Historic Dwight Business William J. Hooker Agency, Inc.

The Paper is running a series on currently operating Dwight businesses that have a long Dwight history and a legacy within the community. This week features the William J. Hooker Agency, Inc., 206 E. Mazon Ave.

In Bill Hooker's own words, he became an insurance agent "quite by accident."

Hooker's family moved to Dwight in 1958 when his father got a job at the Dwight prison. After graduating from Dwight Township High School in 1964, Hooker began working at a factory, but when the factory workers went on strike, Hooker found himself sitting at home. A Prudential Insurance salesman came to his door, asked why he was home, and suggested he become an agent.

"The next thing I know, selling insurance!' I'm Hooker said.

His business began on March 11, 1968. He was an agent for Prudential Insurance and worked out of his home, selling mostly life and health insurance. After 16 years with Prudential, "I decided I would go out on my own," Hooker said. He became an independent agent and shared an office with Gary Neville's law firm in the now vacant building on Chippewa Street formerly occupied by Jams. In 1989, the two moved their businesses to 146 E. Main St. Hooker also became business partners with a Chatsworth agent around that time but decided to maintain his own business again in 1992, when he bought out the Jury Iinsurance Agency and those of Ralph Helton and Alan Mortensen. In 1994, the

William J. Hooker Agency, Inc. moved to its current location, 206 E. Mazon Ave.

For a time, Hooker also had sub-agencies in Bloomington and Braidwood; one is still operating in Odell.

Hooker said many aspects

of the insurance business have changed since 1968.

"For one thing, there's a lot less of us," he said of insurance agents. Nationwide, "everything's consolidated."

Over the past several months, organizers of the Dwight Teen Center, including the teens themselves. have been holding fund-raising events and trying to find a location for the center. Teen center President Dawn Sutton said she wanted to find a centrally located building and was grateful when Donna Vegter offered to give them the first month's rent free on the twostory building, which is located near the water tower. The location once served as Dwight Village Hall and was most recently a hair studio. It now has neon walls and is awaiting a disco ball that has been ordered for the center's first big event, a New Year's Eve party.

The party will be open to all high school-aged residents of Dwight. Doors open at 8 p.m. on Thursday, December 31, and the party starts at 9 p.m. Teens will not be allowed in or out of the

ahead one hour, so the party will end at 11 p.m. To allow all teens to participate, they do not need to be members of the Dwight Teen Center to attend the New Year's Eve party. Eight chaperones will oversee the event.

The Dwight Teen Center is now legally a not-for-profit corporation, Sutton said. The center's bylaws have been completed and submitted to the state, which she said is the last step in the center's legal organization.

According to its mission statement, "The Dwight Teen Center is a community facility dedicated solely for teens living in Dwight, aged 13 to 18 years." The center "offers a variety of organized teen activities in a structured and relaxed environment." Sutton said the center aims to strengthen teens as members of the Dwight community and bridge the gap between teenagers and adults.

"I have listened a lot to what people do NOT want the teen center to be," Sutton said, noting that some were (continued on page 3)

3rd Quarter Sales Tax Lowest in Decade

One has to go back to the third quarter of 1999 to find a with lower sales tax receipts for Dwight than the third quarter of 2009.

According to figures recently released by the Illinois Department of Revenue, Dwight received only \$168,702 in municipal sales tax receipts for the third quarter of 2009. The comparable figure in 1999 was \$168,569.

A year ago the third quarter sales tax receipts for Dwight were \$212,611.

Dwight was not alone in its precipitous decrease in revenue. Morris' third quarter sales tax receipts slid from \$1,222,164 a year ago to \$998,951 this year.

Sales tax receipts for Pontiac in the third quarter dropped from \$555,565 in '08 to \$512,879 in '09, and Fairbury slipped slightly from \$152,011 to \$147,286.

The smaller commun

Dwight generated an increase in revenue. Dwight, Grundy County,

July, August and September showed an increase of more than \$2,000 in sales tax revenue from *Drinking & Eating* Places, third quarter 2008 to 2009. (\$14,054 '08, \$16,073 (09)

> The Livingston County portion of Dwight had an increase of \$7,500 from Drinking & Eating Places in the same period. (\$12,604 '08, \$20,104 '09)

The category showing the largest decrease in sales tax revenue for Dwight was Automotive & Filling Stations, which fell from \$69,109 in the third quarter of 2008 to \$39,460 in 2009. Those figures are for the Livingston County part of Dwight. Grundy County figures for that category are not available due to data censoring when less than four taxpayers are reporting.

(continued from page 1) worried it would become a "drug hangout" or a place to loiter. She emphasized that the center is substance-free, and no teens who are under the influence will be allowed in the building.

Instead, the center will focus on "the teen being responsible for the teen," she said, with an emphasis on their responsibilities as members of the community. The center will encourage teens to be their personal best, be accountable for their actions and be responsible and respectful.

"This is for Dwight's tomorrow," Sutton said. "This is for our future. It's very possible that we can get a child who's on the brink of going down the wrong path and turn their life around." She noted that many teens have been through traumatic experiences, such as seeing their parents divorce, or might just have more unsupervised free time lately if a parent has gone back to work due to the poor economy.

"I want to give them safety and security," she said.

In order to attend the center, teens (and their parents) must sign a contract agreeing with items such as "I realize that the easiest way is not necessarily the best" and "For a successful future, I need to be a good representative of my community." Teens must follow rules, such as wearing appropriate attire and staying in the building for the duration of the activity once they have entered. Teens must have a Teen Center ID card to participate and are charged a fee of \$15 per month to attend. Sutton said no teen who meets the center's criteria will be turned away.

"I worked almost a year on this, just looking up statistics on what works and what doesn't work, and charging a fee was the best option I could find," Sutton said. "We wanted to have some control over it, and we thought this would

Dec. 9 – high 33°, low 2° .06" precip., ¹/₂" snow be the best way to make everyone happy and keep the kids safe." She said the membership money will be used to pay for teen center expenses, such as the cost of field trips or supplies.

At all times, the teen center will be under the supervision of adult volunteers, all of whom have passed a background check.

Although teens must follow rules, they are encouraged to be themselves. For example, Sutton cited a recent clean-up day at the new building. After the six teens present finished cleaning, they made up an impromptu dance routine to the music that was playing on the boom box. Sutton even joined in the dance herself.

"It was really touching that the kids felt so comfortable," she said. "It was really neat to see the diversity of all the kids and how they were together."

Sutton said she wants her own teenaged children to be a part of the community, and noted, "Some of these kids (in Dwight) have been going to school together since kindergarten, and they don't even talk to each other." She hopes the teen center can break down the walls of cliques and show all teens their importance in the Dwight communi-

"If we all work together, we can really do a lot," she said.

The teen center will have structured but fun activities, such as game nights - there are already pool, ping-pong, foosball and air hockey tables in place. There are plans for a professional makeup artist to visit and teach the teens proper makeup application. Sunnyside Tanning and Video has donated movies to the center. There will be monthly dances for teens who also perform a monthly community service. The center also hopes to provide tutoring for students. Most of the center's activities are brainstormed by the teens themselves, approved by a Teen Board.

"This is their teen center," Sutton said.

Even the center's concession stand will serve as learning experience. Teens will take turns working at the concession stand; when it is their turn, they shop (under a leader's supervision) to compare prices and items in order to decide which items might be most profitable. Whoever earns the highest profits from their turn at the concession stand over a given period of time will win a prize.

Sutton and the Teen Center's Adult Board, as well as the Teen Board, are still seeking community ideas and are hoping to steadily add to the number of children involved in the teen center, which is currently about 20.

"I want people to talk to me. I want their input," Sutton said. "'It takes a village to raise a child' - well, we're a village!

The Dwight Teen Center will have a grand opening in January. After that, hours during the school year will be from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. Tuesday Monday, and Thursday; and from 5 to 10 p.m. Saturday. The center is closed on Wednesday and Sunday to allow teens to attend church activities.



With State of Illinois payments over \$4.3 billion behind, many school districts are being forced to make difficult decisions. The Dwight Grade School District is among them.

Auditors from Lindgren Callihan Van Osdol presented the 2008-09 audit results to the board at its December 16 session. District #232 received a 3.1 financial profile rating and is designated at Review Status.

An Education Fund deficit will push the District to abolish the working cash fund as early as next month in an effort to shore up balances and pay operating expenses.

"State payments coming in late have affected fund balances," said the auditor.

And less state funding is available. In 2005, approximately 47 percent of the district's funds were from state sources. This year, state funds accounted for only 40 percent of the school's revenues.

"The district is becoming more reliant on property taxes to fund the education of your elementary students," stated the auditor. "We are seeing this across the board.

Taxpayers are taking on more of the burden until they solve funding issues."

Decreased enrollment also contributes to less opportunity for state funds. A DGS enrollment of 556 students reflects a 12 percent decrease over a five-year period. According to the auditor, this is not unique to Dwight Grade School, and the population decline is common right now among many smaller school districts.

The board moved on to approve the 2009 Tax Levy as proposed by Superintendent Dale Adams last month. The levy request includes a 4.99 percent increase for a total increase of \$133,158. This levy will result in an estimated total tax rate of \$2.48 and generates \$2,802,400. In preparing budget projections, Adams reduced anticipated state revenues for 2010-11 and 2011-12 by 10 percent for each of these years.

"I am not sure 10 percent is enough," Adams told the board. "It is going to take the state a while to come out of this."

However, all board members present at the meeting felt village employees also deserved the \$50 gift. After discussion, Mayor Wilkey reversed his vote to allow the bonus for village employees, but stressed that he was not in favor of spending the money. Due to economic constraints, a Christmas gift

Dwight Appoints Kester as Trustee bonus was not given to paid village employees in 2008, and no salary increases were given to village employees this year.

A question raised during the public comment portion of the meeting shed light on a contractual water agreement with the Dwight Correctional Center. Earlier actions by the village were intended to raise water rates for all large-volume users. However, unlike other large-volume water users, the village has a contractual agreement with DCC regarding water rates.

"They have challenged us because (the village) did not include raising all users' rates. Our position was that it included all rates in that class," explained Village Attorney Gary Neville. "But the language of the agreement says 'all users,' and we will probably have to go along with their interpretation.'

The annual Tax Levy Ordinance was passed, accepting the 2009-10 fiscal year budgeted numbers with the board also approving a \$1,275,000 Public Service Complex Abatement Ordinance: \$3,500.000 Waterworks Abatement Ordinance; and a \$1,000,000 Waupansie Street Abatement Ordinance. The ordinances are required for abating the tax levied for the year 2009.

Dwight High School Approves Tax Levy Increase DTHS Ranked 44th in State

A tax levy increase of 4.98 percent was approved by the Dwight Township High School Board of Education when it met in regular session on December 14.

The levy, as proposed by Superintendent Dale Adams last month, is based on an estimated EAV of \$118,000,000. The levy will result in an estimated total tax rate of \$2.9229 and generate \$3,449,000.

With a healthy financial picture for the DTHS District, reducing the levy was discussed. However, the uncertainty of state revenues is a factor causing financial issues among school districts across the state. In his budget projections, Superintendent Adams reduced state revenues for 2010 -11 and 2011-12 by ten percent each of these two years. Most board members felt it is best to stay "ahead of the curve" and the recommendation for a 4.98 percent increase passed by a five to one vote with board member Amy Hansen casting the lone "no" vote.

In other business, phase two of the roof replacement project received much focus during the meeting. The project, which includes replacing a portion of the existing flat roof, a cafeteria expansion, the addition of a small classroom and enclosing the back entry, will operate under tight timeline in order to complete before school resumes next fall. Present at the meeting were BLDD engineers hammering out details with the board in order to get the project, estimated at over \$1 million, out for bid by early January.

A decision last month to hold money from the final payment to PSI for completion of last summer's phase one of the roof replacement project was reversed. The

board had agreed to hold back money after discovering two reoccurring leaks in the new roof. However, at the recommendation of the architect and after review of the warranty coverage, the board agreed to pay the remaining \$58,844.01 balance. Board President Irv Masching opposed the move to make the final payment before there was assurance that all problems had been resolved.

The many improvement projects at the school coupled with added responsibilities by the building and maintenance staff prompted the board to approve a request for the addition of an Assistant Building and Grounds person. Seven applications were received with Jack Connor being awarded the position. Connor will move up from the district's custodial staff to the new assignment and the open custodial position will be filled.

Principal Bob Richardson presented information regarding the distinction recently received by DTHS when the school was ranked 44th in the state on the Chicago Sun-Times annual list of top 100 Illinois High Schools. There are 629 high schools in Illinois. DTHS was the only school in Livingston County that made the top 100 list.

The ranking is based on 11th grade State assessment results. Richardson's report to the board stated "this was made possible by the work of parents, students and educators doing what they do to the best of their ability."

"This award is for the community of Dwight and what we do here," said Richardson.

A new course proposal brought to the board by Principal Richardson on behalf of the Curriculum Advisory Committee received approval. Energy, Power and Transportation Technology will be offered to students as a one semester elective course. The course will provide a comprehensive study of the basic elements of energy, power and transportation and how they affect the world we live in. One aspect of the course will include understanding renewable wind energy technology. Other curriculum items were discussed including the continued focus on reading improvement needs.

Other employment recommendations were received and approved by the board.

English teacher, Christie Jones, was granted a Family Medical Leave which will begin February 16 with an expected return mid-May.

Two co-curricular employment proposals were given a thumbs-up by the board.

Korey Rodrick will step in as assistant wrestling coach. Rodrick was a fouryear wrestler at DTHS and has completed the ASEP course for coaches.

PE teacher Julie Jensen will take on the role of assistant softball coach with the understanding there will be enough girls to field both a varsity and junior varsity team. Currently, 12 girls have expressed interest for each team.

The board also:

• approved a wind farm resolution Authorizing the Streator Area Enterprise Zone Property Tax Abatement.

• discussed the possibility and potential advantages of moving to a geothermal energy system.

• learned a student teacher will be at DTHS from March 8 through May 6. The first half of the student teacher's semester-long assignment will be spent at DGS.

The next regular session of the DTHS Board of Education will be Monday, January 18, at 7 p.m. in the DTHS Board Room.







FINANCIAL FOCUS Put Unused Vacation Days to Work in Your 401 (k)

Now that the year is almost over, you may want to explore some last-minute steps you can take to potentially boost your financial fortunes and improve your tax returns for 2010. And one good place to look is your 401(k).

Your 401(k) is a great retirement savings vehicle. You typically fund your plan with pretax dollars, so the more you put in, the lower your taxable income. Plus, your earnings can grow on a tax-deferred basis, which means your money can grow faster than if it were placed in an investment on which you paid taxes every year. Also, you can spread your 401(k) dollars among a range of investments to match your risk tolerance, time horizon and retirement goals. Clearly, then, it would be nice to "max out" on your plan each year. But during difficult economic times, it may not be easy for you to defer more of your salary into your 401(k).

Fortunately, there may be a way in which you can boost your 401(k) contributions - without cutting into your takehome pay.

Now, however, the Obama administration has asked the U.S. Department of the Treasury and the IRS to issue new rulings on the topic in the hope of getting more people to increase their retirement savings. And this is an important goal, because many of us still need to put away much more money on a regular basis if we're going to enjoy the type of retirement lifestyle we've envisioned.

The ability to convert vacation or sick time to your 401(k), 403(b) or 457(b) plan can help you make progress toward that lifestyle. While the conversion feature won't enable you to exceed the contribution limit for your plan ---which for 2009 is \$16,500, or \$22,000 if you're 50 or older — it may make it easier for you to beef up your contributions for this year, particularly if you have unused vacation or sick time you can't carry over.

Not all employers are willing or able to turn vacation or sick hours into retirement plan contributions, so check with your human resources or benefits office to see if you can make this move. If it is allowed, though, consider taking action. Once you know how many retirement plan dollars can result from your unused vacation or sick days, go over your 401(k) or other plan, perhaps with the help of your financial advisor, to determine an appropriate allocation of your money. For example, you may have accounts within your plan that are currently under-funded. Or you might benefit from "rebalancing" your plan by adding some new money into different accounts. Keep in mind, however, that diversification does not guarantee a profit or protect against loss.

In any case, consider this opportunity to add to your retirement plan. The more you save today, the brighter your outlook could be for tomorrow goals.

The St. Peter's food pantry works in conjunction with the monthly food distribution at the Gothic Church, Punt said, as food is shared and families attending the Wednesday food distributions are often referred to St. Peter's as a more consistent source.

(continued from page 1) He said the consolidation of large insurance companies has also put pressure on agencies to not only maintain their business but to grow.

Hooker said that around the time he became an agent, in the late 1960s and early 1970s, Dwight was experiencing some economic growth, but many businesses have gone under since then.

"It works the same with insurance," Hooker said. Although he said he has enough business, "Less business (in the area) hurts me, because we need more people coming in."

Another major change in the industry, Hooker said, is the automation that has allowed less people to do more work in a shorter amount of time. In the past, he said, insurance agents only had time to finish a few quotes per day; but since the advent of e-mail, Hooker can quote many policies a day over the computer.

"We're able to do things quicker now," he said.

He said automation has also helped to lower his costs, such as money saved on postage by sending emails.

"When I started, postage was three cents," he said.

Hooker said a downfall of the electronic age is that more people are going online for insurance quotes and to conduct their business rather than talking with a local insurance agent in person.

The Hooker Agency conducts business in about a 25mile radius of Dwight, covering *The Paper*'s circulation area, and offers a full line of insurance services, including auto, home, farm, life, health, annuities, financial products, crop, RV and boat insurance. Hooker works with several major insurance companies as well as a few specialty companies.
