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Area Counties Designated as USDA Natural Disaster Areas

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated 55 counties in Illinois as natural disaster areas because of losses caused by excessive rain, flooding and flash flooding that occurred from April 1, 2010 and continuing. Among the counties are Kankakee, Grundy and Livingston.

Farmers and ranchers in LaSalle and Ford counties also qualify for natural disaster assistance because their counties are contiguous.

The counties were designated natural disaster areas August 30, making all qualified farm operators in the designated areas eligible for low interest emergency (EM) loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), provided eligibility requirements are met.

Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for loans to help cover part of their actual losses. FSA will consider each loan

application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. FSA has a variety of programs, in addition to the EM loan program, to help eligible farmers recover from adversity.

USDA also has made other programs available to assist farmers and ranchers, including the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE), which was approved as part of the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008; the Emergency Conservation Program; Federal Crop Insurance; and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program.

Dwight Boy Creates Unique Woodcarvings for Turtle's Tap

Like many eight-year-old boys, Dwight Grade School third-grader Justin Allen loves to play sports and was excited when his football team won its first game of the season.

Unlike many eight-year-old boys, Justin has a supreme aptitude for woodworking and now has his carvings on public display at Turtle's Tap, Dwight.

With only a touch of help from his grandfather when it was time to put the pieces together, Justin recently created a sign and two turtle carvings that now hang above the antique bar at Turtle's. Justin carved the turtles from the exotic woods padauk, ebony, holly and poplar, using the natural tones of the wood to create the right colors. No paint, stains or dyes were used.

Justin, the son of Kevin and Robyn Allen of Dwight, started woodworking at age four under the direction of his grandfather, Bob Wills of Coal City, who does a type of inlay woodwork called intarsia.

"It's amazing how he took to that saw," said Karen Wills, Justin's grandmother. She noted that although the couple's 11 grandchildren each had a try at woodworking, "he's the only one that has an interest in it."

Robyn Allen said, "He picked up on it easy, and he just continued to enjoy it."

She added, "He does well at everything."

Justin has now created about 40 pieces for family and friends, including roses, ornaments, the cartoon dog Clifford and an angel.

"That angel was hard, though," Justin admitted. He said the turtles, which were hung above the bar September 1, are his personal favorite pieces.

Justin had made woodcarvings for a few employees of Turtle's Tap, and when Justin saw them, he asked Justin to make a sign for the bar.

"I got a start in business when I was young, and it's good to see a young entrepreneur developing a skill that he can use in the future," Turtle said.

Dwight Correctional Center Welcomes New Warden

Sheryl Thompson became the warden of Dwight Correctional Center on August 1.

Thompson, of Kankakee, grew up in Gardner. She has spent 22 years in the correctional field and has many goals in mind for DCC.

"I have several big projects," Thompson said.

One of her goals as warden is to increase staffing at the Dwight facility. Several new jobs have been posted, she said, and she hopes to fill them soon. She would like to increase the number of officers at DCC, because "if we can (better) manage our offenders, the staff will be able to better manage as well." Thompson said the facility shines because of the staff's "get-it-done attitude."

She added, "My vision is to ensure that every staff member knows where they fit into our mission statement," which speaks of segregating offenders from society while assuring their constitutional rights and helping them with successful re-entry into society.

She also wants to improve the buildings and facilities at DCC, "making sure that the quality of life for the offenders is improved."

And to further help with that quality of life, she plans to create more programs.

"I'm a very program-ori-

ented person," Thompson said. She wants to encourage offenders to be a part of their community, whether that means the grounds of DCC or charities that reach beyond the center's walls. She said offenders sometimes give ideas for programs and other ways to make their community a better place.

"Our offenders do a lot of great things for the community," she said, including hosting charity fund-raisers such as a "crop walk" to help the hungry. Offenders sponsor each other to raise

money. "A lot of our long-term offenders here give on a regular basis to charities," she said.

Thompson will especially focus on the needs of offenders serving long sentences, "keeping in mind that those long-term offenders can help improve the quality of life for short-term offenders." Thompson also plans to put a focus on women and family services.

She stressed that all aspects of DCC are connected and must work together in order to function well.

Parents need to purchase a car seat prior to the class, and bring the car seat with them to class.

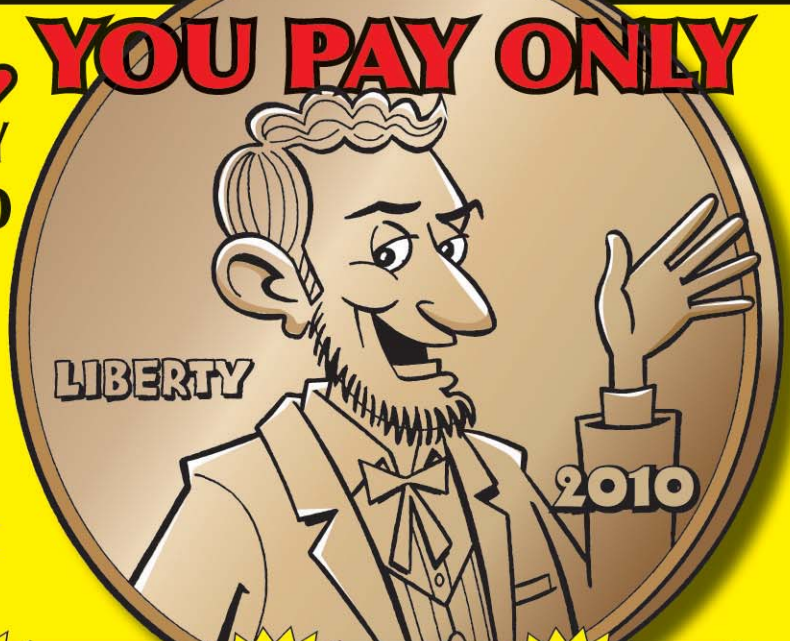

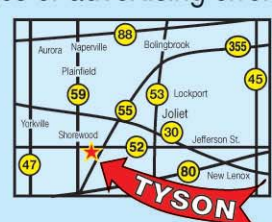
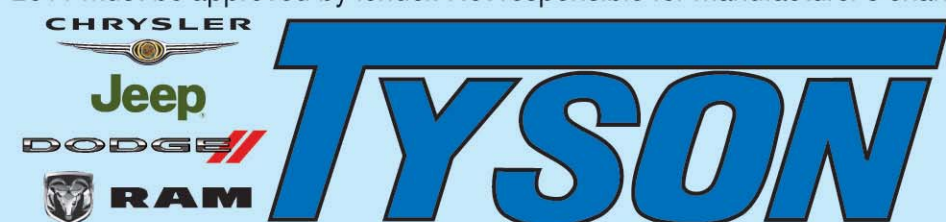

“We’re looking forward to having a great team effort in helping this facility move forward,” she said.

Thompson credits her supervisors and mentors throughout the years for helping her grasp all the important aspects of the correctional system. After attending Joliet Junior College, “I basically utilized the upward mobility program that the state offers to advance my education,” Thompson said. She started her career in corrections at the Sheridan facility in 1988 as a correctional officer trainee; after that, she spent about eight years training other officers. She was promoted to lieutenant, a position she held for four years, and was then a training coordinator and relief shift manager.

“I did just a little bit of everything,” Thompson said.

In 2000, she transferred to Dwight Correctional Center, where she took on the role of record office supervisor.

“I supervised the receiving of offenders from all the counties,” she said. She calculated sentences and oversaw all aspects of the records department.

In 2005, Thompson was promoted to family services administrator.

“During that time, I was able to ... create a lot of programs to help our women with their children and family issues,” Thompson said. Among those programs was a day camp Thompson led for the children of the offenders at DCC. She also looked out for the welfare of

women who were pregnant when they came to DCC.

“That was a really fulfilling job,” she said.

In February, Thompson transferred to the correctional center in Decatur, where she was assistant warden of programs, but she returned to DCC to take on the job of warden and said she is glad to be back.

Thompson said her faith has helped her through her career and life.

“God always has a plan for us, and sometimes we don’t see what that plan is,” she said, but “God has always given me everything I’ve needed when I needed it.”

She also credits her family for helping her get to where she is today.

“I’ve been blessed with a great family and wonderful children and grandchildren, and a very supportive husband.” She said her parents, too, have been extremely important in her life.

In addition to her career in corrections, Thompson has been involved with the Easter Seals Rehabilitation Center as a foster parent, has worked on a task force to raise awareness of and support for Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder and is a member of the American Correctional Association and River Valley Christian Fellowship church, Bradley.

Dwight Correctional Center also has a new assistant warden of programs, Walter Nicholson; and Dorretta O’Brien, who previously served in that role, is now the assistant warden of operations.

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Celebrate Grandparents Day by Investing in Your Grandchildren’s Future

National Grandparents Day is Sept. 12. If you’re a grandparent, this day is meant to honor you — but you can also celebrate by investing in your grandchildren’s future.

Of course, much of their future success may depend on their ability to receive a college education, but college is expensive. In fact, according to the College Board, for the 2009–2010 school year, the average cost (tuition, fees, room and board) for an in-state student for one year at a public, four-year school was more than \$15,000, while a student at a private, four-year school paid, on average, more than \$35,000. Furthermore, in recent years, college costs have risen considerably faster than the general inflation rate, so if your grandchildren are still quite young, their college bills may easily eclipse the numbers shown above.

Fortunately, if you want to help your grandchildren pay for college, you have some good savings vehicles to choose from, including the following:

- 529 savings plan — A 529 savings plan allows you to put money in specific investments, managed by an investment professional. You can gift \$13,000 per year to each grandchild without incurring gift taxes. All withdrawals from a 529 savings plan will be free from federal income taxes, as long as the money is used for the beneficiary’s qualified college or graduate school expenses. (Withdrawals for expenses other than qualified education expenditures may be subject to federal and state taxes, plus a 10% penalty.) Also, if you participate in your own state’s 529 savings plan, your contributions may be eligible for a state tax deduction or credit.
- Coverdell Education Savings Account — Depending on your income level, you can contribute up to \$2,000 annually to a Coverdell Education Savings Account (ESA). (Unless extended by new legislation, however, this contribution limit will fall to \$500 per year, beginning in 2011.) Coverdell earnings and withdrawals are tax-free in 2011.) Coverdell earnings uses the money for qualified education expenses. Any non-qualified withdrawals from a Coverdell ESA may be subject to federal and state taxes, plus a 10% penalty.
- Zero coupon bonds — When you purchase a zero coupon bond, it is priced at a discount to its principal, or face, value. You receive the principal value when the bond matures. You could purchase a zero coupon bond that matures when your grandchild is ready to go to college — and you’ll know exactly how much you’ll be getting. Although you won’t be receiving regular interest payments throughout the life of the zero coupon bond, as you would for a typical bond, you’ll still be liable for the taxes on this interest. But by putting the bond in your grandchild’s name, the interest will be taxable at his or her tax rate, which will likely be much lower than yours. Before purchasing or titling a zero coupon bond, though, consult with your tax advisor.

By making any of these gifts to your grandchildren, you will remind them, once again, of how lucky they are to have grandparents — which is, after all, the true meaning of Grandparents Day.

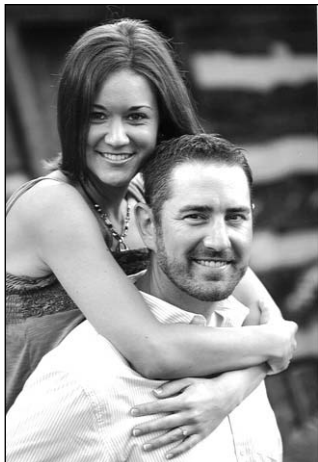

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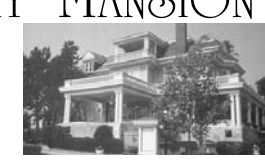

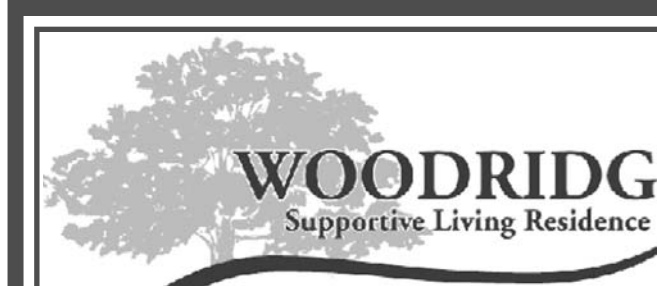

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Improving Safety at Home in Case of Disaster

Disaster can strike quickly and without warning. It can force you to evacuate your neighborhood or confine you to your home. What would you do if basic services – gas, water, electricity or telephone – were cut off? Local officials and relief workers will be on the scene after a disaster, but they cannot reach everyone right away.

Find out what could happen to you, and create a disaster plan. Make a family disaster plan with all information about an emergency meeting place, and family contact numbers.

- In your home:
- Post emergency telephone numbers near phones.
 - Show responsible family members how and when to turn off gas, water and electricity at main switches.
 - Find the safe spots in your home for each type of disaster.
 - Install smoke detectors on each level of your home, especially near bedrooms.

- Teach each family member how to use fire extinguishers and where they are kept.
 - Stock emergency supplies and assemble a disaster supply kit.
 - Determine the best escape routes from the home.
- In addition, conduct a home hazard hunt. During a disaster, ordinary objects in your home can cause injury or damage. Anything that can move, fall, break or cause a fire is a home hazard. Inspect your home at least once a year and fix potential hazards. Contact your local fire department to learn about home fire hazards.

Other steps include taking a first aid or CPR course, teaching children about disaster preparedness, working with neighbors, and more. To find out more about family disaster planning, contact your local authorities or the Grundy County Emergency Management Agency at 815-941-3212.

New Website Creates Illinois ‘Hub for Housing’

A new free bilingual website (ILHousingsearch.org) featuring statewide property listings is available now to help Illinois residents find their next rental home. ILHousingsearch.org was created by the administration of Governor Pat Quinn to allow users to search through a range of features to find a home that fits their needs.

“In this economy, it’s more important than ever to help Illinois residents locate housing quickly. Families will now have a variety of housing options at their fingertips,” said Gloria L. Materre, IHDA executive director.

Housing can be searched by rent range, accessibility features, location, number of bedrooms, screening criteria, acceptance of vouchers, school district, allowance of pets, deposits and fees, and proximity to public transit.

ILHousingsearch.org also provides useful tools for prospective tenants, such as an affordability calculator, moving cost estimates

and a rental checklist. The website is maintained by Socialserve.com – a national non-profit currently building and managing housing locator services in 27 states. Property owners and managers are already taking advantage of the free service to find new tenants to occupy the thousands of apartments currently listed. The same service is also available through a toll-free, bilingual call center, 1-877-428-8844.

Four state agencies partnered to create the website, including the Illinois Housing Development Authority (IHDA), Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS),

Illinois Department of Human Services (DHS) and Illinois Department on Aging. The state agencies joined in an effort to simplify housing searches for Illinois families, especially persons living on a tight budget and those with special needs.

“This housing locator will be a tremendous asset for Illinois residents,” said Illinois Department of Human Services Secretary Michelle R.B. Saddler. “The Illinois Department of Human Services is happy to be a partner in this collaboration to help residents on the path to self-sufficiency locate housing that’s right for their individual needs.”

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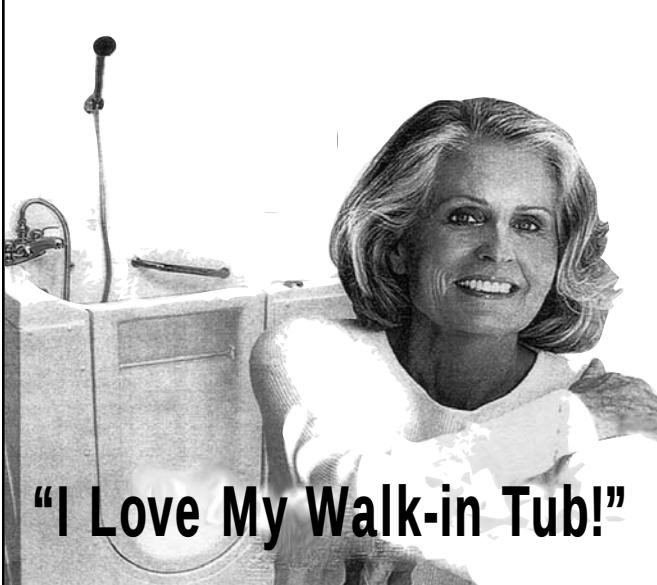
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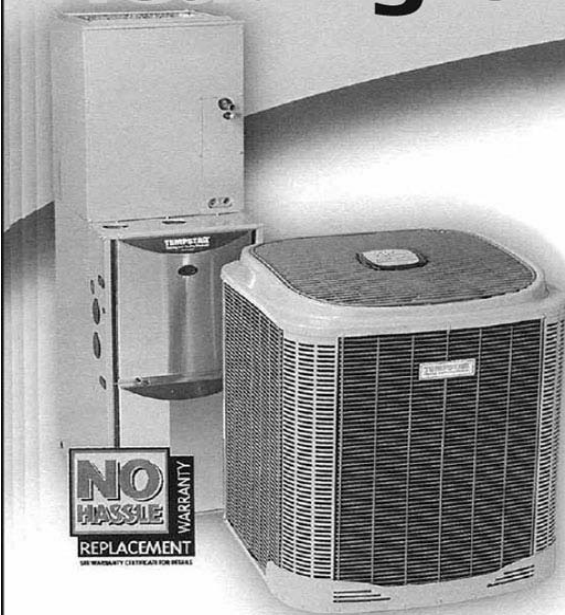

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Financing Home Repairs - From IL Attorney General Madigan

You've decided to fix up your home or add that room you've always wanted. Congratulations. Just be sure to think carefully when considering payment options. Remember, home repair or improvement can involve many thousands of dollars. A mistake in your financing decision can cost you thousands more.

Paying for Home Repair Projects

There are really only three options to financing your project. You can finance through your home repair contractor, finance through an independent lender, or pay cash. For most consumers, cash payment is not realistic except for small projects, so financing will probably be necessary.

Keep in mind that you are under no obligation to use any particular lender. The choice is yours.

Contractor Secured Financing

If you finance directly through the contractor, you will likely be offered a Retail Installment Contract. The contractor is allowing you to pay for the project over a period of time rather than all at once. The interest rate and all fees must be fully disclosed to you before you sign the contract. Do not sign the contract if any of the spaces are left blank. Be aware that it is common practice for the contractor to sell or assign the Retail Installment Contract to another party, such as a

bank. You would then make your payments to that party.

Banks and Credit Unions

You may also finance through an independent lender, such as a bank or credit union. Your contractor may refer you to a lender; while you certainly may consider your contractor's recommendation, it's probably best to shop around and compare. Once again, the lender must disclose all terms of the loan to you in advance.

Loans for Home Repair Projects

It is all but certain that any loan you obtain, whether from the contractor or an independent lender, will be secured by your home. That is, it will be a type of mortgage. Your home is the collateral. If you do not make the payments, you could lose your home. Therefore, you should be absolutely certain that you can afford the monthly payment.

Accept no oral agreements concerning the loan. Insist that all agreements be in writing so that they will be enforceable later.

As with any loan, read the documents carefully before you sign them. Be sure the terms in the written documents are consistent with those promised to you and that there are no blank spaces. If you do not understand something, ask questions. Do not allow yourself to be rushed or pressured to sign.

Never allow the work to begin until your loan has been fully approved, any right to cancel period has passed, and the funds may be disbursed. If your project will require financing, insist on language in your construction contract that no work will begin until financing acceptable to you has been secured, and that the contract is voidable by you if you are unable to obtain a loan. Do not agree to a contract that contains nothing more than vague language such as "subject to financing."

Right to Cancel

Right-to-cancel notices can be confusing. It is important to remember that there are two separate and distinct right-to-cancel provisions in a financed construction project. One applies to the construction contract and one applies to the loan. It could happen that your right to cancel the construction contract has expired while your right to cancel the loan has not. In this situation, you may find yourself in a position where you are able to cancel the loan but not the construction contract. You would then be obligated to complete the construction project even if

you cancel the loan. The contractor might then attempt to impose unacceptable loan terms on you. This is why the language where no work will begin until acceptable financing has been secured is so important.

It is best that the funds from your loan be given directly to you by the lender rather than to your contractor. You then pay the contractor. This puts you in a stronger position if a dispute should arise. If your lender requires that the checks be made payable to the contractor, insist that your name appears on the checks as a co-payee. This way you must endorse the check before the contractor can cash it.

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Herscher Business Offers Tips for Home Heating This Season

Autumn is almost upon us, and as the weather cools, the need for a good home heating system becomes more apparent. There are several ways to fight cool drafts in your home, whether you plan to buy a new furnace this season or just want to keep your home warmer using your current system.

People looking to purchase a new furnace may want to choose a newer model with a 95 percent efficiency rating.

"The 95 percent furnaces are getting to be the hotter selling point," said Corey Eich, manager of R. Eich & Sons Plumbing, Heating and Air Conditioning of Herscher. Eich said 95 percent models qualify purchasers for government rebates and also provide savings over time due to their energy efficiency.

In addition to gas-fired furnaces, geothermal systems are another option. These use water to heat the home.

"If you're living in the country, the geothermal tends to save quite a bit of money," Eich said, because

well water can be utilized for the system. City-dwellers may want to steer away from geothermal systems, though, because they would have to install a well system – and although it saves money over time, geothermal heating is "a very expensive system to purchase and install," Eich said.

Even if you aren't in the market for a new home heating system, there are steps you can take to keep your home warmer than in years past.

"Keeping the filters clean at all times" is Eich's top recommendation for maintaining a furnace. "That's one thing we can't ever stress enough to all our customers," he said, noting that clean filters also increase efficiency, saving homeowners money. "If the filters are kept clean, the better the system runs."

In addition, "Home maintenance goes hand-in-hand with heating systems," according to Eich. Putting seals around windows and doors, as well as making sure outside walls and especially attics are well-insulated, will keep heat from escaping the home, helping to lower bills.

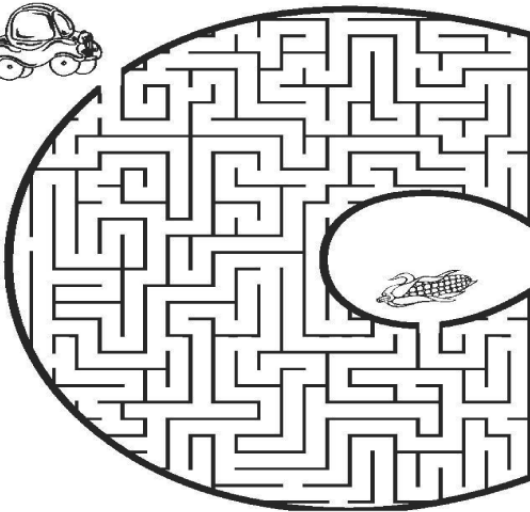

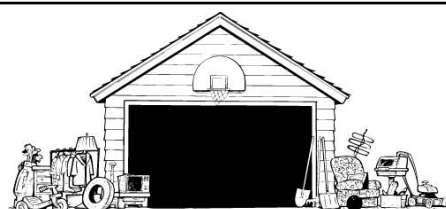
