## **AYP Report Cards** in for Dwight Schools

Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) Reports for 2009 have been received by both Dwight school districts and were presented to each board this month.

AYP is a government mandated accountability system resulting from the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001. Each state is required to establish targets and measure each school's progress through standardized tests in an effort to ensure schools are performing academically, addressing weaknesses, and improving year over year. Schools are required to meet or exceed the established target. Currently, only reading and math are measured through AYP.


At Dwight Grade School, the general population students met the state's AYP benchmark in all areas. However, students requiring special services falling under Safe Harbor targets fell short of meeting the state's mark.

For general population

students at both schools, the state target was a 70 percent meet or exceed rate in reading and math. Next year's state AYP target will increase to 77.5 percent in both reading and math. At both schools, 100 percent of the students were tested exceeding the required testing rate

of 95 percent. The DGS general population exceeded the state targets receiving an 80.8 percent in reading and 88 percent in math. For students with disabilities, 38.2 percent met or exceeded the 55 percent state Safe Harbor target in reading; in math 50.9 percent of these students met or exceeded the 65.9 percent state Safe Harbor target.

Other statistics captured at Dwight Grade School include an enrollment of 651 students with a pupil-to teacher ratio of 15.4. The average DGS teacher salary showed \$52,415, compared to a state average of \$61,402 and the average DGS administrator salary was \$83,947, compared to the State's \$106,217 average. ### Trinity 'Goodfarm' Lutheran Celebrates 155th Anniversary

"Goodfarm" Lutheran Church met outside before the 10 a.m. worship service on Sunday, October 18, to dedicate the new outdoor sign made by Woody Hahn of Morris. The rest of the service, inside, was to celebrate the 155th anniversary of the founding of the con-

gregation in August of 1854. The original name of the congregation was Frankenkirche, until 1872, when it was changed to Trinity. Colonies of families from Southern Germany in Franconia (now Bavaria) came to America in 1845 to settle in Frankenmuth, Michigan to do mission

work with the Chippewa Indians and clear the land for farms. Other colonies settled nearby. Rev. Henry Wunder, from that area of Germany, became pastor at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Chicago and encouraged the colonies of families to come to Illinois instead, where they did not need to clear the land of trees and could begin farming. Families came to the Goodfarm area from 1851 through 1853 and began to use the new technology in farming with plows, planters and reapers. Rev. Wunder helped them to organize as a congregation every two months for wor-

ship, baptisms, confirmation, weddings and other services until 1857.

Rev. Lorenz Kaehler, originally of Hamburg, Germany, became the first resident pastor to serve the Goodfarm congregation.

The current pastor, Rev. W. E. Duey, is the 26th pastor to serve the Trinity Goodfarm congregation, where he has been pastor since July 2007.

The public is welcome to worship at Trinity Goodfarm Lutheran, one half mile east of Route 47 on Stonewall and agreed to come once Road. The church is handicap accessible.

As Flu Spreads, **Schools Feel the Impact** for a few days," Decman

As the seasonal flu and H1N1 virus continue to spread across the area, young people are being hit especially hard.

At its October 20 briefing on H1N1, also known as Swine Flu, the Center for Disease Control reported that more than half of the hospitalizations from 2009 H1N1 flu reported by 27 states from September 1 to October 10 were people age 24 and younger. According to the Illinois Department of Public Health, of the 476

people who have been hospitalized in Illinois for confirmed H1N1, 131 of them were between the ages of five and 18, a higher number than in any other age brack-


Area schools are seeing influenza's impact on youth first-hand. Of the 225 students at Gardner South Wilmington High School, 78 were out of school Tuesday, October 20. While eight of those students were gone for reasons such as dentist appointments, the other 70 were out with flu symptoms, according to Superintendent Dr. Rich Decman.

"We may potentially be looking at canceling school

Decman said although many of the ill students had reported testing positive for Influenza A, it is difficult to know whether any students may have the H1N1 virus because they must first be tested for the virus strain, and then the results must be sent to a laboratory for analysis. As of October 21, there were no GSW students with confirmed cases of H1N1.

But with so many cases of illness at GSW, Decman said, "It's getting to be almost pandemic up here. (continued on page 4)





At Dwight High School, the school exceeded the state targets with 77.4 percent in reading and 71 percent in math. Safe Harbor targets for students with disabilities did not come into play at DTHS since there are not enough students to qualify for the subgroup.

Other statistics captured at DTHS include an enrollment of 327 students with a pupil to teacher ratio of 14.2. The average DTHS teacher

salary showed \$60,049, compared to a state average of \$61,402, and the average DTHS administrator salary was \$88,983, compared to the \$106,217 state average. Expenditures by functions reflect that DTHS spends 40.4 percent on instruction compared to the state average of 46.7 percent.

Complete report cards for each District will be posted on the school's website by the end of October.

### As Flu Spreads, Schools Feel the Impact – – –

(continued from page 1) Kids are now staying home not just because they have the flu, but also because they don't want to get the flu."

Dwight Township High School was also hit hardest on Tuesday, October 20, when 55 of the school's 306 students were absent with flu symptoms, according to Superintendent Dale Adams. That number was down to 33 by October 22.

One DTHS student was thought to have the H1N1 virus, but it was later discovered that was not the case. Adams said that even if a

student were to be diagnosed with H1N1, "unless they have an underlying health condition, (students) are going to experience the same symptoms as they would with the seasonal flu.'

Adams said the school is following CDC guidelines and stressing that students should only return to school once they have been clear of flu symptoms for 24 hours without medication. The school can request a doctor's note stating that a student is no longer contagious if he or she has been out of school for three consecutive days; however, Adams said the CDC has recommended lightening that policy, and it will probably not be enforced at DTHS. Too many children would miss too many days of school if they were not allowed to return once they felt better,

Adams also said DTHS would only consider canceling school if so many faculty members became sick that it was impossible to teach

"For us to cancel school, then we would have to say to the kids, 'You don't go out and be in contact with each other," Adams said. He believes that ill children and healthy children would be more likely to spend time together on a day off school, thus spreading the flu virus to more people than if ill children just stayed home from school for a day or two.

Although Herscher High School's flu absence rate peaked at 42 students during the week of October 12, Principal Ron Oloffson said that rate is not high considering that the school has about 685 students. The situation was similar in the Tri-Point district, where all three schools were reporting about 10 percent of students absent due to the flu, according to Superintendent Steve Fink. Neither HHS nor Tri-Point has considered canceling school. Fink said he has learned, through discussions with other area superintendents, that there seems to be one week with high absences, but absence rates drop the following week as students get well.

GSWHS, DTHS, HHS and Tri-Point are all taking precautions to prevent the spread of the flu virus. Decman said Gardner South Wilmington has sent out information to the school community on how to prevent viruses from spreading, and Adams said Dwight is encouraging students to wash their hands regularly and asking sick students to stay home. GSW has placed hand sanitizer in the lunchroom and provided every teacher with disinfectant spray, and DTHS, HHS and Tri-Point have placed hand sanitizer in every classroom.

Custodians at all four schools are routinely cleaning surfaces, but Decman said, "We're finding that the school isn't the petri dish; it's the acutal humans." He said bacteria only survives for about two hours on a non-organic surface, so cleaning the school's hard surfaces is not as important as keeping sick students from sharing germs with healthy students.

Adams said, "There's good and bad that come with all the media attention this flu has gotten. One of the good effects is that we're seeing more kids, as well as more teachers, who haven't taken a day off in years stay home (if they are sick)."

Decman agreed that educating people about the spread of the flu is key to staying healthy.

"Hopefully, this will all be over soon," he said.

### Identifying and Avoiding the H1N1 Flu Virus

by Meta Machulis Flu season has arrived, and this year, it's a double-whammy. People are not only worried about the seasonal flu, but also about the H1N1 virus, also known as Swine Flu. All the media attention given to the H1N1 virus has left many people wondering how to avoid the flu and how to

tell the difference between seasonal flu and H1N1. Dr. John

Bolden, M.D., infecatati tious disease physician on the medical staff Morris Hospital & Healthcare Centers, said seasonal flu and H1N1 flu have similar symptoms, which may

include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills, fatigue and sometimes diarrhea and vomiting. "Most people with H1N1 have had mild illness and have not needed medical care or

antiviral drugs," Bolden said.

"The same is true of seasonal

flu." According to a Morris Hospital press release, individuals with flu symptoms are encouraged to stay away from others as much as possible to keep from making them sick. The Center for Disease Control also recommends staying home for at least 24 hours after the fever is gone.

While most people with flu have mild illness, certain people are more susceptible to complication from the flu and should talk to a healthcare provider about whether they need to be examined if they get flu symptoms. This includes children younger than five and especially younger than two years old; people 65 and older; pregnant women; and people who have cancer, blood disorders, chronic lung disease, diabetes, heart disease, kidney disorders, liver disorders, neurological disorders, neuromuscular disorders and weakened

immune systems.

The CDC also advises that the emergency room should be used only for those who are very sick, and individuals should not go to emergency room if they are mildly ill. Cases of

H1N1 have been confirmed in Livingston, Kankakee counties, according to the Illinois

Department of Public Health. However, no H1N1-related deaths had been reported in any of the three counties as of October 16.

In addition to the seasonal flu vaccine, the H1N1 vaccine is now available. It comes in two forms: an inactivated vaccine containing a killed virus, which is injected; and a live, attenuated intranasal vaccine

> which sprayed into the nose. The inactivated vaccine is given to highrisk individuals, while the  $\supset$  LAIV

approved for people from two through 49 years of age who are not pregnant and do not have certain health condi-

The Livingston County Health Department in Pontiac is currently offering the first round of the H1N1 vaccine to high-risk, priority groups at no cost to the public, through a grant received by the health department. Clinic dates are Wednesday, October 28, 7:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.; Saturday, October 31, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.; Wednesday, November 4, 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Saturday, November 7, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.; and Wednesday, November 18, 7:30 a.m. to 4

"We're still encouraging everyone to get the H1N1 vaccine when their group is called," said Linda Rhodes of the Livingston County Health Department. "Until their group is called, we're encouraging them to practice the three C's." The three C's are Clean (wash your hands), Cover (your mouth when you cough or sneeze) and Contain (stay home if you are sick).

The seasonal flu vaccine is also being offered every Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the health department for as long as the vaccine is available.

For more information on vaccines at the Livingston County Health Department, call 815-844-7174.

An auditor with Sterlingfirm based Lindgren, Callihan and Van Osdol & Co. presented the 2008-09 fiscal year audit report to the Board of Education at its 19 October session. According to the auditor, the district "is in a very good financial position."

"This speaks very well of how things have been managed here," the auditor told the board regarding the rating. He went on to say that with the State's financial situation and monies not coming in as expected, "to stay at this high level is commendable.'



### Does Your Car Sound Haunted?

Halloween is the time of year for squeals, squeaks, screeches and things that go bump in the night, but when these eerie and haunted sounds come from your car, it's time for maintenance. Noise is to the vehicle what pain is to the body: a warning. According to the Car Care Council, the following strange and scary noises are clues that trouble is brewing within your car.

 Squeal: A sharp noise that usually means a problem with the brakes or the power steering, fan or air conditioning belt. The entire brake system should be checked every year, including brake linings, rotors and drums. Belts should be inspected every three months or 3,000/5,000 miles.

Screech: A sound typically caused by brake wear indicators that tell you it's time for maintenance. Brakes are a normal wear item for any car and eventually they're going to need to be replaced for both performance and safety

· Squeaks: A number of things

can cause squeaks, including belts, the water pump or alternator bearings or a pulley. Belts should be replaced when cracked, frayed, glazed or showing signs of excessive wear. And water pumps, tensioners, idlers and alternators all have bearings that can fail [ and "squeak," all of which should be checked.

 Bang: A backfire, which can be caused by lean air/fuel ratio, an ignition malfunction and/or a mechanical failure

· Grinding (a metal-on-metal grating noise): A sound that is related to the brake linings. The brake system is your car's most important safety system and needed repairs should never be put off.

· Heavy knock: A pounding sound that is usually connecting rod or main bearing failures which are caused by excessive wear.

Thump: A

sound that usually means there's a problem with the tires. To maximize tire life and safety, check tire condition and inflation pressure every three months or 3,000 miles, and have the tires rotated and balanced.

· Clang: Gears will make a "clanging" noise when there is excessive "lash" (movement generally describes as "play"). It's the kind of noise that accompanies one component being allowed to move because of excessive play and the abrupt halt it comes to when encountering the resistance of the part that didn't move when it was supposed to.

 Metallic ticking: Also often associated with excessive play in valve train components.

"These are just some of the many noises a vehicle makes when there's a problem, but whenever there's an unusual sound, it's a good idea to have the car looked at to ensure safety and reliability and to help prevent costly repairs down the road," said Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council.

### Take Control of Your Vehicle's Safety

Like your car's brake system, the steering and suspension systems are key to your car's safety. Together, they largely determine your car's ride and handling. The Car Care Council recommends having your vehicle's steering and suspension systems checked regularly, at least once a year and usually with a wheel alignment.

"Over time, steering and suspension components wear out and require replacement.," said Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council. "Regular checks are critical to the safety of your car."

Symptoms of steering and suspension wear:

Pulling · Uneven tire wear

· Noise and vibration while cornering

· Loss of control

Several factors that affect steering and suspension wear include driving habits, operating conditions, vehicle type and the frequency of regular maintenance such as chassis lubrication and wheel alignment.

· Is there anything I can do to help the steering and suspension systems on my car last longer?

· How does the work being performed eliminate the symptoms my car exhibited or my complaint?

(Keep in mind, though, that diversification, by itself, cannot guarantee a profit or protect against a loss.)

• Scary Move No. 2: Chasing after "hot" tips — You can get "hot" investment tips from anybody - your neighbor, your brother-in-law or even that guy you always see at the bus stop. But while these tips may be well intentioned, they may be flawed, f or a couple of reasons. First, if an investment really was "hot," by the time you hear about it and get around to purchasing it, it may already be cooling off. But more importantly, it might not be suitable for your individual needs. Look for investments that you understand and that can help you meet your goals.

• Scary Move No. 3: Investing too aggressively — or too conservatively. If you invest too aggressively, you could be taking unnecessary chances. On the other hand, if you invest too conservatively, you may never achieve your long-term objectives. Try to find a mix of investments that fits your indi-

• Scary Move No. 4: Leaving your portfolio "unbalanced" Over time, your individual situation will change, as will the fundamentals of some of the investments you own. That's why it's important that you regularly rebalance your portfolio, possibly with the help of an experienced financial profession-

• Scary Move No. 5: Failing to take advantage of investment opportunities — To help meet your goals, such as a comfortable retirement, it's important to take advantage of suitable investment opportunities.
