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

## The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier Program November 18 in Dwight

The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery stands atop a hill overlooking Washington, D.C. On March 4, 1921, Congress approved the burial of an unidentified American soldier from World War I in the plaza of the new Memorial Amphitheater. Inscribed on the back of the Tomb are the words:

*Here rests  
in honored glory  
an American soldier  
known but to God.*

Members of the Dwight Woman's Club and the Dwight VFW Auxiliary are welcoming community members to attend an evening with Matt Kreeb, a veteran who served in the U.S. Army from 2001-2005 as a *Guard of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier* in Arlington National Cemetery. Kreeb will be speaking about Arlington, the Tomb, and the real life applications of the lessons he learned while serving as a Tomb Guard.

Now a civilian, Matt Kreeb works in a real estate business and Christian ministries. He is a graduate of Eastern Illinois University and Lincoln Christian Seminary. Kreeb and his wife, Jessica, raise their three daughters in Fisher.

Open to the public, the program will begin at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 18, at the VFW Hall.

## Mid-Term Election Results

After what has seemed like an endless parade of political flyers filling our mailboxes, and a never-ending barrage of negative television commercials, the Illinois general election of 2014 has finally come and gone.

Concluding a twelve year run of the Illinois Democrat's control over the state's highest office, Republican Bruce Rauner defeated incumbent Governor Pat Quinn by nearly a five percent margin. Governor-elect Rauner will assume control in Springfield on January 12, 2015. Judy Baar-Topinka overcame a challenge for her Comptroller position, and Secretary of State Jesse White and Attorney General Lisa Madigan also retained their positions. In the race for state Treasurer to replace outgoing Treasurer Dan Rutherford, Tom Cross holds an extremely narrow lead

over Democrat Michael Frerichs. At presstime, the race was still too close to call.

Democrat incumbent Dick Durbin easily retained the seat in the U.S. Senate he has held for the past three terms. In the Congressional race for the sixteenth district, Adam Kinzinger also easily retained his seat.

In the Livingston County State House races, voters in the 76th district chose to keep Frank Mautino in office. Tom Bennett was successful in his bid to fill the seat in the 106th district left vacant when Josh Harms chose not to seek another term.

In Kankakee County's 2nd Congressional district, Robin Kelly retained her seat. In the state house, voters in the 79th district had to select from two first time candidates, with Democrat Katherine Cloonan holding a twelve vote lead over Republican Glenn Nixon while awaiting absentee and

provisional ballots to be factored into the final tally. While in the 34th district incumbent Elgie Sims was successful in his bid to retain his seat.

Over in the countywide races in Grundy County, incumbents Sheriff Kevin Callahan and Clerk Kay Olson were successful in retaining their seats, while challenger Lori Werden will assume the Treasurer's position.

For the proposed Amendments to the Illinois Constitution, both the Crime Victims Bill of Rights and the Right to Vote amendments passed.

At last, our televisions, radios, and telephones are finally free of political advertisements. Now we can get ready for the blizzard of Holiday ads.

# Dwight Police News

Dwight Police continue to investigate several car burglaries. Chief Henson stated they do have some persons of interest. Anyone with information is asked to call the Dwight Police Department at 815-584-3132.

Dwight Police also continue to investigate some residential burglaries. They do have some people of interest, but still ask anyone with information to call 815-584-3132.

The Dwight Police also continue to investigate eight tire slashings within the village. Anyone with information is asked to call the Dwight Police at 815-584-3132.

The Kevin Holohan case went to trial November 5, 2014 in Livingston County. Judge Travers found Holohan guilty of aggravated criminal sexual abuse and not guilty on the charges of predatory criminal sexual assault. Criminal sexual abuse carries a penalty ranging from probation to 3 to 7 years in the Department of Corrections and up to a \$25,000 fine. Holohan's sentencing is scheduled for January 12, 2015.

On November 2, 2014, Alex Feddersen, 19, of Dwight was picked up on a warrant for criminal trespass to residence, domestic battery and unlawful violation of an order of protection.

The Dwight Police were notified on November 2, 2014 of a missing juvenile. On November 4, the juvenile was found hiding in an apartment in the 400 block of West South Street in Dwight. The juvenile was taken into custody without incident. The case remains under investigation and Chief Henson believes there will be further charges filed in connection with this case. The Chief would like to thank the Dwight Township High School and the residents for their assistance.

Chief Henson would like to remind all residents to stay alert regarding scams. Three or four new scams are reported on a regular basis. Also, remember to lock your doors and keep all valuables out of sight of criminals. Henson said, "Thank you for helping us make our community a better and safer place to live."

## Free Smoke Detector Program for Dwight Residents

The Dwight Fire Protection District recently announced the start of a new program offered through the Illinois State Fire Marshal, that allows them to offer Dwight residents to participate in a free smoke detector program. The program is funded through the state and is 100% free to all Dwight residents who are in need of a smoke detector. The detectors, provided by the State Fire Marshal, are that of only smoke detection, not any other harmful gas such as carbon monoxide.

The members of the Dwight Fire Protection District are excited for the new program and are eager to help families get the warning that is needed to help save lives and property. Anyone who is interested in the program can visit www.dwightfire.org and click on the "Free Smoke Alarm Request Form" to fill out the needed application, or you may call the station at 815-584-2373, ext. 10, and leave a message for Captain Andrew Kelson. Applications will be processed in the order that they are received. Dwight Fire also reminds everyone that the smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors operate off of batteries, even when hard-wired. It is essential to change the batteries at regular intervals as suggested by the manufacturer. They strongly recommend changing the batteries in your detectors throughout your home every time you change your clocks. Remember, "Change your clocks, Change your batteries."

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## Sex Offenders in Livingston County Targeted for Verification

On October 29, federal, state and local authorities combined forces in Pontiac in an effort to verify 73 registered sex offenders throughout Livingston County. Agents and officers from the United States Marshals Service, Illinois State Police, DHS-Immigration Customs Enforcement, Illinois Department of Corrections-Parole, Livingston County Probation, Livingston County Sheriff's Department, Livingston County State's Attorney's Office, Pontiac Police Department and Fairbury Police Department participated in this multi-jurisdictional compliance operation dubbed **Operation Clean Sweep**. The main focus of this initiative was to locate and verify every registered sex offender residing in the county for the purpose of ensuring compliance in accordance with the United States Marshals Service mandate of the Adam Walsh Child Protection Safety Act of 2006. A total of 73 sex offenders were targeted to ensure their addresses and employment were correctly reported.





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**Yipes! IPO Hype Can Lead to Risky Investing**

All investors probably wish they had gotten in on the "ground floor" of Apple or Microsoft or any other big success story. And, in fact, you can indeed "be there from the beginning" by taking part in a company's initial public offering (IPO). However, the ground floor of many IPOs may be shakier than you'd think — and might not provide you with the solid footing you need to invest wisely.

Of course, not all IPOs are the same. Many large, profitable companies, seeking to raise capital, have gone public in recent years through IPOs. However, IPOs of newer, unproven companies share some characteristics that should give pause to serious, long-term investors. Consider the following:

**Hype** — Let's face it: A big part of the appeal of IPOs is the "wow" factor. It looks really cool when the company's CEO — or perhaps a visiting celebrity — rings the opening bell at the New York Stock Exchange. And the rush to buy shares in the now-public company always garners big headlines. Yet "hype" is just one letter removed from "hope" — and hope alone is not a good reason to invest. Furthermore, no single stock — even one that might have strong growth potential — is likely going to be the ticket to investment success.

**Lack of track record** — By definition, newer companies that launch IPOs don't have long track records. And while it's true that "past performance can't predict future results," it's nonetheless useful to see how a stock has performed in various economic climates and how the company management has responded to different challenges over time.

**Exceptional volatility** — All stocks fluctuate in value. But IPOs tend to be especially volatile — not just in their first few days of trading but also in their first few years of availability to the public.

**Higher risk potential** — Generally, IPOs of newer companies are better suited for aggressive investors — those who can handle a higher degree of risk in exchange for potentially higher returns.

**Nonstandard accounting** — Some IPOs, particularly Internet start-ups, use nonstandard, or "customized," accounting measures to depict their companies in the best possible light. While these measures are not illegal — and in some cases, may even be useful in illuminating a company's performance — they tend, overall, to make it more difficult for potential investors to accurately evaluate a business' profitability, or at least potential profitability. At the end of the day, good old-fashioned profits and cash flow are still the key driver of companies' stock prices.

As an alternative to pursuing an IPO, you could use any extra "investable" money you may have to fill gaps in your current portfolio, based on your goals. Or, if you are truly attracted to the type of business in which an IPO is involved, you might want to consider investing in a more established company in the same industry.

Taking part in an IPO sounds fun and exciting. But as we've seen, IPOs can have some serious drawbacks. And while it may not sound glamorous, a steady approach to investing — one that involves diversification, responsiveness to one's risk tolerance and a constant focus on both short- and long-term objectives — is usually the right choice for most of us.

## Gas Prices — Why They Fluctuate From Station to Station And Town to Town

There are certainly times driving down the highway when the price of gas is not a priority; the gas gauge is on "E" and there aren't many of us that want to pull a "Kramer" and see just how long you can ride on that empty gas tank... after all, no one wants to be on the losing end of that adventure.

However, whenever possible, watching how much you are paying for gas is one way to save a little money here and there, even if it's just a matter of a few cents. There's been plenty of times that, rather than just stopping, it seems better to drive in pursuit of a cheaper per gallon gas price. Which leads to a question — why do some gas prices vary so much, even if purchased from the same company?

The answer is that there isn't just one specific reason, but rather a multitude of determining factors, which can vary depending on the gas station itself. From taxes, to fees, to even the location of the station, all can play a role in determining a price for gas, which causes the fluctuations customers see from station to station.

The biggest factor is, of course, taxes. Gasoline taxes collected by states have an approximately 37 cent range from the lowest to the highest amount, with federal and local governments collecting taxes as well. All in all, these can add around 49.5 cents per gallon to the cost, with around 18.4 of that being purely federal.

Other aspects depend on the gas station itself, and can include things like location, overhead costs, volume, distributors and fluctuating supplier costs.

For example, gas stations that are closer to the highway can charge more for gas, as they can take advantage of customers who want to save time (or who are, ahem, a little too close to empty for comfort). In addition, since most stations are owned and operated by small business owners, the cost of doing business for individual station owners will factor

into gas prices.

Higher overhead and lower volume, or, in other words, a less visited gas station, would lead to higher gas prices. This would mean that, even though two gas stations might be the same company and only ten minutes apart, the price of their gas per gallon could vary greatly.

Some business owners are also told that they must purchase their gas through a specific supplier or distributor, which might make it hard for them to price their gas competitively with other surrounding gas stations. Suppliers can also raise prices unexpectedly and a bit sporadically, which will then cause the owner to pass the additional cost along to the customer.

"The price of gas for me went up five cents just two days ago," Pat Huffman, of Huffman's Tire & Auto, commented. "And the very next day it had gone down seven cents a gallon; Our supplier will vary their prices or the stock market will drop, and amidst all these fluctuations, we are just merely trying to stay competitive."

Fees can range from anything to environmental fees, which vary from state to state, to underground storage tank fees and oil inspection fees.

The number one factor is the cost of crude oil, which is determined by supply and demand since it is a global commodity. This means that a whole range of factors can impact the cost, such as weather events, inventories, exchange rates, investments, and OPEC production decisions.

A big factor is what's known as "zone pricing," a controversial strategy used by oil companies which attempts to boost profits by charging dealers different amounts for fuel, even when the cost to make and deliver the specific brand of fuel is the same. The oil companies will consider traffic volume, station amenities, nearby household incomes, population density, geographic characteristics and even the strength

of surrounding competitors to determine how much they charge the dealers for the gas, making the cost setting completely out of the business owner's hands.

This can cause a price differential of as much as 50 cents per gallon. Though this seems a bit unfair, the courts have deemed it legal so far. The Federal Trade Commission also said that, "the effect on consumers [is] ambiguous because some customers [get] hurt by higher prices while others [benefit] from lower ones."

So while it seems a bit infuriating when you fill up only to drive just ten miles further and see gas prices almost 20 cents cheaper, the fact is that the fluctuation itself is unavoidable.

## Preventing/Dealing With Frozen Doors And Locks

There's nothing worse (besides maybe having your car buried beneath a mini mountain of snow) than running late for work, jumping through the knee-deep, snow covered path before you, only to find you are unable to get into your car. It's 6 a.m., and it's freezing; these tips won't magically vaporize the snow, as you might be hoping at that moment, but they should help make this situation less likely to happen (or easier to deal with if it does occur).

*Keeping Doors from Freezing Shut*

• **Step 1: Replace torn or missing rubber gaskets.** The gasket, or the seal, along the edge of the door is what freezes, not the metal itself. If you notice tears or gaps where water could seep in, be sure to purchase replacements. Make sure to keep an eye and inspect the seals around each door and window

• **Step 2: Wipe down the door frame.** Water can collect around the dirt and freeze the door shut once the temperatures drop; keeping the entire door frame clean keeps road debris and other soils from building up over time.

• **Step 3: Coat the rubber with a protective liquid.** The oil or lubricant will help repel water, helping limit the amount that enters the seal and freezes. Use a paper towel to do this. Though there is some debate on what to use, rubber conditioner/rubber care products are probably the safest options for long-term care. Other lubricants might not last as long per application, and run the risk of drying out or damaging the rubber.

• **Step 4: Use a car cover.** If parking outside, this will minimize the amount of moisture from snow/rain that can reach door parts and freeze. You can also use a heavy gauge trash bag and hang it over the open car doorway. After oiling the rubber as described above, shut the door over the plastic.

*Preventing and Dealing with Frozen Locks*

• **Step 1: Rub the key and lock with rubbing alcohol.** The rubbing alcohol used must contain at least 60% alcohol so that it will adhere to the lock and prevent moisture from freezing over it. Rub it onto the key and door lock with a paper towel once per week to prevent ice from forming. It can also help melt existing ice, but at a much slower rate than the methods described below.

• **Step 2: Spray a lock lubricant for severe problems.** Use this option if the rubbing alcohol is not enough to keep your lock usable. Greaseless lubricants are usually your best option, as they are supposed to attract less dust and debris. Use only one type per lock, as a mix can easily gum it up.

• **Step 3: Spray frozen locks with a de-icer.** Keep de-icer in the garage or in your coat pocket in case you are frozen out of your car. These are typically sprayed directly onto the lock; spray onto the lock with the least amount of ice buildup.

• **Step 4: Heat the key.** Hold the key with an oven mitt or tongs, with the toothed tip over a lighter or match, then insert it into the lock.

• **Step 5: Warm the lock with a hairdryer or your own breath.** This method is less effective, but worth a try if no other options are available. You can place a cardboard tube over the frozen lock to help direct the warm air. Keep trying for several minutes, especially if conditions are windy.

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## HEED THE WARNING!

When you start your vehicle, the instrument panel lights up. As soon as the computer verifies everything is working properly, the lights go off. On occasion, however, a light remains on and it is best that you look up a detailed explanation of what the light means and if the vehicle is safe to drive. Let's take a look at the more common warning lights and what you should do if they light up. All of these should be checked out by an experienced mechanic as soon as possible.

If the brake warning light comes on you should check the parking brake first and then the brake fluid level. If it's low, fill it. If the light remains on, you may have a sensor fault. If you press the brake pedal and the light comes on, one of the hydraulic circuits in the brake system has lost pressure and the vehicle may not be able to stop. Whatever you do, don't attempt to drive it. Have it towed somewhere to be repaired.

If the warning light for the antilock brake system (ABS) comes on your brakes will still work, but the antilock braking you need when coming to a sudden stop won't be available. If the ABS and the brake warning lights both come on,

your brake system has a serious hydraulic problem, in which case your vehicle is not safe to drive.

The check engine light indicates there is a potential emissions fault. This could be a loose gas cap, fouled spark plugs, the failure of an engine sensor or an emissions control system problem. To find the exact nature of the problem, a mechanic must attach your vehicle's diagnostic connector to a scan tool.

The battery charge warning light indicates your vehicle is running on the battery. The charging system isn't producing enough current for the vehicle's electrical needs. Your vehicle will run as long as the battery has a charge, which could be a very short time. To get more life out of your battery, turn off all unnecessary electrical devices.

If the oil pressure warning light is on don't drive your vehicle. If you do, you will run the risk of severely damaging the engine. Start by checking the oil level. If it is low, add some and then turn on the engine to see if the light goes out. If it does not, you could have a bad oil pump or a faulty oil pressure-sending unit that will need to be replaced.

If the temperature warning light is on don't ignore

it. If it comes on while you are driving, stop immediately and turn the engine off. If you don't, you could cause extensive damage to the engine. Once the engine cools off, unscrew the radiator cap and check the coolant level. Never remove the cap when the engine is hot or you could risk getting burned. Add coolant and do a quick check for leaks around the radiator and hoses. Start the vehicle and proceed with care. If the light comes on again, you have an internal problem. There are a number of things that can cause the engine to overheat.

Depending on the make, model and year of your vehicle, there are other warning lights to look out for. These include:

- Lamp out indicator light, which lets you know you have a headlight, taillight, stoplight or turn signal light out.
- Low windshield washer fluid warning light.
- Service reminder light.
- Emissions warning light, which lets you know there is a problem with the emissions sensor or your vehicle has reached a certain mileage.

When a warning light comes on, your vehicle is trying to tell you something. Listen to it and take care of the problem.

## Dig Your Car Out Of A Snowstorm

As the winter months begin slowly creeping up, every car's worst enemy is also approaching – snow. You may not be able to win the initial battle, but here are some helpful tips/steps to give you and your car a fighting chance should your vehicle become buried in snow this winter.

• **Step 1: Locate your car.** This can be tricky, especially after snow has built up, making a row of cars all look the same. To help alleviate this, park your car as close to the road as possible if at home. This will make it easier to find your car, as well as keep you from having to clear out the entire driveway of snow to get out.

It might be helpful to put a stake or a pole out near your car beforehand to make it easier to find; this can also be accomplished by putting a unique topper on your radio antenna. If the car was parked on the street, it is essential to carve out a path to get to your car, so that you can have firm footing when clearing the car. If at work, you will need to wait for the car park owners to help clear the driving areas.

• **Step 2: Grab the tools you'll need.** Try to avoid using tools like shovels that might scratch the car, just because it's hard to know where the snow ends and where the car begins after it's been buried in snow. Use a broom with soft bristled tips to do the most of the removal work (avoid gardening bristle/corn brooms, which may scratch the car).

At this point, grab an ice scraper for the windshield. You can also use an old towel to remove snow if you need to be very careful getting the snow off.

Dress warmly, as it will get cold; make sure to wear gloves, as you want to be able to keep going. Be sure to wear layers, in the event you might get hot while cleaning and have to remove your jacket.

• **Step 3: Start digging**

**out the car.** This task can take anywhere from five minutes to an hour; though it will be much faster if you can get a helper or two on the job. Start by digging around the wheels and the sides of the car, especially the driver's door. Shovel the removed snow well away from the car, other cars and pedestrian walkways; you don't want to create more snow hazards.

Brush the snow off the roof and hood onto the ground. If your vehicle is higher than you, use a small step ladder and a broom to push off the snow. Next, use a scraper to clear the windshield, side windows, side mirrors, back window and any parts of the roof and hood that aren't yet free of ice. Do NOT pour warm water on the windshield as this will cause the glass to crack.

• **Step 4: Check to see if snow has filled the engine compartment.** If so, prop the hood open, remove the snow, dry the spark plug wires and leave the hood open to let everything dry off. Be sure to check your windshield washer outlets to make sure they are clear, since you may need to clean your windows often during

winter driving.

• **Step 5: Try to unlock door with the key, if the car doesn't have a remote.** If your locks aren't frozen, start the car and turn on the heat and defrosters as you continue to clear it off. Make sure the exhaust pipe is clear, and that you only have the engine on while the car is outside; never when the car is in shelter (the build-up of carbon monoxide is toxic).

If it doesn't open, use lock de-icer or clean and try another door is you don't have any de-icer on hand. You can also try using a lighter or match to heat up your key before attempting to unlock your door.

• **Step 6: Clear snow away from the tailpipe.** The exhaust must be able to flow freely from the tailpipe or it may build up in the car's interior.

• **Step 7: Free up the wipers, if frozen.** If they were running when you stopped the car, it may damage the wiper motor if you start the car and they aren't free to move.

• **Step 8: Start the car.** Turn on the heat and rear defroster; wait a few minutes for the car to warm up.
