Dwight Considers Impact Fee Suspension

A possible moratorium on impact fees was discussed at the April 26 meeting of the Village of Dwight Board of Trustees. With village growth stagnant, Mayor Bill Wilkey recommended a one-year rescind on imposed impact fees.

In 2006, Dwight followed the lead of other area communities and elected to place impact fees on residential developers and builders. As communities grow, the cost and demand for infrastructure naturally increases. The main purpose of impact fees is to protect against the effect development and growth have on supporting facilities within the community without putting more burden on the general taxpayer. The vast majority of impact fee monies are directed to the local school districts.

How to implement a temporary suspension, and whether impact fees should be stopped altogether, are now the questions at hand.

Trustee Jerry Curtis indicated that to start, then stop, then restart the impact fee process did not seem fair to those caught in the middle.

It is not a fair way to do it, said Curtis. Either you have (impact fees) or you don't.

Trustee Jared Anderson indicated that he believes a

Renovation Turns Former Campus School into Apartments

An architectural gem has been saved and is now renovated into one of the finest apartment houses in the area.

It is the former Sacred Heart convent house in Campus, built in 1898 as a school operated by the nuns from the church across the street. The church is still there, but the school was discontinued several decades

ago. The building became a rooming house in the early 1980s and had been abandoned for about 20 years since then.

David White and Kerin Larson of Odell would often pass the old building, with its broken windows, crumbling staircase and deteriorating exterior. They felt it was a shame that such a beautiful old building was decaying and eventually would be

headed for the wrecking ball. They decided to do something about it.

They bought the building in early 2008 and have been working to restore it ever since. The four floors of the building have been remodeled into six expansive apartments.

The first and second floors have two apartments each, with several bedrooms. (continued on page 12)

Volunteer Weather Observers Needed in Area Counties

Weather in northern Illinois can vary greatly, and a volunteer weather program is looking for weather observers to measure precipitation from their own backyards across Livingston, Kankakee and surrounding counties.
The requirements for participation are an enthusiasm for watching and reporting weather conditions and a desire to learn more about how the weather can affect and impact our lives. In addition, observers are required to purchase and use the CoCoRaHS standard four-inch diameter rain gauge to measure precipitation. There is a cost for the rain gauge. Internet access is required to enter the reports.
High-quality observations made by CoCoRaHS volunteers are used by a wide variety of organizations and individuals, including the National Weather Service (NWS), other meteorologists, hydrologists, emergency managers, city utilities (for issues related to water supply, conservation and stormwater), insurance adjusters, U.S. Department of Agriculture, engineers, mosquito-control specialists, farmers, outdoor and recreational interests, teachers, students and neighbors in the community.
Information and training sessions for anyone interested in participating in this program will be held in both Kankakee and Livingston counties. The Kankakee County session will be Wednesday, May 12, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at University of Illinois Extension, Kankakee County, 1650 Commerce Dr., Bourbonnais. To register for this session, contact the Kankakee County Extension office at 815-933-8337. There is no charge to attend.
The Livingston County session will be Thursday, September 9, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. at the Livingston County Extension Office, 1412 S. Locust, Pontiac. To register for this session, call the office at 815-842-1776.

(continued from page 1) determine the school districts' position on the matter. Mayor Wilkey informed the board that five area landowners have petitioned to allow Iberdrola to place windfarm windmills on their property. The properties in question are to the south of the village and lie within a one and one-half mile radius of village boundaries. No more details were available.

The board was informed that Dwight Police have filed a petition to become unionized. A letter was received by the village from the Illinois Department of Labor Relations serving as notice of the intention. No further information is available at this time.

Village Administrator Kevin McNamara commented that the village of Dwight had an 81 percent return rate of U.S. Census Forms. Approximately 300 residential locations did not have forms returned. Census takers have begun door-to-door census verifications of homes that did not comply with returning the forms.

Police Chief Tim Henson reported that burglaries to vehicles within the village

continue to be an issue. Six recent arrests were connected to one incident. Chief Henson asked for village residents help and cooperation by securing possessions, locking vehicles and reporting unusual behaviors.

Following public comment, several concerns were sent to the Properties Committee for review. One concern, presented by village resident Tom Tock, was in regard to debris being dumped along Gooseberry Creek.

There is no reason, after all of these years, to treat Gooseberry Creek like a pain, said Tock. We treat it like the village dump.

Tock presented pictures of areas where concrete and other debris has been abandoned by the village. He contends that the debris was placed along the creek to prevent erosion but suggested that there are proper and more visually appealing ways to prevent erosion and grade a creek bank. Tock

also presented information to the board indicating that the neglect of Gooseberry Creek was reviewed 10 years ago and that, at that time, grants were available to help address the situation, but no action was taken. A plan to develop the creek has been established, with the current Rotary Park/Pinecone path as part of that plan. The matter was sent to the May 5 meeting of the Properties Committee for review.

The board also:

¥ approved a permit for solicitation for Team Taylor/Relay for Life allowing the collection of donations at the intersections of routes 17 and 47 on June 11 and 12.

¥ approved a permit for solicitation for Dwight Lions Club allowing the club's annual door-to-door broom sale fund-raiser on Saturday, May 22, from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and Wednesday, May 26, from 4

to 6 p.m.

¥ passed a proclamation designating the week of May 16-22 as Emergency Medical Services Week and encouraged the residents of Dwight to visit the Dwight EMS at its open house.

¥ sent a concern from the property owner at 100 E. Waupansie regarding tap-on fees to the Utilities Committee.

¥ sent a West Delaware Street resident's concern regarding a drainage issue and another resident's request for a culvert to the properties committee for review.

¥ learned that plans are expected to be submitted soon to IDOT regarding the traffic control signal and intersection design on Route 47 at the entrance to the proposed Love's Travel Stop Plaza.

The next meeting of the Dwight Village Board of Trustees will be Monday, May 10, at 6 p.m. in the Public Services Complex.

¥ Make a charitable gift in Mom's name. Your mother probably supports many worthy causes — and a financial gift to any one of them, in her name, would probably please her greatly. Furthermore, your generosity may provide you with an immediate tax deduction, assuming the group to which you donate meets the tax deductibility guidelines established by the IRS. In fact, if you donated an appreciated asset, such as a stock, you could possibly get two tax breaks: a deduction on this year's taxes and the avoidance of capital gains taxes that will result from the eventual sale of an asset. Before donating this type of asset, though, consult with your tax advisor.

¥ Provide Mom with some financial education. If your mother doesn't know much about investing, you might get her a book on the topic. Or, better yet, if you have a financial advisor whom you trust, introduce him or her to your mother. Once your mother enters her pre-retirement and retirement years, she may have many issues — such as cash flow management, estate planning and investing to stay ahead of inflation — for which she could use the help of a financial professional.

Mother's Day comes and goes in a day — but by making the right type of financial gift to your mother, your generosity can be felt for years to come.

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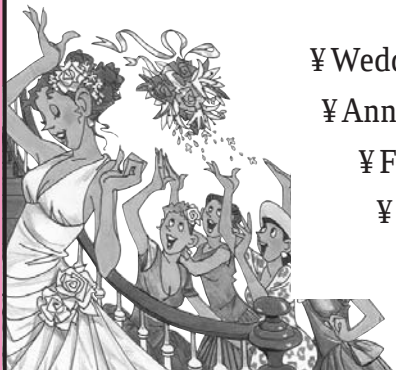

The Complete Count Committee asks that residents cooperate if they receive a visit from a census taker or if they see a census taker in their neighborhood.

The Census is a count of everyone living in the United States and is mandated by the U.S. Constitution to occur every 10 years. For more information

The unique design of the building provides a very nice alcove in the front corners, with three windows in each one. All the windows in the building are very large, with sills big enough to seat two people.
White said it wasn't just his love of architecture and his desire to save a beautiful historic building that motivated him. It also was his

faith.
We own it, but we still consider it a part of the church, he said. We are using it for what the church converted it to, apartments. When work is complete, he plans to have the priest from Sacred Heart dedicate and bless the building.
And, White added, he made sure the cross on top of the building was restored.
White, a 1996 graduate of Herscher High School, financed the project himself, mortgaging his house to pay the bills. Enter water by stepping or jumping from the side; exit water safely using ladder or side; submerge entire head; blow bubbles submerging head in a rhythmic pattern (bobbing); open eyes underwater; pick up a submerged object in shallow water; float on front and back; perform front and back glide; change direction of travel paddling on front or back; roll over from front to back, back to front; tread water using arm and leg motions (chest-deep water); swim on front, back, and side using combined arm and leg actions; move in the water while wearing a life jacket.

-Level Three-

Stroke Development

Jump into deep water from the side; dive from kneeling or standing position; submerge and retrieve an object in chest deep water; bob with the head fully submerged; rotary breathing in horizontal position; perform front and back glide using two different kicks; float on front and back in deep water; change from horizontal to vertical position on front and back; tread water using hand and leg movements; perform front and back crawl; butterfly-kick and body motion; perform the HELP and Huddle position.

-Level Four-

Stroke Improvement

Perform a dive from a standing or stride position; swim underwater; perform feet-first surface dive; perform open turns on front and back; tread water using sculling arm motions and with different kicks; swim on side using scissors-like kick; perform compact jump into water from a height while wearing of a life jacket; perform the following: front and back crawl, breaststroke, butterfly and elementary backstroke.

-Level Five-

Stroke Refinement

Perform the following: standing dive; shallow dive, glide two body lengths and begin any front stroke; tuck surface dive; pike surface dive; front flip turn; backstroke flip turn; front and back crawl; butterfly; breaststroke; elementary backstroke and sidestroke. Tread water with two different kicks and learn survival swimming.
