## Red, White, BOOM!

### Weapon Recovered -- Charges Not Yet Filed

Investigators working diligently to solve the murders of Donna Denker and Kelli Denker announced July 3 that the weapon used in the two murders has been recovered.

The Denkers died of gunshot wounds inflicted in their home, 200 W. North St., Dwight, in the early morning of June 14.

Ballistic results have confirmed the weapon is the one used in the two homicides.

Information about the type of weapon, or owner of

the weapon, had not been released as of late Monday afternoon, July 9, as investigators worked to piece together more details of the crime.

Police continue to stress that the shooting was an isolated incident. Anyone with information about who may be involved with the crime should call the Dwight Police Department at 815-584-3132.

Police are confident the case will soon be brought to a resolution.



### Village of Dwight Aggregated Electric Rates Rise

The Village of Dwight has notified businesses and residents that a new bid of 7.85¢ per kilowatt hour for the supply of electricity from First Energy Corp. has been accepted by the village to replace a similar aggregation agreement with First Energy that expired June 30.

The important difference is that the former contract with First Energy was at a kilowatt hour rate of 4.69¢, considerably lower than the

new rate effective July 1.

Customers using 500 kilowatt hours of electricity a month will be paying an additional \$15.80 for their supply of electricity on next month's bill because of the rate increase.

It should be understood that the above rates apply only to the electricity supply portion of the bill. ComEd will continue to deliver the electricity and be responsible for disruptions in service. ComEd will also continue

to send the monthly bills, which include a number of charges for ComEd's delivery and maintenance services in addition to First Energy's charge for the actual amount of electricity used, plus taxes and fees.

Nothing is required from Dwight citizens to remain in the First Energy program. Those who were not in the program will be automatically included unless they again opted out by June 19. (continued on page 3)

## News from the Dwight Fire Protection District

The Dwight Firefighters Association extends a thank you to all the supporters of recent fundraising efforts. As many of you know Smokey Bear was a fixture of the Fire Prevention and Public Education Division of the Dwight Fire Protection District for nearly 30 years. Many years of use have taken a toll on Smokey and he is in need of some repairs and some upgrades. There are only two locations in the United States that manufacture and repair these costumes. The needed repairs must be done in California, which is where Smokey was originally manufactured.

Many people from the community have asked about Smokey Bear, and we determined it was time to get Smokey back in shape and out in the community again. With your help and support these repairs are going to be made and, provided the scheduling and shipping times all work in our favor, Smokey will be back in the public eye in time for the Harvest Days Parade. Without the help and support of the public, these appearances would not be possible.

In other news, the members of the Dwight Fire Protection District have participated in many recent tours and trainings at our major facilities. Tours of R.R. Donnelley and Aldi distribution warehouse were conducted in the recent months and the members now have a much better understanding of the operations at these facilities as well as how to handle emergencies there.

The training division is pleased to announce that the total combined hours of training

is nearing the 1000 hour mark and is on the rise. So far this year, training classes have included basic firefighter skills, CPR and first aid, EMT training, hazardous materials response, and auto extrication. All of these hours of training add up to one goal: to provide the best possible service to the communities we serve.

Probationary Firefighter Rachel Groll recently completed EMT basic class and has obtained her license through the Illinois Department of Public Health. Miss Groll has also been accepted into the paramedic program and will begin classes in the fall.

Deputy Chief Justin Dyer has also recently completed EMT basic class and also has received his licensure through the IDPH to practice at the EMT Basic level.

Captain Andrew Kelson completed Hazardous Materials Technician B level training and has received certification from the Office of the State Fire Marshal as well as the National Fire Academy to practice at this level.

Nearly every member of the roster has completed both Technical Rescue Awareness training and Hazardous Materials Awareness training in the recent months.

Many classes are scheduled through the remainder of the year and will provide valuable training and knowledge to our members. The fire department will be conducting a six month Basic Operations Firefighter academy beginning in September which will provide over 200 hours of firefighter training required to each participant. 

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
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## Chatsworth Corner

## Japanese Beetles: Lower Numbers This Summer!

Yes — this news is a gardener's dream-come-true — at least for the 2014 growing season! All the winter data is in and the experts now say Japanese beetle numbers in northern Illinois will be much lower this year.

Many Japanese beetle larvae did not survive the winter, particularly in the northern half of the state. "Earlier predictions stated that number should be at normal levels due to the insulating effect of the deep snow cover," explains Martha Smith, Horticulture educator, University of Illinois Extension. "But the latest data shows the cold temperatures challenge this early prediction."

This past winter the cold temperatures penetrated deeper in the soil than what was first thought. Japanese beetle grubs do not migrate deeper than 11 inches into the soil for the winter. They die if the soil temperature reaches 15 degrees Fahrenheit or if they are subjected to freezing temperatures for two months. Last winter the soil was frozen to 15 inches deep in central Illinois and 30 inches deep in northern Illinois for several weeks. Based on previous experience, it is likely that about two-thirds of the larvae died during the winter in the

northern half of the state. That is good news for

crops and landscapes.

A double hit for Japanese beetle numbers has to do with summer 2013 rainfall amounts. In addition to cold temperature mortality, Japanese beetle larvae require approximately 11 inches of water from egg hatch in late July into the fall. Although we received abundant rain in spring of 2013, much less rain fell from July through October, averaging 9.5 inches during this critical time in their life-cycle. On turf areas that were not irrigated and allowed to go dormant, Japanese beetle larvae had a very low survivability rate compared to irrigated turf. Japanese beetle larvae had a greater chance of late summer survivability on irrigated lawns, athletic fields and golf courses. Because late summer 2013 was dry the numbers of larvae were reduced, only to be hit with very cold winter temperatures for extended periods of time. This sounds like the perfect storm for 2014 Japanese beetle populations.

Other pests such as the northern and southern masked chafer grubs require less water and tunnel deeper than Japanese beetle grubs. In areas of central Illinois and other areas where these grubs are numerous, neither drought nor cold is likely to have reduced their numbers. Where Japanese beetle adults are few, masked chafers are likely to invade those turf areas. These adult beetles do not inflict the feeding damage on landscape plants like Japanese beetles, but the grub stage can cause considerable turf damage.


In the final game, Dwight brought home the trophy as they were victorious, 11-1.

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
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

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
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### Brick Basics

Brick can be a great feature in any home, but like most things, it can wear down over time. You can clean brick, you can repaint brick, and you can even replace brick. Replacement, however, can be difficult and costly. If you have brick that has seen better days and replacement is not an option, you might want to consider painting it.

Painting brick is not hard, but it does take some work, and once done, it can be hard to undo. Removing paint from brick is a painstaking process, so you need to make certain you are ready to proceed. If so, here are some pointers.

Choose the right supplies.

Brick in general is porous. For the best results, you will probably need a conditioner paint and a brick paint. You will also need the right rollers and brushes for easier coverage. Consult the professionals at your local hardware store for recommendations.

Prep the surface. To ensure the paint sticks, you will need to prepare the brick properly. Start with a good wire brushing, particularly if the brick has a lot of chalkiness. This will also remove any loose material from the brick. Inspect the brick. See any cracks or missing mortar? You should seal the cracks with caulk and repaint the mortar. Finally, give the brick a good cleaning with soap and water. For exterior brick, you may

want to use a power washer. If you have mold, mildew or moss, make sure you use a bleach solution.

Put in the time. Because brick is so porous, it takes longer to paint. In addition to the conditioner paint, you will probably have to apply two to three coats of the brick paint. When you are done, make sure you give the brick ample time to dry. Just because it feels dry to the touch after a few hours doesn't mean it is totally dry. Brick is so porous that it usually takes a few days for it to dry completely.

Painting brick takes time, time to research, time to prepare and time to complete. Make sure you allow ample time in your schedule to get the job done right.

### Old Door, New Use

Old doors. They seem to be everywhere—antique stores, flea markets, yard sales, in the old home you just inherited. The older the door, the more likely it is constructed from solid wood. Solid wood doors are hard to find these days and cost a bundle. Beyond using them as an entrance, what do you do with old doors? You repurpose them into almost anything imaginable!

Old doors make great headboards. Just remove the hardware, paint or stain the exterior if desired, turn the door on its side, hang it behind your bed, and voila, you've got a great headboard. Door doesn't quite fit? No problem. Cut it down and trim it out for a more finished look.

Old doors make great screens. Find three somewhat equal in size, remove the hardware, paint or refinish them if desired, attach them together

with hinges, and your folding screen is complete. Need a larger screen? Add another door or two. Want to make the screen more practical? Add a panel of chalkboard paint and a panel of corkboard for a bulletin board. You can also create a message center out of one door. Just paint a panel with chalkboard paint, attach a whiteboard in another panel and a corkboard in another, and you've got a large, message center at your service.

You can either hang the door on the wall, stand it against the wall or attach some feet to it for a freestanding message center.

Old doors make great desks. Take a door, remove the hardware, paint or refinish it if desired, add four legs, trim it out and you've got a great desk. Use the doorknob hole for a cup or cord holder. Door has panes of glass? No problem. Slide some photos or postcards onto the glass panes for decoration and lay a large piece of glass on

top of the door to create a solid surface for working. You can also turn an old door into an instant table using the same process. Just cut the door down to the size you need, paint or refinish it if desired, add some legs and trim, and you've got a great side table, sofa table and more. Want a dining table? Use two doors side by side.

Old doors make great additions to gardens as well, either as screens, shutters or potting benches. To turn an old door into a potting bench, turn it on its side and add some legs, or make it freestanding with feet and use it as a backdrop to a real potting bench.

There are dozens of new uses for old doors. Head to your local hardware store or garden center for ideas. Consult some home magazines and the Internet for further ideas. Get creative and design your own project. Then post it online and share it with others!

### Entice the senses






