Clausen's Lincoln Takes Her to Italy

After becoming an instant sensation in Illinois, Dwight artist Cathee Clausen's rendition of Abraham Lincoln has leapt across the pond and made a splash in Europe.

Clausen and her husband, Mark, traveled to Italy between November 13 and November 18 to participate in an exhibition honoring Lincoln at the University of Milan. Three of her paintings were displayed, among other artwork designed to honor the 200th anniversary of Lincoln's birth, at a seminar called "Between History and Myth: Politics and Political Uses of Abraham Lincoln."

'We feel like Lincoln is ours and maybe limited to the U.S., and he's so special here in Illinois, but it's wonderful to know that he's important to people in other countries," Clausen said. "They're creating artwork about Lincoln and studying Lincoln."

Professor Marco Sioli invited Clausen and eight other artists including a video artist. Clausen's work included her trademark Lincoln, a full-body Lincoln and a painting blending Lincoln and President Barack Obama's faces.

On November 15, Clausen took part in the opening of the Lincoln exhibition at the Triennale Bovisa, which is similar to The Chicago Museum of Contemporary Art, she said. She was a member of a three-person panel who spoke about the process and the reason for painting Lincoln.

The following day, several discussions took place on topics such as Lincoln and the Civil War, Lincoln and the American Indian perspective, and Team of Rivals: Barack Obama and the political invocation of Abraham Lincoln.

"People were genuine and warm and eager to participate," she said. "The room was quite crowded. Every seat was taken. It was just so fantastic to see the interest and participate at both the exhibition and seminar."

It was so well received that Clausen expects the

exhibition to eventually tour the United States and may appear in such cities as Chicago; Jacksonville, Florida; and Nashville.

"It was tremendous to see how the people of Milan really embraced his memory," Clausen said. "They really had a straightforward reveal of Lincoln. It wasn't just textbook material. It really dealt with issues that aren't always pleasant to look at with Lincoln."

Sacred Heart Church, Kinsman, Preparing for Fix-ups

Sacred Heart Church in Kinsman is preparing for a facelift – or the application of some anti-aging cream, at least.

Start Planning Now to Cope with Estate Taxes Throughout your life, you strive to provide financial security to your family. And your efforts can extend beyond your lifetime — if you work to control estate taxes.

It's always challenging to create financial strategies that are somewhat dependent on tax laws, because these laws are always changing. In 2009, your estate could have passed up to \$3.5 million to your heirs before incurring federal estate taxes at a maximum rate of 45 percent. In 2010, the estate tax was scheduled to be repealed, but in 2011, it was supposed to return, with a maximum exemption of \$1 million and a top rate of 55 percent. But this may change, as Congress is considering extending the 2009 exemption and tax rate figures into 2010, 2011 and possibly even further.

You might think you'll never have enough wealth to incur these taxes, but virtually every asset — your home, cars, life insurance policy, IRA and 401(k) — may be included in your taxable estate. These assets could push your estate over the exemption amount, costing your heirs a substantial amount in estate taxes.

To help address this potential problem, you might want to think about some of the following estate considerations. For example, if you owned a \$1 million dollar life insurance policy, and it was subject to an estate tax rate of 45 percent, your beneficiaries would receive a death benefit of just \$550,000. But if you established an irrevocable life insurance trust (ILIT) with a new insurance policy, the trust would own the policy and distribute the proceeds to the beneficiaries you've chosen. By using an ILIT, you'd keep the life insurance out of your taxable estate.

Another estate planning consideration is a charitable remainder trust, which might be useful if you have a sizable amount of assets, such as stocks, that have significantly appreciated since you bought them. If you kept these assets in your estate, your heirs would inherit them on a "stepped-up" basis, which, in plain English, means the value of the stocks would be the same as their fair market value on the date of your death. (However, in 2010 — and 2010 only — the step-up basis is limited to \$1.3 million for your children or other heirs and \$3 million for your surviving spouse. Beyond those figures, your heirs would assume, or carry over, your basis — the amount you paid for the assets. In 2011, full step-up is scheduled to return.)

All stocks, and especially those that receive step-up treatment, could add to your heirs' estate tax burden. But you could remove the stocks from your taxable estate by placing them in a charitable remainder trust. Furthermore, you could receive an income stream for life once the trust sold the stocks. You could then use this income to make gifts to your loved ones, further reducing the size of your taxable estate. You can give up to \$13,000 per year to as many individuals as you like without incurring gift taxes, up to \$1 million over your lifetime.

Before making any decisions related to estate taxes, consult with your estate planning professional and your tax advisor. Vehicles such as life insurance trusts and charitable trusts are complex and don't lend themselves to "do-it-yourself" solutions.

Ideally, the building will look exactly as it does now once the project is done, Father Hornicak said.

"The idea is that once we make the repairs, the building will last for at least another 100 years," he said. "It's a beautiful church, and we'd like to maintain it and use it for as long as possible."

Church services will continue throughout the work, which could wrap up by the end of 2010.



That year, midnight came and went without any notice at all. Bret and I were too busy finding the right lids for the Tupperware containers that held all the party leftovers. And our little people were honked off because they'd been treated so shabbily all in the name of some good adults-only fun.

We've finally stopped trying so hard to recapture our youth and to get away from our kids on New Year's Eve. I've got a sneaky suspicion that it won't be long before they'll prefer to leave the two of us at home with a bag of chips and Dick Clark, so they can take part in revelry of their own.

And I bet we'll be able to stay up until midnight, and even later, at least until we know they've landed somewhere safe.
