The Lions Club International Foundation made \$10,000 in aid money available to the victims of the Streator and Dwight tornadoes of June 5. The grant money was evenly split between Streator and Dwight, and the local Lions Clubs administered the distribution of pre-paid gift cards to affected citizens.

In Dwight, the local Lions Club members solicited lists of victims from village officials, local churches and word of mouth from the victims themselves. The Lions Club International Foundation has a long-standing tradition of helping people who have been affected by disasters. The foundation donated \$5.1 million in the wake of Hurricane Katrina and has donated to other disaster relief efforts worldwide.

Bank of Dwight to Become Bank of Pontiac Branch Office

Bank of Dwight President Bob McNamara and Bank of Pontiac President and CEO Bill Kauffman have announced that Bank of Dwight will soon become a branch office of Bank of Pontiac.

Bank of Dwight became a member of Pontiac Bancorp, Inc. in 1997; the two banks have worked together since that time. Making Bank of Dwight a Bank of Pontiac branch is "something that's been reviewed and on the drawing board for a while," Kauffman said.

The new relationship will allow the Dwight bank to provide a wider range of services and opportunities. Kauffman explained that the new status will allow for larger loans, more trust services and the expansion of fixed rate home loans, just to

name a few. In addition, Dwight patrons will be able to conduct their financial transactions at either of Bank of Pontiac's two Pontiac locations, its Odell location or any of its six ATM locations.

Kauffman said the arrangement will also allow the banks to save money on regulatory and other fees.

Bank of Dwight will lose its name, but Kauffman said "'Dwight bank' will still be prominent in the name in some way, shape or form." He noted that although Odell Bank is also a branch of Bank of Pontiac, "they certainly have been able to maintain their identity."

But because it will no longer operate under the same charter, Bank of Dwight will lose its "established in 1855" status. Currently, it is the oldest

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Camp Noah Helps Kids Cope with Emotions After Tornado

"What's the weather like right now? It looks like it's going to storm? How do you feel about that?"

These are some of the questions Rev. David Miller asked the approximately 20 children who were gathered Wednesday morning, June 23, at St. Patrick's Parish Hall, Dwight, to take part in Camp Noah. The weeklong day camp was being held to help children who were affected by the June 5 tornadoes in Dwight and the surrounding area.

"Camp Noah, a program supported by Lutheran Disaster Response, is designed to help children process their feelings and fears following a disaster and allow children an emotional break from recovery through play and recreation," according to the Lutheran Disaster Response website. The ecumenical program was administered June 21 through 25 in

Dwight by 18 teen and adult volunteers from St. Timothy Lutheran Church of Naperville.

Although Camp Noah is geared toward first- through sixth-graders, the children also included one kindergarten and one eighth-grader as of last Wednesday, and participation was growing each day. Most children were from the Dwight area, although children affected by the Streator tornado were also being invited to attend.

Susie Merrihew, a social worker who serves as Camp Noah's mental health professional, said the children who attended the camp included "kids who have relatives who have had their places destroyed, or former places that they lived - so you've got direct victimization, and then you've got the secondary piece of it, where your whole community was affected - where they lost something specifically or they knew someone (who lost something)." She said

that just hearing about the tornado caused many children to have heightened fears about storms and that the camp helps give them the tools they need to work through those fears. Pastor Miller added that new traumas, such as the tornado, often stir up feelings of traumas children experienced earlier in life. The camp gave kids the freedom to talk about whatever was bothering them - not just storms.

Activities each day started with a "large group meeting that might involve songs, sharing of what they learned the day before, and there might be questions about their feelings about what happened to them or what they've seen happen to others," Miller said. "That normally flows into a skit, and we use the Noah story about storms and floods and things that hurt and frighten us, but in a very lighthearted way, to talk about being prepared (and) to talk about God's

Kempton Man Shot by Police Behind Burning Home

District 21 Illinois State Police said they were contacted at 1:09 a.m. on June 19 to respond with and assist the Ford County Sheriff's Department with a report of a "domestic" situation in Kempton. It was reported to the state police that the female at the residence had been injured by her boyfriend, Travis Gash, 29, and that there possibly were three children in the house.

According to a state police press release, "Upon arrival at the residence, 311 E. Main St., Kempton, officers observed flames at the front door of the home and called the fire department. Officers observed Gash inside the burning residence. An officer attempted entry into the residence, at which time Gash began advancing on officers with a knife in his hand, forcing them out into the backyard. A trooper fired his weapon, striking Gash three times. Medical assistance was rendered and Gash

was transported to St. Mary's Hospital in Kankakee."

Police added, "All occupants of the residence, including the three children, are safe and were out of the residence prior to the fire."

As of June 24, District 21 reported, "Gash is currently receiving medical care for his gunshot wounds at St. Mary's Hospital in stable condition."

Agencies involved in the incident include District 21 Illinois State Police, the Ford County Sheriff's Department, Cullom Fire, Illinois State Fire Marshal, Secretary of State Police, Kempton Fire, Cabery Fire, Saunemin Fire, Emington-Campus Fire, Pontiac Fire and Dwight EMS.

Possible charges against Gash are pending as a fire and criminal investigation continues. The public is reminded that criminal defendants are presumed innocent until the government is able to prove its charges in court beyond a reasonable doubt.

Man Injured in Dwight Tornado Dies

Frank Schoiber, 69, of Dwight, died June 20 at Heritage Manor Nursing Home in Dwight, where he had been a resident since June 17, according to Livingston County Coroner Michael P. Burke.

Schoiber was injured on June 5 in the tornado that struck Dwight.

His death is being investigated by the Livingston County Coroner's Office to determine if his injuries were instrumental in his death.

Slown's Death Determined Accidental

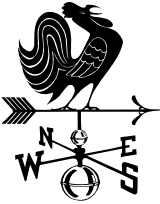

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Bar and Grill to Open in Former JAMS Location

A new, family-friendly bar and grill will soon open in the former JAMS building on East Chippewa Street in downtown Dwight.

The new owner, Dwight resident Bob Storm, said the new name will be Booben's Bar and Grill in honor of the nickname he was given by family members. He is currently cleaning and renovating the building's interior.

"When that was last open, it was with smoking," Storm explained. He added, "The main thing right now is getting it cleaned up." When the new bar and grill opens, he said, "It will definitely be no-smoking."

Another improvement includes "lightening it up" – Storm said the building previously had a dark wood interior. The bar itself will be moved to "make it kind of like a big V," Storm said. The furnace system is being repaired to provide better heating and cooling, the security system is getting upgrades and the kitchen is being enlarged, with new equipment added.

Storm said he plans to serve traditional bar and grill fare such as burgers and pizza, as well as some more unique foods.

"I want it to be a place where you can bring your family and have a nice meal," he said.

He also plans to host a variety of entertainment and is currently redoing the stage. He hopes to include special lighting and other equipment in the stage area.

Booben's will also feature flatscreen TVs and a large projection TV, pool tables and legal gambling machines if the Village of Dwight approves.

"I just want to have a nice place that people can go in and enjoy themselves – a nice place to relax and have a good meal," Storm said.

He said his five-year-old daughter is already enjoying it, riding her three-wheeler around in the current open space.

Storm said he has been in management at a chemical plant for 27 years and plans to continue working his day job.

He's shooting for Saturday, August 28, for the grand opening of Booben's Bar and Grill.

care for their family and for them.” He added, “It gives them space to feel their feelings, name their feelings and begin to process that.”

The children then broke up into smaller groups each day based on age for activities such as crafts and story-time. Merrihew said the goal was for the children to have “resiliency by the end of the week.”

Abby Tyler of Dwight, who will enter fifth grade this fall, participated in Camp Noah.

“I’m having a lot of fun,” she said. “We get to play a lot of games.” In addition to learning about the type of wood that was used to make Noah’s ark, Abby said, “If we get mad, we learned a move that will help us go to our ‘happy place.’”

Learning how to visit her own ‘happy place’ was also a favorite activity mentioned by fellow fifth-grader Kirsten Oelschlager.

And Brooke Bossert, who will soon enter sixth grade at Dwight Grade School, said, “We learned how to respect other people more and (respect) their feelings. We

learned that everybody’s different, but they’re still special, and we learned that everybody can be friends.”

Mike Mittlestadt, team leader of Camp Noah, explained that the camp “was developed by Lutheran Social Services in Minnesota. They started the program in 1997 in response to flooding in the Red River Valley.” Five years ago, when hurricanes Katrina and Rita struck the Gulf Coast, Camp Noah expanded into a national program, Mittlestadt said. In June 2006, volunteers from St. Timothy Lutheran became the first national volunteer team, helping Hurricane Rita victims in Lake Charles, La.

“Because it was such a positive experience for us, we’ve always wanted to do another one,” Mittlestadt said.

The volunteer group from St. Timothy found out about the Dwight tornado through Merrihew, whose sister is Tracy Karstens of Dwight. The volunteers had planned to host Camp Noah in Wisconsin this week, but when that fell through, they decided June 16 to come to Dwight. That only left a few

days to organize and spread the word, but “with Tracy putting her good name behind us, it allowed us to get the kids in here,” Mittlestadt said.

Pastor Miller said the Dwight churches also played a big role, along with the entire community.

“There’s been a lot of community involvement,” Miller said. “It’s one of the strengths of a lot of smaller communities...because it’s hard to get three or four steps removed from the situation. You know people who were in the trailer park; you know people who were affected; you know people who were in one way or another traumatized or felt the emotions and had the damage.”

Dwight pastors also helped with the effort to get people involved with the Camp, and churches in Dwight, Pontiac and Flanagan provided snacks for the campers.

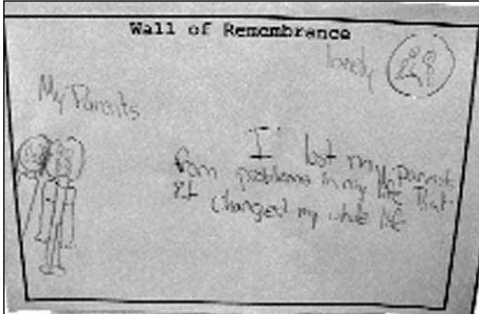
“This is a very life-giving, life-enhancing ministry,” Pastor Miller said. He added, “We understand our call from God to be part of that life-giving work of God in the world.”

under its original name.

Other than the name change and new offerings, Bank of Dwight patrons shouldn’t see a big change in the bank.

“We’re not looking to make any personnel changes,” Kauffman said, and “We hope that we can do nothing but increase the

things that (Bank of Dwight is) able to do.”

The change is currently awaiting approval by the State of Illinois, the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago and the FDIC, Kauffman said. Bank of Dwight is expected to officially become a Bank of Pontiac branch in August.

Gov. Quinn Requests Federal Help

Governor Pat Quinn asked President Obama on June 18 to declare Kankakee, LaSalle, Livingston, Peoria and Putnam counties major disaster areas. If approved, a federal disaster declaration would help people and businesses affected by the June 5 tornadoes recover from the storm’s aftermath by allowing them to apply for federal grants and loans to assist with storm-related losses.

Damage assessment teams from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA), the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) and local officials documented the extent of damage in all five counties.

Governor Quinn’s request for federal assistance is based on the results of those assessments, which determined that 62 homes were destroyed by the storm and 42 suffered major damage. Nearly 160 additional homes were damaged to a lesser extent.

If granted, the federal disaster declaration would make assistance available, including grants to individuals and households to help with temporary housing, home repairs or replacement and other disaster-related expenses, as well as low-interest SBA loans to residents and businesses.

Governor Quinn previously declared all five counties state disaster areas to ensure affected communities received needed state assistance to

recover from the storms. The State of Illinois has been assisting with debris removal in several of the affected communities for the past two weeks.

Several trucks and other pieces of heavy equipment from the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) helped with clean-up efforts in Streator and Dwight. In addition, inmate crews from the Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC) assisted with the debris removal.

Airman Howard of Saunemin Providing Nuclear Security

MALMSTROM AIR FORCE BASE, Mont. – They call this part of Montana “Big Sky country,” with rolling plains, few trees and lots of, well, sky. It’s also where the son of a Saunemin couple calls home, with a job of protecting the U.S. in an area slightly larger than the state of Maryland.

Air Force Airman Matthew J. Howard, son of John and Deborah Howard of Saunemin, is a security forces specialist at this intercontinental ballistic missile base, one of only three remaining in the U.S. The 341st Missile Wing is

one of the largest units in the Air Force, with 150 Minuteman III missiles spread out over 13,800 square miles within 15 missile alert facilities, and more than 4,000 military and civilians, making it the largest complex of its kind in the western hemisphere.

Howard is assigned to the 341st Security Forces Squadron.

“For the past few weeks I have been in the classroom learning about my job and what happens here on a day-to-day basis,” said Howard, who is a 2009 graduate of Pontiac Township High School.

To support such a large operation requires help from just about every corner of the Air Force career specialties. Everything from admin to chefs, missile crewmen, missile alert officers, security forces, helicopter pilots and maintenance, communications, services, medical and dental – it all adds up to one of the biggest support operations in the military.

“The importance of our mission is to provide nuclear security for all of

the nuclear weapons around the base. If security forces weren’t here, the nuclear weapons could end up in the wrong hands,” said Howard.

For Howard and other airmen stationed there, Montana is either one of the best places to be stationed or one of the worst. Montana can be a haven for the outdoorsman and traveler, with major national parks like Glacier and Yellowstone just a few hours away. For others, being in an out-of-the way place like Malmstrom, with no major metropolis or urban centers nearby, can make a tour seem isolated.

“Montana is a big state with a lot of mountains and a lot of sights to see,” said Howard. “There is a lot of outdoor stuff like hunting, skiing and boating to do. For right now, it is still cold outside, so I just go to work and then to the gym.”

Howard has been in the Air Force for seven months, and besides Malmstrom, has only been to basic military training and technical school in Texas.

Randall Slown Memorial Camp Scholarship Fund Established

Saunemin Grade School athletic director and boys basketball coach Mike Stoecklin announced last week that following the passing of one of his former players, Randall Slown, a memorial camp scholarship fund will be established in Randall’s name, utilizing memorial funds that had been provided in his name, along with funding from two other events that he enjoyed.

“Randall had become an important part of our everyday life following his departure from SGS and into Pontiac High School,” Stoecklin said. “He enjoyed the game of basketball, playing four years here and then two more at PTHS. He also enjoyed working with our kids this past year during our season. One of his most enjoyable experiences each summer was going to the Illinois Wesleyan University Day Camp which is held each year in June. So with that in mind, it is both with a heavy heart and much happiness to announce that we are creating the Randall Slown Memorial Camp Scholarship Fund, that we will use to send campers to the IWU camp each summer.”

The decision to utilize memorial funds made in Randall’s honor was made following a discussion with his parents about how the funds could be used.

“Randall’s parents are very pleased with what we are doing, knowing their son would appreciate being able to give other youngsters similar opportunities that were given to him,” said Stoecklin.

Along with the memorials, plans are to match those funds through the local summer basketball camps and through the I-55 Junior High Shootouts which bring schools from

across the state to the IWU campus each year, giving them the opportunity to play at one of the premier DIII university facilities in the nation.

“Randall not only participated in our camps but worked them following his departure from junior high,” Stoecklin said. “Along with the IWU camps, it was one of the highlights of his summer. He also had the opportunity to play twice at the Shirk Center while in junior high, leading our teams to wins each time. The last two years, he was able to help organize and work at the shootouts and enjoyed that time as well.”

Stoecklin said that the family and his coaching staff will continue the process of evaluating the program and determining its parameters.

The first camper to benefit from the memorials, which sparked the scholarship idea, is Tanner Walls of Pontiac, who grew close to Slown this past basketball season. 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Declare Your Own Financial Independence Day

The Fourth of July is almost upon us. To commemorate Independence Day, we shoot off fireworks, attend picnics and maybe even walk in parades. While it might not be as dramatic, another celebration of freedom should eventually play a big role in your life – specifically, your personal Financial Independence Day. And you can speed the arrival of this day by making the right moves.

Here are a few ideas to consider:

- Boost your 401(k) contributions. To build the resources you'll need to become financially independent during your retirement years, you should take full advantage of your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored plan. Whenever your salary goes up, try to contribute more to your 401(k). Generally, your contributions are made with pretax dollars, so the more you put in, the lower your taxable income. And your contributions grow on a tax-deferred basis. In 2010, you can put up to \$16,500 into your 401(k), or \$22,000 if you're 50 or older.
- Max out on your IRA. In 2010, you can contribute up to \$5,000 to your IRA, or \$6,000 if you're 50 or older. Your traditional IRA contributions may be deductible, depending on your income level, and your earnings can grow tax deferred. Contributions to a Roth IRA are never deductible, but earnings can grow tax free, provided you don't take withdrawals until you are 59½ and you've held your account at least five years.
- Build an emergency fund. Try to build an emergency fund containing six to 12 months' worth of living expenses, placed in a liquid account. Without such a fund, you may be forced to dip into your long-term investments to pay for needs such as a new furnace or a big doctor's bill – and the more you tap into your investments, the longer it will be until you can attain financial freedom.
- Cut down on your debt. It's easier said than done, but by reducing your debt load, you'll have more money to invest for the future. You might want to start by eliminating the smallest debts first, then moving on to whittle away at the bigger ones.
- Don't over-focus on your investment statements. Obviously, you want to know how your investments are performing. But you may be better off not checking on your investments every day, or even every week. When you pay extremely close attention to the movements of your investments, your emotions may lead you to make decisions based on short-term events rather than long-term goals. Invest with your head, not your heart.
- Avoid time traps. Many people know they need a certain amount of money at a certain time for a specific goal, such as a down payment on a home, the first college tuition payment or even the first year's living expenses during retirement. Yet they get into trouble because they set aside the money in an inappropriate investment – that is, one whose price can fluctuate greatly. If you know when you're going to need the money, put it in a lower-risk investment and avoid the time trap.

Taking these steps won't instantly enrich you. But eventually, they can lead you down the path to your personal Financial Independence Day – and that may be reason enough to celebrate.

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Clay Harbor Preparing for Training Camp, NFL Season

Dwight's Clay Harbor is a busy man as he prepares to join the Philadelphia Eagles on the field this football season.

Currently participating in the NFL Rookie Symposium in San Francisco, Calif., the six-foot-three, 252-pound 2005 Dwight Township High School graduate was chosen by the Philadelphia Eagles in the fourth round of the 2010 draft. Just a couple weeks ago, Harbor signed a four-year NFL contract.

"We just got done with mini camps and OTA" (organized training activities), Harbor said. "Basically it was just running experience, trying to get the rookies caught up with the veterans in terms of the offense." The players also studied films of previous seasons. "Everything was to help us make a difference in play as rookies."

Following the mini camps that ended June 17, he now has about a month to focus on weightlifting and conditioning and studying plays before the next big thing – Eagles training camp, which starts July 26 at Lehigh University in Pennsylvania.

Harbor said training camp will be a "huge time for the young guys" on the team.

"That's when position battles will take place and everybody finds out who's on the team," he said. "It's a pretty tough camp. We do a lot of full-speed, full-contact

drills." He said many NFL teams would rather save their players' legs, but the Eagles want to push their players to see their capabilities.

Harbor is up to the challenge.

"At first, the game might be a little fast, but I expect to go out there, make plays and show the coaches what I've got," he said. He is hoping to become the Eagles' number two tight end.

During training camp, the players will stay in college dorms.

"I don't know how some of those guys do it – some of them are pretty big!" Harbor laughed, referencing the small size of college dorm rooms.

Harbor might be more used to the dorms than some of his teammates – he is a 2010 graduate of Missouri State University. A three-time All America selection, he set a Missouri State record with 150 career catches for 1,906 yards and 10 touchdowns in his four-year career.

Already, Harbor is seeing the difference between college and professional football.

"It's a lot more competitive. The game's faster," he said. "In college, it wasn't your profession. Now the only thing important is football. It's still fun, but it's more business-like."

But Harbor is handling the adjustment well.

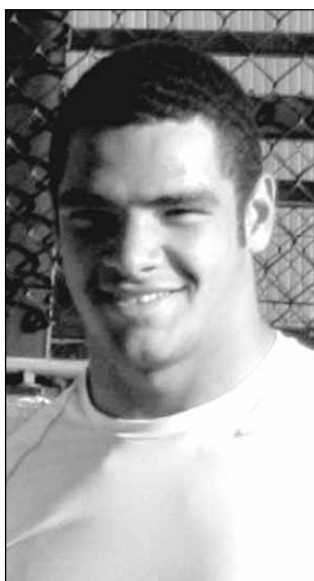
"We've got a close group of teammates there, so it's

made the transition easy for the rookies," he said. "All the other guys on the team are real cool and we all get along real well."

He said even though they may be vying for the same position on the team, the tight ends have a comradery, with even veterans offering Harbor rides to practices.

"There's such a competition, but nobody's really showing it," he said. "We're all Philadelphia Eagles."

The team's first game of the 2010 season will be Sunday, September 12, versus the Green Bay Packers.



Clay Harbor, Missouri State and Philadelphia Eagles

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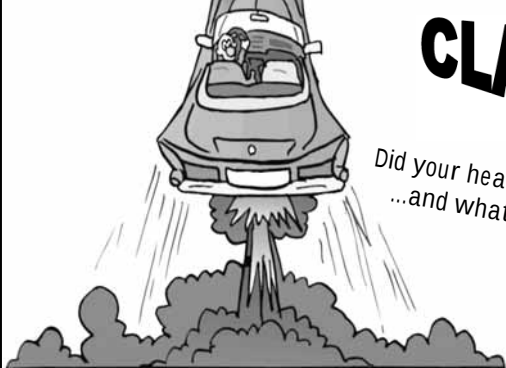

Source of Drinking Water

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pickup substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:
- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (800) 426-4791.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population.

Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. All regular Village Board Meetings are held on the 1st and 3rd Mondays of each month. Monday holidays, the meetings are held on the next day, (Tuesday).

To determine Mazon's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, the following document was reviewed: a Well Site Survey, published in 1990 by the Illinois EPA. Based on the information obtained in this document, there are 7 potential sources of groundwater contamination that could pose a hazard to groundwater utilized by Mazon's community water supply. They are all abandoned or improperly plugged wells. In addition, information provided by the Leaking Underground Storage Tank and Remedial Project Management Sections of the Illinois EPA indicated sites with on-going remediation that might be of concern. Based upon this information, the Illinois EPA has determined that the Mazon Community Water Supply's source water is susceptible to contamination. As such, the Illinois EPA has provided 5-year recharge area calculations for the wells. The land use within the recharge areas of the wells was analyzed as part of this susceptibility determination. This land use includes predominantly agricultural properties.

The Well was probably flushed and resampled. Test results for August and September all resulted no coliform or E. coli present. October sample indicated a presence of coliform and no E. coli. This Well was shut down and discharge line was closed. The well pump and pump discharge line was removed for inspection. Found iron and maganese build up in pump and line. These were replaced. Other sampled were taken and additional inspections found a broken well casing. A short section of PVC piping was threaded to the metal casing, this threaded area broke. The PVC pipe was replaced with metal casing. Sample were again taken and returned with good results. All samples taken since November 2009 have good results.

I always sample and submit all required water samples in a timely fashion, these should have been completed earlier. TheVillage Board and myself are always concerned about the quality of drinking water we provide people of Mazon. I am very proud of the quality of water I provide to the people of Mazon. I will never short cut or not do my best to over see the Water Operation of the Village. You, as residents of Mazon, can review the sample reports, call the Village Hall to set up a time.

August 11, registration will be held from 9 a.m. to noon for new students who were not enrolled in District #230, District #232, Odell Grade School, St. Paul, Ransom Grade School or Saunemin Grade School. State law requires new students to bring a copy of their birth certificate when registering.

Thursday, August 12, registration will be from 4 to 8 p.m. in the gymnasium for freshmen through seniors. Friday, August 13, students will register in the gymnasium at the following times:

Seniors, 9-10 a.m.; juniors, 10-11 a.m.; sophomores, 1-2 p.m.; freshmen, 2-3 p.m. Freshman Orientation will be held from 3 to 4 p.m.

Monday, August 16, registration will be held in the gymnasium for freshmen through seniors from 9 a.m. to noon.

All students must be registered at these times. Questions may be directed to the office at 815-584-6200.

Monday, August 23,

will be the first day of school for students. Classes will begin at 8:15 a.m. and dismiss at 3:10 p.m.

Students will be required to supply the following information on registration day:

Student's Social Security number, name of family health coverage plan - insurance company, parent's place of employment and telephone number, family physician and phone number, adult to contact in case of emergency (if parent cannot be reached).

State law requires students entering ninth grade and students new to the district (at any grade level) to present evidence that the dental and physical examinations and immunization requirements are met. Students entering ninth grade for the first time will be required to show evidence of having received two doses of the live measles virus vaccine. Students failing to present evidence of physical examinations and immu-

nizations will not be allowed to enter school until this requirement has been met. Dental and physical exam forms are available in the high school office.

Two school-approved combination locks are to be purchased by incoming freshmen. One is to be placed on the student's hall locker and the other on the physical education locker. The fee for the two locks is \$12.

Other student fees include:

Behind-the-wheel driver's education fee, \$10; textbook rental, \$28; year-round, 24-hour accident plan, \$60; football coverage, grades 9-12, \$125; activity fee (required of all students), \$15; participation fee (required of all students participating in athletics, cheerleading, band and flag corps), \$25; P.E. uniform, \$16; parking, \$5.

Fees are due at registration. Students may also be required to pay other fees for consumable work-

books or project fees for supplies and materials, depending upon courses for which they are enrolled.

Football insurance covers football players during a football game and practice only. School time insurance covers a student during school hours and at all athletic events and practices except football. School time accident insurance is available to all students at no cost. Twenty-four-hour coverage covers the student 24 hours a day, seven days a week for 12 months. This insurance also covers all athletic activities except football.

The school district does not receive any commission or derive any income from the student accident insurance program. The plan is made available at the prices listed above. The student accident insurance policy does have certain benefit limitations. The district suggests that parents retain this information for future reference.
