DWIGHT CENTRUE BANK ROBBED

On November 20, 2014, at approximately 4:30 p.m., an unknown subject entered Centrue Bank, located at 302 W. Mazon Ave. in Dwight, and robbed the financial institution.

The male subject entered and demanded money. No weapon was displayed and no injuries occurred. An undisclosed amount of money was taken. The male was approximately 5'10" tall and approximately 200 lbs.

The Dwight Police Department is being assisted by the Illinois State Police, Livingston County Sheriff's Police, Pontiac Police, and Agents from the FBI Peoria Office. This case remains under investigation and numerous leads have been followed up. Anyone with information is asked to call the Dwight Police Department at 815-584-3132 or the Police hotline at 815-584-1975.

A large cash award is being offered for anyone with information that leads to the arrest and conviction of the individual or individuals who were involved.

"Although there is nothing new to report," Chief Henson commented, "rest assured that all Law Enforcement agencies continue to follow up on leads." On the day of the robbery, the Police K9 took them from the North Entrance of the Bank and down the alley located between the Palms Apartments and the beauty shop, but lost the scent after that. It is thought that a get-away vehicle might have been located there, but nothing could be substantiated.



Saunemin United Methodist Church Makes Plans For New Building



by Bridget De Waard The Methodist Church in Saunemin, whose current building has stood for almost 90 years, has decided to rebuild, planning to construct an entirely new structure in the empty lot on the eastern side of the original building. This has been a two year process, with serious discussions beginning as far back as January 2013, which has finally come to fruition.

said. "The survey included three proposals: we would either update the building, leaving the current structure intact; update but also put on an addition to the existing church; or, instead, build an entirely new, stand alone church."

The congregation voted overwhelmingly to proceed with a new building, and plans soon came together to begin planning how the new church would look, what "Our current church is elements would be kept from the old building, and what the entire process meant, besides just a new place to worship. "This isn't solely about the new building itself," said Pastor Bradford. "It is also our commitment to the future generation, and what the people in Saunemin believe God is doing." The church hopes that, by being a small rural church themselves, they can bring hope and faith to other small churches like them. "Essentially, we are leaving a legacy of faith, just as the congregation who built our current church did for us,"

Pastor Bradford said. "They sacrificed to build this church, and it has played a key role in helping us assist the children and families of the Saunemin community."

"It is also our hope that the church's new format will be more appealing to young people," Fink said. "The current church, which has such a traditional style, can be somewhat intimidating and might have deterred some from attending in the past."

Pastor Bradford, who grew up in Saunemin and left when she was 17, returned around 40 years later, and has been dedicated to this church ever since. "Most churches have to share their pastors with other congregations," she commented. "So not only have I grown up here, but I have been assigned to my home church; this usually doesn't happen." The new building, which will be approximately 5,988 square feet, will have everything on one level, as op-

Following the Pledge of Allegiance, the minutes of the October 13, 2014 meeting were approved by roll call vote.

The board listing report, representing all due bills for the village for November, and the report representing all due bills for tourism in November were approved by the trustees for payment, plus an additional invoice from Weller Hooker Insurance for \$75.00.

Sgt. Mitchell reported 15 calls in Odell last month, with one citation issued, but no warnings were given.

Under old business, there was no discussion held nor action

taken on Elk Street; Mayor Joyner updated the board on information he received from Andrews on the progress of the Route 66 Trails Grant Project. IDOT has received the project plans. Andrews expects to hear back with any comments or minor plan changes, and will then re-submit the plans. Once IDOT approves the re-submitted plans, discussion can begin on prospective bid advertisement and letting dates.

Mayor Joyner tabled the Resolution of Support on Tax Abatement until the December Board meeting.

Trustee Gary Wykes suggested that the Village have an Ordinance in place to monitor that construction taking place within the village is being performed by contractors that are licensed and insured. Attorney Legner will research the idea.

Mayor Joyner reported that the clerk has received a request from the Fast Stop to change their Liquor License from Class A to Class B in order to obtain a video gaming license. Attorney Legner will check with the State Statute to verify that a Class B license is a necessary requirement to obtain a video gaming license.

The Clearwell Project was moved to executive session at 7:56 p.m., exiting at 8:10. The purpose of the session was to discuss litigation updates.

After resuming regular session, the meeting adjourned at 8:12 p.m.



Grundy Economic Development Council Hosts Rail Luncheon

More than 100 people attended the Grundy Economic Development Council (GEDC) Fall Speaker Series event on November 5 at Chapin's East in Minooka. The topic this year was the resurgent railroad industry and a discussion of the growing importance of railroads to Grundy County, the Chicago region, and the nation. Business development experts from Class I Railroads BNSF, CSX, and Union Pacific were on hand to share their perspective on where the industry has been and where it is going in the years ahead.

Eric Pitcher, Regional Manager for Economic Development of BNSF, addressed the significant impact of North American oil production on the transportation infrastructure. He noted that BNSF is investing billions of dollars in new capital, including both equipment and new rail infrastructure. Jeff Wagoner, Industrial Development Manager at CSX, echoed Pitcher's remarks about investment and referenced the growing importance of the local CSX rail spur in transporting sand from LaSalle County to the rest of the country.

Wagoner also provided insights to the audience, which included public officials, local businesses, and representatives from education, labor, and non-profit organizations, for helping grow the rail-served industrial sector.

Wayne Borg, Regional Manager at Union Pacific, provided details of growth opportunities for rail in the region, including the Inland Logistics Port of Coal City. The proposed industrial park is located on an underutilized

lars in new capital, including both equipment and new rail infrastructure. Jeff Wagoner, Industrial Development Manager at CSX, echoed Pitcher's but well-served Union Pacific line and is poised to be an important destination for freight from Mexico and the Gulf Coast region.

"It was great for the community to be able to bring this group together to tell the rail story," said Nancy Norton Ammer, CEO of the GEDC. "Between them, today's speakers have developed several billion dollars of new industrial projects throughout Illinois and the Midwest, and they were able to provide key insights to our community about how to be development ready."



Look for the Panthers to be in the top half of the RVC this season - and don't be surprised to see another match-up versus St. Anne again in the regionals.


"It's always our goal to be competitive with the best teams in our area," Gibson stated.

Tax Levy time is once upon us as Superintendent Jancek presented initial 2014 tax levy, projections for District #230

Dr. Jancek's proposal used a conservative approach to the planning process factoring in a little less in revenues and a little more in expenditures. By proposing a 3.0421 tax rate, he worked to make a balanced budget while not making a significant change to the tax rate. Jancek asked the board to think about its past direction regarding surplus funding and asked that the board consider

its future direction. "At what point is enough money, enough money?" Dr. Jancek asked the board.

While property values continue to decline, three year projections show the District remaining healthy with over \$3 million in its budget. However, while the revenue side remains fairly consistent, projected expenditures show more substantial increases leaving an accumulating budget deficit.




