

Sgt. John Mitchell reported only one citation and no warnings in the village last month. There were 18 calls.

An e-mail received by Mayor Joyner from the Village Engineers indicated that the Illinois Historic Preservation Association has cleared Odell's Route 66 plans and that IDOT will try to expedite its review of the plans.

Attorney Legner indicated that in regard to the Clearwell, during the Discovery process MPC did not submit answers to several items. Therefore, the Judge has ordered that a high level representative from MPC appear in March at a Hearing as to why they have not complied.

The Attorney has provided a proposed Amendment to the Construction Ordinance, and following discussion as to specific wording, the Amendment was tabled until next month.

Trustee Fearman reported that he has updated wording for the Red Carpet Corridor pamphlet for 2015 and displayed a neon clock with a picture of the Odell station that will be for sale at the station.

Under new business, Mayor Joyner relayed to the Board that he would like to apply for a grant offered by ComEd through the ComEd Green Regions Program. The program will grant up to \$10,000 to entities to improve open land in ComEd's service area. If accepted, the Village would have a \$10,000 match. The grant would allow the

Village extra monies for landscaping the Route 66 Walking / Biking Path. Trustee Fearman moved to approve the resolution authorizing participation in the program and to apply for the full amount of \$10,000 which will require a \$10,000 match by the Village. Trustee Weaver seconded the move and it was approved by roll call vote.

The mayor told the board he is looking into the purchase of some planters and benches for the downtown area. The mayor also reported that the white Dodge has not worked right since last year's accident, and he asked Ribordy to obtain prices on a replacement truck.

The Dwight Grade School Board of Education showed support of a proposal that could offer its students a special kind of learning opportunity by the way of a school garden. Present at the February 11 BOE meeting was Jill Cooke of Dwight, who presented information to the board with regard to starting a Farm to School Program at Dwight Grade School.

The USDA Farm to School Program empowers children and their families by advocating fresh, healthy foods and allowing students, and the community, to take part in locally producing these foods by way of a school garden. Through the program, students would engage in hands-on learning through gardening. The benefits could include use of the fresh garden foods in the

• approved moving the April 8th DGS BOE meeting to April 22 at 6 p.m.

• agreed to a special joint Board session with the DTHS BOE on April 29 for seating of new members to the board and acknowledging outgoing members.

• learned that the State of Illinois currently owes the District \$166,319.48 in late mandated categorical payments.

The OFS program is similar to the Next Step Options program that MCCA launched last



Dwight Exploring Pool and Aqua Center Options -- February 9 Board Actions --



by Madelyn Fogarty

The Village of Dwight is continuing to explore the possibility of a new swimming pool and aqua center. On February 12, the Village Administration Committee heard a report from the committee tasked with researching pool options and considered its recommendation for moving forward.

In March of 2014, David of Burbach Burbach Aquatics out of Plattville WI presented his company's evaluation of Dwight's

The Robert Stevenson Memorial Swimming Pool was built in 1976 - 1977, with the pool opening on Memorial Day weekend in 1977. At that time, the pool facility cost approximately \$300,000 to build with funding for the pool coming from individual pledges and donations. The land was donated to the village. After

38 years, the facility has come to a crossroad with a cracked vessel and other significant and costly repairs necessary to continue operation. Last summer, at the direction of the board, a Pool Committee was formed and had been researching options which include repairs to the current facility or construction of a new

Renovations of the existing facility come with a probable construction cost of \$2.33 million and a life expectancy of approximately ten years.

Totally new construction of a swim facility with all new amenities, increased capacity, and added features is estimated at \$4.11 million with a life expectancy of 40 – 50 years. The committee cited many advantages to a new facility that may outweigh the increased cost, such as, an increased attraction to draw people to Dwight for entertainment, shopping, and economic development.

The Stevenson Pool Committee is enthusiastic about the positive effect of a swimming pool project as a way to "enhance and reenergize our community as a place people will want to move here to live" as opposed to "a community that is running down and people are moving out of..."

"It is a critical decision what is our vision for the Community of Dwight?" Dr. Lou Cronin of the Pool Committee asked the group.

The Pool Committee recommends construction of a new 7,842 square foot pool and aqua center with a capacity of 410 persons and modern features to most economically serve the anticipated swimming pool needs of Dwight for many years to come. It is expected Village Administration Committee will make a recommendation to the Village Board to take the next step in the process and look at financing options for a new facili-

the Village Board of Trustees met on February 9. At that session, the board approved several Ordinance Committee recommendations. 

Pontiac to Get New Museum

The Society of Gilders, an international organization dedicated to the craft of gold and silver leafing, will be opening an expanded version of their popular display that shared space inside the former Walldog Museum.

Record Yields Impacting 2015 Crop Plans

The January 12 USDA Agriculture Crop report estimated the average Illinois corn yield in 2014 was 200 bushels per acre, a new state record.

"The soybean average yield was also a new record at 56 bushels per acre. While these numbers are amazing, vield alone does not mean profit for farmers," states Illinois University of Extension Commercial Ag Educator Dennis Bowman.

The price they sell it for temporarily, filled the supply "pipeline" and prices have dropped accordingly. This makes the profit margin outlook for the 2015 crop very tight compared to high margins seen in the recent past. John Deere just announced another big round of layoffs bringing the count up to over 2,000 workers in the last six months.

University of Illinois

Economist, Gary Schnitkey, talked about the Estimated 2015 Crop Budgets at the recent Corn & Soybean Classic meetings. He explained that in 2015 the outlook in Central Illinois is for soybeans to be more profitable than corn. The complete crop budget list for all areas of Illinois is available at www.farmdoc.illinois.edu/ in the management section.

The budget groups costs is just as important. The into three categories: direct record yields have, at least costs, power costs, and overhead costs. When these costs are added together and subtracted from the projected revenue given the current price outlook and average yields, the best return comes from soybeans following two or more years of corn.


This has an estimated return of \$225 per acre. Rent and operator income still have to be subtracted from that \$225. Many Central

Illinois counties have been reporting average cash rents over \$250 per acre. If yields are not above average, many farmers have a very tough year ahead.

If significant numbers of farmers decide to switch more acres to soybeans in response to this, the outlook will change as prices adjust to reflect potential supply. The comparative advantage may shift back to corn.

When prices are high there is a tendency to evaluate decisions on anything to maximize yield. In low price situations managing input costs takes on a very high priority. Dr. Schnitkey summarized farmers potential responses to these scenarios: lower or eliminate capital purchases, lower fertilizer or seed costs, renegotiate cash rents, and attempt to dramatically reduce family living expenses.





PUBLIC NOTICE NOTICE TO ELDERLY (OVER 65) AND HANDICAPPED VOTERS REGARDING THE CONSOLIDATED ELECTION, **APRIL 7, 2015**

Notice is hereby given to elderly over 65 and handicapped persons that the County of Livingston has complied with federal and state election laws to promote the fundamental right to vote by improving access to polling places and election day voting as follows:

All polling places are wheelchair accessible.

If your polling place is difficult for an elderly or handicapped person to manage, there are some alternatives:

- 1. On request by phone or letter, the county clerk will supply you with a proper affidavit for a voter unable to enter the polling place on Election Day. This must be completed and returned to the County Clerk's Office no later than 4:30 p.m. on April 6, 2015. On election day two judges from your polling place, of opposite parties, will bring the ballot sheet outside the entrance, providing that you are within a distance of not more than 50 (fifty) feet from the door to the polling
- 2. If an elderly or disabled voter has difficulty in reading the ballot sheet he or she may ask for assistance at the polling place, or may bring a friend or relative to assist. After filling out the proper affidavit, the friend or relative or two judges of opposite parties, can assist you.
- 3. A request can be made by phone or by mail to the County Clerk's Office for an absentee ballot. When the request is received an application for an absentee ballot will be mailed to the voter. You can download an application on line by going to: livingstoncountyil.gov. This application must be filled out and mailed or hand delivered to the County Clerk, who will then mail the absentee ballot to the voter. After voting the absentee ballot it must be mailed back to the County Clerk's Office, so it can be counted on Election Day.
- 4. Illinois election law allows for absentee voting to be conducted in the County Clerk's Office. The clerk's office will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 Noon on Saturday, March 7, 2015 for voter registration and absentee voting; on Saturday, March 28 and Saturday, April 4 for absentee voting from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 Noon. Voting will take place during the regular office hours Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30
- 5. The County Clerk's office will offer two methods of voting, the AccuVote optical scan unit and TSX electronic voting


