Now Pledged for Drug Dog

In the effort to bring a drug-sniffing dog to Dwight, more than \$33,000 cash has now been donated by individuals, businesses and organizations, and another \$14,000 has been pledged,

according to Dwight Police Chief Tim Henson.

Sixty thousand dollars is needed to bring a K-9 unit to Dwight. A "thermometer" to gauge progress toward the goal is being placed near the downtown Dwight park.

Former Director of Odell, Pontiac Libraries Arrested

Eric Colclasure, the former director of Odell Public Library and Pontiac Public Library, was recently arrested and charged with two counts of theft over \$10,000 of government property, according to Livingston County Assistant State's Attorney Scott Terry.

Terry said Colclasure allegedly intercepted three rental checks intended for Pontiac Public Library.

Terry said records also indicate that Colclasure was convicted of theft over \$10,000 in Cook County in 2003.

Bond was set at \$100,000, and Terry said it was his understanding that Colclasure had posted the \$10,000 to be released from jail.

A preliminary hearing for Colclasure is scheduled for October 4.

A representative of the Livingston County Sheriff's Police said there is currently an ongoing investigation at Odell Public Library in connection with Colclasure's arrest, but he declined further comment on the matter.

In June, Colclasure was placed on unpaid leave from Pontiac Public Library during an investigation. At that time, calls to Odell Public Library regarding Colclasure's employment status there were directed to library board members, but board members did not return *The Paper's* calls.

Dwight Moves Forward with Chicago Street Repaving

Depot Structures to Remain

There was a large turnout for the September 13 meeting of the Dwight Village Board of Trustees as several hot topics were on the agenda.

One of those items focused on the repair of crumbling village streets as the board overturned Mayor Bill Wilkey's veto of an earlier approved street repair project.

At its August 9 session, board members approved repaving a four-block stretch of Chicago Street from Philmar to Susan, using concrete, at the bid price of \$226,100. With \$250,000 budgeted this year for street repaving, the board had weighed options that included a base bid for milling and asphalt overlay of several streets, including two blocks of West Chippewa, Smith Lane, Sunset Drive, Morris Road north of the tracks, and Chicago Street from Philmar to Susan, at a base bid of

\$308,133. The board also looked at alternate bids of only the Chicago Street portion of the project, using concrete instead of asphalt, at \$226,100, or dropping the Chicago Street portion entirely for a bid price of \$195,090.

With some differing opinions, a majority of the board favored staying within the budget and elected to do the Chicago Street concrete option, which has approximately four times the lifespan of asphalt. However, Mayor Wilkey opposed the decision and was in favor of going outside budget to bring more streets into the project. At the following August 23 session, Wilkey vetoed the project, sending it back to the board for reconsideration.

"We will never get caught up with our streets if we do them four blocks at a time," said Wilkey, who was now proposing that the board approve going \$60,000 over budget and do all of the (continued on page 10)

Board Reviews Reductions Pending Referendum Results

Following a public hearing on September 15, the Dwight Grade School Board of Education approved the 2010-11 budget.

Changes to Education Fund monies were made from the budget proposal last month. On the revenue side, \$123,225 was added for Pre-K Block and Pre-K For All Grants and \$500,000 from the abolishment of the Working Cash Fund. On the expenditure side, costs for the Pre-K programs were added in addition to \$500 to

the Title One supply account. Superintendent Dale Adams noted that the district cost for the Pre-K Block program will be an additional \$1,557.

The board authorized the issuance of a \$1 million Working Cash Bond which will take place sometime in October. The bond is necessary for the district to remain financially afloat. As things stand now, along with using the current tax rate and without \$500,000 added to the budget from the Working Cash Bond, the district will experience a \$317,000 deficit at the end of the 2011- (continued on page 11)

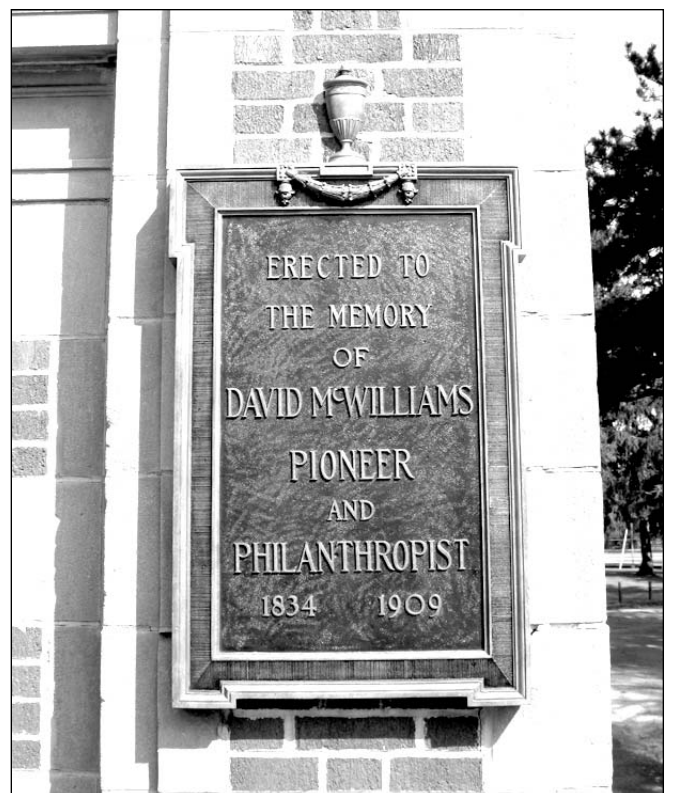

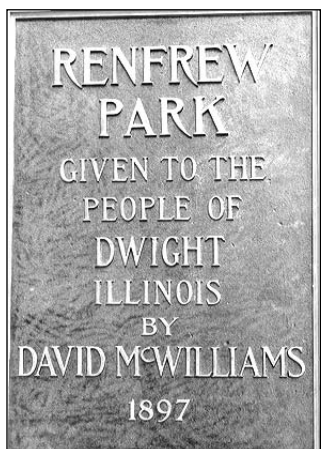

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Two Drug Busts in Dwight

Possession, Delivery of Heroin Among Charges

Three Dwight residents were arrested for possession of heroin and other charges September 16 during two separate drug busts.

According to Dwight Police Chief Tim Henson, at approximately 11 a.m. that day, the Livingston County Pro-Active Unit, Dwight Police Department and Livingston County Emergency Response Unit executed a search warrant in the 100 block of South Franklin Street.

“Forced entry was made into the residence there,” Henson said.

Arrested were Caprecio Patterson, 32, of Dwight, and Nicole Watts, 25, also of Dwight.

“Seized from the apartment were 63 bags of heroin, \$7,450 in cash, a 73-inch television, a 26-inch television, a touch-screen computer and a PlayStation 3,” according to Henson.

A baby at the residence, approximately eight months old, was turned over to the custody of other family members, Henson said.

He said the investigation was a cumulative effort of the Livingston County Pro-Active team and the Dwight Police Department; they were assisted by the Pontiac Police Department’s K-9 unit, a dog named Draco.

Patterson, if convicted, faces increased time in prison and fines due to a prior drug conviction in LaSalle County. He is being charged with unlawful possession with intent to deliver a controlled substance (heroin), a class 1 felony, with a possible sentence of up to 30 years in prison and a \$500,000 fine; three counts of unlawful delivery of a

controlled substance (heroin), class 1 and 2 felonies with one possible 30-year sentence and \$500,000 fine and two possible 14-year sentences and \$400,000 fines; and three counts of unlawful possession of a controlled substance (hydrocodone, alprazolam and dextro-propoxyphene), each class 4 felonies with sentences up to six years and \$50,000 fines.

Patterson is detained in Livingston County Jail in lieu of \$750,000 bond.

Watts is being charged with unlawful possession with intent to deliver a controlled substance (heroin), a class 1 felony; three counts of unlawful delivery of a controlled substance (heroin), class 1 and 2 felonies; and three counts of unlawful possession of a controlled substance (hydrocodone, alprazolam and dextro-propoxyphene), class 4 felonies. The class 1 felonies carry a maximum fine of \$250,000 each.

She is being held in Livingston County Jail on \$250,000 bond.

Later September 16, at approximately 10 p.m., the Livingston County Pro-Active Unit conducted a traffic stop in the 600 block of West Mazon Avenue following a joint investigation with the Dwight Police Department, Henson said.

Mitchell Tousignant, 23, of Dwight “was arrested for delivery of a controlled substance, that being five bags of heroin,” Henson said. He was also arrested for possession with intent to deliver.

Seized was an additional nine bags of heroin and \$342 cash, Henson said.

Tousignant is detained in Livingston County Jail in lieu of \$100,000 bond.

Local Christian Band ‘Asher’ Sending Message Via Music

An area-based Christian band is gaining popularity while sharing life experiences and spreading a message of hope.

Asher is composed of Robb Black of Dwight, bass; Burton Gestner of Dwight, guitar; Rick Maderis of Forrest, vocals/writing; Sarah Brummitt of Cropsey, guitar/vocals/writing; LoriLee Dunahee of Fairbury, vocals/keys; and Dan Ucherek of Chenoa, drums.

Asher was formed in spring of 2008 with a mission to “reach the lost and encourage the saved through song,” according to the band’s brochure. “We believe that as God leads us individually, He will also lead us as one united group.”

He said the overall message in Asher’s music is one of hope, “just realizing that God has a better plan for each of us and our families” by “trying to relay experiences in our lives that we know other people are going through at the same time.” He added, “We truly believe that having Jesus as your Savior is what really makes a difference in your life.”

Asher has played at many churches and festivals in the area. Last year, the band provided worship music at Dwight Harvest Days; it has also played at New Life Assembly of God in Dwight, where both Black and Gestner are members. Asher recently played at a festival in Metamora and has also

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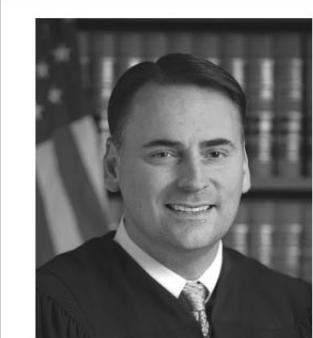

Gardner Village Board Hears Dining Car Update

The Gardner Village board opened its regular meeting September 13 receiving a “thank you” letter from Vino’s Bar and Grill for the village’s support of the recent cruise night. The evening was a benefit for We Care of Grundy County and was a huge success, with several boxes of food and more than \$500 raised.

Mayor Tom Wise relayed a request from the Gardner Angels to hold a movie night on September 24 and close Depot Street from Division to Center from dusk until the end of the movie, approximately 10 p.m.

Other items included the board approving a request from the Gardner Lions Club to hold its annual candy day on October 8 and 9; and setting Halloween trick-or-treat hours for 4 to 6 p.m. on Sunday, October 31.

Resident Tom Perkins reported the historic dining car is progressing very well with volunteers providing most of the labor. Perkins met with roofer Dan Boyd of Braceville for an estimate on placing 60-mil. rubber roofing on the car. Perkins and others will donate the plywood for the roof overhang;

the paint for the project will be donated by the Route 66 Preservation Society. The car should be ready to be moved soon. Commissioner Mike Serena reported the concrete and conduit are in place and awaiting the placement of the car. Perkins also noted there may be grant monies available to offset some of the expense related to the installation. The car was previously housed behind the Riviera Restaurant.

Commissioner Bill Gerish reported the public works employees have exercised the valves and will provide the list to Guy Christensen to create a new map of the valves. Christensen will also work with the village to determine the status of the electrical systems at the sewer treatment plant and determine a plan of action to address any issues found.

Commissioner Serena reported he reviewed the proposed bus stop with Grundy County Administrator Dan Duffy and there is existing concrete for the stop.

clerk. Belt reported that based on current state law and village code, the clerk is required to live within the corporate limits of the village. Commissioner Mike Serena inquired where the issue of residency of the clerk came from. Village Attorney Scott Belt and Commissioner Dick Hileman responded the concern centered on an ad to be placed for the replacement of Village Clerk Barb Bexson, who will retire at the end of the year.

Belt related he had reviewed the agreement with Kraus Cable and is ready to meet with the provider, but he was unsure of the direction the village would like him to pursue. Hileman commented he had made several comments at a previous meeting in response to concerns raised by a resident. Hileman was then contacted by one of the owners of the service, who took exception to Hileman’s comments published in *The Paper* following the meeting. Hileman stated he wants to see the best service possible for the village and would be open to bidding the contract competitively. Belt related that negotiation of a new contract is an excellent

time for the village and residents to address any issues prior to awarding a new contract.

Hileman reported he has been in meetings with the Gardner South Wilmington High School concerning the renewal of the TIF District. Hileman reported the agreement with the grade school district is complete; however, the high school district took issue with language in the contract requiring TIF funds being used only for capital expenses directly related to building and grounds. Hileman reported the proposed language by the village is directly from the state statute, and the school district’s attorney is expected to respond to the village in the near future.

Hileman motioned and the board approved waiving the permit fees for the Gardner American Legion’s recently installed electronic sign.

Based on economic concerns, Hileman suggested waiting until next spring before spending additional funds on parks and then determining a long-range plan for the parks’ equipment.

GSW High School Board Approves Mandatory Summer School for Some Students

The Gardner South Wilmington High School District #73 Board of Education held a regular meeting September 15.

Janet L. Brown, certified public accountant, was present to review GSW High School’s financial situation from the 2009 fiscal year via the audit that was conducted this past August. There were no major findings on the audit.

Dr. Decman reviewed enrollment projections for the next nine to 10 years. After a brief analysis of these figures, it appears enrollment will hit a low of 193 in 2011 and then another low in 2014 before the school starts increasing to a high of 234 in 2018. The next few years may be tough before GSW starts growing again. However, Dr. Decman highlighted that these numbers do fluctuate greatly due to the high percentage of transition that GSW has in its feeder communities.

A summary of the board policies was given to each board member. Since it was the second reading, the policies were approved.

The BOE discussed the concept of mandatory summer school for students who do not reach a minimum criterion of the PLAN and EXPLORE tests. These two tests are given in the spring of every year to GSW freshmen and sophomores. The BOE estimates that this mandatory summer school will affect between 20 and

40 students. Dr. Decman sent out an ALERT NOW, wrote a letter to parents, posted an explanation of this plan on the district’s website and even created his first and second blogs to elicit parent and community concerns. As of the meeting, he had received only a couple of comments.

Dr. Decman was contacted by the district’s bonds salesman, David Pistorius. Pistorius notified Dr. Decman that if the district wants to keep its tax rate stable, the BOE needs to strongly consider levying tax bonds in the next couple months. However, in order to levy for additional bonds, the district must spend or transfer the money to the Education Fund from the bonds levied a few years ago. Several ideas and issues were presented. Some of the highlights of the discussion included: how much money GSW High School should put into the current building; whether or not GSW should start putting facilities on the recently purchased land; and whether GSW should save the money for future use.

Dr. Decman received a call from the district’s attorney stating that he has spoken with Dick Hileman, village commissioner, and that they are very close to having an agreement on the TIF issue. The GSW attorney’s next step is to contact the attorney for the Village of Gardner to “iron out” the last details of the agreement.

Students in grades three through eight take a state test called the ISAT. In high school, students take a mandated national test called the ACT/PSAE. Dr. Decman highlighted some of the differences between the tests to answer the question as to why it seems students in the feeder grade schools score very well on the ISAT but not as well on the ACT/PSAE. Specifically, Dr. Decman informed the BOE that when the eighth graders from Braceville, Gardner and South Wilmington were given the EXPLORE test (which is a practice test for eighth and ninth graders for the ACT) last November, they did not score as well as they did on the ISAT. As a result, Dr. Decman hopes to work closely with the grade schools to better prepare GSW High School students to be successful on the ACT.

The BOE approved the following: the board policy revisions, as listed; the fiscal year 2011 budget, as presented; mandatory summer school for all students who do not meet minimum criterion on the EXPLORE and PLAN tests; Jennifer Wzorek’s request for two “personal days,” which will be considered “dock days;”

Cassie Bexson as volunteer assistant softball coach for the 2011 season; the revised 403 B Plan with Midland Insurance added as a vendor; the employment of Aaron Henrickson as fall

and spring play director for the 2010-2011 year; cancellation of the second board of education meeting for the month of September; and the annual audit, as presented by Janet L. Brown.

In superintendent information items:

- Dr. Decman reviewed the latest information from the state and federal governments concerning education.
- Dr. Decman provided the BOE with an article that demonstrated how many school districts in the state are putting up wind turbines to save on energy costs.
- An article was presented on “Workforce, college require the same reading skills.”
- A Certificate of Financial Recognition was received from ISBE for maintaining excellent financial records and a balanced budget.
- A “thank you” note was received from the Gardner Angels for allowing their group to use the Panther Bus and for supporting their event this summer.
- GSW has received the mineral rights on the recently purchased property.
- GSW has been informed that Gardner Grade School is no longer going to share any regular routes with the high school. This will increase the high school transportation costs by approximately \$12,000 per year.
- Board and Administrator Notes were reviewed.

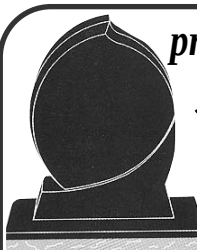

streets, including Chicago, in asphalt.

But staying true to the budget was a concern.

"I am opposed to going that much over budget," responded Trustee Jerry Curtis as he questioned from where the additional money would come.

"It is not that we won't do the other projects; we just will carry them over to next year," said Curtis.

Trustee Jared Anderson felt the project should encompass more streets right now.

"We need to service the

most amount of people for the dollar," said Anderson, who also believes that just repaving the streets is not the answer.

"Our biggest problem is we have no maintenance program," said Anderson. "If we don't do (street) maintenance, it doesn't matter what we do."

But with project bids approximately 60 days old, there was a question as to whether the asphalt bids were still viable. However, the concrete contractor was willing to hold the current bid for the concrete work. And with cold weather rapidly approaching,

time is running out to get the project done.

The board elected to move forward with repaving of the designated four-block stretch of South Chicago Street, using concrete, at the bid price of \$226,100. Trustee Anderson voted "no" to the motion, and Trustee Mike Woods was absent. Anderson Concrete of Coal City will do the work.

Another agenda item receiving a lot of public interest was the recent landscaping work around the village's train depot.

In June, the Dwight Village Board approved a design proposal from IMPACT Dwight for beautification of the Village's train depot following a private donation specified for the project. That Perennial Place of Morris was contracted for the work.

However, the finished project — which in addition to landscaping includes brick pavers in place of the former asphalt under the depot's north canopy, newly constructed planters, a shelter/bench and two kneeling walls — met with opposition, as many feel the design and materials used are not in keeping to architectural design of this historical landmark building.

Failure to have in place a Historical Preservation Committee, which could have worked with IMPACT Dwight on the project, may have contributed to the problem, which has been called "a really good lesson learned." The last documented minutes from a Historical Preservation Committee meeting are from 2004.

Establishing committees is the responsibility of the mayor.

Historical Preservation Committee member Marilyn Thorsen stated that per ordinance, nothing can be done to a historical landmark building or grounds without approval of the committee. Thorsen called the process that led to the depot changes an "illegal process" and stated that the responsibility lies "solely on the Village," not IMPACT Dwight.

"We have kind of gotten ourselves into a pickle," Curtis said of the situation.

The new Dwight Historical Preservation Committee, established at the recent August 23 session, has recommended that the brick pavers be allowed to remain, but that the vertical structures be removed "to preserve the aesthetic and historical value of this significant public building."

"I think there has to be some compromise," said Trustee Nick Kester. "There might be some modification that can be done to make it more historical...without tearing it down."

Private donations of \$17,500 have been raised to be used toward placing additional pavers around the rest of the depot to give a more finished look, but the donations are contingent upon the current project remaining untouched. While the Preservation Committee is not enthusiastic about the color and style of pavers used, it has consented to letting those remain in place.

"Our compromise would be to continue with pavers all around if the vertical struc-

tures are taken down," said Preservation Committee member Brad Wilkinson.

"I think they are being reasonable," said Mayor Wilkey, who sided with the Historical Preservation Committee's recommendation.

After much discussion, board members voted unanimously to leave the current updated landscaping remain as is and recommended that the Historical Preservation Committee and IMPACT Dwight review again to see if a compromise can be reached. Trustee Justin Eggenberger abstained from voting due to his involvement with IMPACT Dwight, and Trustee Woods was absent.

A third topic receiving focus involved the Dwight Police Department's efforts to secure a K-9 unit with the spotlight on having a drug-sniffing dog.

Prompted by increased drug activity — specifically heroin — in Dwight, discussions have been taking place and the Police Department received approval from the board to move forward with securing a K-9 unit. The police dog and its expenses are to be covered entirely through private funding with no village monies being used. As of September 2, \$23,575 had been raised with an additional \$10,000 pledged toward the estimated \$60,000 necessary. In addition, the Health, Services and Safety Committee recommended that the current 2009 Ford Crown Victoria be retrofitted immediately to serve as the K-9 squad. This action is necessary to meet the last training date for 2010, which starts October 22. Mayor

Wilkey questioned spending money on the squad before all of the funds were raised.

"We felt with the problems we are having in the village, we need to make an immediate impact," said Police Chief Tim Henson, asking for village partnership to move forward so training could begin. "I want to make it very clear that we will not be asking for an additional squad car until these funds are raised."

The board approved all motions regarding moving forward with the K-9 unit. Trustee Anderson cast an opposing vote.

In other business, the board approved:

- the resignation of Police Officer Nan Scott following 17 years of service to the Village. The board will seek a replacement for Scott, with the new officer not to begin until January 1.
- a resolution to extend Watters Drive, allowing access onto Old Route 66.
- paying request #1 to Conley Excavating for \$164,624.40 for water main improvements.
- Dwight Lions Candy Days on Friday, October 1, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m.; and Saturday, October 2, 7 a.m. to noon, at the intersection of routes 17 and 47. Rain dates will be October 8 and 9.
- Dwight Baptist Academy's door-to-door candy sale fund-raiser from September 24 through November 1.

The next meeting of the Dwight Village Board of Trustees will be Monday, September 27, at 6 p.m. in the Dwight Public Services Complex.

DGS District Seeks First Tax Increase in 27 Years

12 school year. Anticipated tax revenues from wind farms will begin to be received with the 2011-2012 school year.

“The addition of property taxes received from wind farms is a two-edged sword,” Adams told *The Paper*, “because the increase in EAV from wind farms reduces the amount of state aid the district receives.”

“We are getting to the point where we have to bite the bullet and issue the Working Cash Bond,” Adams told the board. The bond will buy the district an additional 1½ years of solvency at current spending levels. As a result, the district is looking at additional cuts for the next school year.

Earlier this year, the financially distressed district made reductions of approximately \$154,000 but stopped short of cutting deep into programs that would affect the educational quality it currently provides its students. The board also elected to wait on cutting extracurricular programs until the public had a chance to voice its opinion. That voice will come by way of a referendum vote on the November ballot.

With a current maximum tax rate of \$1.88, the board is proposing a tax rate increase of 50 cents, raising the maximum tax rate to \$2.38. Passing the increase should mean financial security for the district for many years to come and allows the flexibility to reduce the rate once the district is financially solvent and the Working Cash Bond is paid off.

“This (rate) gives us the power to go where we need to go,” explained Board

President Deb Christoff.

But should the referendum fail, the district is gearing up for changes. Changes that will drastically affect the district and its students.

It has been nearly three decades since a referendum has been passed for the Dwight Grade School District.

“We have not passed a referendum in 27 years,” said Christoff. “A lot of things have changed in 27 years.”

“We will be in serious jeopardy,” stated board member Steve Tock regarding possible failure of the referendum. “It will look ugly.”

Hoping for the best but preparing for the worst, Superintendent Adams presented his recommendations for budget reductions if the referendum fails in November.

“We need to have a conversation at the board level of what would happen if the referendum did not pass,” said Adams as he presented a reduction plan, explaining that he simply adapted the reduction plan the board had put in place earlier this year.

The current list of proposed cutbacks includes a reduction in teachers, forcing larger class sections; replacing a current principal with a dean of students; the release of three reading aides; the elimination of all co-curricular activities; and an increase in textbook rentals for a total savings of \$305,996. Adams also pointed out that fine arts programs, such as band and art, are not mandated, indicating that “those could also be eliminated for additional savings.”

Conditional budget reductions would call for the

elimination of all Pre-K Grant programs pending state funding.

“We would look at Pre-K on a year-to-year basis depending on what the State is able to provide,” recommended Adams.

In addition, with the current three-year teacher contract expiring at the end of this school year, a total salary freeze could save the

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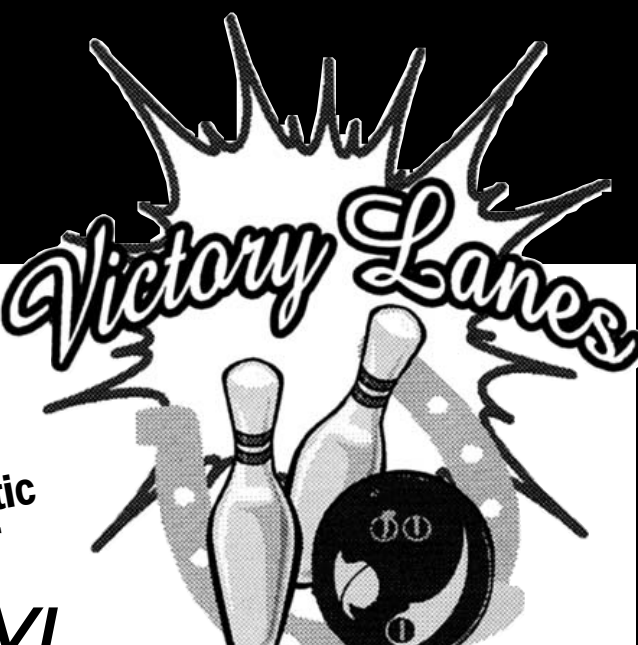

Children age six months to 18 years must meet eligibility requirements per the Vaccine For Children Program to receive the vaccine at the health department flu clinics. The eligibility requirements for children are: child is enrolled in Medicaid; child does not have insurance or health insurance does not pay for vaccines; or child is American Indian or Alaskan Native. For children who meet these guidelines, a donation per vaccine is requested but not required. For adults age 19 and over, the cost of the vaccine is payable by cash or check. Debit or credit cards are not accepted. Medicare and Medicaid cards must be presented to pay for the vaccine.

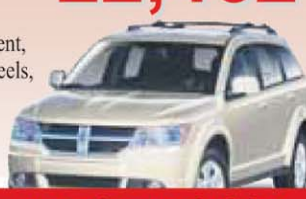
