DTHS Board of Education January Actions

With limited facilities in a small community, the school, with its gymnasium, auditorium, cafeteria, stadium and other offerings, often becomes a sought after go-to location for non-school related events. At the January 21 Dwight Township High School Board of Education session, Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek looked for guidance from the board on facility usage.

"The school becomes the identity of the community," Dr. Jancek told the board during their discussion.

An Application for Use of Building Facilities, including facility usage rules and rental fees outlined for Non-Profit Civic, Non-Profit, and For Profit organizations, was reviewed by the board. With taxpayer dollars used to fund schools, board members gave direction that school facilities could be a possible option for outside events and organizations, especially those that benefit children, provided school-related activities always have usage and scheduling priority.

In Principal Dan Kaiser's report to the board, the BOE learned that ACT Prep is again being offered to DTHS juniors this year with sessions taking place each Sunday in February from 1 to 4 p.m. A specific section of the test (Math, English, Science and Reading) will be covered during each three hour session. A fee of \$60 is accessed to any student taking part in the ACT Prep. The board discussed a suggestion to waive the fee so cost would not deter any students who might want to take part in the classes. However, maintaining some sort of buy-in by students to ensure attendance was recommended by administra-

DTHS will again conduct the 5 Essentials Survey this year. This on-line survey is designed to drive improvements in schools nationwide measuring administration, collaboration, relationships, teacher instruction and supportive environments surrounding the school. Students, parents and teachers will be asked to participate in this survey before its deadline of March 13 with a report generated in August.

In Financials, Dr. Jancek reported that the State of Illinois currently owes the District \$58,209.45 in late mandated categorical payments.

"My concern is that the State will continue to fall behind," said Dr. Jancek.

Board President Irv Masching commended those responsible for coordinating the DTHS Athletic Hall of Fame induction ceremony that took place on January 16. The night included the induction of three former individual DTHS athletes, Dwight "Whitey" Anderson, Rachel Drake Edwards, and Tom Halloran, along with deceased Football Coach



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Dwight Not Participating **Property Tax Abatement Program Approved in** \$40 **Livingston County**

A number of taxing bodies in Livingston County have approved a new program of property tax abatements designed to encourage economic development within the county.

The program offers threeyear, five-year, seven-year and 10-year abatements of property tax, dependent on the value of a developer's new or expanded construction, the amount of capital investment, and increases in employment.

Signing on to the new program at a January 14 meeting chaired by the Greater Livingston County Economic Development Council in Pontiac were the Livingston County Board; municipalities Fairbury, Chenoa, Pontiac and Odell; Prairie Central and Pontiac Township High School Districts; Pontiac and Odell Elementary School Districts.

Dwight taxing districts are not involved in the pro-

Village of Dwight officials decided they would prefer to consider economic development inquiries on an

individual basis, rather than applying a program of predetermined incentives.

Dwight also has a unique situation, with a vital part of the Village being in Grundy County, where a different property tax abatement program is already in effect.

According to Adam Dontz, CEO of the GLCEDC, Dwight would not be excluded from consideration for any proposed development because of its non-participation in the program.

The program does not impact existing revenue streams to any taxing body. The abatements only apply to future tax revenues resulting from new construction and/or building expansion.

Dontz stated, "This property tax abatement program — with its scaled 10-year term — is the most robust and competitive pre-negotiated property tax abatement in the I-55 corridor . . . I'm optimistic we could see the benefits of the program within 12 to 18 months or less.'

Dontz said a multifaceted marketing campaign will be launched to inform business owners and potential investors of the new tax abatement program.

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What Do Low Oil Prices **Mean for Investors?**

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As you've no doubt noticed, your trips to the gas station have been a lot more pleasant these past several months. There's not much doubt that low oil prices have been welcome to you as a driver. But when oil is cheap, is that good for you as an investor?

There's no clear-cut answer. But consider the following effects

of low oil prices: Positive impact on economy — When you spend less at the gas pump, relative to recent years, what will you do with your savings? Like most people, you'll probably spend most of it on

Different results for different sectors — Different sectors within the financial markets may respond in different ways to low oil prices, even if the overall effect is generally positive. For example, businesses such as consumer goods companies and auto manufacturers may respond favorably to cheaper oil and gas. But the picture might be quite a bit different for energy companies.

You could spend a lot of time and effort trying to adjust your investment portfolio in response to low oil prices. In fact, you may well want to consult with your financial professional to determine which moves might make sense for your individual situation. Yet there's actually a bigger lesson to be learned here: Don't overreact to temporary developments. The recent decline in oil prices has certainly had an economic impact, but no one can predict how long these prices will stay low or what other factors may arise that would affect the financial markets. That's why you can't reconfigure your portfolio based on particular events, whatever they may be - oil price drops, interest-rate fluctuations, political squabbles at home, natural disasters in faraway lands, and so on.

If you can keep from being overly influenced by specific events, you may be able to gain at least two key benefits: First, by not making trades constantly in reaction to the headlines of the day, you can avoid piling up heavy fees and commissions —costs that can reduce the return rate on your investments. Second, you'll find that if you aren't always thinking about what's going on in the world today, you can focus your investment efforts more intensely on where you want to be tomorrow. The most successful investors set long-term goals and don't focus on factors they cannot control, such as oil prices, interest-rate changes or other economic events. Instead, these investors make adjustments, as necessary, to accommodate changes in their goals as well as other changes, such as revisions in tax laws - but they basically stick to their same approach for the long term.

So be aware of low oil prices, but don't get so "pumped" about them that you sludge up your consistent investment strategy because that strategy has the energy to keep you moving toward your important objectives.

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
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E-Waste Recycling

Now that the Holidays are behind us and the sales are over, many of us are faced with the disposal of that old TV or computer we replaced with a fancy new model. Gone are the days when all that was needed was a trip to the curb and a wave goodbye for the old units.

Environmental concerns over the toxic chemicals contained in these devices, like mercury, lead, cadmium, beryllium, chromium, and chemical flame retardants, which have the potential to leach into our soil and water, have led to the use of E-Waste Recycling efforts across the United States.

Furthermore, E-waste contains many valuable, recoverable materials such as aluminum, copper, gold, silver, plastics, and ferrous metals. In order to conserve natural resources and the energy needed to produce new electronic equipment from fresh

resources, electronic equipment can be refurbished, reused, and recycled instead of being landfilled.

Electronic recyclers receive financial support from electronic manufacturers to recycle under the federal Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act, which allows us, the public, to have the access to the service at no cost.
