2015 Meeting Schedules Finalized Gardner Village Board Briefs

The Gardner Village Board met in regular session on November 10, with Commissioner Dick Hileman serving as Mayor Pro-Tem in the absence of Mayor Tom Wise, whom Hileman reported has returned to the hospital.

The board approved the Village and Zoning Board meeting schedules for 2015; the board will not meet on Columbus Day, October 12, 2015. Hileman noted bills for payments of \$1,500 for the furnace in the Scout cabin and to Stott Excavating for the work on Pine Street. Ida Schopp offered to organize the Christmas Tree Lighting with the assistance of the Village and Don Phillips as MC. Commissioner Terry Jensen represented the Village at the Veterans Day Ceremonies on November

Commissioner Jensen reported a former resident contacted him concerning their final water bill, for the village minimum, for a house that they recently

sold. The resident stated she would pro-rate and pay the amount she believed she owed as she felt the Village's minimum bill practice was unfair. Village ordinance does not make allowance to pro-rate minimum bills.

Jensen's primary concern is the possible loophole in the village's current practice. Jensen Commissioner Mike Serena suggested revisiting the ordinance to prevent similar instances in the future.

Commissioner Serena reported the Village picked up the Rt. 66 bike rack and it will be installed near the historic jail. Serena reported the Grundy Transit System is starting advertising on the side of the buses. Serena offered to look into purchasing advertising if the other commissioners are interested. Serena suggested contacting the local businesses to assist with the cost. The Grundy County Board has approval rights for the advertising.

Commissioner Rob Wolf litigation at 7:38 p.m.

reported he made contact with the motorcycle shop in the former beauty salon being sublet by Paul Nicoletti. Wolf has turned the issue over to Mayor Pro-Tem Hileman as he believes he has reached the extent of his effectiveness.

Hileman reported when the Village contacted the owner of record, she reported the property had been sold to Nicoletti on contract. Hileman requested Village Attorney Scott Belt investigate the situation to support continued action by the Village to clean up the property.

Commissioner Hileman reported the village received thank you notes from GSW High School, the Gardner Lions, Gardner Seniors, and United Lutheran Church for the donations from the village. The donations were derived from gambling revenues collected by the Village.

Dwight Proclaims November 29 Small Business Saturday

The Dwight Village

Board of Trustees addressed a lengthy agenda when it met in regular session on November 10.

Saturday, November 29, has been proclaimed as "Small Business Saturday" by the Village of Dwight. Mayor Jared Anderson presented the proclamation designed to celebrate and support small businesses that create jobs, boost the economy and invigorate neighborhoods around the country. Everyone is encouraged to support local small businesses and merchants on Small Business Saturday throughout the year.

In other business, following a November Administration Committee meeting, the Board reviewed the various discussion points and took action as required. Committee recommenda-

tions that received board approval include: • IDOT Construction Easements (Trustee Kinkade

abstained). • A three year audit agreement with Mack

Associates. • The purchase of a 12 camera system for the Public Services Complex from

Absolute Mobile Services at a cost of \$2,700.00 (Trustee Tim Dougherty voted no). • The purchase of a 2015 F-550 Truck from DeLong Ford at a cost of \$75,297.90

(Trustee Tim Dougherty

voted no). The purchase of a dump truck box from Monroe Truck Equipment at a cost of \$12,995.00.

• The purchase of Dwight Economic Alliance holiday

gift certificates for all Village employees and appointed Commissions & Committees.

One item, a "no salt proposal" presented to the board by Village resident Mike Compasso received no action. Compasso proposed that only major thoroughfares, business streets and bus routes be salted in winter months, leaving residential streets plowed but not salted. Compasso presented his estimated cost saving to the board along with arguments around being environmentally friendly.

However, concerns raised focused on creating a potential safety hazard and putting the people of the community in danger with ice-covered Mayor streets. Anderson indicated the Village would evaluate the



Charitable Giving Pays Off ... for Everyone

Americans are pretty generous — in fact, 83% of us donated money to charitable organizations last year, according to a Gallup survey. And now that we're entering the holiday season, charitable giving well may be on your mind. Your key motivation for making charitable gifts, of course, is to help those organizations whose work is meaningful to you. However, by supporting these groups, you can also make life less "taxing" for yourself.

Specifically, by making charitable contributions, you may be able to receive some valuable tax breaks. To claim a deduction, though, you need to itemize your taxes, and you need to make sure that the organization you're supporting is qualified, from a tax-deductibility standpoint. If you're unsure whether a group is qualified, just ask to see its letter from the IRS. (Many organizations now post these letters on their websites.)

Here's how the charitable tax deduction works: If you give \$200 to a qualified charity, and you're in the 25% tax bracket, you can deduct \$200, with a tax benefit of \$50, when you file your 2014 taxes. Consequently, the net "cost" of your donation is just \$150 (\$200 minus the \$50 tax savings).

Of course, you are not confined to making cash gifts. In fact, if you donate certain types of noncash assets, you may be able to increase your tax benefits. Suppose you give \$1,000 worth of stock in ABC Company to a charitable group. If you're in the 25% bracket, you'll be able to deduct \$250 when you file your taxes. And by donating the ABC stock, you can avoid paying the capital gains taxes that would be due if you had eventually sold the stock yourself.

Keep in mind that if you want to deduct your contributions for the 2014 tax year, you'll need to make your gifts by Dec. 31. One more reminder: Retain your paperwork. If you made gifts totaling over \$250 to any single charity — or noncash contributions of any items worth over \$500 — the IRS requires written acknowledgments for your contributions.

If you want to take a longer-term approach to charitable giving, while incorporating your gifts in planning for your estate, you might want to consider establishing a charitable remainder trust. Under this arrangement, you'd place some assets, such as stocks or real estate, into a trust, which could then use these assets to pay you a lifetime income stream. When you establish the trust, you may be able to receive an immediate tax deduction based on the charitable group's "remainder interest" — the amount the charity is likely to ultimately receive. (This figure is determined by an IRS formula.) Upon your death, the trust would relinquish the remaining assets to the charitable organization you've named. This type of trust can be complex, so to create one, you'll need to work with your tax and legal advisors.

While the tax benefits associated with charitable giving are significant, they should not, ultimately, drive your gifting decisions. You should also consider the effect your gift will have on the other areas of your estate considerations — so make sure you communicate your plans to your family members.

In any case, though, be as generous as you can this holiday season and in the years to come. Your generosity will be a rewarding expe-

Dwight Grade School Presents 2014 Tax Levy Proposal

DGS to Join Foster Grandparent Program

As area property values continue to trend downward, members of the Dwight Grade School Board of Education considered a proposal for its 2014 Tax Levy at the November 12 board session.

District School Superintendent, Dr. Richard Jancek, presented initial 2014 Tax Levy projections based on information received from the Livingston and Grundy County Assessor's offices while weighing upcoming needs of the district.

Dr. Jancek proposed increasing the overall taxing rate to 3.2502 thereby offsetting decreasing home values, but, noted that homeowners should not notice any significant impact to their overall tax bill.

Dr. Jancek did caution the board with regard to the threeyear projections as various needs of the district will increasingly strain the budget.

"It is a big concern that we will need to keep an eye on," Jancek told the board. "We will need to react to this trend and have some serious conversations.'

The final tax levy proposal will be presented for approval at the December board session.

In new business the board discussed and approved a partnership with the Kankakee -Livingston Counties Foster Grandparent Program. The grant funded program pairs seniors 55 and older with students. The well-established program is a volunteerism effort focused on young and old alike to grow, gain confidence and become productive members of society. According to the program's website, the benefits to individuals, families, schools and communities are both immediate and longlasting. This intergenerational project also provides many opportunities for youngsters and seniors to learn and grow together. Foster Grandparents serve as tutors, mentors and caregivers at various volunteer

sites in Kankakee and Livingston Counties. Fringe benefits for the foster grandparents include an hourly stipend among other benefits.

In another matter, athletes, parents and other concerned parties addressed the board regarding the School Athletics and Activities Guidelines and looking for a clear understanding on the district's philosophy regarding individual athlete moves. A recent situation prompted the discussion which centered on the ability for athletes to be pulled up playing levels. Concerns regarding playing time, building selfesteem, providing skill building for all players, and encouraging participation by keeping it fun were discussion points along with how to pull up talented players without creating a "hole" in the grade level team

the player is leaving. We are a small school with small numbers. We need to maintain flexibility," said board member Bo Partney.

The board approved a recommendation for athletic participation based on IESA Guidelines which allows lower grade level players to move up levels. The approval was made with the addendum that grade level moves must be approved by administration.

In reports to the board, Building Principal Ben Bailey reported on the increasing stu-

dent enrollment. Student enrollment showed an increase of eight students over last month with a total of 574 students building-wide.

Dr. Jancek welcomed special guests to the meeting as visitors from China were in the audience to watch and learn about the workings of local school government. The delegation members are Chinese government employees who will spend three months at the University of Chicago to study and further their knowledge in public administration.

Dr. Jancek also reported that he has met with an architect to evaluate the circle drive situation in an effort to try and alleviate some of the traffic issues in that area. It was also noted that the three newly purchased 2015 white activity buses had

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


