## Summer Reminder: Mowing into Streets NOT Allowed Dwight July 13 Board Actions

With an unusually wet summer upon us, Village of Dwight Officials are asking citizens to do their part to ensure storm sewers are kept clear to help alleviate flooding issues.

Dwight residents are reminded that mowing or blowing grass into village streets is not allowed and violators could receive a substantial fine. Blowing grass into the street carries a first violation fine of \$100 and a second violation fine of \$250.

Residents who witness a blatant violation with regard to blowing grass clippings into the streets are asked to report the incident. Also, if any resident does accidentally blow grass into the street, they are asked to then promptly blow the grass from the street and gutters to help keep the storm drains clear. By residents taking these extra precautions when mowing, everyone can benefit.

"If we can get a little help

from our citizens, I would appreciate it," said Steve Kinkade, Dwight's Public Works Director.

In other matters at the July 13 meeting of the Dwight Village Board of Trustees, a public comment / question was raised regarding spraying of mosquitos in the village. It was noted that the only employee certified to administer the insecticide spray is currently on leave.

Officials stated that ultimately the situations end in the hands of the court system and without the support of the courts their hands are tied.

"It is a work in progress," stated Police Chief Tim Henson. "And it never goes as fast as you would like."

A d m i n i s t r a t i o n Committee June 30 minutes were presented to the board.

The Administration Committee discussed the possibility of placing another sales tax increase referendum before voters with the hopes of earmarking up to one percent of additional revenue for infrastructure improvements specifically aimed at street and sidewalk upgrades.

Last year, a referendum asking for a ½ cent sales tax increase on certain sales failed when voters from the Village of Dwight cast their ballots in the March 2014 Primary Election. It was anticipated then that \$300,000 could have been



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## CDC Examines Rise in Heroin Use in States Including IL

Heroin use and abuse in the United States is rising among most age groups and income levels, according to a recent report from the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Usage has risen fastest, more than doubling, for young adults. In Illinois last year, more than 600 people died from a heroin overdose.

The reasons behind the rise are complicated, said CDC director Dr. Tom Frieden. But one thing is clear – there's a connection to opioid prescription painkiller addiction.

more likely to use heroin.

There also has been a national uptick in heroin overdose deaths, more than 8,000 in 2013. Frieden said quality and potency varies on the street, and overdose-reverse medications aren't always readily available in emergency rooms, although he said that needs to change. He underscored the need to keep opioid painkillers as medical treatment options despite the heroin connection, with pros and cons weighed carefully.

"If someone has excruciating pain from a surgical procedure, or a car crash, or a severe, terminal pain from

cancer, you absolutely want to provide all palliation," he said. "For chronic non-cancer pain, you really have to look at the risk and the benefits."

Recommendations for stemming the tide of heroin abuse include increased access to treatment, including medication-assisted treatments; recognition of the link between past prescription painkiller dependence and future heroin use; and pain treatment plans for chronic sufferers that include options beyond medications. The report, "Today's Heroin Epidemic," is online at cdc.gov.

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

## Wesley Pulver Attends National Science and Technology Conference

Dwight teen Wesley Pulver recently had the privilege of hearing words of wisdom from science and technology icons, including astronaut Dr. Buzz Aldrin and one of the co-founders of Foursquare, during the Congress of Future Science and Technology Leaders.

Students from around the United States were chosen to attend the annual congress, which is meant to encourage youths gifted in STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) to pursue careers in those fields.

Twenty of the country's most accomplished space pioneers, engineers, researchers, Nobel Laureates, entrepreneurs, and others spoke to the students throughout the gathering at Tsongas Arena of UMASS Lowell in Lowell, Massachusetts from June 28-30.

Speakers included Aldrin, the astronaut who stepped onto the moon's surface

soon after Neil Armstrong on July 20, 1969. Aldrin is the science director of the National Academy of Future Scientists and Technologists, the group that organizes the congress event.

Other speakers included Dennis Crowley, CEO of Foursquare, an app and website designed to help users find businesses and attractions based on location and preferences. Crowley and Naveen Selvadurai developed Foursquare in 2008 and launched it the following year. As of now, Pulver's intended field of post-secondary study is computer science, which made this encounter especially interesting to him.

Another speaker who proved to be greatly inspirational to Pulver was motivational speaker Bo Eason, formerly of the NFL Houston Oilers, who offered his story of being the "runt of the litter" and overcoming obstacles in his professional career. He asserted that these lessons are applicable to overcoming failures in scientific research, business ventures, and many of life's difficulties.

Permanent insurance may be suitable if you want to ensure a guaranteed death benefit for life, rather than just for a certain time period. Permanent insurance may also be the right choice if you have a high net worth and are seeking tax-advantaged ways of transferring wealth.

Still, you may have heard that you might be better off by "buying term and investing the difference" — that is, pay the less costly premiums for term insurance and use the savings to invest in the financial markets. However, this strategy assumes you will invest the savings rather than spend them, and it also assumes you will receive an investment return greater than the growth potential you receive from permanent insurance. Both assumptions are just that: assumptions, not guarantees. 



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

and offered participants a week of exploration in the study of environmentalism. The program inspires teachers to bring science to life, and to engage their students in the examination of environmental issues.



The lessons establish that there is often no "right" answer, but aspires to teach students to find the best solution.

Kathy Stewart loved the opportunity she had at Keystone Science School's Key Issues. "Absolutely, I would go again. It was an amazing learning experi-

ence." She is not positive how she will use what she learned at Key Issues in her science lessons, but will possibly test the water from a surrounding area with her students. She believes the program will help her students develop problem solving skills and will challenge them to collect data and find solutions.

The youth will eventually grow into our future leaders, and should be taught how to solve problems with a healthy respect for the environment. The Keystone Science School's Key Issues programs prepare teachers and students to "become familiar with scientific and critical thinking skills and encourage them to be engaged citizens."


Nolen added, "No handicap is required, just get a partner and sign up by calling Nettle Creek Country Club at 815-941-4300."

State law requires new students to take a copy of their birth certificate when registering.

On **Monday, August 10**, registration will be from 4:00-7:00 p.m. in the cafeteria for freshmen-seniors.

Registration will be in the cafeteria **Tuesday, August 11**, at the following times:

seniors, 9:00-10:00 a.m.; juniors, 10:00-11:00 a.m.; closed, 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.; sophomores, 1:00-2:00 p.m.; freshmen, 2:00-3:00 p.m.

Freshmen Orientation is in the auditorium from 3:00-4:00 p.m.

Late registration will be by appointment only **Monday, August 17**. Call the main office to schedule

an appointment. This is the last day to register.

**All students must be registered at these times.** If there are any questions, call the office at 815-584-6200.

**Monday, August 24**, will be the first day of school for students. Classes will begin at 8:10 a.m. and dismiss at 3:10 p.m.

**School Fees**

Two school-approved combination locks are to be purchased by incoming freshmen. One is to be placed on the student's hall locker and the other for the physical education locker. A \$12.00 fee applies for the two locks.

Other student fees include: Behind the Wheel Driver's Education Fee – \$50.00; Textbook Rental – \$45.00; Activity Fee (required by all students) – \$15.00; participation fee – athletics, cheerleading, band, and flag corps – \$30.00 per sport, \$60 per student, \$90 max per family; P.E. Uniforms – \$16.00.

**Fees are due at registration.**

Students may also be required to pay other fees for consumable workbooks or project fees for supplies and materials depending upon courses for which they are enrolled.

Students will be required to supply the following information on registration day: name of Health Insurance; parent's place of employment and phone numbers; family physician and phone number; adult to contact in case of emergency (if parents cannot be reached); e-mail.

State law requires students entering ninth grade and students new to the district (at any grade level) to present evidence of physical examinations and immunization records, within the past year. Students entering ninth grade will be required to show proof of meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MCV) upon school entry. This is a new law to prevent your student from a severe form of bacterial meningitis. Some students have already received a meningitis vaccine. If the vaccine was received after age 16, only one vaccine is required. If vaccine was received prior to age 16, two vaccines are required.

Varicella vaccine, or a health care provider's indication of a past case of chicken pox.

As in the past, all students in grades six through 12 shall have proof of Tdap vaccine.

**Students failing to present evidence of physical examinations and immunizations will not be allowed to enter school until this requirement has been met.** Physical exam forms are available in the high school office.

Incoming seniors: all students entering 12th grade (seniors) for the 2015-16 school year will be required to show proof of meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MCV) upon school entry. This is a new law to prevent your student from a severe form of bacterial meningitis. Some students have already received a meningitis vaccine. If the vaccine was received after age 16, only one vaccine is required. If vaccine was received prior to age 16, two vaccines are required.

### ROE Compliance Audit

Mr. Chris Mehochko, Regional Superintendent, from the Regional Office of Education, was at GSW High School on Thursday, June 18 to conduct an audit. This was a regular audit (every 5 years) to review our compliance with School Code. Our bookkeeper, Keeley Christensen, and others worked for several weeks to compile documents to support the 82

areas / items being audited / reviewed. GSW received the status of “Fully Recognized.” GSW met requirements for being compliant.

September 30th is the due date to the State. The board will review / approve the final budget at the September meeting.

### Other Items

Mrs. Katy Wepprecht informed the board members that the new Band Uniforms will be on back order and probably won’t arrive until November. GSW marches in two parades: Dwight Harvest Days Parade and the Morris Corn Festival Parade, both which are in September. The Band will have to find an alternative to the uniforms.

### Old Business:

Building/Grounds Projects: Mr. Perrott reported on the following projects currently taking place in the building.

Flooded band room update: Ideal Environmental ran Air Quality Tests in the basement/band room and outside. They recommended airing out the room, letting all items dry out and then doing an overall cleaning. Mr. Perrott has a company coming in on Thursday, July 16, to do a complete cleaning of the band room. They will scrub floor to ceiling and spray down area with anti-fungal products.

They have sent the band instruments that were in the water out to be reconditioned. The instruments not able to be repaired are being replaced. They have ordered new drums. Pictures have been sent to the claim adjustor. They are in the process of working to complete the claim with the insurance company.

Generator – looking into purchasing a generator that will be large enough to run the basement sump pumps, boiler and freezers.

Windows are coming out and new windows are going in.

The gym hallway paint is complete and the floors are coming out / going in.

The south gym wall has been painted and the team awards will be rehung. The masons are working on the tuck pointing and sealing the windows that were filled on the south wall.

New Score boards for the gym. Mr. Gibson has been looking into the costs and components of purchasing two new score boards. The existing ones are close to 30-years old. The new ones would be LED, wireless, digital.

The electrician has most of the conduit in place and is in the process of pulling wire.

Parking Lot Expansion – Fatlan’s Trucking Company will be taking care of the project. The expansion will be just stone for now.

Summer Workers – cleaning up entire building after the new windows are installed – might need to work longer hours and/or over-time in order to get all areas finished before school year starts. Additional staff/ workers from South Wilmington Grade School summer cleaning crew may be added to help out at GSW.

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

Visitation will be held at the Dwight United Methodist Church at 10 a.m., Saturday, July 25.


A memorial service will be at 11 a.m., with a luncheon to follow.

## Unique Attraction Constructed in Casey

Casey's newest attraction, a big pencil, was recently placed outside 8 West Main Street in Casey, Illinois. Beyond the fact that this attraction is 32'6" in length, the pencil is unique because it is constructed mainly of recycled products.

Jim Bolin, Vice President of Bolin Enterprises, Inc., built the pencil in addition to the existing big attractions found in Casey. The idea behind the pencil stemmed when Jim purchased a coat rack for his wife's room at school. He noticed similarities between the rack and a pencil.

Not long after that, he was sorting through a pile of salvage items from Marathon Pipeline and happened to see a foam rubber inline product separation tool (commonly known as a "pig" because of the squealing noise it makes as it travels through the

pipeline) that looked like an eraser for a giant pencil. Jim rescued the "pig" from the junk pile and put it aside until a later date. A few years later, a Bolin Enterprises crew recovered a broken graphite anode from a job with Buckeye Pipeline. The rod appeared to be perfect for use as the "lead" for the pencil project.

Once those two pieces were acquired, Jim made definite plans to build the pencil. With the assistance from Corey Foster and Dustin Regul, Bolin Enterprises, Inc. team members, the giant pencil became a reality this year.

The body of the pencil is made from Western Red Cedar poles that were cut into boards and laminated together for strength. The eraser measurements were used to determine the scale of the pencil. The graphite rod

was ground to the appropriate size and inserted 18 inches deep. With the exception of the paint and the aluminum band that connects the eraser, the project was created from all salvaged materials.

Although it will not set a world record, the big pencil makes a unique photo opportunity and is a great addition to the Big Things collection. The pencil is 12 inches wide and weighs over 500 pounds. Visitors are encouraged to post on all social media platforms using the hashtag #BigThingsSmallTown. With overwhelming opposition, Dwight residents turned down the referendum. Village Officials believe that lack of communication and understanding about the sales tax referendum led to the opposition. Village officials will continue to look at the possibility of another referendum attempt for a sales tax increase and how to get detailed comprehensive

information out to area voters.

The Board approved a Sound Amplification Permit for Taste of Dwight at Renfrew Park on August 9. The permit allows for a sound amplification device to operate from Noon to 8:30 p.m.
