# **Mammoth Search for Evidence Ends**; No Reportable Results

If a weekend 26-acre search for evidence pertaining to the homicides of Donna and Kelly Denker of Dwight was productive nothing was being officially reported by investigators Monday.

Members of the Illinois State Police, Dwight Police, Morris Police, fire department personnel from divisions 15 and 25 Mutual Aid Box Alarm Systems, and the LaSalle County Sheriff's Office combed a 26-acre area near the Sheridan Correctional Center beginning at 8 a.m. Sunday, August 3.

The purpose of the search was to locate evidence that could assist in solving the Denker homicides and also burglaries that occurred in Grundy County near the time of the murders.

The area of the search was not originally disclosed for security reasons. The area was cordoned off to restrict the search to authorized personnel only.

More than 100 law enforcement and fire personnel worked the 26-acre site.

The Denkers died of gunshot wounds inflicted during the early morning hours of June 14 in their home at 200 W. North Street in Dwight.

officially A third, unidentified, person was wounded in the shootings, but has recovered. He was able to identify the killer as a white male wearing an orange hoodie. The hoodie was just one of the items being sought in the weekend search. Investigators did not give a reason why the particular area near the correctional center was selected for the search.

No suspect in the murders has been officially identified by authorities, but a more substantive report from the Livingston County States Attorney is being sought before next week.

In answer to a question from The Paper, Katcho, Dwight's sniffer dog, was not used in the weekend search because his handler, police officer Watson McKee, is not available for duty with the dog until September 19. McKee and Katcho are on unpaid administrative leave from the village until that date.

# Village of Dwight Audit Without Issue July 28 Village Board Actions

No issues of concern were noted when the Fiscal Year 2014 audit report was presented to the Village of Dwight on July 28 by Mack & Associates Certified Public Accountants of Morris.

Following the presentation the audit, Village Administrator Kevin McNamara noted the decline in EAV, dropping from \$77 million in 2009 to \$65 million currently - a \$12 million decline over five years.

"That is a challenge faced by all municipalities," said the auditor.

In matters addressed by the Dwight Village Board of Trustees at its regular session, a recommendation from the Properties Committee received board approval which will allow for the repair of eleven free-standing picnic tables at Renfrew Park which are in serious need of repair. The board approved repairing the tables with laminated planks and stainless steel nuts and bolts at a second recommendation by the committee to address foundation leaks in the Public Services Complex basement was also approved. Pulverized black dirt will be spread along the foundation in an effort to build up the ground along the building and improve drainage. A report from the Properties Committee also noted that the MFT street repair project for this summer should now be complete. Also, downtown businesses are reminded that dumpsters are not allowed on Village streets or Village parking places due to

dumpsters.

In new business, the board reviewed two requests from Al and Carol Seniw for property located at 1200 East Mazon Avenue (New Lenox Machine). The requests are pursuant to the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Pilot Program. The Seniws wish to operate a cultivation center which would involve areas for cannabis cultivation, processing, storage and business administration. The board referred an associated Special Use request to the Plan (continued on Page 6)

# Dwight Man Arrested After Multi-Agency Effort

On July 29, Joliet Metropolitan Area Narcotic Squad (JMANS) Agents, assisted by Grundy County Sheriff's Deputies, arrested 43-year old Charles L. Johnson Jr. of 7375 S. Holm Rd. in Dwight, on charges of "manufacturing and delivery of cannabis."

Sheriff Kevin Callahan said an outdoor cannabis grow in rural Grundy County was detected by the Illinois State Police Air Operations Unit. The cannabis grow was put under surveillance and confirmed by Joliet MANS Agents. A search warrant was obtained in Grundy County and executed by Grundy County Sheriff's Deputies and JMANS Agents. As a result of the search warrant, 206 cannabis plants, three firearms, five pounds of cannabis bagged for sale, and US Currency was seized.

"I'm very proud of the work done by the MANS Agents, Sheriff's Deputies, and the ISP Air Operations Unit. They conducted a thorough investigation which resulted in the arrest of Charles Johnson," said Sheiff Callahan.

Johnson is currently in the custody of the Grundy County Jail.

The Dwight Protection District and its members have been very busy lately with fire prevention, public education and extra volunteer activities.

The members dedicated extra time to make the following activities a success:

- Participated in a parade in Braceville for their annual Summer Kick-off festival
- Played a large role in the homecoming and sendoff of two local Marines
- Assisted with the Casey Kohlmeier charity bike run
- Showed operations of the newest engine during a car show at the Dwight Methodist Church and at Station 343
- Stood by for the 4th of July fireworks, as well as held the waterball fights for children, and
- Assisted the Dwight Grade School in May with a Fire Safety Drill.

Also, some members dedicated their off time to help with the local Habitat for Humanity home being constructed in Dwight. Members spend countless hours training, responding to

Eight members of the District also took part in a Severe Weather Spotting Class hosted by the Morris Fire Protection District. People from surrounding communities took part in this class and learned very valuable techniques in storm tracking, safe positioning, and identifying. All eight members are now trained and available to assist and protect the community with early notification for potential weather threats. Dwight Fire has responded and assisted Dwight ESDA in the past with weather spotting when the National Weather Service issues a watch or warning in the area. Extra eyes on the sky are always a great help when trying to keep the residents safe.

Pontiac Police hosted the Safe Weapons Handling Class where students learned valuable skills on safe handling of loaded weapons, proper ammunition removal, proper storage and safety. He is going to help with the record keeping of maintenance as well as development of future maintenance checks and inspections. Chatsworth is fortunate to have dedicated citizens like Jim and Ruth McGreal. They have been collecting and displaying Chatsworth memorabilia for ages. The McGreal museum is open to everyone during Mc-Gathering events. This last weekend hosted a Corvette club from Downers Grove called the Windy City Corvettes. The Club takes periodic drives to enjoy their cars and get out of the city. There were many Corvettes participating and enjoying lunch in beautiful downtown Chatsworth. Some of the exhibits in the museum include:

McGreal's father's Model B 1936 steel wheeled tractor. His Dad and this tractor were highlighted in the 1942 Farm Journal's Feature story from 1942. The tractor has been fully restored and is one of the highlights in McGreal's collection.

There are the bird mounts made by Mrs. Stodemeyer for her Chatsworth High School science classes back about the 1930's. These beautiful taxidermy birds are still housed in the custom case Mr. Bill Haberkorn made with his Industrial Arts Classes at the school. You will find artifacts from the Chatsworth train wreck, including the actual lunch box that held the lunch for a passenger on that fateful night. The theater stage curtain from the Grand, and


advertising signs from local businesses that adorned that curtain back in the day.

On the North wall, mahogany and glass display cases are filled with items that have been donated and are dear to local families. These cases are 20 feet long and were lovingly dismantled and relocated from the Fairbury Paint store when it closed.

The miniature diorama of the "modern" kitchen including a refrigerator, stove and wringer washing machine showed customers how well they fit into the home. The detail is precise.

There are two baseball uniforms from Chatsworth's traveling baseball team hanging from the ceiling. Joe Smith's 1940 uniform from Larry's Farmall fast pitch softball team and Jerry Birkenbeil's Uncle's uniform from Bartlett Lumber hangs beside it. These were two of the quite popular traveling baseball teams from Chatsworth. Of course Chatsworth only remembers the wins, but the team held their own and traveled

extensively. Finally is the huge 1918 map of the United States. Its reverse side is the State of Illinois donated by Gordon Schroen. It is amazing to see the changes from the map of today. Imagine, no interstate highways! These are just a few of the wonderful memories Chatsworth holds. Jim delights in teaching viewers

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

# Trinity Lutheran Church 160 Year Anniversary and Organ Re-dedication

Church, located at 515 E. Stonewall Rd, Dwight, will be celebrating its one hundred and sixtieth Anniversary of Lutheran Church and a rededication of the refurbished pipe organ. Paul Roeder, who initially suggested the organ be restored, also participated in the refurbishing directed by Ron Hartman, along with Elwood (Woody) and Lois Hahn, and Barbara Morphey.

The church held its first worship service in August, 1854, by Mr. and Mrs. Fruehwirth. Reverend Henry Wunder was key to its first location, on Goodfarm Road. The congregation also built the first sanctuary in 1861, later moving to their present location in 1864. They went on to build a second building in 1975, which served as the Education Building.

In 1899, the new church was built, with much of the labor being donated. A new fellowship hall was added in 1991, and both are still in use

The Hymn Festival and re-dedication is planned for August 17, with refreshments following afterward. The congregation's original organist, Barbara Morphey, along with several guest organists, including George McComb, Verona; Fred Kieslar, Mazon; Mrs. Linda Beiswanger, Texas; and David Green, Indiana, will play at the celebration.

The organ, which is 115 years old, is a tracker mechanical playing system, according to Ronal Harman, containing four ranks of manual pipes and one set of pedal pipes, totalling 300 pipes. Interestingly, the parts

The Trinity Lutheran for this instrument are still manufactured, as compared with present day electronic organs which, in another 20 to 25 years, may not have parts readily available. The organ has been with the church since 1899.

Roeder contacted Hartman after the electric organ stopped working. Hartman currently refurbishes instruments as a hobby. The cost of the restoration was primarily funded by donation, with 50 to 75 percent of the organ being taken

Several of the church members assisted in the refurbishment, pipes, sanding foot pedals, and breathing new life back into an instrument that hadn't been played in about 50 years.

"There were pipes of all sizes laid out on the table," said Lois Hahn. "They ranged from the size of a small pen to the size of the table." Lois also washed out the pipes, discovering there was coal dust left over from the early days of the church, when the sanctuary was heated using coal.

Paul Roeder, who also assisted, described the entire process, which included sending the keys to Milwaukee, and the installation of a new reservoir. The organ, when built in 1899 was hand pumped to ge,t keys to play, which created a sweaty job for one lucky parish; oner in the summers. The old reservoir had to be replaced because it was leaking air.

"It was fun," said Roeder, "We all learned a great deal about the organ, as well as our church."



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# Gardner Village Board Approves Ditch Cleaning

Board opened their regular meeting on July 28 with a discussion and approval of the bid of \$2,750 from Fatlan Construction to complete cleaning of the East Street drainage ditch and pursue reimbursement from the owners.

Village Attorney Scott Belt reported the property appears to be owned by Ellis Enterprises and he spoke to one of the listed owners and they are interested in working with the village to correct the issue. Based on a conversation between Belt Village Building Inspector Dean Rankovich, the owners appear interested in redirecting the water to the existing culvert. Belt also commented it is Rankovich's belief that allowing Fatlan to complete the ditch is the Village's best option.

Belt next verified with the Board that they received his memo stating the Village did violate the Open Meetings Act as was alleged in a recent complaint. The complaint regarded a special meeting the board held to advance TIF funds to the Gardner Fire Protection District. The complaint suggested the lack of public comment at the meeting violated the Act. Regarding a zoning issue carried over from the previous two meetings, Belt commented that
