



Filling the Route 66 Ambler-**Becker Texaco Gas Station** One Piece at a Time



When Legner's nephew asked him if he wanted to work

as a volunteer at the Ambler-Becker Texaco Station on Route 66, he replied, "I'd rather go to auctions and find things to put in it." And so, over the years, Legner has collected related antiques; pieces of history to add to the restored gas station.

The station, which has been in Dwight since 1933. is the longest operating Route 66 gas station, with over 60 years of continuous service. It was in 1999 that the last tank of gas was pumped at the station.

As he walked through the building, Legner pointed out several items he had contributed, each one holding a story behind its slightly rusty exteriors. Each object once held an importance, a function that was, at one time, relevant but is no longer necessary.

In the far right corner sat a collection of old jacks, which were used to hold the cars up as station employees worked to get them up and running again. Directly next to them, on a table,

changed on gas. Throughout the station, there were also many other little objects that Legner had given over the years, such as a Texaco doorstep and an old fire extinguisher. "This," he said as he pointed to an item in the middle of the station, "is the last piece I put in this building.'

"It was used to hold oil so customers could take it from the bigger container and put it directly into their cars," he said.

Legner describes himself as a general collector, which will collect anything, as opposed to a specialist, which will collect only certain items. seems to refer to everything old simply as antiques,' Legner commented. "But in the world of collecting, there are actually specific genres which separate the items into groups." Some of (continued on page 3)

Odell Board Hears Auditor's Report on Fiscal Year 2014

The Village of Odell Board met Monday, August 11, 7:05 p.m., in the Council Room, with Mayor Joyner pre-

Trustees Brian Verdun, Gary Wykes, Jamie Johnson, Phaela Hodges, Matt Weav-er and Herman Fearman were present, along with Iris Thorne, Village Attorney Ed Legner, Nick Ehrgott, Sgt. John Mitchell and Lee

Following the Pledge of Allegiance, minutes of the July 14 meeting were approved by the six trustees.

Iris Thorne, Clerk, had copies of a YTD Fund Summary and an MTD Treasurer's Report furnished by Treasurer Jim Rebholz. Bank balances for the month ending July 31 are as fol-

\$47,706.26 Odell Checking \$82,161.50 \$228,163.46 \$120,242.84 General Fund \$224,389.81 CD's Odell Tourism \$27,868.03 Treasurer's Report and Johnson seconded. All trustees approved.

All due bills for the Village and all due bills for Tourism for August were presented for payment approval. Additional bills presented for payment were: Locis \$1,620.00 and Riber, Inc., \$1,464.76. Weaver moved to approve all bills; seconded by Verdun. Approved by six trustees.

Sgt. John Mitchell reported 23 calls in July, with two citations and one warning issued. He also reported that upon checking the ball park one night last month the back restroom was open; however, there were no broken locks.

No action was taken on the Elk Street Project following discussion. Mayor Joyner reported a cost estimate from Andrews Engineering Firm in the amount \$16,111.70.

The Zoning Board of Appeals met last week to discuss a petition filed by Lee and Becky Cleary, asking for a variance in the 20.5' height of the peak of a shed to be built on their property. The Zoning Board recommended the variance be granted, and the Village Board accepted the ZB recommendation with Fearman moving to approve

and seconded by Wykes. All trustees approved.

Under new business, Rick Phillips, Village Auditor, gave a summary of the fiscal 2014 audit. He indicated that the Governmental Fund showed a positive cash flow due to increased revenue; the Utility funds have positive cash flow when depreciation is deducted from expenses, while the sewer fund would be in deficit except that \$21,315 was transferred from the General Fund at the beginning of the 2014 fiscal year. The auditor will correct the inadvertent listing of the \$25,000 Grant under Sewer Fund instead of the Water Fund.

Johnson moved to approve the audit with the correction in Grant funds and Hodges seconded. All approved.

Trustee Johnson moved to retain Phillips and Associates as the Fiscal Year 2014 auditor; Weaver seconded; all approved.

Work to Become a Better Investor

DTHS Enrollment Numbers Increase

August Board Actions

A shift in numbers reflects a welcome change at Dwight Township High School - student population is growing this school year. DTHS Principal Mr. Dan Kaiser reported to the Board of Education that general registration was held on August 11 and 12 and initial enrollment numbers reflect an increase in enrollment over last school year by 15 new students. Initial numbers show a student population of 300 including 78 Freshmen, 65 Sophomores, 74 Juniors and 83 Seniors.

A continuation of last month's building security projects discussion also took place when the DTHS Board of Education met on August

One security feature that

the board reviewed is adding security film on all lower level windows and entryway glass. Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek presented a verbal quote of \$19 per square foot, or approximately \$28.300 for the 3M break resistant security window film and installation. The security film, manufactured by 3M and Security, is a premium tear resistant safety and security window film utilizing microlayered film technology. According to 3M, the film has a broad range of application uses including bomb blast mitigation, windstorm protection, safety glazing, and deterring smash and grab attempts and break and entry events. An intruder's attempt to break a glass window treated with the 3M product can delay the intruder's entry time by nearly two minutes, offering people in the building additional time to react to a situation. The film will also add UV protection and, tinted, will help pro-

vide significant solar heat reduction. The approved the window film security measure pending a guaranteed rate that matches the verbal quote received.

In his report to the board, Mr. Kaiser also reported that a grant he had submitted to Monsanto made it to the national level and was later approved by the Farmer Advisory Council for an amount of \$10,000. The grant spelled out a plan for the purchase and use of a wireless weather station with six classroom consoles, live camera, and a designated IP address which will provide complete access across the worldwide web. An emphasis was placed on its use in the DTHS science and agriculture classrooms to meet Common Core Standards as well as Next Generation Standards.

Dr. Jancek presented the 2014-15 proposed budget which reflects surplus budget meaning the budget reflects more anticipated revenues than expenditures. The proposed budget will be posted on line for public viewing for 30 days prior to final approval at the September board ses-

Sheriff's Office. A.L.i.C.E. is designed for teachers to create options on what they can do during a violent intruder event in the school. Police will be responding, but that takes time. With the philosophy, strategies and concepts of A.L.i.C.E., Gragert, Livingston County teachers can take action to protect themselves and the students with several options. "This is not a new

philosophy," Det. Beier explained. "The issue is the teachers have never been trained or provided these options and told it's ok to use

Every school knows what and how to do a lockdown. This program enhances what they currently do and doesn't make locking the door the only choice. Teachers in further, the disbursement of Odell spent several hours practicing and grasping the accordance to Subsection concepts. This program opens eyes and really gets the staff thinking about options. The mindset of "Get busy living or get busy dying" was stressed. "You must be proactive and not passive during these inci-

dents," Det. Beier stated.

Currently there are only two schools in Livingston County utilizing the philosophy taught by A.L.i.C.E. Det. Beier explained there are critics (some who are in law enforcement) who don't agree with some of the material provided. A.L.i.C.E. is not a law enforcement program. It is designed for the staff within the schools when they are forced to do something. "I feel this program has merit based on my experience and knowledge of violent intruder situations in schools," Beier stated. "These are bad situations and if a teacher, custodian, or bus driver can make kids safer, why not give them the tools? A.L.i.C.E. has slowly started to work its way into Illinois schools. There are no foolproof or one answer solutions out there, but A.L.i.C.E. is one option that seems to make sense and can

vide the specific section of the TIF Act that allows for the disbursement of TIF funds that are not in accordance to Subsection (q). And TIF funds that are not in (q)(7) and read the specific portion of the Act.

5) Another contention being the Village was not properly accounting for annual "surplus" TIF funds which should be returning to the taxing bodies annually with no strings attached and that the Village's auditor and TIF administrator were asleep at the wheel, rubber-stamping lawfully required annual reports. Reports that are intended to serve the public by providing an accurate accounting of how their tax dollars are being lawfully used as a means to avoid another Dixon, IL embezzlement case.






