The communities along Route 66 are still suffering, but have figured out a way to survive and supply the (continued on page 3)


Dwight Free Leaf Pickup Days Underway

Can Less Salt Save Village Streets?

Dwight will provide free leaf pickups for its residents on the first three Mondays in November - November 3, 10, and 17. Leaves must be in biodegradable Kraft style paper bags, cardboard boxes, or rigid trash containers – no plastic bags are allowed. Leaves should be placed out for pickup by 6:00 a.m. Dwight residents reminded that burning leaves is prohibited at all times within the village. In addition, raking or blowing leaves into village streets is an ordinance violation and not allowed.

In another matter at the October 27 meeting of the Dwight Village Board of Trustees, local resident Mike Compasso, addressed the



proposal he presented earlier this year. In May, the Prospect Avenue resident requested that the board consider the elimination of winter residential street salting noting reasons such as damage to streets, shrubbery and lawns caused by the salting chemicals, along with a potential significant costsaving for the village. He suggested that village streets that are along the school bus route continue to be salted along with the Routes 17 & 47 highways which run through the village, but that all other residential streets

be plowed only. He estimated the average resident would only have to travel the length of a football field in order to get to a salted street.

According to Compasso, during the 2013-14 winter, the village spent \$26,000 on road salt for village streets. He indicated his proposal could save the village \$20,000 annually while greatly reducing the environmental impact

"The benefits of this plan are huge," Compasso told the board. "We are destroying our streets quicker than we can repair them."

The Board next approved waiving water bills for the month of December, as they have done for several years. The board finished by approving the storm sewer project to be completed in

The village will host their annual Veterans' Day Ceremonies at 11:00 a.m. on November 11, sponsored by the Gardner American Legion Auxiliary. This year's ceremony will take place in the Gardner Fire Station, regardless of weather, and the public is invited. The Gardner Archives will be open for viewing in the council chambers that day.

November is Long-Term Care Awareness Month – a month dedicated to educating the public about the need to prepare for the potentially devastating costs of long-term care. And the more you know about these expenses, the better prepared you will be to deal with them.

To begin with, just how expensive is long-term care? Consider this: The average cost for a private room in a nursing home is more than \$87,000 per year, according to the 2014 Cost of Care Survey produced by Genworth, a financial-services company.

And the average cost of an assisted living facility, which provides a level of care that is not as extensive as that offered by a nursing home, is \$42,000 per year, according to the same Genworth study. All long-term care costs have risen steadily over the past several years, with no indication that they will

Many people, when they think about long-term care at all, believe that Medicare will pay these costs — but that's just not the case. Typically, Medicare only covers a small percentage of long-term care expenses, which means you will have to take responsibility. Of course, if you are fortunate, you may go through life without ever needing to enter a nursing home or an assisted living facility, or even needing help from a home health-care aide. But given the costs involved, can you afford to jeopardize your financial independence - or, even worse, impose a potential burden on your grown children?

To prevent these events, you will need to create a strategy to pay for long-term care expenses — even if you never incur them. Basically, you have two options: You could self-insure or you could "transfer the risk" to an insurer.

If you were going to self-insure, you would need to set aside a considerable sum of money, as indicated by the costs mentioned above. And you would likely need to invest a reasonably high percentage of this money in growth-oriented investments. If you chose this self-insurance route, but you never really needed a significant amount of long-term care, you could simply use the bulk of the money for your normal living expenses during retirement and earmark the remainder for your estate. However, if you did need many years of nursing home care, you could end up going through all your money.

As an alternative, you could transfer the risk of paying for longterm care to an insurance company. Many plans are available these days, so, to find the choice that is appropriate for your needs, you will want to consult with a professional financial advisor. Here's a word of caution, though: The premiums for this type of protection rise pretty rapidly as you get older, so, if you are considering adding this coverage, you may be better off by acting sooner, rather than later.

None of us can know with certainty what the future holds for us. Ideally, you will always remain in good shape, both mentally and physically, with the ability to take care of yourself. But, as you've heard, it's best to "hope for the best, but plan for the worst." So, take the lessons of Long-Term Care Awareness Month to heart and start preparing yourself for every scenario.



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

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Veterans Day Facts

Veterans Day is a holiday that has come to mean more since September 11, 2001, and the U.S. military involvement in Iraq and Afghanistan. Originally started after World War I, the increasing number of veterans in recent years and the military commitments have made the holiday more important to contemporary society. More schools and businesses close, and observances have blossomed across the country. Despite those developments, there are still some questions about this national holiday.

There's even some question about the actual name of the day. Does the day belong to veterans? Should the name have an apostrophe? If so, does it belong to one veteran or all veterans? There is no apostrophe in the name because it is a day to honor all veterans.

How is it different than Memorial Day? Memorial Day is meant to honor and remember veterans who have died in the service of their country or because of wounds from service. Veterans Day is meant to honor all veterans. It has taken on an increased awareness of living veterans, their service and the contributions they have made to national

security in recent years. Veterans Day is not only a national holiday in the United States. Dating back to World War I, Canada, Australia and Great Britain all observe Remembrance Day on November 11. The celebrations are a little different in each place, but the overall intent is the same: to honor those who have served to protect the country. Parades, wreath laying and ceremonies mark observances in all three countries.

While Veterans Day is a federal holiday, it is not universally observed. There is no requirement for businesses or state offices to close, although all federal services are suspended for the day. There is no federal law requiring all schools to close as there is for other federal holidays, so each school district decides whether to follow the observance. Unlike other national holidays that have been moved to Monday to create a long weekend, Veterans Day is always observed on November 11 regardless of the day on which it falls. Veterans groups have long lobbied for special recognition. Schools can and do choose to observe the holiday on different days of the week.

The practice of wearing poppies on Memorial Day is a tradition that has gone largely unobserved by many in recent years. Many wonder if it is appropriate for Veterans Day as well.

Officially, the wearing of poppies to remember war dead is precisely that—a remembrance for those who have died—and, because Veterans Day honors all veterans, the wearing of remembrance flowers is not a common practice. Many communities, however, are developing rituals and ceremonies to mark the holiday honoring all veterans.



Veterans' Stories Lead To Understanding

Time in the armed forces can be complicated. Many people are very proud of their service and eager to tell their tale. Some are more reticent, leery of reliving their time in the service.

One way that you can learn about military service during times of war is by working with the Veterans History Project. Established in 2000 by Congress and signed into law by President Bill Clinton, the Veterans History Project is housed in the Library of Congress and collects first-hand accounts of service members from World Wars I and II, Vietnam, Korea, the first Gulf War and the current conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. It also collects stories from those who supported the war efforts

through their work, including private contractors, USO workers and medical per-

If you know a veteran, consider conducting and preserving an interview as a gift, perhaps for Veterans Day. On this holiday designed to honor all living veterans, some thoughtful reflection on their service reported and recorded for prosperity can be of great benefit.

Many veterans find a therapeutic value in sharing their stories, particularly with someone they know well. These stories can serve as a final contribution to a national dialogue about the experiences of individuals during wartime. If you are a veteran or

know someone who is, you can get involved in the tory, a variety of voices and

Veterans History Project. The first step to recording a story is to get a Field Kit from the Veterans History Project. It provides detailed instructions on how to get the best interview, and there is even a comprehensive video that demonstrates best practices for interviews. The project is ongoing, so there is no deadline for submitting materials. If you are interested in interviewing someone but don't know a veteran, the program relies on volunteers and a set of veterans service organizations in communities. You can be in touch with a group like the American Legion or your local Veterans of Foreign Wars department to see if they can help you contact a

about military service, not just the voices of a few in the history books. The Project also collects artifacts from service members that include photos, diaries, memoirs and other historic documents.

If you are interested in learning more about the Project, there is a broadranging website that provides all of the tools and information you need to get involved, whether you are a veteran yourself or are interested in interviewing someone. The Project provides a unique window into the daily experiences of veterans in all branches of the military, a window you can explore to learn more about modern history and honor the service of veterans.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) is the oldest surviving veterans service organization in the United States. The national organization began in Denver in 1899 as the first official post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and was officially charted by Congress in 1914. Dedicated to working on behalf of veterans, it lobbies Congress for health care and benefits for veterans. It is also an important civic organization dedicated to integrating veterans into their local communities.

One of the organization's many goals is to promote awareness through community involvement. The VFW has a long-standing relationship with the Boy Scouts of America and sponsors thousands of units across the country. It also sponsors scholarships like the Scout of the Year award, focused on citizenship and national service. It is also committed to helping the local community. With several thousand posts in diverse communities across the country, the organization offers programs based on local need and coordinates many volunteer

efforts, including blood drives, community food kitchens and visits to hospitalized veterans. The primary focus is to develop community service and increase active citizenship in communities, with a heavy focus on shaping young people into model citizens.

In addition to its work in the community, the VFW connects active military units with locals in a number of ways. It provides free phone calls to deployed service members and those in the hospital recovering from injury. It helps local posts support active units through welcome-home and going-away events. It provides assistance to families who are deployed and have unexpected financial hard-

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



The trip, however, wasn't a fluke for this powerful Tiger team. The boys were coming back for redemption after placing second last year.


