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Gardner Archives Chronicle Town's Unique History

Everything you wanted to know but were afraid to ask about the history of Gardner plus unique historic artifacts are displayed for all to see at the Gardner Archives, lining the walls of the Gardner Village Hall council chambers.

Thanks to the painstaking dedication of Curator Ida Schopp, Recorder Pat Malinowski and Historian Linda Tyler, such precious memories as letters from soldiers written to Burt Parkinson's *Gardner Chronicle* during World War II, the dress worn by Gardner 1954 Centennial board member Vivian Fisher, and the propeller and wing from a 1939 airplane crash that killed two Gardner boys may be viewed.

"It's so fun," exclaimed Schopp. "All these pictures."

The project, which now features nine fully-packed display cases, began five years ago when Schopp asked then-Mayor Tom Wise if she could have more cabinets to display historical artifacts and archival documents for the public at the Village Hall.

After going through village channels, she was first granted two cabinets and the project was off and running.

"We finished filling the last two cabinets in the last year," Schopp said. As more material is gathered, more cabinets will be procured, she said.

The donors are promised that they may at any time have their items back if they wish and are now up to 426 items archived by the curator.

"The people are very generous," Schopp said.

The cabinets have a general theme, including one devoted to military which also includes a tribute to former Grundy County Sheriff Terry Marketti.

A special feature of the cabinet is a booklet with hundreds of World War II letters written to the *Gardner Chronicle* by soldiers from the Gardner area. They are handwritten, so the letters have been retyped for all to read clearly.

"One lady came in with her daughter and she found a letter from her husband from World War II," Schopp explained. "It was fantastic."

The archives include

many "scrapbooks" containing photos and historical documents, including one from the South East Grundy County Senior Citizens Center.

There are cabinets devoted to the Gardner Centennial and Sesquicentennial, plus school history, church history, and business history.

There is also a comparison of two aerial photos of the village, one from 1882 and one from 1981.

Doc Krueger's glasses are on display (a long time drug-gist in Gardner).

There are Gardner Days buttons displayed including one commissioned by Burt

Parkinson in 1994 featuring a cartoon rendering of Gardner's historic jail by this reporter.

Wind Power to Inflate Budget for Tri-Point School District

Millions of dollars will be sailing on the wind to Tri-Point School district coffers starting in 2017.

Tri-Point Superintendent Jeff Bryan told *The Paper* that the Kelly Creek Wind Farm project will result in revenue from between 90 and 94 wind turbines located within the school district boundary, estimated at a net additional annual revenue boost of \$1.2 million from equalized assessed valuation.

"The first year is estimated to generate \$1.5 million," Bryan explained, adding that the second year would be roughly \$200,000 less due to less state aid offset by increased EAV from the wind turbine farm.

However, with farmland EAV increasing each year, the net increase will be roughly \$1.2 million a year, even with annual depreciation on the wind turbines, Bryan said.

To put this into perspective, the entire school district budget is \$5 million, so this is a roughly 25% increase to school coffers each year.

The wind farm project began several years ago, but

was plagued when the economy took a downturn plus subsequent permitting issues that have since been resolved, Bryan said.

The company, EDF Renewable, will start phase II of the project, known as the Kelly Creek Wind Farm, after the 2015 harvest, starting with road surveying and road construction. The turbines are expected to be up and generating electricity by next March, Bryan said. Each turbine will generate 2 megawatts of electricity.

The Tri-Point tax levy to be approved this December will not include the EAV for the more than 90 turbines, payable in 2016. But the following year, the turbines will generate not only electricity, but millions of dollars in revenue for the small school district that serves roughly 430 students from the communities of Cabery, Cullom, Kempton, and Piper City, including 120 at the high school in Cullom.

"How else are we going to generate assessed valuation in this school district?" Bryan asked of the rural school district consisting of primarily residences and farmland.

Victory Lanes Notches a Decade of Serving Dwight, Surrounding Area

Victory Lanes and Slammer's Bar & Grill has marked a decade of serving customers from Dwight and the surrounding territory.

Owned and operated by Scot Banks, the bowling alley boasts its bar and grill serving fresh dishes daily.

As bowling leagues have dwindled over the decade, Banks instituted a Wednesday social bowling, whereby people can bowl just for the day, no commitment to a league and no dues.

"They can come in to just socialize and exercise," Banks said.

The grill is open for lunch from 11 AM to 2:30 PM

offering sandwiches and coffee shop food, a step up from a fast food restaurant, says kitchen manager Bernie Koronkowski.

For lunches and dinners, "we offer fresh food, hand-cut meats, never frozen."

Koronkowski added steaks are high graded by the United States Department of Agriculture.

He cuts vegetables fresh daily, hand batters food, and the bar and grill offers seafood and pasta specials on the weekends.

But food is just one part of the experience.

"We are a family entertainment center," Koronkowski added. "We offer great family fun, great food

and drinks, five big screen TVs."

And of course, there's bowling. The 12 lanes are made of wood, not synthetic, and Banks explained Victory Lanes is one of the few bowling alleys in Illinois still using wooden lanes.

"There's nothing out there like it close by," Banks added.

In addition to open bowling Wednesday afternoons, Victory Lanes hosts men's bowling leagues Wednesday and Thursday nights.

The bowling alley has "laser bowling" with black light effects that make clothing glow and a light ball sprinkling splashes of movement. (continued on page 3)

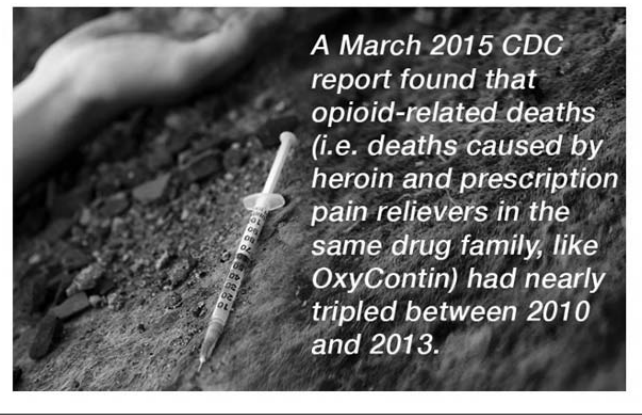

Drug Overdoses Nearly Double from Last Year

Dwight Emergency Medical Services responded to five drug overdose calls during 2014.
So far in 2015 drug overdose calls in Dwight's area of response have increased to nine, according to EMS Director Alan Metzke.
Those drug overdoses may have been caused by a variety of opiates such as heroin, prescription pain-killing drugs, and others, but they all demanded the immediate administration of Naloxone (Narcan) in order to save the patient. Naloxone almost immediately gets an overdose patient breathing normally.
Will the number of the area's drug overdoses keep growing? Metzke told *The Paper* that he could easily see the number of cases reach 12 or 15 by year's end.
"The real problem is the demand," said Metzke. "The market is out there. People just don't realize what it's like to be addicted."
Dwight or Sheriff's police usually accompany Dwight EMS personnel on drug emergency calls. "Oftimes a victim is angry when he wakes up from a high," said Metzke.
Heroin overdose deaths in America have nearly quintupled from 2001 to 2013, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
Termed an epidemic by many in the medical field, the over-prescription of painkilling drugs is often blamed for the start of a user's addiction.
According to Illinois law, the overdose victim and those who call for help are immune from criminal charges.



It's a Scam!

Phishing is a scam in which you receive a fraudulent e-mail designed to steal your identity or vital personal information, such as credit card numbers, bank account numbers, debit card PINs, and passwords. A phishing e-mail often asks you to verify this type of information.
The e-mail may state that your account has been compromised or that one of your accounts was charged incorrectly, but you must click on a link in the e-mail or reply with your bank account number to confirm your identity or protect your account.
Legitimate companies never ask for your password or account number via e-mail. The e-mail may even threaten to disable your account, if you don't reply, but don't believe it. If you receive such an e-mail, there are several actions you should take:
• Don't click on any links in the e-mail. They can contain a virus that can harm your computer. Even if links in the e-mail say the name of the company, don't trust them. They may redirect to a fraudulent website.
• Don't reply to the e-mail itself. Instead forward the e-mail to the Federal Trade Commission at spam@uce.gov.
• If you believe that the e-mail is valid, contact the company using the phone numbers listed on your statements or in the phone book. Tell the customer service representative about the e-mail and ask if your account has been compromised. You can also contact that company online by typing the company's web address directly into the address bar; never use the links provided in the e-mail.
• If you clicked on any links in the phishing e-mail or replied with the requested personal information, contact your bank directly to let them know and ask to have fraud alerts placed on your accounts, have new credit cards issued, or set new passwords.
Similar to phishing, vishing scammers also seek to get you to provide your personal information. However, instead of using e-mail to request the information, vishing scammers use the phone to make their requests. You may be directed to call a phone number to verify an account or to reactivate a debit or credit card. If you have received one of these calls, report it to the Internet Crime Complaint Center.

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One Employee Injured After Fire Broke Out at PharmaCann

An employee was treated on the scene and released after a fire broke out at the new PharmaCann greenhouse building being constructed adjacent to the New Lenox business on Route 17, East of Dwight.

"It was a gas-fed fire and one individual was in the building," Johnson said.
In addition to the Dwight fire fleet, responding were Dwight EMS, Gardner Fire, Emington-Campus Fire, and Pontiac was on the way but did not arrive before the fire was extinguished, five minutes after Dwight Fire arrived, Johnson said.
The scene was cleared by 4:55 p.m.

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Tri-Point School Board Oks Balanced Budget

The Tri-Point School board approved a balanced \$5 million budget, the first time the budget is not in deficit overall in several years.

Superintendent Jeff Bryan told *The Paper* he is not sure how many years it has been since the school budget was balanced, having just started with the district in 2013.

The board approved the 2015-2016 budget at its Monday, Sept. 21 meeting.

While the overall budget is balanced, the Education fund is running an estimated \$170,000 to \$180,000 deficit for the year. Income is projected to be roughly \$3.1 million with expenses estimated at \$3.3 million in that fund.

The Operations and Maintenance Fund will also end in deficit, although not as much, with income of \$490,000 and expenses projected to be \$525,000.

The Transportation fund, however, will have an income of \$625,000 with expenses projected at \$400,000, effectively wiping out this year's deficit in the Education and O& M funds.

The district has "found" dollars over the past two years to drastically reduce expenses.

For example, Tri-Point switched from a private contracted bus service to an in-

house fleet. After changing from seven routes to five to reduce daily miles from 600 a day to 400 a day, the district is generating a net surplus \$200,000 in the Transportation fund.

Bryan added that the more efficient routes are not requiring pupils to experience any longer rides, with the longest route at 38 miles.

Other factors generating income or saving on expenses include:

- An increase of \$250,000 a year in the tort fund for risk management. Any time a teacher tells a student to stop running or the maintenance staff does work for the safety of students and employees, the tort funds are used to pay a portion of those salaries, Bryan said.
- A reduction in force of employees who retire or leave and are not replaced.
- Less special education students living in the district, saving roughly \$100,000 a year.

In other action, the board:

- Approved technology upgrades at a cost not to exceed \$12,000.
- Accepted the Terminix proposal for Pest Control for \$2,580 per year.
- Voted to use the Country Mansion in Dwight as the venue for the 2016 prom.
- Will purchase boys basketball uniforms for the Junior High for \$9,550.

Dwight Man Found Guilty of Sexual Assault, Abuse of a Child

On September 14, a jury trial was held in Livingston County on charges of Predatory Criminal Sexual Assault of a Child and Aggravated Criminal Sexual Abuse. The defendant, Karl Kinkade, 56 of Dwight, was alleged to have committed a sex act against a minor under the age of 13.

The trial, which spanned two days, saw the State present evidence from several witnesses, including the victim and a child forensic interviewer from the Children's Advocacy Center. Once the State rested its case, the defense called several witnesses including the defendant himself.

Following closing arguments, the jury deliberated for just less than two hours before finding the defendant guilty on both charges. After the verdict, the defendant's bail was revoked and he was taken into custody.

The charge of Predatory Criminal Sexual Assault of a Child is a Class X felony with a special sentencing range of six to 60 years in prison, with no possibility of probation, and the defendant would be required to register as a sex offender upon his release. Under Illinois' "Truth in Sentencing" law, the defendant would be required to serve 85% of his prison sentence. The case is scheduled for status on October 13, as the defendant has another similar charge pending trial.

"This type of case is one of the most difficult that we deal with in this job," said State's Attorney Seth Uphoff. "The victim showed great courage in coming forward and testifying against her perpetrator; and I'm glad we could help her and her family find justice."

Two Centenarian Siblings On Track For World Record

Two centenarian siblings are on track for a world record. Like a good wine, they have a few more years before their combined ages are ripe for a record.

Dwight resident Stella Spandet, 100, and her sister Irene Baumgartener, 103, of Kenosha Wis., are both models of health. They've managed to escape cancer, heart trouble and other age-related diseases.

How centenarians achieve such a milestone is still a mystery, but genetics play a role in their ability to live 20-25 years beyond average life expectancy, according to a 2002 study by Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center in Boston.

At 102, Baumgartener participated in the Tri-

County Senior Olympics in Racine, Wis. last summer and took third place in the soccer kick competition.

Spandet still lives independently and drove until June 3 when the Department of Motor Vehicles refused to renew her driver's license.

A 2002 study by the University of California, Berkeley, found having siblings survive to extreme old age is more likely a familial predisposition for longevity rather than a strong environmental or behavioral component.

The sisters combined ages are on track for a Guinness World Record. The last confirmed "highest combined age of two living siblings" was 213.

Irene's advice

When asked what her secret to longevity is,

Baumgartener said, "Good living and wine."

Her daughter Joanne Anen said her mom is a devout Christian who has attended St. Mary's Lutheran Church for decades. But she's also religious about her daily wine. "Every night at 5 o'clock," Anen said.

Baumgartener, who suffered a small stroke at 99, said having a good attitude in life and being frugal are important, noting that living through the Depression taught her the importance of pinching pennies.

Kenosha bound

She was born in 1912 in Dwight, Ill., but moved to Chicago, where she worked in a five-and-dime store.

That's where she met her husband, Richard. They had two children, moving to Kenosha in 1952.

While Irene never finished high school, the couple put their children through college, with her son Ken becoming an attorney.

He said her ethic of helping the little guy and stopping bullies is what helped his aspirations as a defense attorney.

"The best advice my mother ever gave me was, 'Just do your best.'" Ken said.

Lessons learned

Granddaughter Carla Norris said Irene taught her life skills she uses to this day.

"She could cook a huge meal, and the kitchen would be spotless. So she taught me how to clean up as I go so it wouldn't be a huge mess at the end," Norris said.

Granddaughter Rhonda Levy enjoyed Irene's positive attitude and effervescent energy.

"She never slowed down and was always ready to get up and go, of course, with her great big contagious smile," Levy said.

Irene remains active at Brookside Care Center.

"She loves being social. She was a former champion bridge player," Anen said.

A good attitude

The sisters' positive attitudes might be one secret to longevity.

"Stella is a very determined, strong-willed person that doesn't let much of anything get her down," her son Terry Spandet said.

Spandet said his mother's diet flies in the face of common wisdom.

"She won't even taste anything first; she'll go directly to the salt shaker. So much for that myth," he said, noting that Stella's favorite meal the last 45 years is a hamburger and onion rings from Dairy Queen.

"She was a farm wife, so she had normal meals — beef, pork, potatoes and gravy with an occasional vegetable and lots of cookies," Spandet added.

Stella's advice

When asked about her secret for a long and happy life, Stella thought about it overnight and came to this conclusion;

"I've always tried to live my life one day at a time and never give up," she said. "You thank the good Lord every day for your health and happiness and don't let money, power and greed in this world get in the way of what's important. What is important is family and friends."

The Dwight United Methodist Church choir is seeking new members, particularly people who have alto and tenor voices.

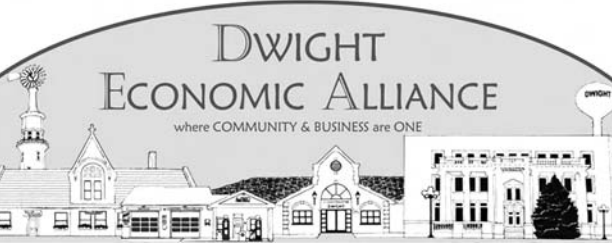
Director Bruce Richardson said the choir is open to adults who are not members of the church, and all voice parts are welcome.

Despite the second half onslaught from the Comets, stat-wise it was pretty even between the two teams – Dwight at 315 yards of total offense, Central at 341.

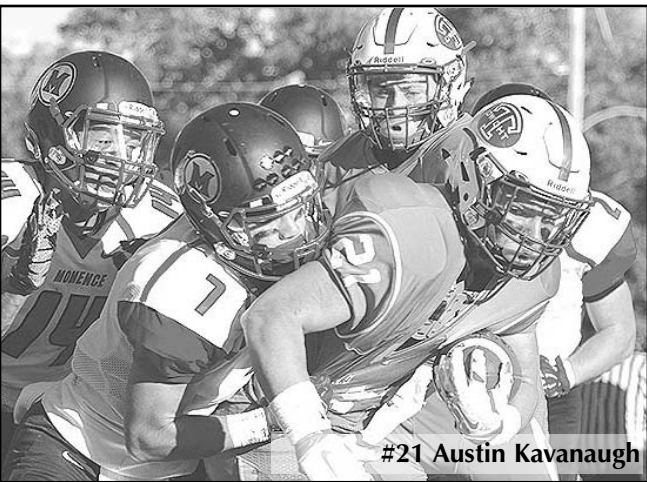
Fox was 13-26 passing in the game, good enough for 157 yards. He tossed two TD's and a pick.

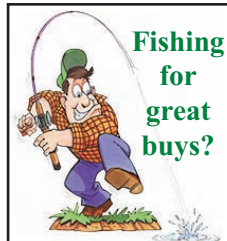

Hi, my name is David Voigts. I'm a former naval officer and graduate of the United States Naval Academy. I would like to ask the public for some assistance and information. In the early 2000's I became an avid commenter on the internet. I commented on news articles, movies, TV shows, commercial

products, sports etc. I noticed that a few of my posts for some TV shows were addressed. I had posted some comments on a now popular streaming website that was relatively new at the time. I thought it was great to get a response, but the manner of the response was problematic. I had taken an oath to support and defend the Constitution. I knew from my coursework and some military non-fiction novels, that there would be Constitutional issues with stifling and silencing speech on the internet. With the Snowden revelations, we all know about surveillance capability and practices. At the time however, this was not talked about. I was concerned that there might be Fourth and First Amendment issues. Also, I happened to read about some of the past reprisal methods and I was worried that those methods might be used on some unknowing citizen. These techniques might be lawful in a military context, but should never be used domestically. I felt I had a duty to voice disagreement with the practice, and I tried to use internet comments to create a public discussion. As a result, I experienced a heavy-handed reprisal. I would like to ask the public for information and assistance. If you have any information about this discrediting campaign, I would appreciate if you would share what you've seen or heard. Also, there are some discrediting videos that were made without my permission or consent. If you have any video of me I would appreciate a copy, any present url links, or information where they were posted in the past. Just to be clear, I did not consent to any videos. Tree Identification

Would you like to know what kind of tree you have in your backyard? Whether it is an oak, maple or something rarer learn to identify trees with this Tree Identification workshop presented by University of Illinois Extension.

Please join us on October 1, 2015, 1:30 to 3 p.m. at the McLean County Extension Office at 1615 Commerce Parkway, Bloomington, Illinois. Registration is required along with a \$5 class fee per person. Register online at <http://web.extension.edu/lmw/register> or call the Extension office at (309) 663-8306. If you need a reasonable accommodation to participate in this program, please contact our office.

“Learning the language of trees can help you greater understand their attributes and how to better care for them,” states University of Illinois Extension Horticulture Educator, Kelly Allsup. Avid gardeners and novice homeowners can benefit from this class by learning the process horticulturists use to identify trees. We will examine

the trees and all of its intricate details from the height of the tree to the shape of the leaf to the pattern of the bud. Using a dichotomous key is one of the easiest methods to identify a tree. Dichotomous means ‘dividing into two parts’ so the key gives only two possibilities to choose from at a time, narrowing your options until you arrive at the identity of the tree.

Join University of Illinois Extension Specialist, Travis Cleveland, as he shares his expertise and knowledge of trees and the identification process. Travis is a prominent contributor to the University of Illinois Plant Clinic in identifying tree diseases and has assisted University of Illinois with their tree identification classes.

Class activities will include using a dichotomous key to identify various trees. Each participant will receive a free poster, dichotomous handout and have a chance to win door prizes assisting with tree education. Please bring samples from home of trees or shrubs you wish to identify.

“Planting shrubs starting now through mid-October offers many benefits that may outweigh spring planting,” states University of Illinois Horticulture Educator, Kelly Allsup. The temperatures are cool and easier on the plants, so there is less chance for the shrub to be stressed by extreme heat. The warm temperatures of the soil and cool temperatures of the air create ideal conditions for root growth, making the planting much stronger. Keeping the shrub consistently watered can be an easier task with lower transpiration and fall rains.

Buying from a nursery or greenhouse now allows you to pick out the best fall colors. Plant the following shrubs for the best fall displays:

Chokeberry is named for the astringent taste of the

berries, which must be turned into jams and jellies to become edible for humans. This shrub that does best in full sun and will produce white clustered flowers in May that turn into black berries in late summer and early fall. This native shrub has an average height and spread of four feet and has fiery orange-red fall color.

Korean Spice Viburnum is a stand-out in the garden throughout the entire growing season. Fragrant flowers emerge pink from red buds and then turn white, resembling a small snowball. Blue-black berries appear in late summer, followed by a stunning fall display of reds and purples.

Blackhaw Viburnum is a larger native shrub that is tolerant to drought. In June, the white flowers are spread out and can resemble the delicacy

of Queen Anne’s Lace. The dark blue berries stand out in front of dark, glossy foliage of vibrant reds and purples.

Fothergilla is a small compact shrub that grows around two feet high with a two-foot spread and can be grown in full sun or part shade. Fothergilla

is an ideal shrub to add to a shade garden in need of fall color. In April or early May, small doll-sized, bottle brush-looking, aromatic flowers are followed by brilliant shades of yellow, red and orange in the fall.

Callicarpa doesn’t have outstanding leaf color during the fall,

but the berry display gives color like few plants can. Starting in late autumn, effervescent purple berries line the stems of a four-foot shrub. Clusters of white flowers form on the stems in June.

The berries persist after leaves fall off and attract birds.

Vehicle Registration Renewal Reminders No Longer Mailed

The Illinois Secretary of State’s office issued a press release Sept. 28 indicating that the office has suspended mailing reminder notices for vehicle registration “due to the lack of a state budget.”

This will save the department roughly \$450,000 monthly in mailing costs, allowing the state office to mail purchased stickers, titles and license plates to vehicle owners for a few months longer before the postage account is depleted of funds.

“This lack of a Fiscal Year 2016 budget is adversely impacting the Secretary of State’s office, and threatens to jeopardize the services were provide to the public,” said Jesse White, secretary of state. White added if the

postage account runs dry before January, he will be unable to mail annual licenses to auto dealers, which they need to operate legally, as well as critical incorporation paperwork needed for businesses in Illinois.

The Colors of Fall

Most of us are dazzled by trees that turn a brilliant red in the fall, but this dramatic effect would be lost if ALL the trees turned red. The variation in color is what makes the fall display so eye-catching. It's the oranges, the burgundies, the golds, the browns and even the greens that provide the backdrop for these red beauties.

The colors of autumn are determined both by the plant's genetic factors and by the environment. Xanthophyll and carotene, the yellow pigments, are present in leaves all year

long but are masked by chlorophyll, the green pigment. The cooler temps and shorter days (less sunshine) of fall slow down the production of chlorophyll, while the remaining green pigment breaks down and disappears, allowing the more colorful pigments to show through. Environmentally, there is no magic formula to plug in temperatures, rainfall and sunlight and predict exactly when and how the leaves will color, but the Department of Tourism website should have updates on fall foliage. The last thing we want from

our autumn is for our trees to be under a lot of stress where the leaves turn immediately to ugly brown and drop.

This is the time for drives through the country. Look to nature to decide what to plant in your home landscape. While you won't be able to achieve the mass, you can get the idea of size and color combinations working together. This is where your art comes in. Also visit your garden center at this time to see how the new hybrids color up. Or the ultimate fall field trip, Morton Arboretum, for the appropriate dazzle.
