No FEMA Disaster Declaration;

Quinn Now Seeking SBA's Help

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has denied Governor Pat Quinn's request for a major disaster declaration in the State of Illinois.

Quinn asked President Obama on June 18 to declare Kankakee, LaSalle, Livingston, Peoria and Putnam counties major disaster areas, which would have helped people and businesses affected by the June 5 tornadoes recover from the storm's aftermath by allowing them to apply for federal grants and loans to assist with storm-related losses.

A response letter from FEMA Administrator W. Craig Eugene states, "Based on our review of all of the

information available, it has been determined that the damage was not of such severity and magnitude as to be beyond the capabilities of the State, affected local governments and voluntary agencies."

Quinn will not appeal FEMA's decision but is now seeking federal assistance from the U.S. Small Business Administration, submitting a request on June 30. If approved, the SBA Disaster Declaration would apply to LaSalle, Livingston and Peoria counties and would offer SBA disaster loans to "eligible individuals and businesses in the counties that are contiguous to the requested counties," according to a letter Quinn submitted to the SBA.

Dwight Mobile Home Park Proposals Still Under Discussion

No actions were taken regarding a proposed mobile home and mobile home parks ordinance when the Dwight Village Board met on June 28.

Following a tornado last month that cut a path through the Village of Dwight and destroyed a mobile home park on Dwight's west side, Village officials have been looking at enforcing tighter regulations with regard to mobile homes and mobile home parks in an effort to improve safety precautions. A meeting of the Ordinance Committee, also on June 28, brought more discussion but no decisions.

One proposed requirement would mandate mobile home parks to provide a basement storm shelter for park residents. Arguments against this included citing that many non-mobile residential homes do not have a

basement. Other proposed recommendations include each mobile home should be set on a concrete pad; tie downs required for each mobile home unit; new mobile homes being placed in a park must not exceed five years of age; and establishing the minimum number of mobile home units required to qualify as a mobile home park.

One point of controversy raised at the board meeting centered on Trustee Angie Turner serving as the Ordinance Committee chairperson, citing a possible personal conflict of interest with regard to pending decisions on mobile home parks. Village attorney Gary Neville indicated that there was no legal conflict of interest. However, *The Paper* was informed that Turner has since submitted a request to step down from the position of Ordinance Committee chairperson. No reason was noted on the resignation request.

More discussion will take place regarding the mobile home and mobile home park proposed ordinance when the committee meets again on Monday, July 12, at 5 p.m. in the Public Services Complex.

In other business, Conley Construction of Morris was the low bidder for upcoming water main projects. The board approved a Utilities Committee recommendation including three water main projects totaling \$640,798.83. In addition, the west water tower will be painted at a cost of \$125,000 and an emergency generator will be purchased for Well 9 at a cost of \$60,000. Engineering contingency fees are estimated at \$100,000, bringing total combined project costs to \$925,798.83. Water fund bonds of \$650,000 along with Water Capital Funds and Sewer Reserve Funds equal \$960,000 which will leave \$50,000 in the Water Capital Fund for emergen-

cies.

The board also:

- learned that part-time Police Officer Joe Kokaly will retire on July 1 after 32 years of service.
- approved the purchase of a spare pump for the Milbauer Lift Station at a cost of \$2,400.
- approved a one-time variance on the sewer portion of a residential water bill at 516 E. Seminole Street, #11, where a hot water heater broke under the mobile unit, causing a water leak that went directly into the ground with no sewer usage.
- denied a request from

the owner of 100 E. Waupansie Street for an adjustment to a water tap invoice which included the installation of a 1 1/2-inch water meter. Trustees Mike Woods and Nick Kester disagreed with the board's action to deny the request.

- approved a five-year contract renewal with Stewart Spreading at five cents per gallon for removal, transportation and application of sludge from the waste-water treatment plant.

The next meeting of the Dwight Village Board will be Monday, July 12 at 6 p.m. in the Public Services Complex.

Rates for This Year's Tax Bills

The rates on 2010 property tax bills have been compiled for various communities in Livingston and Grundy Counties and appear below at right.

The 2009 property tax bills for Dwight showed a 31¢ decrease in the overall property tax rate. Not so this year. Dwight's rate increased about 8¢ for the 2010 bills, from \$8.28334 to \$8.36034.

It should be understood that the actual amount of one's tax bill is determined not only by the *tax rate* per each \$100 of equalized assessed valuation, but the amount of one's *assessed valuation*, which may or may not have changed since the previous year.

With generally decreasing property values, it may seem odd to have one's property valuation remain the same, or even show an increase for 2010, but taxpayers should remember that valuations are based on three-year averages, and the general decrease in real estate values has not yet worked its way through the three-year assessment system.

Livingston County Assessor Duane Kiesewetter told *The Paper* that while he had not seen final figures from the state, "there might be value drops in 2010 that would appear on next year's

tax bills."

One should not assume that will mean a lower overall tax bill.

Mazon Man Arrested, Charged with Dealing Drugs

A Mazon man has been charged with possession of 30 to 500 grams of cannabis with intent to deliver, according to the office of the Grundy County Sheriff.

On June 29 at approximately 3:30 p.m., members of the Grundy County Sheriff's office and the Metropolitan Area Narcotics Squad (MANS) arrested Denny J. Och, 26, of 3350 S. Old Mazon Rd., rural Mazon, for "unlawful possession of cannabis with intent to deliver." Och's arrest stemmed from information initially received by the sheriff's office which led to an investigation by sheriff's detectives working in conjunction with the Grundy County State's Attorney's Office.

According to Grundy County Sheriff Terry Mar-

ketti, "On June 29, a search warrant was obtained to search a garage located on the property...where drug activity was reportedly occurring. Sheriff's deputies, investigators and representatives from MANS executed the search warrant and recovered in excess of 100 grams of suspected cannabis that is now removed from the streets of our communities."

Och was taken into custody and transported to the Grundy County Jail, where he was later charged in Grundy County Circuit Court with possessing more than 30 but less than 500 grams of cannabis with intent to deliver. Och was released on July 1 after posting \$750 cash bond pending his next court appearance on July 8.

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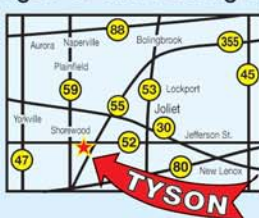
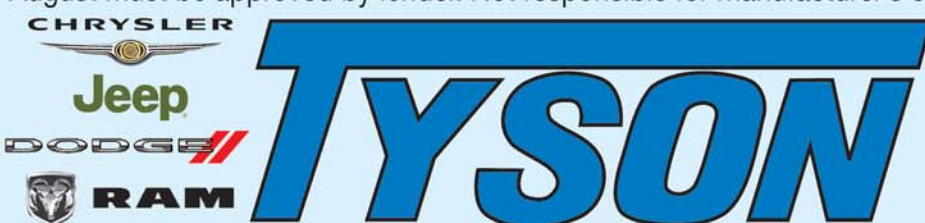
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Bileckis Honored with Route 66 Lifetime Achievement Award

Crash Claims Life of Piper City 18-year-old

A one-vehicle crash which was reported by a passerby at 8:35 a.m. the morning of July 2 claimed the life of the driver of the vehicle, according to Livingston County Coroner Michael P. Burke. The victim was Jaryn E. Burns, 18, of Piper City. She was pronounced dead at the scene of the crash.

The crash occurred on Livingston County Road 900 North in rural Chatsworth, approximately a quarter mile west of the Ford County Line, Burke said. The vehicle was apparently traveling westbound on Livingston County Road 900 North when Burns seems to have lost control, striking a concrete bridge. The vehicle came to rest in the ditch on the north side of the road, which is in Charlotte Township.

The Chatsworth Fire Department was assisted at the scene by the Piper City Fire Department and SEL-CAS. The crash is being investigated by the Livingston County Sheriff's Police. The Piper City Chief of Police assisted the sheriff's department and the coroner.

An autopsy has been completed.

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Gardner Beautification Corner

On Sunday, July 11 at 1 p.m., the Gardner Lions will host a summer afternoon free concert at the Gazebo in downtown Gardner. Gardner's former resident Gary Huston and his five piece brass band, The Prairie Brass Quintet, of Fairbury will perform. Also check out the new mural on the south side of the building at the end of Depot Street which is being prepared and painted by ConMan, Stephan Connor of Blackstone. The mural is a replica of the old bandstand or gazebo which stood in the West Side Park.

An old newspaper article written by Burt Parkinson, who was the editor and pub-

lisher of the Gardner Chronicle, states that the old gazebo had been built in 1884 for the special dedication of a flag pole which was 185 feet high called the Liberty Pole, and it was dedicated on July 4, 1884. Many local residents - Charles and Ben Bookwalter, Jack Morris, Jim Michaels, Frank Mulvey, Les Wise, Doc Fuller, Ira Bookwalter, Tucker Drew, Rogers Cumming, High Fuller, and Burt Parkinson, just to name a few - played in a band and entertained the town people who came to the park for entertainment. It was decided around 1930 to move the

gazebo to Depot Street, or the business district, opposite the Exchange Bank where band concerts were held. Free movies were also shown at the gazebo. People brought chairs and blankets and could buy a five cent bag of popcorn. The old gazebo is part of Gardner's history, but the newly-built gazebo is the present and future location of many events.

Bring your lawn chairs and enjoy the mural, music, memories, and the flower garden. Apple and cherry pie slices with ice cream will be served. Drinks and popcorn will also be available.

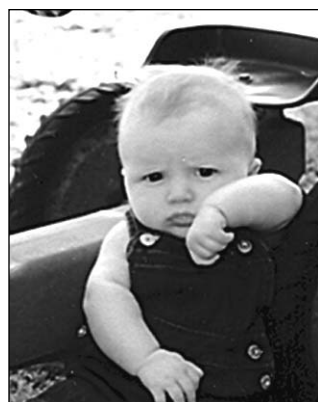

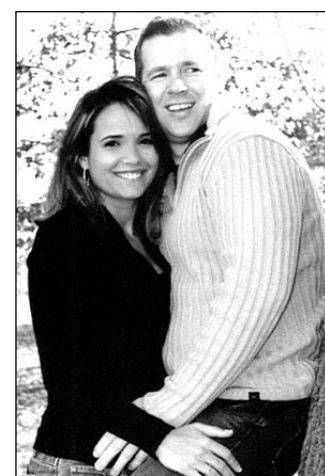

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Electrical Generators Gain Popularity After Power Outages

Power outages caused by recent storms have led many to look into the benefits of electrical generators. These generators provide backup electricity when utility lines are down.

"In the past few weeks, we've had several calls of people inquiring about generators," said Steven Vaughan, electrical manager with Popejoy Inc. Plumbing, Heating and Electric. With a generator, he said, "You've got safety, you've got peace of mind – it's like insurance."

Vaughan explained that a generator is a one-time investment that cannot only help people stay comfortable when the power goes out, but may save a lot of

money by preventing damage such as frozen pipes when the heat doesn't work, a flooded basement when there's no power to a sump pump or spoiled food when a refrigerator warms.

Portable generators are one option, but someone must be there to turn them on, making these a disadvantage if no one is home when the power goes out. And since most portable generators are powered by gas tanks, "hopefully the outage is not too extensive, where you'd run out of gas," Vaughan said.

Automatic standby generators are another option. These can provide power to anywhere from 10 circuits to an entire home, Vaughan said – more than a portable generator can handle. And

it comes on automatically within 15 seconds of a power outage. Automatic standby generators are fueled by the natural gas utility supply, or in the country, by the home's LP gas tank.

Where safety is concerned, Vaughan said Popejoy sells Generac generators, which have a safety feature that ensures "the generator power and utility power can't be in the same location at the same time."

When someone is interested in buying a generator from Popejoy, he said, an employee goes to the person's home to discuss their needs and wants and figures out what size generator is needed for that particular home.

Bill Aug, owner of A&S Exteriors, Dwight, has offered some hints to make the home remodeling process a little smoother.

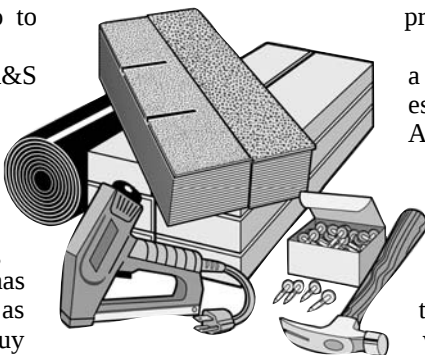
Aug said remodeling or adding onto homes has become more popular as fewer people decide to buy new homes.

A&S, which stands for Aug and Sons, has been a "full-fledged" business for six years, Aug said, although he has been working in the industry for about 20 years.

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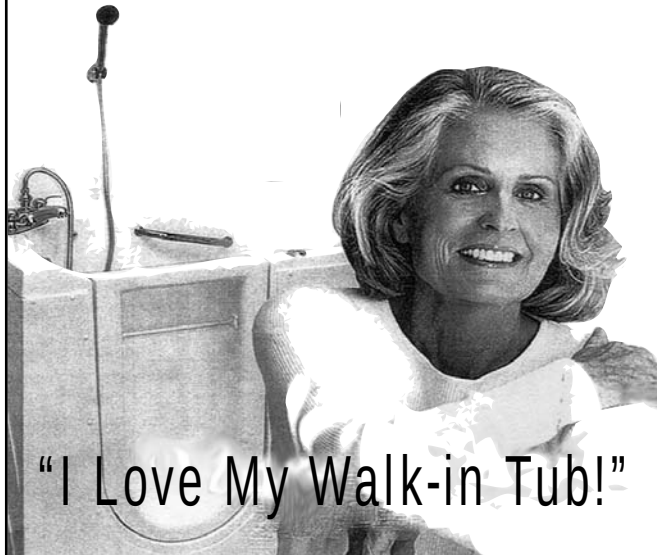


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ComEd Reminds All to Call Before Digging

In 2009, ComEd's northern Illinois service territory

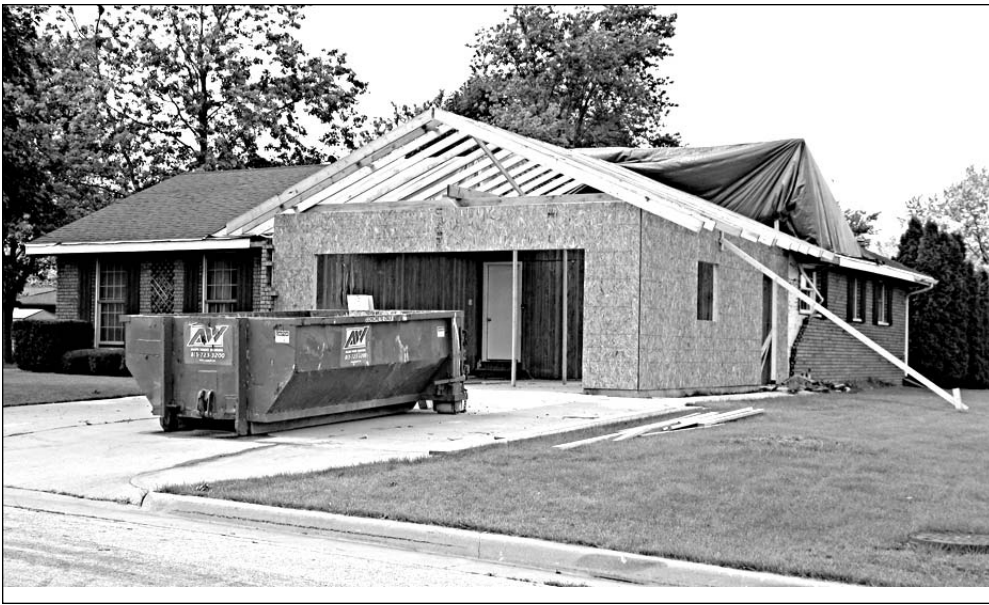
averaged more than one accidental dig-in per day, resulting in nearly 400 incidents causing power outages to 40,000 customers.
