the downtown area. Others understood the program to be village-wide.

Mayor Bill Wilkey, who had initial reservations regarding the Rent Subsidy Program and the village's financial obligation, expressed concerns again at the meeting.

"I am not for spending this kind of money," stated Wilkey.

"I think [the program] should be given a chance to work," countered Trustee Jerry Curtis.

Saunemin United Methodist Church To Celebrate 150 Years of Ministry

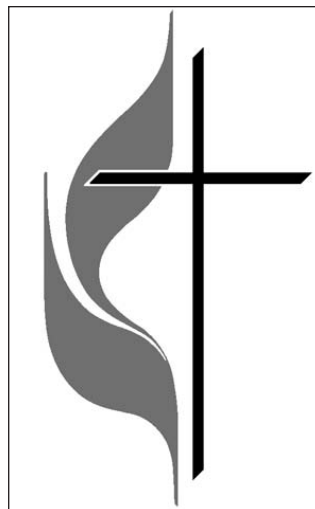
The Saunemin United Methodist Church will celebrate 150 years of ministry on October 11 with special services and events planned.

A schedule for the day includes: 10 a.m., fellowship time; 10:45 a.m., traditional morning worship featuring Vermillion River District Superintendent Dr. J. Keith Zimmerman as special speaker; 12:30 p.m., dinner at the Community Building; 2:30 p.m., service of celebration and remembrance featuring words from former pastors and special music; 3:30 p.m., closing reception.

Saunemin UMC member Cheryl O'Donnell shared a synopsis of the church's history with *The Paper*.

Methodism in Saunemin began in 1859 when a Methodist Class with 10 charter members was organized in a log schoolhouse near the Five Mile Grove Cemetery, one mile west and two and a half miles south of the present town of Saunemin.

Over the years, the church has undergone several reorganizations and name and location changes. The Saunemin congregation built and dedicated its first church building in 1872 at Saunemin Center, about 1/2



mile west of the present town of Saunemin. The church was called Bethel Methodist Episcopal Church, with a membership of 80. The cost to build the church was \$3,000. The first parsonage was built across the street from the church in 1874.

When the Wabash Railroad was built across Livingston County in 1879, it became necessary for all the buildings at Saunemin Center to be moved to the new town of Saunemin, which was located alongside the new tracks. The Bethel church and parsonage were moved in 1880 or 1881. The church was relocated to what is now 54 Center Street, and the parsonage occupied the southeast corner of Center and Bramley streets. The cost for moving the building

was \$200.

The present parsonage was erected in 1903, and by 1925, the congregation had decided that a new church with expanded facilities was needed. The N. G. Bennett lot at North and Lafayette streets was chosen and secured for the new church building. The basement was dug with donated labor using horse-drawn scoop scrapers. Workers competed to see who could remove the largest number of shovelful in a day.

The cornerstone for the present church building was laid on June 20, 1926. Placed within the cornerstone were conference and individual church records, a history of Methodism in the township, rosters of pastors, presiding elders, members and organizations, an 1860 Bible, a hymnbook brought across the Atlantic from Denmark and a copy of the last Saunemin Headlight.

On Sunday, May 15, 1927, three special dedication services were held in the new church. The total cost of the building project was \$31,500, with \$4,800 needed to clear the debt for the building. Member subscriptions brought in the necessary money.

Extensive repairs to the church building were com-

STAY FIRE SMART!

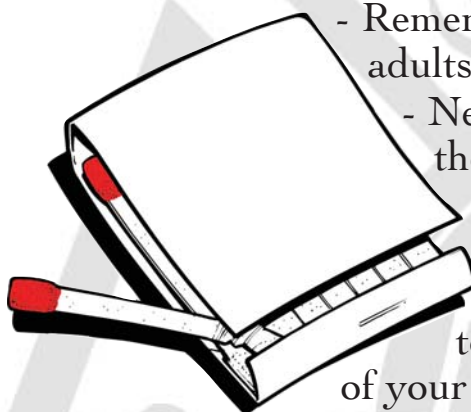
DON'T GET BURNED



- Keep hot foods and liquids away from tables and counter edges so they cannot be pulled or knocked over.
- Have a 3 ft. "kid-free" zone around the stove.
- Never hold a child in your arms while preparing hot food or drinking a hot beverage.
- Be careful when using things that get hot such as curling irons, oven, irons, lamps, heaters.
- When using heating pads only use for 15-20 minutes at a time and don't lie, sit or place anything on the pad.

JUST RIGHT?

- To avoid scalds, set the thermostat setting in your water heater to no higher than 120 degrees F.
- Remember young children's and older adults' skin burns more easily.
- Never leave young children alone in the tub, shower or near a sink.
- Be careful about scalding water. The water should feel warm, not hot. Before you put your child in the tub, test the temperature with your wrist, elbow, or the back of your hand. Don't rely on a tub with a temperature indicator, such as a drain plug that changes color to indicate too hot, too cold, and just right.



FIRE-SAFETY BASICS

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. For the best protection, interconnect all smoke alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- For best protection use both photoelectric and ionization technology. You can use individual ionization and photoelectric smoke alarms or combination units that contain both technologies in the same unit.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month using the test button.
- Replace smoke alarms every 10 years.
- Make sure everyone can hear the sound of the smoke alarms.
- Have a home fire escape plan. Know at least two ways out of every room, if possible, and a meeting place outside. Practice your escape plan twice a year.

More Discussion Around DTHS Expansion

Reviewing expansion project options that are expected to be implemented along with next summer's phase of the Dwight Township High School's roof replacement project was the topic of discussion at a special session of the school's Board of Education on September 30.

As this summer's phase one of the three-year project draws to a close, the board is considering moving the phase three expansion of the cafeteria into year two which is being planned for next summer. This construction timeline change works better with the roof replacement plan.

Along with expanding the cafeteria to provide seating for 325 students, the board is also looking at adding another

serving line. An alternate proposal to add a classroom at the south end of the existing band room is also on the table. The back entrance would be extended and include air lock doors. Superintendent Dale Adams suggested the board look at alternatives that would keep the phase two price tag around \$1,000,000 and push the remainder of the work and cost — estimated at approximately \$800,000 — into year three. Cost estimates for each phase include completion of the roof project.

Handling the project planning is BLDD Architects of Bloomington. Representatives were on hand and provided several different options to the Board. Pending finalization of details and approvals, construction is expected to begin in the spring.

Clearly Display Your Address to Aid Emergency Responders

Even if you rely on a post office box for mail delivery, it is important that your emergency 9-1-1 address be posted on your property and be visible from the road.

You can help emergency responders locate your house by properly displaying your address and following some very simple guidelines:

- Use large numbers and make sure the numbers face the correct street. Call your village hall to make sure your numbers meet your village's code.
- Put the numbers on your house under a light. Numbers on a mailbox or post should be reflective or on a highly contrasting background.
- Numbers on your mailbox should be posted on both sides. Emergency vehicles may not arrive from the same direction as your mail carrier or delivery.
- If your house is not visible from the street, post numbers so that they are clearly visible from the road, either on a pole, sign or post. If your house is across the street from a mailbox, post the number along your driveway.
- If the driveway leads to more than one address, post all numbers at the end of the driveway and also post the correct number on each building.
- Several times per year, trim the bushes, vines, flowers and weeds so all numbers are clearly visible. Move flower baskets, flags and other items that may obstruct a clear view.
- Two or more houses should not share a mailbox.

Properly displaying your numbers could save your life. If you need emergency services, fire, law enforcement and EMS will be able to find you faster. A visitor, child or an injured person may be unable to give clear directions. New emergency personnel may be unfamiliar with our area. Seconds count in an emergency!

Board member Jared Anderson wants the board to be clear on the program parameters before moving forward indicating that this first rent subsidy request decision could establish future standards.

Approval of the request is pending as the issue was sent to the Administration Committee for further review and clarification.

In other business, traffic control recommendations made by Dwight's Ordinance Committee resulted in the board's approval for several new stop sign locations. Stop signs will be placed at the following corners: Delaware at Franklin Street; St. Louis at Philmar Street; St. Louis at William Street; James at St. Louis Street; Chicago at Susan Drive; Chicago at James Street; Prospect at Chicago; Linden at Chicago; Wilmac at Chicago; Prairie at South Street; Delaware at Lincoln Street; and yield signs will be replaced with stop signs on Washington at Taylor Street.

The board accepted the low bid of \$29,120 from Lovell Excavating, Inc. of Dwight for repair of expansion joints on Waupansie Street. Three bids were received for the repair proj-

ect. The village engineer's estimate for the project was \$26,000.

A Utilities Committee recommendation to instruct Burke Engineering to draft water main plans for all proposed water main replacement projects was approved. The committee's report shows estimated costs for the entire project at \$2,108,316. Prioritizing the list to the top five projects brought the estimate to \$1,604,793. The village is reviewing options and will determine its plan for moving forward at a later date.

A Dwight apartment building owner addressed the board regarding actions by the village in September to impose a sewer replacement fee of \$7.25 per month on all residential units in the Village. The fee previously was imposed per water meter; however, this left residents of multi-unit buildings not properly assessed. According to a Utilities Committee report, imposing the fee on all residential units will add approximately 310 units and an additional \$26,970 to the sewer fund. The owner of the multi-unit property on North Union Street argued that the change was unfair since vacant units are being assessed a fee.

Mayor Wilkey indicated that the intent of the sewer

replacement fee change was to be fair across the board and ensure fees are properly assessed.

"We are trying to use a figure that will be fair for everybody," said Wilkey.

The board took the concern into advisement but no action was taken.

The board also:

- turned down a request for solicitation from M&M Distribution.

- heard a report from Dawn Sutton on her intent to move forward with establishing a teen center in Dwight.

- instructed Village Attorney Gary Neville to request information from SparkPlug regarding its possible intent to move the internet antenna located on the former Access Ag property which now belongs to the Village and inform SparkPlug of the 2015 contract expiration date.

The next Village Board meeting will be held Monday, October 12, at 6 p.m. in the Public Services Complex.

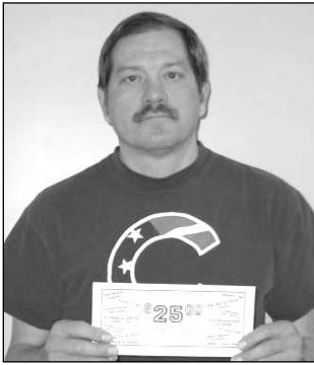

Put these Estate Planning Moves to Work

Like everyone else, you want to leave a legacy. To make it happen, though, you need to do some estate planning. For most of us, that sounds like a scary task, but it doesn't have to be – as long as you break it down into a few key moves. Here, in a nutshell, are some of the broad-based moves you'll want to consider:

- Communicate your wishes. When drawing up your estate plan, you can't leave anything to chance – so you need to communicate your wishes in writing. But if you develop your estate plan while your children are young – and you certainly should – you should name a guardian for them in case both you and your spouse were to die prematurely. Of course, you'll also need to consider having the right type and amount of life insurance for survivor income and loan repayments.
- Position your investments to benefit your heirs. You can arrange for some of your investments to provide significant benefits to your heirs. For example, you can stretch your IRA to extend the key benefit of IRAs – tax-deferred earnings – over a period of several years. You should also make sure you've updated beneficiary designations on various accounts, such as annuities and 401(k) plans, to make sure the assets go to the right people. These designations are very important, as they can supersede even the instructions in your will.
- Protect against incapacity. None of us can predict the shape of our physical and mental well-being in the years to come. But to protect your family, you'll certainly want to be prepared for everything. That's why you'll want to make the appropriate arrangements, such as establishing a power of attorney and health care directive, while you're still healthy. These types of documents will empower family members, or other people close to you, to take the necessary steps to carry out your wishes even if you become incapacitated. As with other aspects of your estate plan, however, you'll want to review these arrangements periodically to make sure they still reflect your current thinking.

To make any of these moves – in fact, to make any moves at all related to estate planning – you'll need to work with a team of professionals, including your tax, legal and financial advisors. Comprehensive estate planning can be complex and time-consuming – but it's worth the effort.

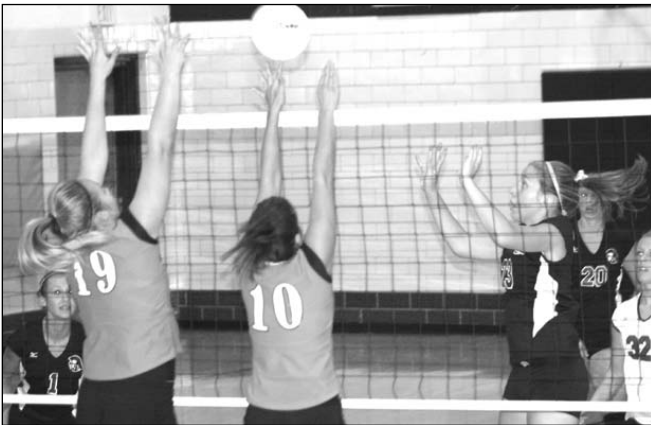

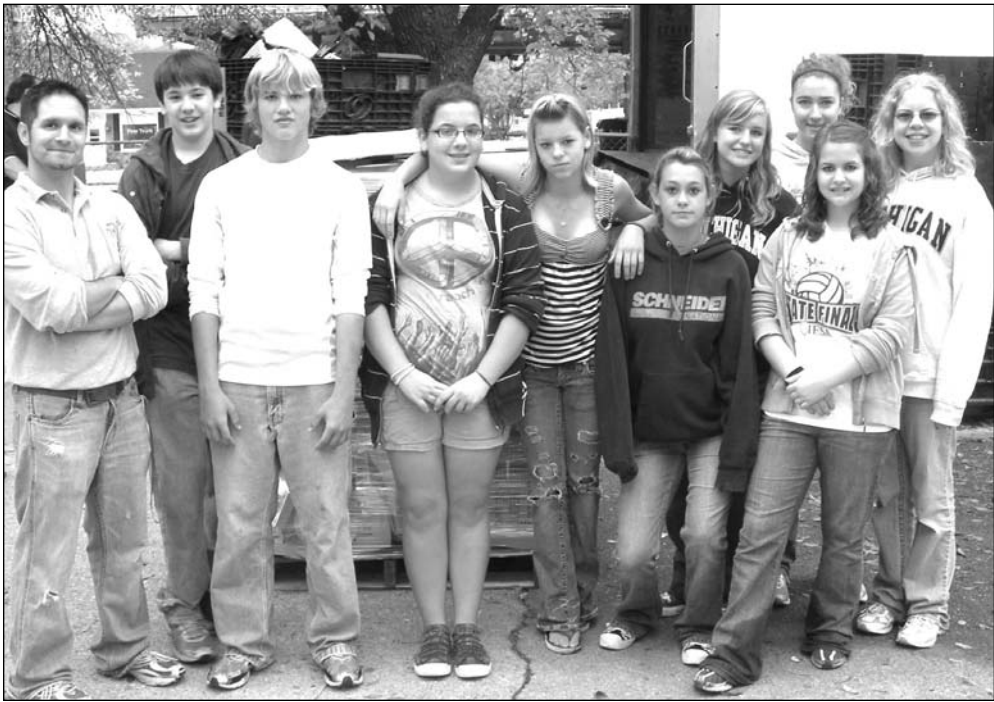

People brought in more than 13 tons of electronics to recycle at a recent e-recycling event in downtown Dwight.

That's more than the weight of an 18-wheeler, or the equivalent to 13 Volkswagon Beetles.

"It was a lot higher than we expected," said AT Recycling President Barb Ehresman, whose Pontiac-based company took the items and disassembled them and then recycled them. "It was a good turnout."

The event, sponsored by Livingston County and Allied Waste, took place Saturday, Sept. 26.

Among the items accepted were televisions, computers, computer monitors, printers, phones, stereos, radios, DVDs and cell phones.

A total weight of 27,039 pounds was collected. Of that, televisions accounted for 8,886 pounds of the collected materials.

"There was a lot of TVs. It could be that it's been a long time since the last drive or it could be the change over to digital," she said. "We kept seeing them come in and it was like 'dang!'"

For the next several years, Ehresman said she expects TVs to remain one of the top recycled items as people switch from the bulkier old TVs to thinner flat screens.

Coming in a close second to televisions were computer monitors. About 232 monitors were turned in for a total of 8,071 pounds.

Personal computers followed with 3,870; Printers, 2,884; Consumer electronics, 1,990; miscellaneous items, 890; wire, 208 pounds; and phones, 240 pounds.

In 2008, AT Recycling kept more than 750,000 pounds of electronic waste from people's homes out of landfills.

State lawmakers are currently considering a proposal that would require people to pay a fee to dispose of electronics beginning in 2011.

The event was organized in conjunction with Impact Dwight volunteers, who are working for a cleaner, more beautiful and prosperous community.

Until another drive takes place, Ehresman said she hopes people remember that electronics shouldn't go to landfills.

"People need to be educated in regard to recycling electronics along with a lot of other items," she said. "They're not good for the environment and people need to realize that. Just don't throw it away. It needs to be properly disposed of."

Tri-Point Superintendent's News

This edition of the superintendent's news contains information about five topics.

First, best wishes to Jerry Tkachuk. Jerry is leaving the Tri-Point School District to take an administrative position with the Altamont School District. Jerry has been with Tri-Point for five year as the principal at the upper elementary/junior high school building in Piper City. Jerry has led the staff members through many significant changes that have resulted in the excellent education the students at Piper City receive. Jerry's administrative expertise and positive personality will be missed.

Second, the Tri-Point School District is pleased to welcome Ann Nugent. Ann has been employed as a special education teacher at the upper elementary/junior high school building in Piper City. Ann will be working with Dana Phipps-Arnett and Sharon Schuette the other special education teachers in Piper City. Ann is an experienced teacher and she will be a positive addition to the faculty at the upper elementary/junior high school.

Third, changes in the high school library were approved at the July school board meeting. The current library will become a media center. Computers are being installed in the library to provide the high school students

with additional sources for accessing reference information. Students will still be able to utilize the encyclopedias, dictionaries, atlases, and almanacs in the library.

Fourth, the school district's health/life safety projects are continuing to move toward completion. Updates on the different projects are available on the school district's website by clicking on the "Health/Life Safety Information" tab. The health/life safety work is being paid for with the money from the bond sale the school district completed this past January. The health/life safety money can only be used for health/life safety projects. The health/life safety projects do not take any money away from the amount of funding the school district has available for educating students.

Fifth, some building projects in addition to the health/life safety work are taking place in Kempton and Piper City. The exterior drainage system at the Kempton West building is being updated to direct water away from the school building. The drainage system will be tied into an underground tile. At Piper City the roof on the 1898 school building is being replaced and the west entrance is undergoing changes. New ceiling tiles and light fixtures are being installed in the interior, and the outside concrete of the entrance is being replaced.

Livingston County SWCD Fish Sale Deadline Approaching

The deadline to order Grass Carp is coming fast! Grass Carp orders are due Thursday, October 8.

Triploid Grass Carp, also known as White Amur, are an excellent alternative to using chemicals for weed control in ponds and lakes. They are genetically incapable of reproducing, (each and every fish that leaves the farm is tested for triploidy.) When proper numbers are stocked they will eliminate the need to use chemical herbicides for weed control.

Stocking rates depend on the amount of weeds present and the size of your pond. You will need to restock your pond every 3-5 years, dependent upon severity of the weed problem, as the fish grow older since they are sterile.

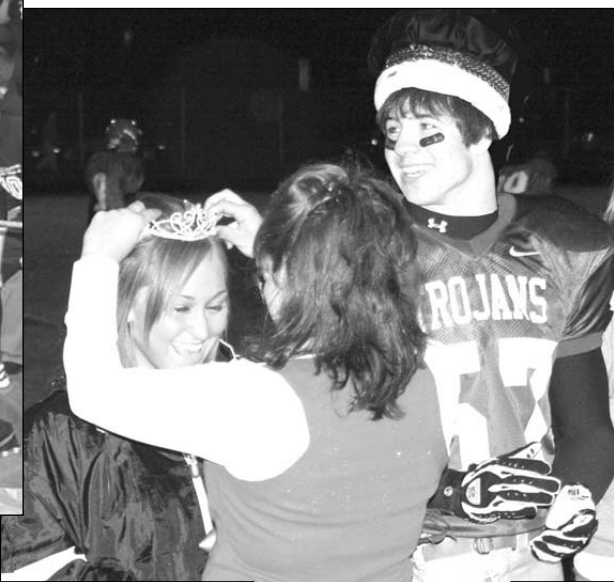
