Bumpy Roads Continue for Dwight's Sales Tax

After posting a moderate increase (\$12,000) in total sales tax received during 2014 compared to 2013, Dwight's sales tax revenue slumped some \$18,000 in the first quarter of 2015.

January, February and March figures released by the Illinois Department of Revenue showed Dwight received \$130,405 for retail sales in the first three months of 2015. That same period a year ago produced \$148,612 in sales tax.

The Grundy County portion provided \$37,492 of Dwight's sales tax in the first quarter of 2015. Dwight, Livingston County, produced \$92,913.

Automotive & Filling Stations was again the top sales tax category in Dwight, with \$35,341 reported in the Livingston Co. part of the community. The comparable figure in the first quarter of 2014 was \$51,767. The report did not break out fig-

ures for that category in the Grundy County area.

Food sales in Dwight, Livingston County, were responsible for \$21,142 in sales tax revenue, first quarter 2015.

Drinking & Eating Places in Dwight continued their strong sales tax returns: \$8,830 from the Livingston Co. part, and \$7,632 from Grundy, for a total of \$16,462. The first quarter 2014 total for that category in Dwight was \$18,561.

Dwight Noncommittal to Pool Proposal Sidewalk Café Regulations Approved

Members of Dwight's Pool Committee and other concerned citizens were looking for a firm commitment and definitive timeline from Village of Dwight officials regarding their stand on moving forward with construction of a proposed \$4 million outdoor swimming pool complex.

"Where do we go from here?" asked Lou Cronin on behalf of the Pool Committee when the Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on June 8.

Over nearly the past year, questions on how to address major issues with Dwight's aging swimming pool have been accessed, and recommendations for a new facility have been developed and presented to the Board of Trustees while also trying to gain support from local residents for the project. While few would argue there is value to having a recreational facility such as a swimming pool / aqua center in Dwight, cost and funding

concerns have kept village officials from diving in without reservation.

"I think it is important to the community," stated Dwight's Village President Jared Anderson. "But, I am looking at the dollars and trying to work it out."

While Anderson indicated there is little concern with the structural plan presented, the biggest challenge is the financial state of the village right now and for the next couple of years.

Pending cuts on the table by Governor Bruce Rauner add more uncertainty to the financial forecast. However, Anderson indicated that the financial picture could allow for some flexibility in the near future as current debts owed by the village will drop from an approximate 2015 debt of \$953,000 to a debt of \$460,000 by the end of 2017.

"We are completely handcuffed on improvements we can do for the village," stated Anderson. "Right now, we don't have the money to pay it back."

But, with certain bonds reaching retirement and money freeing up over the next 17 months, the Mayor asked the committee to allow the village more time to review the overall financial picture and work on a financial plan before making a final commitment decision.

"We just need time," said Anderson.

In other business at the June 8 session, sidewalk café and outdoor restaurant seating requirements and standards were agreed upon by the Board of Trustees.

Applications for a seating license will be required for Dwight restaurant businesses that hold a valid County Public Health Food Handler License and wish to have an outdoor seating area. An annual application fee of \$100 will be accessed.

Some other operating requirements outlined in the standards include operation of the outdoor area only when the main business is open and not before 8 a.m. or after 10 p.m.; fencing

requirements; alcoholic beverage guidelines; public sidewalk right-of-ways; and May 1 – October 31 months of operation.

A one-year intergovernmental agreement has been reached between the Village of Dwight, Dwight Grade School District #232, and Dwight Township High School District #230 with regard to providing a Resource Officer to the schools.

Last month, Dwight Schools agreed to pay the Village of Dwight \$10,000 for 2014-15 program services received and to continue the program for the 2015-16 school year at a cost of \$11,000. In addition, the Dwight school districts will pay \$35 per hour for each additional officer at school-sponsored functions. Over the next year, Dwight Schools will review and evaluate the various programs being offered by the Police Resource Officer and make a determination on how to proceed beginning



It is important to remember that these are examples

and final donor suitability is determined at the collection site on the day of donation using standards in place at that time.

Call the Donor and Client Support Center for state specific age information or visit redcrossblood.org and enter your zip code to print the parental consent form, if required.

A whole blood donor may donate every 56 days. A double red-cell donor may donate every 112 days. A platelet donor may donate as often as every seven days, up to a maximum of 24 times a year. A person may donate any combination of these procedures, but the donation interval will vary.

The Odell Village Board met Monday, June 8, with Mayor Terry Joyner presiding at the 7 p.m. meeting. Iris Thorne and Richard Ribordy, Odell staff, and Village Attorney Ed Legner were in attendance with three guests: Sgt. John Mitchell, Officer Brian Hoffmeyer and Phaela Hodges.

Trustees present were: Brian Verdun, Gary Wykes, Jaime Johnson, and Brian Mills.

Following the Pledge of Allegiance, the May 6 regular meeting minutes were approved, and the treasurer's report was given by Iris Thorne, Clerk, for Treasurer Jim Rebholz, who had supplied copies of a YTD Fund Summary and an MTD Treasurer's Report. Bank balances for the month ending May 31 are as follows: Odell Checking \$26,271.73 Odell Savings \$87,224.43 Illinois Funds Gen. Fund Checking \$261,588.90 Illinois Funds MFT Checking \$85,576.97 General Fund

CDs \$225,161.48 Odell Tourism \$27,440.37 The Report was approved by the four Trustees. Mayor Joyner administered the Oath of Office to newly - elected Trustee Phaela Hodges.

All due bills for the Village and for Tourism for June 2015 were presented and given payment approval.

Trustee Johnson requested that Attorney Legner research if the Village should be paying property taxes on Tourism property.

Sgt. Mitchell reported that according to the June Police Activity Report there were 19 calls in Odell last month with one citation issued and no warnings.

The board requested that the town officer enforce the Village NEV Ordinance. Sgt. Mitchell asked that the clerk send a current list of registered NEV owners.

Officer Hoffmeyer reported on the 5-K Run which had 73 runners and nine walkers. \$796 was netted for the Special Olympics. The 2016 run is

scheduled for May 21 in Odell.

Bid letting for Odell's Route 66 Trail will be July 1. The Mayor reported the car show at the Standard Station "a success."

Mayor Joyner presented his committees' recommendation for the fiscal year 2015-16.

Ed Legner and Iris Thorne have prepared the FY 2015-16 working budget and presented it to the board. Iris explained that next month the Appropriation will be prepared based on the working budget. Trustee Johnson moved to approve the working budget with Trustee Verdun seconding.

It was brought to the attention of the Village that on Tremont Street in the alley there appears to be people living in campers. The Mayor will have the situation looked into.

The Board entered Executive Session at 7:45 p.m. to discuss the Clearwell Litigation, exiting at 8:19 p.m., moving to adjourn from regular session at 8:20 p.m.


'Hang Loose – Let the Good Times Roll' Car Show in Pontiac June 20

Dwight Grade School Joins GLCEDC Tax Abatement Program June Board Actions

Dwight Grade School District #232 has approved a proposal by the Greater Livingston County Economic Development Council to be part of a property tax abatement plan offered in the county.

The abatement plan is an effort by Livingston County area taxing bodies to join forces and offer a tax abatement to incent new commercial construction which could increase the equalized assessed valuation (tax base) of the county by incenting new commercial construction.

By encouraging the construction of new or expanded commercial development and the addition of employees at sustainable wages, the GLCEDC believes it will result in increased sales tax revenue, property tax revenue, more students in schools, and help to stabilize and increase residential and commercial property values. The abatement program is designed to allow the Livingston County area to better compete with counties such as Grundy, McLean, Peoria, and Will which have larger labor forces and tax incentive plans already approved. The abatement does not impact existing revenue streams of any taxing body and the abatement only applies to future tax revenue resulting from new construction.

"There are good measures in [the agreement] that can be a win-win", Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek told the board.

In other business matters addressed at the June 10 Board of Education meeting, the DGS District #232 BOE approved entering into an Intergovernmental Agreement with Dwight Township High School District #230 regarding student school bus transportation. In April, both Dwight BOEs unanimously agreed to move forward with a plan to manage bus transportation services in-house. At that time, the boards approved a leasing option that will give the Dwight School Districts more control of their transportation needs while realizing an anticipated overall cost savings. Through the agreement, Dwight Township High School will be the primary managing party and will provide transportation services to Dwight Grade School at a contracted rate.

No decision was made regarding regular education sections for the 2015-16 school year. With registration numbers still coming in, school administrators will take one more month to review elementary enrollment numbers and final fiscal year financials before making a recommendation to the board regarding section sizes.

In some positive financial news, the board learned that the State of Illinois currently does not owe the district any money with regard to mandated categorical payments. The unanticipated state monies received could help provide a "better financial picture than we thought" said Dr. Jancek. Final fiscal

year numbers will be presented in July.

Celebrate Father's Day by Investing in Your Children's Future

Father's Day is almost here. If you're a father, especially one with young children, get ready to add to your collection of homemade cards, ties, golf tees or other such gifts designed to please you. Your greatest gift, of course, is your children — and you would doubtlessly get great satisfaction from knowing that you've provided them with financial resources that can benefit their lives in many ways. So, why not use this Father's Day as a starting point for investing in your children's futures?

Here are a few methods for doing just that:

UGMA/UTMA — If you would like to buy and sell securities for the benefit of a child, you may consider opening a custodial account known as either an UTMA (Uniform Transfers to Minors) or UGMA (Uniform Gifts to Minors) account. You would serve as the custodian for this account, giving you control of it until your child turns either 18 or 21 (depending on your state of residence), at which point he or she would take over ownership. Investment income from an UGMA/UTMA account can receive favorable tax treatment. As long as the child is under age 19 (or under age 24 and a full-time student) and does not have earned income providing more than half of his or her support, the first \$1,050 of investment income is tax-free, and the next \$1,050 will be taxed at the child's tax rate, which is typically 10%. Investment income above \$2,100 will be taxed at the parent's tax rate.

Roth IRA — Even young children can contribute to a Roth IRA, as long as they have some type of earned income from babysitting, mowing lawns or any other type of employment. Your children can fund a Roth IRA and choose from several different types of investments — stocks, bonds, government securities, and so on — and withdrawals of contributions are tax-free. Roth IRA earnings are also tax-free, providing the investor is at least 59½ and has had the account for at least five years. A Roth IRA can be used to help provide retirement income for your children, but it also offers penalty-free withdrawals of earnings when the money is used for a first-time purchase of a home.

529 Plans — If you would like to give your child the gift of education, earnings in a 529 college savings plan accumulate and are distributed tax free, provided they are used for qualified higher education expenses. (529 plan distributions not used for qualified expenses may be subject to federal and state income tax and a 10% IRS penalty on the earnings.) Another benefit to 529 plan contributions is that they may be deductible from your state taxes. However, 529 plans vary, so be sure to check with your tax advisor regarding deductibility. A 529 plan offers other benefits, too. For one thing, the lifetime contribution limits are generous; while these limits vary by state, some plans allow contributions well in excess of \$200,000. And a 529 plan is flexible: If your child decides against college or vocational school, you can transfer the unused funds to another family member tax and penalty free.

Living and Testamentary Trusts — If you would like to leave a financial legacy for your children, and even their children, but still maintain some control over when they receive the money and how they can use it, you might consider speaking with an estate-planning attorney about establishing a trust. Some individuals create a trust to offer long-term support to heirs or charities after death, whether for several decades or several generations. Before you decide on any of these plans, consult with your tax and financial professionals to make sure the arrangement you've selected is suitable for your needs.

But however you choose to help your children, your generosity will make all the Father's Days to come even more meaningful for you — so consider taking action soon.



Gardner Village Board Meets

The Gardner Village Board met in regular session on June 8, opening the meeting with approval of a resolution for the 2015 storm sewer improvements. The resolution includes the acceptance of liability by the contractors for working under Illinois Route 53.

The board next discussed a proposal from Gibs Nielsen to sell the abandoned grain elevator to the Village for \$25,000. The board's discussion centered on costs associated with tear-down and disposal of the materials. Village Attorney Scott Belt advised the board that to force the tear-down of the structure without ownership would require a court order declaring the structure unsafe. Belt further advised the Village would not recover their costs until the property is sold and then only if the sale price was high enough to cover other possible liens against the property.

Belt also commented the Village could explore eminent domain proceedings to acquire ownership of the property. To pursue eminent domain, the Village would need to show a public need for the property, such as additional downtown parking. The board tabled the issue, pending further research.

Mayor Mike Serena raised the temporary closure of the alleyway behind the Mahoney property. The closure will allow the filming of the television program "Garage Squad" during the building of a garage along the alley. The closure was expected to last until June 15, but may be extended if needed.

Sergeant Slattery provided the Grundy County Sheriff's report detailing the calls the department responded to during the last three weeks. The report included three warrant arrests and two vehicle burglaries.

The board received one bid for tree removal from Future Tree Service for removal of several trees, including Monroe and North Streets, one in the park, and two along Main Street for the completion of the storm sewer project. Removal of the stumps downtown will be under a separate bid. Commissioner Dick Hileman motioned and the board voted to accept the bid under the condition the work is completed within 14 days. The board approved the final payment estimate for the 2014 street project. The board also approved the purchase of bushes to replace the trees removed from downtown.

Commissioner James Riley proposed the purchase of four bushes, black dirt and mulch to supplement six bushes donated to the Village.

Commissioner Riley advised he has placed towing of vehicles from private property based on an opinion from the Grundy County State's Attorney from several years ago. Belt advised the board the opinion was written when Susan Bates was an Assistant State's Attorney and Terry Marketti was Grundy County Sheriff. Belt noted he had not visited with current Sheriff Kevin Callahan or representatives from State's Attorney Jason Helland's office since the Village changed their ordinance following Bates' opinion and a Supreme Court ruling. Belt does not believe the Sheriff's Department will tow vehicles until there is a warrant issued by a judge ordering the removal. The board directed Belt to discuss the situation with the State's Attorney's office.

Commissioner Hileman directed the board to review the current financial reports, noting if Governor Rauner's cuts are adopted, the board could see tax revenues cut by as much as half.

- to recommend a Plan Commission Special Use Permit review.



ORDINANCE 2015-01

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics, and other workers employed in any public works by the State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by anyone under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended, being 820 ILCS 130/0 01 et seq; and,

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Act requires that the Prairie Creek Public Library District of the counties of Livingston, Grundy, and LaSalle, State of Illinois, investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of said Prairie Creek Public Library District employed in performing construction of public works, for said Board of Trustees.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF PRAIRIE CREEK PUBLIC LIBRARY DISTRICT, DWIGHT, IL.

SECTION 1: To the extent and as required by "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by anyone under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the Board of Trustees is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in Livingston County as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June of the current year, a copy of that determination being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. As required by said Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the Prairie Creek Public Library District. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance which are also used in aforesaid Act shall be the same as in said Act.

SECTION 2: Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of the Board of Trustees to the extent required by the aforesaid Act.

SECTION 3: The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of the Prairie Creek Public Library District this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications.

SECTION 4: The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

SECTION 5: The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois.

SECTION 6: The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a copy of this Ordinance such publication shall constitute notice that the determination is effective and that this is the determination of this public body.





• **Food Science and Technology State Proficiency Winner:** Kendall Wills. She

and are pale in color.

Braden Ifft. He is the son of Tim and Julie Ifft of Piper City. Diana Loschen is his FFA advisor. Ifft started his SAE when his family began doing a farmer's market in Chicago. 

Village of Mazon to place cameras in parks

On June 12, Grundy County State's Attorney Jason Helland announced that his office has partnered with the Village of Mazon to place several surveillance cameras in local parks.

Helland agreed to pay \$11,500 for the initial cost of the purchase and installation of cameras in the parks. "My office has previously purchased cameras for parks in Coal City and the program has worked well in assisting law enforcement to prevent crimes and reduce vandalism," Helland said. The cameras will enable the Village of Mazon to monitor the parks 24/7. "This purchase is a great backup tool for law enforcement".

The State's Attorney's Office drug asset forfeiture

account paid for the purchase. During FY2013 the Grundy County State's Attorney's Office forfeited more than \$100,000 in assets seized and was 3rd out of 102 counties in the State of Illinois in drug asset forfeiture, behind only Cook and Will Counties. The State's Attorney's Office receives 12.5% of all property forfeited for use in the enforcement of drug laws.

Helland has purchased thermal imaging equipment for law enforcement, crime prevention billboards, three K-9 dogs, and has brought the Alliance Against Intoxicated Motorists to local schools to warn students of the dangers of destructive decision-making.
