Village of Dwight Referendum

On Tuesday, March 18, the Village of Dwight will have a referendum on the ballot to increase sales tax 1/2 cent. If approved, the monies generated from this increase will be used strictly for infrastructure upgrades and repairs. The Village Board has determined that the monies would be spent initially on street resurfacing and reconstruction of existing roads. It is anticipated \$300,000 would be generated annually by this increase in Dwight's sales tax.

While an additional \$300,000 per year would be a start on repaving streets, residents are reminded about the high costs of repaving. "Passage of the sales tax referendum and the additional funds it would bring into the Village, would be a start to help in getting the Village streets back in shape," stated Dwight Village Administrator Kevin McNamara, "But everyone needs to be aware that every problem street will not be able to be fixed "At today's overnight." prices, which go up every year, it costs around \$50,000 to resurface one block and \$160,000 to reconstruct and rebuild one block."

If approved next week, the half-cent sales tax would not go into effect until January 2015, and it would be April 2015 before any of the monies would be seen by the Village.

Currently, due to the passage of an additional one cent sales tax for schools in Livingston County, sales tax in Livingston County is one cent higher than in Grundy County. If the current sales tax referendum is approved, a shopper in the Livingston County portion of Dwight purchasing \$10 worth of goods would see their sales tax rise from 72 1/2 cents to 77 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents. In the Grundy County portion of Dwight (Love's, McDonald's, etc. the tax on \$10 worth of goods would go from 62 1/2 cents to $67 \frac{1}{2}$ cents).

Groceries, prescriptions, over the counter medicines, vehicles, service operations such as barber and beauty shops, video rental, attorneys, accountants, are excluded items and are not charged Sales Tax in Illinois.

Dwight residents are encouraged to contact one of their Village Trustees or the Village Hall if they have any further questions regarding this proposed Sales Tax, which will be voted on Tuesday, March 18, and they are also encouraged to vote.

McNamara added "If you do not want to declare a party and ask for either a Republican or Democrat ballot next Tuesday, you can ask for a non-partisan ballot and still be able to vote on this referendum. We encourage everyone to celebrate our freedom and Vote."

What should we do with Dwight's swimming pool? That was a big question on the table facing the Village of Dwight Administration Committee when it met on March 4.

The Robert Stevenson

was built in 1976 - 1977, with the pool opening on Memorial Day weekend in 1977. At that time, the pool facility cost approximately \$300,000 to build with funding for the pool coming from individual pledges and donations. The land was donated to the village from the McWilliams family. For over 37 years, the pool has provided summertime fun

summer, the pool opening was delayed for weeks while problems with the pool's pump system were being resolved.

Present at the meeting was David Burbach of Burbach Aquatics out of Plattville, WI to discuss his company's evaluation of Dwight's aging swimming pool and to propose options for consideration.



Sheriff Kevin Callahan recently announced that the Grundy County Sheriff's Office is now able to fingerprint Illinois Concealed Carry applicants.

The Grundy County Sheriff's Office is now a certified Live Scan vendor, which allows digital photographs and electronic fingerprints to be submitted to the Illinois State Police. This will expedite the process for citizens' Concealed Carry applications. A fee applies for this service, per application that covers the fees required by the State of Illinois. 



(continued from page 1) An option to repair and caulk cracks in the walls and floor would extend the life of the pool vessel by two or three years with a cost estimate of \$30,000. Another option is to add a PVC liner which could extend the vessel life by 10 years at a cost estimate of \$80,000. A third option would be to replace the pool's shallow area with a new area. According to Burbach, the shallow portion is the worst area of the pool's vessel. Cost for the new shallow area would be approximately \$550,000. Burbach recommended that the wading pool be closed permanently.

The bathhouse structure was another consideration. According to code, the bathhouse meets the minimum requirements for stalls, urinals, etc so it could be renovated. An option to renovate the facility, including adding a liner to the existing pool and renovating the existing bathhouse is estimated at just under \$1 million.

However, other problems - such as problems with the pool's main circulating pump and aging water lines go beyond repairing the pool's vessel and bathhouse structure. And, since the pool was built in the 1970s, Code regulations have also


changed. Therefore, making renovations could mean having to bring certain areas up to code – a domino effect of one change leading to another.

"There are just lots of little things that come with the age of the pool," Dave Bozarth, Director of Dwight Public Works, told The Paper. "The vessel is the most costly thing, and these are not very long term solutions.'

In light of the many issues, would it make sense to build a brand new swimming pool facility? The group discussed the option of replacing the entire facility with a new family aquatics center and the benefits of such a facility to the community.

A municipal pool offers four important opportunities for residents of a community including recreation, education, wellness and competition. A project of this size could positively change the profile of the community. Conversely, losing the pool could cause a negative blow. Village Administrator Kevin McNamara warned the group on the impact of cutting community services.

We are trying to attract people to the community,' McNamara told The Paper. "If we don't have this type

of recreational facility to offer, I don't think we are going to be successful." Burbach agreed.

"If your goal is to lower the average age and attract young families, then you need to have some amenities in the community," said Burbach.

With few outdoor public pool facilities in the area, Burbach told the committee that a professionally run aquatics center in this vicinity could draw people from 20-25 miles away. Burbach presented a layout of a family aquatics center built in Newton IL in 2010. Newton has a population of approximately 2,889.

The suggested new outdoor facility with its zero depth entrance pool and waterslide comes with an estimated cost of \$4 million and an expected life span of up to 50 years. Paying for a project of this magnitude can come from various sources including grants,

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White to allow a printed receipt from the Secretary of State to serve temporarily as the vehicle renewal sticker was approved by the State Senate.

Senate Bill 2802 would allow motorists to drive without an up-to-date vehicle renewal sticker affixed to their license plate provided they have a receipt from the Secretary of State that proves they purchased a sticker online before expiration, but have not yet received the registration sticker. The receipt is valid for no more than 30 days from the expiration of the previous registration's sticker's date.

Last year, more than 150,000 customers purchased vehicle renewal registration stickers during the last two days in May. The vast majority of customers these transactions; just over 200 percent in the Secretary 6,300 people purchased their renewal stickers online.

The Silver Fox in Streator

The Silver Fox in Streator, which opened November 30 of last year, is a unique venue. Events ranging from weddings to corporate meetings and everything in between can be held at this historical and beautiful location.

Sarah Besser and Bill Phelan, the venue's owners, were eager to save and restore one of the many old buildings in downtown Streator, but were unsure of exactly what they wanted to do.

The inspiration for their business came from a tragic event, Sarah's brother John's John, whose death. childhood nickname was "Silver Fox", fell ill and passed away at the age of thirty-three. Chatsworth Corner

WHAAAT? The water bill went UP? I can't afford any more! The town is getting RICH on what I pay! THAT's ridiculous! Water is FREE, it's our right!

Yes, the town of Chatsworth water bills have increased. And do you know WHY?

What does it take to produce a glass of water? Simple. Water is pumped from the ground to the water tower and then gravity feeds into our homes. NOT!

Our water comes from the Mahomet Aquifer. That



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is the giant fresh water lake over 100 miles long, deep underground. It services most of central Illinois.

Chatsworth has four wells, two are north of town and two are in town. The water starts by going through an aerator to remove solid impurities. It moves on to the treatment plant for filtration and chemical injection. The system of four filters removes manganese and iron, pathogens and sediments. Chlorine and fluoride are injected to kill bacteria and strengthen our teeth.

Water goes through daily testing, monitoring the chlorine and fluoride levels. The EPA tests monthly using rigorous standards for quality and safety. The wells also have to be tested by the EPA regularly for ground contaminants. Only then is it pumped up to the 200,000 gallon, 125 foot tall water tower and mains where it is stored to be used as needed by the 1200 residents and businesses in Chatsworth.

The water must comply with all levels of safety from the first house it reaches to the last. The technicians that monitor, test and service our water system are obligated to obtain a Class B Water Operator's License from the state EPA that requires strict testing and 30 hours of continuing education every three years.

The Auditor's Report states the cost of producing 1,000 gallons of water in Chatsworth is \$3.40. The town of Chatsworth charges residents \$5.00 per thousand gallons. That is less than \$1.00 for 200 gallons. For less than \$2.00 per day residents receive water, sewage treatment and garbage removal. The rates were compared to surrounding towns with a comparable system.
