Three Arrested in **Drug Deal Gone Wrong**

Three Dwight men were arrested last week after what police say was a drug deal gone wrong.

Dwight police officers were called to the Country Mansion at about 6 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 19, in response to a man who alleged that he was beaten and robbed of \$215 at the intersection of South Street and Carriage House Lane. "Through the course of

interviews and working the case, we found he did not have any money taken from his person," Police Chief Tim Henson said. "Instead he had somewhere between 10 and 15 foils of heroin that were taken from him. Basically this was a drug deal gone bad."

The alleged victim, Brian Kobiela, 25, of Dwight, was arrested and charged with obstructing justice and filing a false police report.

Kobiela's alleged attackers, Adam Krimpelbein, 25, of Dwight, and Joseph Faris, 24, of Dwight, were both arrested and each were charged with

battery and vehicular invasion, a class one felony.

Police believe Krimpelbein and Faris knew Kobiela would be at the Country Mansion and intercepted him at the nearby intersection.

They then beat Kobiela through the window of the pick-up truck he was riding in, police say, and fled the scene to an apartment in the 100 block of East Chippewa Street, where they refused to come out. About two hours later the men surrendered to police.

A search warrant obtained from the apartment did not turn up the stolen heroin, Henson said.

All three men were transported to Livingston County

Krimpelbein and Faris were later charged with robbery and mob action by the Livingston County state's attorney's office.

Kobiela was later released without charges, however additional charges against him could be filed at a later date, Henson said.

DTHS District #230 Presents Proposed Tax Levy

Superintendent Dale Adams presented the Proposed 2009 Tax Levy to the Dwight Township High School Board of Education at its regular session on

November 16. An EAV of \$118 million is projected for 2009. The proposed 2009 Tax Levv calls for the maximum rates set by code in the Education, Special Education, O&M, Transportation, Working Cash, and Fire/Life Safety funds. The Education Fund request shows an increase of

a rate of \$2.0339. The proposed levy would generate \$163,475 more than last year, which is a 4.98 percent increase. Because the requested increase is less than five percent, a Truth in Taxation Hearing and publication is not necessary.

The final 2009 Tax Levy will be brought to the Board for approval at its December 14 session and must be on file with each of the county clerk offices by the last Tuesday in December.

(continued from page 1) meet all board requests, which could extend the project costs to \$1.2 million.

The expansion project is part of the overall roof replacement project that began earlier this year and will complete over three years. BLDD will present a proposal at the December 14 session and plan to have the cafeteria expansion project out for bid in January.

Finalization of punch list items from the first phase of the roof project completed this past summer prompted the board to approve the final payment of \$71,466. However, after much discussion, the board voted to retain nearly \$50,000 to ensure that issues with leaks in the new roof have been adequately addressed. The board will withhold the specified amount until a significant weather/rain event has occurred or up to May 1,

Officers of the Dwight Music Boosters spoke to the board, bringing awareness to issues that led to the dissolution of the Dwight Band Parents and the creation of the new music organization. According to Dwight Music Boosters President Jennifer Myzia past financial issues and failure to file an annual report with the State has put the organization at risk of approximately

\$19,000. The organization is taking legal measures to remedy what was referred to as "unintentional negligence" and asked the board for moral support through the process.



FINANCIAL FOCUS Everyone Wins When You Make Charitable Gifts

It's Thanksgiving time again. Like everyone, you have many things in your life for which you are thankful. And you may want to show your appreciation for what you have by making a gift to a charitable organization. If you do, both you and the charitable group can come out ahead.

Of course, it's no secret that 2009 has been a pretty rough year, with most of us feeling the effects of the recession in one way or another. Consequently, you may feel that you can't really afford to make charitable gifts right now. But there's probably never been a more urgent need for these gifts, as the distressed economy has led to a decline in contributions for charities across the country. Furthermore, your charitable gift can provide you with some distinct economic advantages.

Specifically, by making charitable contributions, you can gain these tax benefits:

• You can take an immediate tax deduction. If you itemize your taxes, you can deduct your contributions to charitable organizations, as long as they are "tax qualified." (Be sure to ask the organization if it has tax-qualified status.) Your tax deductions for charitable contributions are generally limited to 50 percent of your adjusted gross income. (If you want to claim a deduction for the 2009 tax year, you'll need to make your contribution before Jan. 1.)

• You can avoid capital gains taxes. If you want to support a charitable group, you're not limited to making cash contributions — you can also donate other assets, such as stocks or real estate. If you've held these assets for a long time, their value may have risen considerably, despite the volatility of the financial and real estate markets the past couple of years. If they have appreciated, and you wanted to sell then, you'd have to pay capital gains taxes on your profits. But if you donate these assets, you can avoid the capital gains liability while still claiming the tax deduction.

• You can remove assets from your taxable estate. In 2010, the estate tax is repealed, but it will be back in 2011. Estate taxes can be heavy, and if your heirs aren't prepared for them, they may have to sell assets to pay them. To possibly help avoid this problem, you may want to reduce the value of your taxable estate. One way of doing this — and of also receiving an immediate income tax deduction — is to donate assets, such as investments and property, to a charitable group. If you want to still enjoy the benefits of these assets while you're alive, you could transfer them to a charitable remainder trust, which can then sell them and reinvest the proceeds, out of which you could receive an income stream for life. Upon your death, the charity you have designated will receive the remainder of the trust's assets. (To properly establish this type of trust, you'll need to work with a qualified legal advisor.)

As you can see, the old saying "when you give, you also receive" is certainly true when it comes to making charitable donations. So, during the upcoming holiday season, be as generous as possible — to charitable groups and to yourself.

GSW Board of Education Hears Reports, Talks Tax Levy

Wilmington High School District #73 Board of Education held a regular meeting November 18.

Lance Copes from the Grundy Area Vocational Center was present to inform the Board of Education about the addition and renovation project for the Morris building. Scott Rile from Healy-Bender & Associates also talked about the projected plans and how they will affect the four feeder schools (Morris, Minooka, Coal City and GSW).

Athletic Director Ben Bailey gave the BOE an update of his progress on various projects and a summary of the fall sports sea-

Jennifer Wzorek gave a short presentation on how the federally unfunded mandate called RTI (Response to Intervention) is affecting GSW HS.

Dr. Decman provided a few handouts to help explain the tax levy extension for next year. Specifically, his is asking for a 5.03 percent increase in the extension from last year. As a result of this request, there will be a Truth in Taxation hearing prior to the next BOE meeting. However, only a 1 to 2 percent increase in the levy is expected.

Dr. Decman provided the Truth in Taxation resolution, which will be published in The Paper.

Dr. Decman received a transportation bid from Illinois Central on October 16. The bid shows an increase in prices of 1.9 percent over the next two years. Council was presented.

Gardner South The feeder schools have presented the bid from Illinois Central at their BOE meetings. After a few more questions are answered about the presented bid, he will be ask-

> ing for board approval. All four schools' (GSW HS, GGS, SWGS and BGS) superintendents, along with one board member from each school, had a meeting to discuss the various issues related to the eighth grade algebra program. As a result of this meeting, the schools discussed a potential joint agreement with the schools all sharing in the costs.

Morris Hospital Funds Gardner Fire Cardiac Monitor

The Morris Hospital Foundation has provided the Gardner Volunteer Fire Department full funding for a \$15,882 cardiac monitor that will enhance services provided to heart attack victims.

The cardiac monitor gives first responders with the Gardner Volunteer Fire Department the ability to conduct electrocardiogram (EKG) tests right in the field and then transmit the test results to a hospital emergency room. EKGs are used to record the heart's electrical impulses, enabling physicians to determine if the heart rate and rhythm are normal or if the heart is showing signs of not getting adequate blood flow, which could indicate a heart attack.

"Having this capability will enhance patient outcomes during cardiac emergencies," says Chief Randy Wilkey of the Gardner Volunteer Fire Department. "By identifying heart attack victims in the field and transmitting EKG results, the receiving hospital will be able to prepare for the arrival of the patient, which expedites treatment."

Clinicians at Morris Hospital have witnessed the benefits of this technology numerous times over the past several months.

the ability to conduct EKG tests in the field and transmit them from the ambulance," says Kevin Roesch, manager of Cardiovascular Services at Morris Hospital. "As soon as the emergency physician sees the EKG reading and confirms the likelihood of a heart attack, we begin assembling our cardiac cath team so we're ready to open the blocked artery with balloon angioplasty as soon as the patient arrives at the hospital. So far, our best 'doorto-balloon' time was 23 minutes. That means the patient's blocked artery was opened 23 minutes after arriving at the hospital. The sooner we can open the artery, the less damage to the heart."

Residents of Gardner aren't the only ones who stand to benefit from Gardner Volunteer Fire Department's new cardiac equipment. monitoring When requested, Gardner Fire provides advanced life support services to Dwight Emergency Medical Services and South Wilmington Department.

"The ability to accurately diagnose the patient's EKG and transmit it to the receiving emergency department will greatly enhance the patient's ability to survive and recover from a heart attack," says Wilkey. "We are very pleased to be adding this type of service to our capabilities. It will greatly enhance the quality of care for cardiac patients in emergency situations. We're grateful to the Morris Hospital Foundation for providing the needed funding."
