PRAIRIE CREEK LIBRARY CELEBRATES

In July, 1731, Benjamin Franklin and 50 subscribers invested 40 shillings each and started the first library for the British Colonies. Nearly 200 years later, after a purchase of land on Prairie Avenue by the Dwight Woman's Club was given to the town of Dwight for use as a public library, the Dwight Public Library opened its doors on February 1, 1927 with a total of 1,679 books. Today, it is estimated that over 120,000 libraries of all kinds exist in the United States. Those, along with Dwight's Prairie Creek Public Library, will join together in celebrating National Library Week from April 13 - 19.

Dwight Public Library remained on Prairie Avenue for 64 years, and after recognizing the need for a larger facility, the Library Board accepted Mr. James Oughton's offer to donate the Carriage House for Dwight's new library.

Renovations began in 1990, and the new facility was opened in 1991 with over 12,000 books. In that same year, the board petitioned to change Dwight Public

Library to a Library District, providing a larger territory and tax base. During the mid 1990's, funding was raised to renovate the upper floor of the library, to house both a children's library and community meeting room. In addition, an elevator would be installed to meet ADA compliance.

Since then, the board has helped to maintain the library and to facilitate its ability to stay current with the changing media trends.

Under the direction of Librarian Kristin Glatz, the library currently serves over 6,600 north-central Illinois residents. A collection of over 30,000 volumes exists. Computers, printers, copy and fax machines, free Wi-Fi and a meeting room are also available for the public.

The library board members through the years have acted as visionaries, who have given time and resources to meet the needs of a changing culture and community, providing the people of Dwight with an invaluable resource. As Alan Mortensen, President of the current board says, "Working to improve

library services and programs is one of the most enjoyable duties of being a board member. We try to come up with ideas that will interest people in the community and give them an opportunity to learn and be entertained. It is interesting to try to keep services provided at the library practical, and pertinent to the needs of the community. As technology changes, keeping up with current trends and ways to stay relevant are very important to us."

Fellow board member Janet Neville echoed that sentiment, "Many people think the library is only a place to check out books. While that fact alone would be incentive enough for me, the library also has magazines, newspapers, music CD's, movie DVD's and e-books - all loaned out for FREE."

Having a board willing to embrace the changes in technology and how the public engages in the use of media, has been important. Board member Rosemary Miller adds, "As a board, we have tried to be forward thinking in an effort to move the library into the

Be Prepared for Severe Weather

The following is a public service announcement from the Dwight ESDA (Emergency Services and Disaster Agency).

With the arrival of warm weather, severe weather arrives as well. The following are suggestions to help you and your family be prepared for severe weather.

- Have a portable AM/FM radio available, preferably a weather alert radio.
- Have a reliable flashlight available.
- Monitor TV or radio for weather updates.

Severe thunderstorm watches: These mean that conditions are favorable for severe thunderstorms. A watch will be issued by the National Weather Service and will expire at a specified time.

There is no cable TV announcement or emergency siren sounded in Dwight for severe thunderstorm watches. Be prepared to seek shelter. Monitor TV and radio for weather updates.

Severe thunderstorm warnings: These mean severe thunderstorms have been sighted in our area. A warning will be issued by the National Weather Service and will expire at a specified time.

There is no cable TV announcement of the warning. Emergency sirens will be activated only if there is hail, damaging winds above 58 mph, or evidence of fun-

nel clouds forming.

When emergency sirens are sounding: Take cover immediately.

Go to a basement if possible. If you don't have a basement, seek shelter in a small room near the center of your dwelling or the bathroom. Stay away from windows or skylights. Keep a flashlight, portable radio or weather radio with you. Listen for updates. Stay alert until an "all clear" is given by the National Weather Service or the time has expired for the warning.

Tornado watches: These mean conditions are favorable for tornadoes to develop. The National Weather Service will issue a watch that will expire at a specified time.

There will be a cable TV announcement for tornado watches. Emergency sirens will be activated only if there is hail, damaging winds above 58 mph or evidence of funnel clouds forming.

Take emergency action as described in severe thunderstorm warnings.

Tornado warnings: These mean tornadoes have been sighted in our area. The National Weather Service will issue a warning that will expire at a specified time.

Emergency sirens will be activated. There will be an announcement of the warning over cable TV.

Take cover immediately.

You are in imminent danger.

Go to the basement if possible. If you don't have a basement, seek shelter in a small room near the center of your dwelling or the bathroom. Monitor radio stations or weather radio for updates. Stay in your sheltered area until the time has expired for the warning.

Remember: WATCHES mean in time severe weather or tornadoes may develop. Be prepared to take shelter.

WARNINGS mean severe weather or tornadoes have been sighted in our area. You may be instructed to seek shelter immediately. If sirens sound, take cover.

We suggest purchasing a weather radio that will keep you advised of conditions.

Local radio stations may keep you updated as weather changes occur. Here are a few stations in our area:

Pontiac - WTRX FM 93.7, WPOK AM 1080, WJEZ FM 98.9
Morris - WJDK FM 95.7, WCSJ AM 1550

Dwight cable TV carries The Weather Channel on channel 28. It will carry local Doppler radar of our area if we are experiencing severe weather.

Remember, be prepared. Have a plan and be ready to take action. Tornadoes can occur in any month of the year, with Illinois averaging 25 per year.

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Improve Your Own "Investment Environment"

On April 22, we celebrate Earth Day — a day devoted to education and action on environmental issues. As a citizen of the world, you may have a keen interest in protecting your physical surroundings. If you're always jumping in and out of the market, looking for "low" points to buy and "high" points to sell, you'll probably be wrong most of the time — because nobody can accurately predict highs and lows. Even more importantly, you may find yourself out of the market during the beginning of a rally, which is when the biggest gains tend to occur.

Diversify your "species" of investments. Drawing inspiration from Earth Day, the United Nations has designated 2011-2020 as the United Nations Decade on Biodiversity. And, just as preserving the diversification of species is important for life on Earth, the diversification of your investment portfolio is essential for its health. By owning a variety of investments — stocks, bonds, government securities, certificates of deposit and so on — you can help protect yourself from downturns that primarily affect just one asset class. (Keep in mind, though, that while diversification can reduce the effects of volatility on your holdings, it can't guarantee profits or protect against loss.)

Earth Day happens just once a year — but the lessons of environmentalism can help you, as an investor, for all the days and years ahead.

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


future. Our library programming uses advanced technologies to better serve our patrons."

DGS Plans Summer Projects April Board Actions

Signs of summer approaching are showing up everywhere – even school board meetings as summer projects at Dwight Grade School were discussed by the District 232 Board of Education when it met on April 9.

One project slated for this summer, and receiving board approval, includes resurfacing of the school's gymnasium floor. Central Supply Co. of Bloomington won the contract with a bid of \$13,750 for material and labor. A new center floor logo is also included in the cost. Monies for this project will come from Sales Tax Revenues.

Other summer projects will include a solution for filling the gap currently between the drive and the sidewalk on the north side of the building, painting the hallways, and replacing ceiling tiles.

In other business, the board acted on a recommendation by administration to move to a powerful school management software system that includes modules for both business and student management. The integrated software solution, Skyward, offers a wide variety of options to meet the specific needs of a school. The student management suite offers many options such as schedule building, grading, report cards, health records, family

access, lesson planning and Response to Intervention. The School Business Suite offers assistance with operations such as budget preparation, payroll processing and reporting, contracts, and employee management. While the initial transition to Skyward is expensive, the cost reduces significantly by year three. Board members agreed that the transition is necessary.

"The money is a huge amount right now," said Board member Cathy Ferguson. "But it has to be done and we have to keep moving forward."

A three-year contract at a total cost of \$140,804.50, to be split with the DTHS District, was approved by the Grade School Board pending approval of the same by DTHS District 230 at its April 16 meeting.

Moving to another matter, the board also approved a three-year contract with Bushue Human Resources, Inc. The outsourced risk management company assists in managing complex business and administrative functions for school districts. Bushue focuses on areas such as human resources, safety, insurance and background screening. The District currently already uses the company for fingerprinting and background screening needs. Cost for year one of the contract is \$3,450 with an additional \$50 for years two and three.

The Board also: learned that a requested \$20,000 in additional Pre-K funds has been granted the District.

approved a leave extension for teacher Mike Guerrero.

employed Laura Calhoon as Special Education Teacher for the 2014 – 15 school year.

employed Laura Franks as ECE Aide, .5 AM part-time through the end of the current school year.

employed Missy Ferrari as ECE Aide, .5 PM part-time through the end of the current school year.

approved summer maintenance and technology workers as presented.

approved offering summer school and posting for required teachers as done in previous year.

learned the State of Illinois is currently behind in payments to the District totaling \$117,228.36.

Following a closed session discussion, the board accepted Administration's recommendation to find Student A guilty of violation of student handbook policies and recommend the expulsion of Student A's bus privileges for the remainder of the 2013-14 school year.

The next meeting of the DGS Board of Education will be Wednesday, May 14 at 6 p.m. in the DGS Library. All meetings are open to the public.

Liv. Co. Proactive Drug Investigation Leads to Bust

Livingston County Sheriff's Proactive Gang/Drug Unit recently advised that on April 7, at around 6:37 p.m., a drug investigation led them to a buy/bust north of Dwight.

During the investigation, 28 grams of cannabis, four grams of cocaine, and \$450.00 were seized as evidence. During the bust, Derek Huss of Wilmington, and Julie Keagle of Shorewood, fled the scene in a 2014 Ford Focus.

A short time later, Dwight Police advised that the vehicle had crashed just north of Livingston County near the intersection of Dwight Road and Livingston Road in Grundy County.

Huss was located in a field by police units and taken into custody. Keagle

was also located and released. Both Huss and Keagle were medically checked by Dwight EMS and refused treatment.

Huss was arrested on cannabis, controlled substances, and numerous traffic violations.

Agencies involved with the arrest were the Livingston County Proactive Unit, LCSP Patrol Units, and Dwight Police Patrol Units. The investigation is ongoing with more charges possibly pending.

Mayor Richard Runyon called the April 10 Town of Chatsworth Board meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Roll call was taken and all board members were present. The minutes from the last meeting were corrected by addition and unanimously approved.

Sheriff Mitchell's report recalled 32 calls last month with three citations and five written warnings. Business as usual. The new Sheriff's contract was reviewed and approved for the next three years.

Trustee Schaffer brought up the need for fuel tanks to be shared by the Fire Department and the town vehicles. It is under consideration how to share costs of purchase, insurance and filling the tanks.

The water plant paper work will be submitted to the state by Tuesday for the new plant construction.

Under "New Business," it was noted there is a problem with the town hall windows leaking. However, it only occurs when it rains.

President Runyon reminded everyone that tree planting season is upon them. They've promised some residents on 4th Street to replace trees that have been removed.

There were no other trustee reports this time. Bills were paid and the meeting was adjourned at 7:38 p.m.

President Hansen closed the meeting until next time, May 2.

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


LETTER TO THE EDITOR

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

A Fire Pit Adds a Cozy Element to an Outdoor Area

Spring sends us outside and anxious for yard projects to create a relaxing outdoor environment for leisure time enjoyment. One such project might be to build a fire pit suitable for a good old fashioned wiener roast or just some casual conversation with friends around a warm fire on a cool evening.

Google "fire pits" and you will find many examples; some so simple they can be completed in ten minutes and others so solidly constructed that it may take at least a day or two to build.

Fire pits can be purchased as kits. Kits include a steel ring insert and concrete wedge-shaped blocks. If you prefer to create your own unique design, stones and steel inserts can be purchased separately. Steel rings are optional but recommended for a better built pit. Rings can be hard to find in

home supply stores, but more easily found on-line. Look for a ring with a lip at the top. The lip will allow the ring to sit on the top edge of the fire pit wall. A grate for the ring may be included.

Marilyn Kruger of rural Ransom, added a fire pit to the family's outdoor area last fall and offered the following instructions for anyone interested in a similar project.

"The first decision to be made is where to locate your fire pit," said Kruger. "Choose an area that is at least 50 feet from buildings and away from overhanging tree branches and dry brushy areas."

Once you have decided on your area and design, gather your tools. In addition to the concrete blocks and steel ring, you will need a spade, measuring tape, stake, heavy string, spray paint, long and short levels, rake, hand tamper, rubber mallet, gravel, sand, and

masonry adhesive (optional).

To begin, drive a stake in the center of the area chosen for the pit. Second, measure the radius of the steel ring and add to it the measurement of the depth of the stone that will surround the pit plus 3-4 inches. Then, tie a string to the stake and measure out to the distance of the measurement in step 2. Using the string, mark the circumference of the circle with spray paint - this is the outside edge of your fire pit wall plus a little "wiggle" room. With a spade, remove grass and dirt inside the painted circle to a depth of 12 inches. Rake and level. Keep center stake in place to set steel ring in position later.

Add gravel and firmly tamp until a level depth of 4 inches has been reached. Top gravel with 4 inches of sand. Tamp and level.

Lay 3-4 rows of interlocking bricks around the inside of the circle. Use a rubber mallet to set bricks in place. Fill spaces between bricks with sand to keep them stable. This will be the foundation for the stone wall. Check for level as bricks are laid. (Instead of bricks, a 4" deep layer of concrete can be laid.)

After bricks are laid, set the steel ring in place. Begin to set the wedge-shaped blocks on the brick foundation around the ring. Offset the placement of the blocks as additional rows are added. As the wall is built, occasionally leave a small space between the stones to create better air flow for a good fire. After stacking two rows of stone, you will want to remove the ring in order to continue building the pit wall.

"Stones can be set in place with masonry adhesive. Once the adhesive has been applied, the stones cannot be removed," said Marilyn. "If you choose to use adhesive, it is best to disassemble the walls after you are

satisfied with the construction and then reassemble the walls, cementing the blocks permanently in place."

Finally, set the steel ring back inside the pit walls.

"Stone caps can be added to the top of the wall, covering the steel lip. While optional, this gives the fire pit a very nice, finished look," suggested Marilyn. "In the fire pit pictured, a layer of bricks was added to the inside area of the steel ring. A solid base makes it easier to clean the fire ashes from floor of the pit."

Again, this is one of many ways to build a fire pit. Go on-line and find one that works for you.

Remember, always have regard for all aspects of safety when considering an option like a fire pit and never leave a fire not attended by an adult. Also, before beginning, make sure there are no restrictions in your local area against fire pits and outdoor burning.

Now, sit back, relax and enjoy.

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The Right Way To Mow

You cut your grass a few days ago, but already, it's looking a little long. Darn! You trudge to the garden shed, pull out your mower, set the blades low and start chopping. Chopping? Yikes! If you want your lawn to look good, you need to mow it well.

Proper mowing is essential to a healthy lawn, and timing is everything. When do you mow your lawn? Do you get up early in the morning and plow your way through the wet grass, never worrying about slipping, spreading disease or clogging up the mower blades? Do you wait until mid-afternoon when the heat will place you and the grass under a lot of stress? Do you mow in the evening when the sun has almost set and

the grass is dry? Hopefully, you choose the latter when conditions are perfect for mowing.

How do you mow? Do you start in the same corner and mow in the same direction each time? While you might appreciate the routine, your grass won't, as it will soon grow in the pattern you have created. For straighter grass strands, mow in a different direction each time. This will also allow for a more even cut.

How sharp are your mower blades? Mower blades are like knives. The duller they are, the more ragged cut they will make. Sharpen your mower blades often throughout the season for a clean cut.

At what height are your mower blades set? Sharp mower blades won't mean a thing if you don't have them

set at the proper height. You will find dozens of charts with height recommendations for various grass types. Most experts, however, advise never cutting more than a third of the grass blades at a time. This will allow for deeper root systems, better growth and fewer weeds.

What happens if you miss a week or two? Don't try to make up for it by moving down your blade and cutting it shorter. The longer, heavier clippings will clog up the mower fast and leave many clumps on the lawn. Instead, cut the grass at the highest height possible and then cut it again at the normal height a few days later.

Stick to the one-third rule and you'll never have to worry about clippings. You can just leave them on the lawn. They will decompose

quickly and fertilize the grass (they will not lead to the buildup of thatch as you may have heard). If you want to dispose of the clippings, you may do so but be careful how you go about this. Most city dumps will not take them. Consider using them to fertilize your garden or flowerbeds instead.

As the growing season comes to an end, lower your mower blades for a shorter cut. This will retard the growth and reduce the chances of snow mold later. When spring arrives, take a day to clean up and make way for new grass. Remove any leaves and other brush that may have fallen onto your lawn during the winter that could smother the grass.

Proper mowing is key to a lush lawn. Know what is involved, follow through and never take safety for granted. Wear the appropriate apparel and safety gear when mowing—long pants, good shoes and eye and ear protection. Clear the lawn of debris beforehand, take pets inside and insist children stay well away. Finally make sure your mower is in good condition and the blades are sharp. Then get ready to give it a go!



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
