Dwight Forms Swimming Pool Committee July 14 Village Board Actions

The Dwight Village Board has approved a committee to review how to move forward with needed repairs at The Robert Stevenson Memorial Swimming Pool. In March, the board heard a presentation from David Burbach of Burbach Aquatics out of Plattville WI where he discussed his company's evaluation of Dwight's aging swimming pool and proposed options for consideration.

The pool, built in 1976 - 1977, appears to have reached a crossroad which could include major costly repairs, building a new facility, or closure. Burbach Aquatics evaluated the facility in 32 different categories with the floors and walls of the pool vessel, the structure that actually holds the water, receiving ratings of average to poor condition. In March, options for short, intermediate, and long term solutions - including constructing a new outdoor facility with a zero depth

entrance pool and waterslide with an estimated cost of \$4 million and an expected life span of up to 50 years - were presented for consideration.

The Pool Committee reviewing options for consideration will be comprised of Tara Hansen, Lynn and Lou Cronin, Mary Ann Hall, Bill Flott and Kelly Bruce. Mayor Jared Anderson and Village Administrator Kevin McNamara will also participate.

In other matters, sealed bids received for the North Water Tower painting project were reviewed by Christopher B. Burke Engineering. Era Valdivia Contractors Inc. (EVC) submitted the low bid with a base lump sum bid price of \$168,000 and an Alternate "A" price of \$8,000. The board approved EVC contingent upon insurance protection being provided.

Members of the Dwight Economic Alliance were on hand to request a sound amplification permit for the Taste of Dwight event on August 10 at Renfrew Park. Local food vendors, entertainment and softball games are

planned. The sound permit was approved for 2 - 8:30 p.m. with Doug Patten providing DJ services. The board also approved a Special Use Liquor License Permit for Willy's Pub from Noon - 9 p.m. for the event.

Chief of Police Tim Henson reported to the board that the investigation continues with regard to the June 14 shooting in Dwight that left two people dead and another injured. Chief Henson also thanked the officers and others that have helped during this process. In response to a public comment question regarding an alleged suspect, Henson dispelled rumors.

"Everyone is allowed to speculate, but only the police have the facts," stated Chief Henson. "We do not have anyone in custody at this time."

In another matter, Chief Henson cautioned residents regarding area car burglaries. Henson advised everyone to take extra precautions and ensure that vehicles are securely locked and valuables are out of sight.

New Band Uniforms Approved for Trojan Marchers July Board Actions

A new look is on the horizon for the DTHS Marching Band following action on July 16 by the Dwight Township High School Board of Education approving up to \$35,000 in the 2014-15 budget for the purchase of 75 new uniforms.

The uniforms will feature more of the Trojans' Kelly green color and the sleeker style will feature adjustable fittings to be more accommodating to the student wearer. The current uniforms are 12 years old.

In his report to the board, Dr. Richard Jancek informed the board that school officials are working with an architect, fire marshal, and other necessary parties to install a curved stair lift in the main hall staircase. The move is necessary to meet the needs of students with physical disabilities and provide access to the second floor. The chair lift is expected to be installed for use this

fall.

Dr Jancek also informed the group that, through a Livingston County Mental Health Grant, the district will have the use of a Student Services Social Worker. Beginning this fall, Abby Taplin will be available on Wednesdays from 8 a.m. to Noon for students and teacher referrals.

A financial report to the board showed Dwight High School District #230 finishing FY 2014 with \$3,251,455 in its Education Fund, which is used to cover teacher salaries and other expenses directly related to education. Over all funds, the District ended FY14 with an end balance of \$4,694,171.

- learned Social Studies teacher Andy Ehrhardt will be leaving to accept a position outside of the district.

- discussed Building Security Projects and approved seeking quotes on 3M break-resistant security window film and expanding the all call intercom system.

- approved Prairie State Insurance Cooperative Renewal Rates And Coverage.

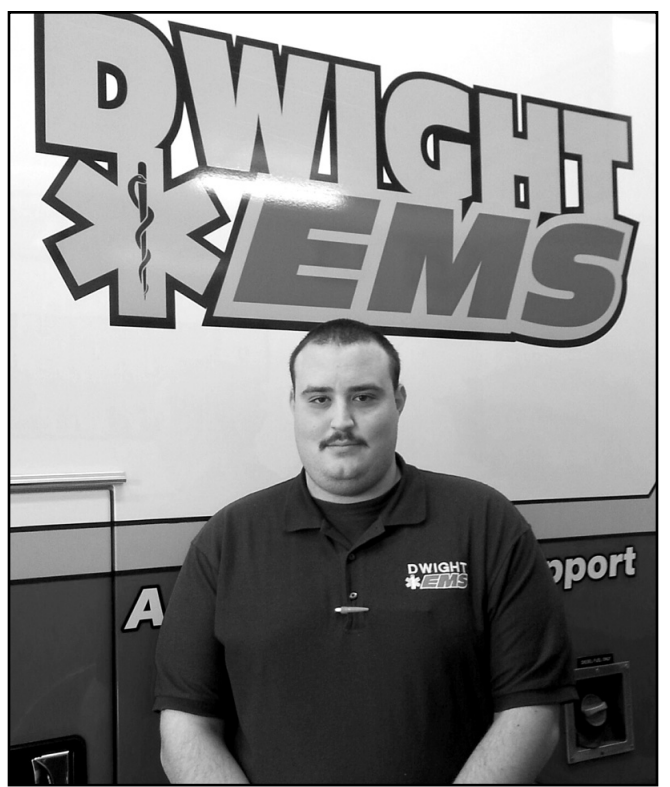

Casinos Complain as VGTs Roll On

Casino officials in Illinois complained recently to state regulators that video gaming terminals have been stealing their thunder -- more importantly, cutting into casino profits, which were down more than 5% in 2013 compared to 2012.

There is no question that Video Gaming Terminals have become very popular, with 17,467 now in operation statewide.

In Dwight, the number of machines decreased from 32 to 28 in June, with reports not filed by Victory Lanes and Turtle's.

Still, \$290,366 was invested in the 28 Dwight machines during the past month. The VGTs paid out \$214,940, leaving a Net Terminal Income of \$75,425.

The State of Illinois received \$18,856 of the Net Terminal Income for June; Village of Dwight, \$3,771.

In April of this year, a record \$299,293 was invested in Dwight's 32 machines; in May, \$269,749.

Smart Use of "Variables" Can Lead to Right Answers for Retirement

If you think back to your math classes in high school or college, you may remember that many of the problems involved the use of variables. Changing these variables around in any fashion would change the outcome of the problem. Similar situations occur in life all the time. To illustrate: If you look at the need to manage your retirement income so that you can't outlive it as a "problem" to be solved, you will need to adjust some variables to arrive at the solution you seek. That's why it's so important you be aware of the key variables involved in your retirement income planning.

What are some of these variables? Consider the following:

Your investment mix — You might think that once you reach retirement, you can invest solely in income-producing vehicles, but you can't forget about inflation. Even a low rate of inflation, such as we've had for a number of years, can seriously erode your purchasing power over time — which is why you need to consider owning at least some investments that provide growth potential. Of course, you can change your investment mix at any time: For example, you might want to shift to a greater percentage of income-oriented investments as you move deeper into retirement.

Your withdrawal rate — You'll need to calculate how much you can afford to withdraw from your investment portfolio each year without depleting it prematurely. Your annual withdrawal rate will depend on a few different factors — such as your projected longevity, your investment mix and your other sources of income — but you'll want to be careful not to take out too much too soon. As was the case with your investment mix, you have the flexibility to adjust your withdrawal rate during your retirement years.

Your Social Security — You can start collecting Social Security benefits as early as age 62, but your benefits will be permanently reduced by up to 30% unless you wait until your Full Retirement Age (FRA), which is likely 66 or 67. However, your monthly checks can increase if you delay taking your benefits beyond your Full Retirement Age, up to age 70. If you come from a particularly long-living family, and you have sufficient income apart from Social Security, you might want to delay your payments to get the larger benefit amount. Once again, you have a choice to make.

Your earned income — Just because you've retired from one career, it doesn't mean you'll never again earn some income. Many retirees take part-time jobs, do some consulting or even open a small business. Whether you feel that you need to work, or you just want to work, the money you earn from employment can be an important component of your overall retirement income.

As you can see, all these variables involve choices on your part. And how you choose to exercise each variable will affect all the other variables. Consequently, as you manage and monitor your retirement income, you'll need to make many important decisions. Still, this doesn't have to be a scary prospect — because the very fact that you have choices means you also have a great deal of control over your situation.

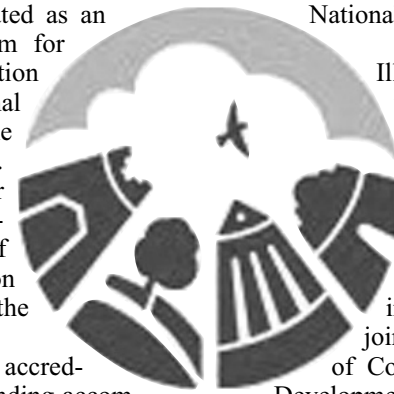

Shelter Box USA Board Member Visits Dwight Rotary

Dwight Rotary was visited July 16 by Gary Olsen, who gave an inspirational talk about the Shelter Box USA organization. Mr. Olsen is a director and former president of Shelter Box USA. He was the architect of the Dwight Public Library rehab. He is a member of the Champaign-Urbana Sunrise Rotary Club.

Shelter Box is an idea that came from a United Kingdom Rotarian who wanted to help disaster victims survive in the disaster area for an indefinite time in 2000. Each plastic storage box weighs over 120 pounds. Each box has a family size tent to give a family shelter, cooking and eating utensils, water purification system, food and bedding.



Shelter boxes are often distributed to the victims before other charities start their surveys. They have several distribution centers around the world. Most of the centers are co-located with DHL, who donates the space and equipment to move and store boxes. Boxes may start arriving within hours of the event.

The first major distribution was to the Indonesian Tsunami. Since then, boxes have been sent to natural disasters and conflict zones on every continent but Antarctica. They distributed

boxes to hard hit areas after Katrina. They were there almost immediately after the storm. FEMA people tried to send them away but the overwhelmed officials of several

parishes were thrilled for a place to put survivors.

Although they are designed for a few weeks, most of the Haitian survivors are still using them. So many have been sent to Indian disasters, re-packed, and stored by the government that India feels they can handle most disasters themselves.

Dwight Rotarians are looking to support Shelter Box USA as one of their charities. Current plans are to have a Shelter Box exhibit at Harvest Days. Those wishing to contribute can do so at the exhibit.

They stopped at the Methodist church and found Henry Klehm who told them of Carrie's need. He also offered a place for the group to stay while in Chatsworth. "This is a beautiful town with really friendly people. EVERYONE waves!" remarked Wilkison.

Kara Kelso leads this youth group and kept them all

busy building the ramp, mowing lawn, weeding flower beds, trimming bushes and cleaning gutters. They even mowed the neighbor's lawns! Kelso believes this is the best youth group ever. She also blogs on Facebook about the group's progress and lessons learned. "The kids have raised the money for this faith mission throughout the year with fund-raisers and donations. Materials are purchased locally wherever they can."

Randy Brazier was deemed the brains of the outfit, and his expertise has not only constructed beautiful functional structures, but taught these kids hands on what it means to give from your heart. Among Brazier's assistants are his son Elliot and daughter Makenzie.

Talking with these young people was inspirational. They all but glowed with happiness and accomplishment. Everyone was busy the whole time. I asked them what they learned from this trip, and I was impressed with their answers. 

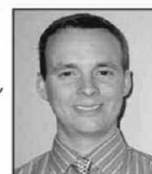
