





People Need to Get Flu Vaccines, Experts Stress

People should get flu vaccines wherever they can find them, say experts at the Livingston County Health Department.

The Livingston County Health Department is currently out of the seasonal flu vaccine, said Linda Rhodes, health education and marketing director at the health department, and she's not sure when another shipment may come in. In Dwight, locations to be vaccinated include doctor's offices; at the new Pamida store from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Oct. 19; or daily at Doc's Drugs.

"At the present time, we're giving the standard seasonal flu shots and we are in particular doing it on an everyday basis," said Richard Schwartz, pharmacist in charge at Doc's Drugs. "It's definitely recommended. The seasonal flu shot changes from year to year, so people have to get it every

Doc's is open from 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. during the week and 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday. They do not admin-

ister the shot for people under the age of 14.

Medicare pays for the shot for seniors. If a person has insurance, they just need to pay the co-pay. Without insur-

ance, the shot is \$25.

The shot is made with egg, so people with allergies or who take immunosuppressant drugs should consult a physi-

Schwartz isn't sure if or when Doc's will be receiving a shipment of the swine flu vac-

"In a week or so they'll be releasing more information

about swine flu," Schwartz said. "It's so sketchy as to who's going to get the first available injections."

The swine flu vaccine comes in one of two ways: a nasal spray mist of live virus that can only be used by healthy people ages two to 49; or an injection of a dead virus for pregnant women, seniors, babies and people with compromised immune systems.

Livingston County Health Department workers expect their first shipment of the H1N1 nasal vaccine to come in the next week or so, and they'll begin administering it at a clinic tentatively scheduled for the last week of October.

Following the CDC guide-

lines, Rhodes said the initial round will be reserved for three groups of people: healthy adults who are healthcare workers who are under 50 years of age; healthy adults under age 50 who provide daycare for children who are less than six months of age; and healthy people ages two through ages 24.

Unlike the seasonal flu, the swine flu has particularly hit young people the hardest. Of the 448 people in Illinois who have been hospitalized for the

swine flu, the majority have been under 65 years old, with 125 people between the ages of five and 18 and another 105 people between the ages of 25 and 49, according to the website ready.illinois.gov

As of Oct. 2, there were 19 deaths in Illinois from the swine flu. That compares to more than 30,000 deaths a year nationwide from the seasonal flu, Rhodes said. For more information, visit these websites: cdc.gov; flu.gov; or ready.illinois.gov







The cool, damp summer necessary for optimal growing served crops well, but the wet fall is wreaking havoc on the harvest.

Additionally, the extra moisture coupled with cooler temperatures created the perfect environment for white mold to invade some soybean crops.

"In some fields, in some locations, in some varieties, individuals are having as much as 30 percent yield loss," said Marion Shier, crop systems educator with the University of Illinois extension based in Pontiac.

The disease, typically seen in cooler northernmost states such as Wisconsin and Minnesota, attacks soybeans as the flower is dying after pollination, he said.

'It is a significant disease here in the county," Shier said. "It varies by field and variety, but last vear we had (it on the) west blast. I think it's going to be year, it's pretty well all over the county. Not every field has it or has it significant-

In the fields affected, the white mold resembles fluffy, white, cottony structures on the stems with black capsules resembling mouse droppings.

The white mold serves as a double-whammy to farmers who anticipate a decrease in bushels per acre due to the late start they got after an extremely wet spring.

Instead of planting in mid-April, most farmers did not make it into the fields until mid-May, putting them about a month behind schedule.

While they needed a cooler, wet summer to salvage crops, many of which had shallower root systems this year from being planted into hard ground, that moisture is now delaying harvest.

Farmers can't harvest soybeans unless the fields are dry. Wet plants cause problems for the combines.

In Illinois, only one percent of soybeans have been harvested, compared to the 21 percent that should be done, said Phil McArdle, owner of McArdle Grain and Commodities.

Typically, 40 percent of corn has been harvested by now, but Illinois farmers have only harvested five percent.

"We're farther behind in Illinois than others in the Corn Belt," western McArdle said. "We're kind of waiting (for it to dry up). We should be going full-

side of the county. This a really slow harvest time, especially on corn. Our combines are huge and able to do lots of acres, but they'll be limited on the number of bushels they can

Cooler weather also means higher moisture percentages during harvest.

Typically, farmers harvest corn at about 15 to 17 percent moisture levels, McArdle said. Currently, corn is at about 35 to 40 percent moisture. Corn needs to be dried before it is stored in order to prevent

In a typical year, farmers spend all day and even into the night combining, but McArdle expects that many of them will combine for two or three hours and then spend the rest of the day waiting for that corn to dry before they can harvest

Beyond moisture, the later the harvest, the greater chance of running into other complications, he

"We're going to be really late with our harvest, and the later we get, the greater the chance of cold weather or high winds," he said. Additionally, a freeze

could do significant damage to the corn crop, as only about half of it in Illinois is mature right now, he said.

"It's going to be a slow harvest," he "Normally we'd be nearly done with soybean harvest, and no corn has been harvested yet that I know of. We just haven't gotten very much done. It's been raining and cloudy and not the weather we need."

I've probably mentioned before that I was born into and raised by a family who neither values nor enjoys sports. My dad does golf, but he didn't start that until long after my brothers and I left the nest.

To be polite, and I suspect as a way of arming themselves with at least a few conversation starters for their new, sporty member of the family, my parents slowly started putting baseball and football news on their radar. I didn't bother, though. For years, football season meant I could have a good. uninterrupted nap on Sunday after-

But then, we had this little boy. For a long while, not much changed, at least not on the football front. I just had this adorable, albeit grubby little guy who grunted an awful lot and couldn't keep his hands and face clean if his life depended on it. We went through a series of phases, and all of them were loosely held together with dirt, sweat and aggression. There was the sandbox/eating rocks phase, a fire truck phase, a Power Ranger period that might still rear its ugly head on occasion, and even a brief fascination with army guys. My husband relished all of it, celebrating like only fathers with sons can, the ever-increasing possibility that he and our son would likely share an attraction to the full-blown testosterone rush that apparently only football can satisfy.

For both of their sakes, I'm happy to report that my son lives and breathes football. The two of them talk about football all of the

time. It's like having a radio sports commentary playing non-stop. Of course, it's during football season that all of this activity and conversation reaches a fevered pitch. But in the off-season, the conversation simply turns to rehashing seasons past and speculation about the season to come.

Naturally, my son plays littleboy football. And my husband coaches little-boy football. My son's muddy cleats get left in the living room, and I'm a pro at getting his knee pads put in the right way. They come home from practices and games all wound-up. Saturdays are devoted to the most important contest on the face of this Earth.

I don't completely understand the game, but I'm getting there. At a recent match, another football mother and I had to laugh at ourselves. We were the mothers who'd been forever reminding our sons to stop being so rough, to keep their hands to themselves, to try to stay clean for five minutes, and there we both were, screaming from the sidelines with deep, almost guttural conviction, "Hurt him! Get in there! Get tough!" We were encouraging our sons to be rough and dirty and aggressive, all of the things they get in trouble for off the field.

How ironic. If someone had told me 25 years ago that I'd be screaming my head off in the rain so that my son would fight and scrap and use his body like a weapon, I would have laughed and put my nose back in my book.

I guess we just never know what's in the next chapter, do we?

FINANCIAL FOCUS Keep Inflation in Mind When Investing

As an investor, you're always aware of the potential effects of market volatility on your portfolio. But you also need to pay attention to another factor that could impact your investments' return — inflation.

If you look back over the last few decades, you might not think inflation is much of a threat. Since the double-digit rates of the early 1980s, inflation has fallen significantly and, for the most part, has stayed low. Still, over time even a mild annual inflation rate can eventually erode your pur-

Obviously, if you're a retiree, or close to retiring, you need to plan for the impact of inflation on your income stream, which may, to a large degree, depend on the types of investments you own. But even if you're at an earlier stage in life, you need to think about inflation because it can reduce the "real" rate of return you receive on your invest-

In any case, you can find investments that may be able to help you cope with inflation. When you own stocks, for example, you've got an ownership stake in companies that have the ability to raise prices — which make them effective inflation-fighting investments. Keep in mind an investment in stocks fluctuates and you can lose your money.

But one of the biggest inflation-fighting benefits of stocks is the dividends that they may pay. Well-run companies may reward investors by paying them back with dividends — and some companies have increased their dividends annually for decades. A word of caution, though: Companies can reduce or eliminate them at any time, without notice. In fact, during the long market slump we experienced, some companies did cut back on their dividend pay-

Not all stocks pay dividends, of course. In any case, if you're going to maintain a balanced portfolio, you'll also want to own other types of investments, such as bonds. But many bonds — along with other fixed-income vehicles, such as Certificates of Deposit — are not good "inflation fighters" because the fixed rate of return they offer simply may not keep up with inflation. However, if you built a "bond ladder" that is, a group of bonds with varying maturities — you'd have more flexibility in combating inflation, because your

longer-term bonds typically offer higher interest rates. What about the so-called "inflation hedges," such as commodities and real estate? Actually, these "hedges" are extremely volatile and should be approached with great caution. You need look no further back than the bursting of the housing "bubble" to see that real estate, for instance, can go down just as fast as it goes up — and once down, it can take years to recover.

In your efforts to invest wisely for the future, inflation is only one of the variables you need to consider. But it can be an important one — so make sure you choose the investments that both address inflation and can help you make progress toward all your financial goals.
