## Disciplinary Action for Dwight Officer Board Approves Reward Offer

Following a closed session discussion on June 23, the Dwight Village Board of Trustees approved several stipulations that must be met in order for a local police officer to be retained by the Dwight Police Department.

Officer Watson McKee was sentenced on DUI charges following a one-vehicle accident on December 21, 2013 where he sustained serious injuries. McKee pled guilty to driving under the influence of alcohol in Livingston County Circuit Court in May. On June 9, the Board was split on its decision to retain McKee, who is also the Dwight Police Department's

K-9 handler, with Mayor Jared Anderson casting the tie breaking vote.

The board agreed that Officer McKee will return to work Sept 19, provided his driver's license has been reinstated by the State of Illinois by this date.

Disciplinary action agreed upon by the board, and conditions that must be adhered to by McKee, include passing a medical evaluation by a local doctor of the Village's choosing. McKee will also be required to retake and pass the State of Illinois physical agility test for law enforcement officers. In addition, Officer McKee is required to help develop and participate in programs at local and area schools aimed at educating

young people on the consequences of drinking and driving; there should be a minimum of ten programs over the next five years.

Finally, Officer McKee will be required to participate in random drug and alcohol testing for two years starting on his return date. Any future violation of any Village of Dwight Code of Ethics will result in immediate termination.

In another matter, Village officials agreed to provide an additional \$5,000 donation towards a reward for any information which leads to the arrest and filing of criminal charges with regard to the double homicide that occurred in Dwight on June 14, 2014 in the 200 (continued on page 16)

Trustee Brian Verdun moved to approve the minutes of the May 12 Regular Board Meeting as printed; Trustee Herman Fearman seconded and the motion was approved.

Trustee Matt Weaver moved to approve and pay all bills on the Board Listing Report #780, Board Listing Report #781, plus all additional bills; the motion was approved.

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

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

Mayor Richard Runyon called the Town of Chatsworth Board meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. June 26, 2014. Most board members were present. The minutes from the June 12 meeting were approved and seconded.

No Sheriff's report was given.

### Old Business

Trustee Shane Bell reported there will be a family movie night "drive in" style under the park pavilion complete with popcorn in the Park on July 11. Residents are asked to bring chairs and blankets.

Jennifer Olson from the Livingston County Housing Authority came and spoke about working with the Livingston County Economic Development Council and Livingston Workforce Services to offer residents the opportunity for job training. She also added LCHA wants to lend a helping hand in beautifying Chatsworth to add to the community.

Mare Reardanz reported there are 140 stop signs and ten yield signs in the town of Chatsworth. She presented a map showing there is a stop

## Gardner VB Receives Audit Signs, Garbage, Flooding Discussed

The Gardner Village Board opened its regular meeting on June 23 with comments from resident Sharon Pickles, who addressed the board asking when the flea market sign in front of O'Hare Towing would be removed from the berm. She believes it is on village property. Pickles pointed out the village required Future Tree Service to remove their items from the village right-of-way several years ago.

The board received the annual audit completed by Mack & Associates. The report was presented by Erica Blumberg who pointed out to the commissioners she has completed the audit for the past three years. Blumberg noted there was no significant change in the village's financial standing compared to last year. The largest variances year-over-year were related to TIF payments for the school district held from the prior fiscal year and paid in the reported year. Commissioner Mike Serena motioned and the board voted to accept the audit as presented.

The board approved the renewal of the refuse/recycle contract with Homewood Disposal. Commissioner Dick Hileman advised the board he was contacted by Homewood to extend the current agreement by five years, drop the "extra garbage" tag fee, continue the yard waste and white goods fees as they are, and replace the current recycle bins with a 95 gallon cart and move recycling pick-up to every two weeks

rather than weekly. Fees would remain the same for the first year and increase three percent in each of years two through five. Hileman motioned and the board voted to extend the agreement per the letter from Homewood Disposal.

Business owner Wayne Holt addressed the board regarding flooding at his building at Campus Rd. and L-53, with water flowing across the easement property between his building and the apartments. Holt stated his building existed prior to the construction of the apartments, however the apartment property was built up, directing runoff onto his property.

Village Attorney Scott Belt advised he and Holt walked the property with the survey but is unsure of the ownership of the 50-foot strip of property in question. Belt also confirmed the pump discharge from the apartments discharges to the north, toward Mr. Holt's property. Holt commented the property holds six to eight inches of water on an ongoing basis and he is unable to maintain the property. Holt also stated that if the village owns the property and would be willing to sell, he would buy and improve the property since purchasing in 2007 but would be forced to move his business out of the village without improvement.

The Board directed Village Engineer Guy Christensen to determine elevation of the properties in question. The board will also determine if a violation exists on the part of the north apartment owners and notify them of such.

### Sarcasm killed the cat.

Sarcasm killed the cat. The cat is our interaction on the Internet. Sarcasm in itself is already a very strange thing. You say the exact opposite of what you mean. Obviously in person your mannerisms and the tone in which you speak can usually identify to the person receiving the message that it is in fact sarcasm. Usually, anyway.

Now let's remove the tone in which you say it, the mannerisms that accompany the word, and any other situational queues that could otherwise indicate sarcasm, and what are you left with, just words. Which is very easy to transition to online interaction.

This writing platform is a great example as to how sarcasm could very easily be misconstrued, unless I put it in italics or quotes around it, is there any real way to tell that what I'm saying is sincere, or isn't sincere? This is becoming very problematic in the online world.

I was tweeting with one of my favorite writers the other day, and I said something very sincere about him being a great writer. The response he gave was something along the lines of "thank you, that's one of the nicest things anyone has said." I'm paraphrasing but bear with me.

My brain, probably because it's been bombarded with memes, vines, and countless other things that aren't serious, immediately associated it with that same group of nonsensical imagery and information. When interacting with people in a professional manner this can be very problematic.

It gets even worse when communicating from my generation (I'm 20 years old) to the one above that are online, say 45-60. Since it's already very hard to realize when something is genuine or sarcastic online, throwing in a generation gap just makes it that much worse.

I tweet with my uncle on a semi-consistent basis, and granted he's one of the more sarcastic people I know, but almost every tweet that is exchanged has to be followed up with "was that serious, or a joke". I'm not really sure what the step would be to change it. Installing some sort of sarcasm font seems a little far-fetched, and isn't very realistic.

The whole situation just makes it very disheartening to know that memes have discombobulated my brain to the extent where I think everything I see is a joke. It's very possible our generation will never regain sincere online interaction.

If you go to Facebook and you're friends with a decent number of people over 35-40 years of age your feed is dry as a bone, but what you see is what you get. There's little to no sarcasm, which also makes it incredibly boring. Reading about how the bus has been coming 5 minutes late to your kids stop everyday just doesn't resonate with me the way that reading a sarcastic tweet about Kanye West loving himself does.

That's just part of it, though, a lack of sarcasm just isn't entertaining. It just comes down to attempting to dial back on the sarcasm just to make 15% of your twitter interactions run smoother isn't worth it. I'm a victim of it too, I love that stuff. I'm just afraid of the day when the sarcasm is misinterpreted and it costs me a job opportunity or something of that nature.

Yes, I know a job opportunity from twitter, or Facebook or any social media platform seems like it's not a possibility, but it is. It could get your foot in the door, or get you talking with someone that will benefit you at some point down the road.

All it takes is one tweet asking a question, and you respond with a seemingly harmless sarcastic tweet saying "oh definitely" or whatever the response may be and it just gets taken completely the wrong way. In the meantime, keep on clogging the arteries of social media interaction with sarcasm we all love.
