Super Evan vs. The Evil C. Monster

Our story begins with our protagonist, 7 year old Evan Sandeno, enjoying a summer day jumping on his trampoline with all his friends, filling his yard with laughter. Just like every other day to some extent. Evan is your typical six-year-old boy, full of energy and optimism, ready to take on any challenge put in front of him. He doesn't know a stranger. He hardly slows down unless it's time to play with his younger twin siblings Carson and Claire. Sure he has his moments from time to time, but honestly when you look at him, his face is sparkling and his love for everyone is obvious.

One day last summer Evan's parents Joel and Erica noticed that his energy level had dropped. He didn't want to go outside and play as often. At first they just credited it to a very warm summer stretch. Then

he got a respiratory infection. Their doctor diagnosed him with asthma, when he heard Evan wheezing Mom and Dad set Evan up with an inhaler, nebulizer treatments, allergy shots and pills. The

whole nine yards. They worked on that for a while, hoping it would get better in time, but the "attacks" continued. Erica, who has worked as a nurse in the past, would listen to Evan's lungs and notice that even though he was having trouble breathing, his lungs sounded clear. It was a mystery. Then one evening this

firmed every parent's worse nightmare. Evan had a mass in his chest. The hospital staff then performed a CT scan and concluded quite confidently that sweet Evan had cancer.

Morris Hospital directly transferred Evan and his family up to Oak Lawn where he was admitted to Advocate Hope Children's Hospital. They diagnosed past December he had Evan with Acute Lym-

phoblastic Leukemia or ALL (T cell) cancer. This form of cancer accounts for about 15% to 25% of all acute Lymphoblastic Leukemias in children and adults. It is more commonly found in older children or teenagers. It is aggressive and affects the white blood cells known as T-Cells. Its symptoms can be unspecific at times and are commonly mistaken for other common illnesses. It develops very quickly with symptoms occurring in a matter of days or weeks. The symptoms can include large glands that persist for up to six weeks, abdominal pain and or frequent and persistent infections. These are caused by a lack of healthy red and white cells and platelets in the blood. Evan's mass in his chest was partially caused by his Thymus Glands, where T-cells are produced. It became enlarged due to the T-cells

Focus must not only be Livingston County Economic maintained on existing businesses and assets, but on the cultural and capital offerings in our communities. Town centers, libraries, schools, recreational facilities must all be above average if communities are to retain their youthful populations and be able to attract growing businesses with good employment opportunities.

Leaders are of prime importance, but the leaders must have the ability to develop a team approach to resolving community problems.

Asked about the poor business climate in Illinois, Knott responded: "You'll just have to learn to deal with it."

As urgent as the need may be to stimulate growth in Livingston County, Knott emphasized that any goals set must be achievable, and must be accompanied by strategies and plans of action that are measurable.

Knott taught the 3 to 5 p.m. class in a second-floor committee room in the newly-remodeled historic county courthouse, a proper setting for rehabilitating the economic development thoughts of those in atten-



GSW Building Committee Discusses **Projects and Needs**

The Building Committee of the Gardner South Wilmington High School met to discuss facility projects and building needs. Members of the Committee in attendance were Craig Male and Joe Elens. Also in attendance were Board President David Doglio and Superintendent Mike Perrott.

Craig Male reported the status of the current sewer line project. Although the sewer line has been put in the ground on the north side of the building there is still some concrete work that needs to be completed. When the weather cooperates a new concrete pad can be poured at the main entrance of the school. Until the project is complete the public has to enter

through door fourteen on the south side of the building by the tennis courts.

Male pointed out that additional work may be needed in the building to replace waste lines that were not included in the scope of work from last summer's renovation project. This project is being reviewed and will have to be scheduled for the sum-

The committee reviewed items that were mentioned during the annual building inspection by the Regional Office of Education. Perrott stated that there are plans to address the few items that showed up on the report. New door releases for the cafeteria doors and running power to ceiling mounted

will addressed. Board Member Joe Elens

pointed out repairs that need to be made to the doors that exit from the gymnasium to the corridor. Perrott was instructed to contact a contractor to look into the needed repairs to the door hardware. Joe Elens also commented that several community members appreciate the installation of handrails in the gym balcony and the additional handicapped parking.

President Doglio encouraged Perrott to continue to work with the maintenance staff to address the minor building issues that were identified. Perrott was also asked to create a timeline for initiating and completing building repair and improvements that were discussed for presentation to the Board of Education at a regular meeting.

Perrott indicated that he was hesitant to begin projects due to the lack of revenue received into the Operations / Maintenance fund. Perrott stated that, "because the Village of Gardner has not forwarded \$420,000 of TIF funds owed to the school, many of the needed projects cannot be started. Right now we don't have the money to start some of these projects. It looks like the Village will delay funds owed to the district and delay projects that we need to begin. Summer work may also be delayed or not started."

2013 Crop Outlook

Will we plant more corn in 2013?

Most world grain traders would like U.S producers to increase corn acres and depend on South American farmers to increase supply of sovbeans. At the present time, we are expecting South America to produce a record soybean crop although we do see some problem areas

in Argentina. Over the next six weeks, planting decisions will be finalized, with the main question being "how many acres of corn will be planted?" Corn needs to be planted on high-productivity land so in most cases the extra acres of corn usually come at expense of soybeans. At today's prices corn is projected to be more profitable in 2013 than soybeans. While this may be true for 2013 we need to look at what effect this will have on future years. Planting more or all corn in 2013 may result in lower returns for 2014 because we would be

planting fewer or no acres of corn following soybeans, of course we expect to get a yield boost for corn following soybeans.

How do we anticipate 2013 net farm income to compare to average income?

Given today's (February 5) future prices, we could expect harvest prices of \$5.80 corn and \$13.20 soybeans. Using these prices and University of Illinois' table of costs the result will most likely be above average net income.

Should you be pricing some of your 2013 produc-

We think so - today's prices are well above values one year ago. Corn is \$.60 per bushel higher, soybeans \$2.75 per bushel higher and wheat is a dollar or so above last year. And this year, we anticipate South America to produce 30 million metric tonnes more soybean than last year. At the present time Brazil, known for soybeans, is actually expecting more corn than we are. So competition is heating up this year.

Most analysts conclude that grain and oil seed prices still carry considerable premium just in fear of what happened last year. There is also a little weather premium built into 2013 prices. A lot of talk about how dry subsoils across the corn belt are and worries that summer could be hot and dry. If we receive or even get forecasts of improved moisture prospects in coming weeks that weather premium will evaporate quickly.

In summary, with the extremely tight supplies of corn and soybeans here and around the world we don't expect a drop in prices until traders are fairly confident that the 2013 crop is made. Prices are still at near record highs for cash and we will continue to see wide fluctuations on every bit of market news that comes out. The next major market mover will be spring planting weather. That spring weather will go a long ways toward determining how many acres of corn and beans get planted and what hunger event. kind of a start the crops get off to. I know we have a lot of weather to get through before crop is made but don't is part of a nationwide camoverlook today's prices of new crop corn or beans.

Are Cover Crops the Future of Agriculture?

by Matthew Boucher Are Cover Crops the Future of Agriculture?

While driving through the country side late this summer, you may have spotted a yellow airplane or two crop dusting a farmer's corn or bean field. These days, that isn't too uncommon of a sight; however did you know some of those planes aren't crop dusters at all? A few of these "Air Tractors", as they have been nicknamed, are set up to plant seeds in the farmer's fields.

These unique planes are equipped handle large amounts of small seeds, called Cover Crops, and spread them evenly and accurately across the farmer's fields. These seeds are planted at the end of August into mid September, into standing corn or bean fields, where they will grow and produce many benefits to the farmer and the environment as well.

So what is a Cover Crop? Brian Scott, an Indiana farmer who posts about cover crops and his farm, at www.thefarmerslife.wordpress.com puts it best, "It [the plants] covers the soil during the period between the time you harvest one crop and plant the next."

So why would a farmer plant a Cover Crop? There is a list of reasons to plant a cover crop like reducing tillage, reducing chemical applications, reducing fuel

This Highland Township field, above, was growing corn in 2012 when it was over seeded with Annual Rye Grass in September of 2012. After the corn crop was harvested, a lush healthy field of green grass remained.

The Tillage Radish, right, helps the soil retain nutri-

costs and reducing overall input costs all while potentially raising the Corn or Soybean Crops yield. In Brian's latest post on Cover Crops "Farming Smarter With Cover Crops" he states 'Cover crops provide erosion control, improve soil structure, increase organic matter, scavenge soil nutrients, suppress weeds and pests, and some can be used as forage for livestock." For instance, when the Rye Grass shown in the picture above is only 2" tall, its roots can be as many as 3' deep. When these roots die off over the winter, they will leave channels in the ground allowing excess water to penetrate the soil rather than stay atop the ground which can cause compaction, nutrient runoff and could potentially damage the fol-

lowing crop. Some other examples of Cover Crops are, Cereal Rye Grass which has been proven to have a detrimental effect on soybean pests and can be used for livestock forage, Crimson Clover which can naturally produce nitrogen benefiting the following

years corn crop and the commonly used Tillage Radish (pictured below) which loosens up the soils, helps the soil retain its nutrients and can also provide forage for livestock.

This Tillage Radish was planted in September and picked after the farmer's crop was harvested. As the radish grows it takes in nutrients from the soil (preventing them from leaching out of the field) which will be released back into the soils after the Radish dies over the winter months. In the spring, all that will remain in the field is a loose seed bed filled with nutrients that is ready for the following years crop to be planted.

Cover Crops are still fairly new to Midwestern farmers and time will tell if they will be the next big thing in Agriculture, but they are catching on. Their wide array of benefits is beginning to be realized by many more farmers every year. 

Federal Crop Insurance Deadline March 15

Illinois farmers who are recovering from last summer's drought will need to start planning their federal crop insurance coverage needs in advance of the March 15 sign-up deadline.

Some farmers will find lower rates due to reductions made by the Risk Management Agency based on changes in the federal rating methodology. The Trend-Adjusted Actual Production History option has been expanded to the entire state. It allows farmers to have their actual production history based on recent county yield trends.

Other notable federal crop changes include a High Risk Alternative Coverage Endorsement which provides separate reduced-yield coverage on high-risk acres within a county. The endorsement further allows for revenue protection at a lower coverage level, or an equal or reduced level of yield coverage. In addition, blue corn contract growers in select Central Illinois counties can obtain a Yield Protection policy.

Farmers can secure coverage through yield, revenue and county protection policies. Some farmers could qualify for Enterprise Unit coverage that insures all acres of an individual crop within a county.

Farmers can further reduce risk by developing a grain marketing plan.
