Gardner Village Board Discusses Cannabis Manufacturing Facility Table Chicken Request

The Gardner Village Board opened its regular meeting on September 8 with a discussion of the application from Bill and David Mennie for a cannabis manufacturing facility license.

The Mennies are considering property on Howland Road, between Gorman and Gardner Roads, currently owned by Chris Lenzie. The Mennies are willing to pay for extension of water and sewer to the property at no cost to the Village. Commissioner Mike Serena noted the entire cultivation operation would be entirely indoors and is in the industrial TIF district. The facility would employ approximately 40, and the license application is currently

under review by the State of Illinois.

Village Attorney Scott Belt advised the board that as cultivation centers are not currently referenced in the zoning ordinance, they should consider addressing it in the ordinance sooner rather than later.

The Mennie family currently owns and operates a machining company in Mark, and suggested the board and residents visit www.mennies.com to see the facilities they build.


Commissioner Serena motioned to direct the Mayor to draft a letter of recommendation to the State in support of the Mennie application with the motion passing unanimously.

The board heard the Grundy County Sheriff's

Department Report from Deputy Sgt. Bret Black. Black reported over 200 property checks, six theft reports, one residential burglary, and numerous other calls.

Following up on a discussion from the August 25 meeting, the board tabled a resident request to keep chickens in the village. Current ordinance forbids keeping poultry except where agriculture is a specifically permitted use. Village Clerk Becky Pasternak advised the board the Rt. 66 bike racks approved by the board in the spring will be ready in October. The Village Archives committee reported they had a very good turnout during the craft and vendor fair, and thanked the village for having them open.

Bozarth Celebrates 40 Years with Village of Dwight

September 8 Board Actions

Dave Bozarth, Director of Public Works for the Village of Dwight, celebrates 40 years as a village employee on September 16. At the September 8 meeting of the Board of Trustees, Dwight Village Administrator Kevin McNamara thanked Bozarth and congratulated him on this milestone, while also pointing out a few fun facts regarding his four decades of service.

Bozarth has seen a lot of change over his 40-year tenure with the Village of Dwight, including change in village leadership. Bozarth has served with nine different mayors, five village clerks, six village administrators, and 48 village trustees. Surprisingly, Bozarth currently does not hold the longest term as a village employee, but, rather, the second longest. Records show only Ruth Brendley served

the Village of Dwight longer. Brendley held her position as village clerk, an elected position, for 43 years from 1918 – 1961. It is very unlikely that Bozarth will surpass her record as he plans to retire this fall.

Bozarth expressed his gratitude to the Village of Dwight and its residents.

"It has been an honor to serve the people of Dwight," stated Bozarth.

Village officials have not yet named a replacement for Bozarth.

In another matter, Village Clerk Patti Drechsel announced that petitions for the April 7, 2015, Consolidated Election will be available on September 23. Three openings for Dwight Trustee seats will be on the ballot as terms held by Nick Kester, Marla Kinkade, and Tim Dougherty expire. Petitions can be picked up at the Village Hall.





Sheriff Callahan today announced the Grundy County Sheriff's Office will conduct a National Seat Check Saturday event on September 20, 2014 at the Sheriff's Office, 111 E. Illinois Avenue in Morris.

Certified child passenger safety technicians will be on hand from 9:00 am until 2:00 pm. to check car seats for proper installation and advise parents and caregivers on how to choose the right car seats and install them properly in their vehicles.


The Way Down Wanderers, a Band of Brothers Reunited



What's Smarter -- Paying Off Debts or Investing?

It probably doesn't happen as much as you'd like, but from time to time, you have some extra disposable income. When this happens, how should you use the funds? Assuming you have adequate emergency savings — typically, three to six months' worth of living expenses — should you pay off debts, or fund your IRA or another investment account?

There's no one "correct" answer — and the priority of these options may change, depending on your financial goals. However, your first step may be to consider what type of debt you're thinking of paying down with your extra money. For example, if you have a consumer loan that charges a high rate of interest — and you can't deduct the interest payments from your taxes — you might conclude that it's a good idea to get rid of this loan as quickly as possible.

Still, if the loan is relatively small, and the payments aren't really impinging on your monthly cash flow that much, you might want to consider putting any extra money you have into an investment that has the potential to offer longer-term benefits. For instance, you might decide to fully fund your IRA for the year before tackling minor debts. (In 2014, you can contribute up to \$5,500 to a traditional or Roth IRA, or \$6,500 if you're 50 or older.)

When it comes to making extra mortgage payments, however, the picture is more complicated. In the first place, mortgage interest is typically tax deductible, which makes your loan less "expensive." Even beyond the issue of deductibility, you may instinctively feel that it's best to whittle away your mortgage and build as much equity as possible in your home. But is that always a smart move?

Increasing your home equity is a goal of many homeowners — after all, the more equity you have in your home, the more cash you'll get when you sell it. Yet, if your home's value rises — which, admittedly, doesn't always happen — you will still, in effect, be building equity without having to divert funds that could be placed elsewhere, such as in an investment. In this situation, it's important to weigh your options. Do you want to lower your mortgage debts and possibly save on cumulative interest expenses? Or would you be better served to invest that money for potential growth or interest payments?

Here's an additional consideration: If you tied up most of your money in home equity, you may well lose some flexibility and liquidity. If you were to fall ill or lose your job, could you get money out of your home if your emergency savings fund fell short? Possibly, in the form of a home equity line of credit or a second mortgage, but if you were not bringing in any income, a bank might not even approve such a loan — no matter how much equity you have in your house. You may more easily be able to sell stocks, bonds or other investment vehicles to gain access to needed cash.

Getting some extra money once in a while is a nice problem to have. Still, you won't want to waste the opportunity — so, when choosing to pay down debts or put the money into investments, think carefully.



New Student Population Rises at DGS 2014-15 Budget Approved

Despite the weather with its extreme heat and flooding that occurred within the first couple of weeks, the 2014-15 school year has experienced a very positive start according to Dwight Grade School Building Principal Ben Bailey.

"We have managed, conquered and overcome," Mr. Bailey told the Board of Education at its September 10 meeting.

One of those positives is an increase in new students. According to Bailey's report, DGS has 568 total students in its building – a

number which reflects 80 new students – students that have never been enrolled in the Dwight School District. While this number reflects two new students in the Early Childhood Education program and 35 three-year olds into the Pre-K program, it also reflects 43 new students in grades Kindergarten and above.

In other business, following a public hearing on September 10, the 2014-15 Budget was approved for Dwight Common School District #232 by the BOE as presented by District Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek.

The budget reflects anticipated total revenues of \$5,326,601 with expenditures totaling \$5,351,118 across all funds. The Education Fund budget projects \$3,940,762 in revenues with \$3,989,535 in expenditures for an unfavorable difference of \$48,773. Across all funds, the forecasted FY15 end balance is \$1,847,062. The projected FY15 Education Fund end balance is projected to be positive \$224,104.

Dr. Jancek told the board that the budget was developed using a conservative approach and that, putting everything into perspective, he feels the District is

"doing OK."

"While it might not feel this way, we are certainly doing better than a lot of other districts," Jancek told the board.

Moving to another matter, the Board addressed a concern with regard to Kindergarten class sizes. This year, Kindergarten currently has 13 new students with a total of 61 students in two sections. While the board has a goal of 20 students in a classroom, aides in the classroom allow for some flexibility. However, concerns were raised when aides are pulled from the rooms at times to relieve for lunch and other duties. The

board authorized posting for a part-time (4 hours per day) classroom aide to ensure that Kindergarten aides are not removed from their Kindergarten duties.

"This will guarantee an aide in the Kindergarten room at all times whenever there is a teacher and students in the classroom," Jancek told the board.

Security improvements were also in the spotlight as the board toured the building and viewed the newly installed 3M window security film and saw a demonstration of the 12 new security cameras which now monitor all doorway

entrances to the building.

In other business, the board:

- approved a Resolution verifying the Serious Safety Hazard designation remains unchanged and continues to exist with regard to transportation routes and the crossing of Route 17, Route 47 and the railway.

- approved the ISBE application for recognition of public schools for 2014-15.

The next meeting of the DGS Board of Education will be Wednesday, October 8, at 6 p.m. in the school's library. Meetings are open to the public.

Justin Fox and the Trojans had 29 passing yards, to Watseka's 0, and


147 combined rushing yards to their 106.

Kinzinger Votes to Protect Illinois Farmers

On September 9, Congressman Adam Kinzinger (R-Channahon) released a statement on the passage of H.R. 5078, the Waters of the United States Regulatory Overreach Protection Act of 2014. H.R. 5078 prevents the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) from expanding its jurisdiction into state and local waters, which would drastically

increase its regulatory influence in rural areas. Congressman Kinzinger is a co-sponsor of the bill.

In the past year, both the EPA and the US Army Corps of Engineers have advanced rulemakings that would expand the definition of "waters of the United States" under the Clean Water Act. H.R. 5078 prohibits the EPA and the US Army Corps of

Engineers from changing the definition and keeps waterways under state jurisdiction.


