## Gardner Council Clarifies Position on Bookwalter Woods: They Pay Costs

If Bookwalter Woods, a manufactured home community outside the Gardner village limits, wishes to connect 140 households onto the village sewer system, it will be on Bookwalter Woods' dime.

That was the message given to those attending the Sept. 28 village board meeting in Gardner.

There was concern at the meeting two weeks prior that the village funds would be expended to pay for Village Engineer Guy Christensen of Chamlin and Associates, Morris, and Village Attorney Scott Belt, and that the system was not able to handle the extra capacity.

"A motion was made, that if they do a study, if they want to talk to Guy or Scott, they pay Scott and they pay Guy," said Commissioner Dick Hileman. "You do the

study and you pay the freight."

Mayor Mike Serena echoed Hileman's sentiment.

"I contacted them and explained to them they have to do their own study, have to get easements, buy property," Serena said. "We were not going to pay for anything."

The subject was brought up by Don Phillips.

Phillips also suggested that the village may charge Bookwalter Woods residents at least four times what Gardner residents pay for those services or more.

Eric Schutz, community manager for Bookwalter Woods at 23 Sistek Road, rural Gardner, told *The Paper* he was aware of the village's stipulations.

He said the residents need the sewer services and would have to pay \$750,000 for their own sewer plant, and would likely pay the same amount to hook onto

the village system.

Gardner engineer Guy Christensen, however, told *The Paper* that he had no idea what the costs would be and the concern in Gardner is that the sewer system is at capacity during wet weather.

Village Clerk Pat Malinowski told *The Paper* Gardner currently has roughly 600 hookups for sewer and water.

"The sewer is what people are worried about," Christensen said. "During storm events, excess flow is a concern."

He said during a storm, additional hookups on the system could push the system beyond capacity.

"The village would love to fix it, but more users are just going to aggravate the situation," Christensen explained.

A check has been sent to the Village of Gardner for

## Heritage Woods to Bennett: Don't Kick Out 2,500 Residents Statewide

A cost-cutting measure to make requirements more stringent for residents to qualify for assisted living facilities in Illinois could end up costing the state more money in the long run.

The state is considering changing the Determination of Need for medicaid residents of assisted living facilities which would result in short term savings.

The trouble is, it would also result in 2,500 residents statewide no longer eligible to stay in assisted living facilities, including several living at the Heritage Woods facility in Dwight.

State Rep. Thomas M. Bennett (R-Gibson City), was in Dwight touring the Heritage Woods facility Friday, Oct. 2, hearing of the issues related to the DON certification for residents.

"If the DON score goes from (the current) 29 to 37, 40% of the residents on Medicaid will be required to

move out," of assisted living facilities, said Rick Banas, vice president of development and positioning for Gardant Management Solutions which runs the Heritage Woods facilities.

At assisted living facilities, there is an average of between 60 to 67% on Medicaid he said. Of those on Medicaid, 40% would be required to move.

That results in a death blow for assisted living facilities in Illinois, Banas said.

Banas explained to Bennett that moving those 2,500 residents to nursing homes would result in a major loss of revenue for assisted living facilities and cause them to close their doors, a layoff of 5,000 workers statewide, causing them to be on unemployment instead of contributing to state tax revenue, and in the long run result in a loss of revenue, even though it looks like a savings in the short-term.

He told Bennett a bill designed to keep the DON score at 29 and prevent residents statewide to move out of assisted living facilities currently sits on Gov. Bruce Rauner's desk for a signature or veto, Banas said.

The state, meantime, struggles to come together on an agreement for a budget, Bennett said, "We got ourselves in a very serious situation."

Bennett who was elected to office this past November, said the state has been spending more than it earns for more than a decade.

"We were \$1.5 billion in the hole," Bennett explained.

He said to eliminate the deficit, "either raise taxes or take money from other buckets."

He added that not having a budget yet this year is "aggravating the deficit situation."

He said the state will have an estimated \$32 billion in income for the year but the

## Hancock's Jewelry to Close Doors after Christmas, Ending 61 Years in Dwight

Del and Docia Hancock believe a career spanning more than six decades in the retail jewelry business in Dwight is long enough.

"When we first started in the jewelry business, it was considered a 'no-no' for a jewelry store to offer discounts," Del explained. "Now, it's a necessity."

He said back in the 1950s, jewelry stores offering discounts were considered to be in bad financial shape.

The couple opened Hancock Jewelry's doors at the former Klingler's Jewelry store where he stayed for nine years, then moved to the current location at 112 E. Main Street in 1963, purchasing the business from Harold Lewis. Harold was the son of E. B. Lewis who originally occupied the space in Downtown Dwight going back to 1902. So the location has been in continuous operations as a jewelry store for more than a century.

Del, a native of Marion, Illinois, jokes his career started in the jewelry business from raising baby pigs as a young boy.

His first lesson in entrepreneurship was to feed and care for the baby pigs. He constructed a cart to attach to his bicycle and trekked around town looking for food scraps to feed his pigs.

It just so happened that the barn where he was housing the pigs belonged to the jeweler in Marion who was able to see first-hand Del's work ethic feeding and caring for the pigs in the barn.

One day Del was asked if he would like to apprentice at the jewelry shop and eventually Del attended Bradley University to obtain his degree in horology, the study of time keeping in 1951.

From 1952 to 1954, he was in the U.S. Army during the Korean War.

At that time, he was a square dancer and met his future wife, Docia, who at the time was a secretary working at the Pentagon in Washington, D.C. She is a native of Cumberland, Kentucky.

The couple married in August of 1953, and after settling in Dwight the next year, were named the Dwight Centennial new Bride and Groom.

When the Hancocks started in business, a big part of

their trade was in glassware and china. But the freight on those items became expensive and the demand dwindled so the store no longer carries those items.

But the primary products such as rings, wedding bands, clocks, and other personal jewelry continues to be on display at the shop.

The couple had two boys, Randy who grew up to operate the Hancock Jewelry store in Morris. Randy died of heart failure in 2004 and the Morris store was sold in 2005.

Their other son, Jamey, is an internal medicine physician, pediatrician and has adult patients.

Del said another doctor said that means Jamey is a doctor for the patients "from womb to tomb."

Over the years, Del and Docia have been very active in the Dwight community, including both teaching classes at Sunday School for a quarter-century and Del holding such offices as Dwight school board, president of the Chamber, and a past Master at the Masonic Lodge.

"I'm a has been," Del said. "I has been everything," he joked.

## The Dream Continues--Will the Funding?

The plans to bring High Speed Rail to Illinois are proceeding . . . with an eye focused on funding as well as on the plans.

The original \$8-billion in taxpayer funds dedicated by President Obama and the federal government in 2009 to begin a quest "for high-speed rail across the country within 25 years" has gotten off schedule.

**Illinois accepted \$1.2-billion** of the federal funds to upgrade the St. Louis to Chicago Amtrak route for 110 mph service, and added \$258-million of Illinois taxpayer funds to the effort. More Illinois \$\$\$ have been

added since then.

So far, the 110 mph service that was expected to be in place from Joliet to Alton by the end of 2015, saving one-half-hour, is available on only 15 miles of track between Dwight and Pontiac.

Theoretically, that cuts some three minutes off the travel time between those communities . . . unless the train has to pull off on a siding south of Odell to allow other rail traffic to proceed. And it happens.

Other bottlenecks remain on the St. Louis/Chicago route, especially from Joliet to Chicago and Alton to St. Louis. Illinois Watchdog.org



(continued from page 1) north/south, adding that a study of north/south routes into and out of Chicago had already been made.

The new study points out necessary work costing billions of dollars that will be needed to alleviate the passenger and freight congestion that exists in the Chicago area. Amtrak passenger trains are often forced to stop on their way into the city.

The study also proposes the consolidation of dispatchers for the six major freight railroads, and those for Amtrak and Metra, to be consolidated in a unified control center.

**Scott Speegle** of the Illinois Department of Transportation was asked if one of the alternate north/south routes for Amtrak into and out of Chicago had been selected. Not yet.

Speegle was also asked why the known congestion at the north and south ends of the Chicago/St. Louis Amtrak route weren't resolved before any work began on improving track speeds downstate.

He answered: "We got the improvements we could get."

In other words, the 15 miles of 110-mph track between Dwight and Pontiac was a showpiece. Not that there won't be more. Tests will continue on separate stretches of track between Chicago and St. Louis with the intent to gain approval for 110-mph speeds and eventually join those higher-speed segments.

The original \$1.5-billion

in Illinois HSR money should last until June of 2017, according to Speegle.

Expenditures until then will include the building of a new depot in Dwight (now under construction), new downtown crossings, and repaving of East and West Main Streets in Dwight. Probably in 2016.

What about a second track from Chicago to St. Louis?

Speegle said that "no funding is presently available" for a second track, but additional sidings are being constructed along the route, with the intention to eventually join them and provide a second track which would alleviate traffic conflicts presented by a single track.

**Mark Davis** of Union Pacific, which owns much of the Chicago/St. Louis track, recently told *The Paper* his company wasn't too concerned about having to share a single track with Amtrak passenger trains.

"The genius in all of this," Davis said, "is the computer program we have for controlling all of the traffic on the tracks between Chicago/St. Louis."

Delays may be inevitable for both passenger and freight traffic as they shuffle on and off sidings, but the computer program, and those operating it, can handle any situation, according to Davis.

When should we expect 110-mph service from Joliet to Alton? Chicago to St. Louis? 2016? 2017? Probably later rather than sooner. Patience will be required.

tance of having working smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement.

"In a fire, seconds count," said Deputy Chief Dyer.

"Half of home fire deaths result from fires reported at night between 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m., when most people are asleep. Home smoke alarms can alert people to a fire before it spreads, giving everyone enough time to get out."

According to the latest NFPA research, working smoke alarms cut the chance of dying in a fire in half. Meanwhile, three out of five fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign includes the following smoke alarm messages:

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement.

- Interconnect all smoke alarms throughout the home. This way, when one sounds, they all do.

- Test alarms at least monthly by pushing the test button.

- Replace all smoke alarms when they are ten years old or sooner if they don't respond properly.

• Make sure everyone in the home knows the sound of the smoke alarm and understands what to do when they hear it.

- If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place.


- Call the fire department from outside the home.



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MAKING SENSE OF INVESTING

### Avoid Emotional Investment Decisions

What's the biggest obstacle to your ability to invest successfully? Is it the ups and downs of the financial markets? Political events? The fact that you weren't born rich? Actually, the chief hurdle you face is something over which you have control: your own emotions.

Your emotions can lead to a variety of ill-advised investment behaviors, such as these:

- Cutting losses – Declines in the financial markets can lead some investors to try to "cut their losses" by selling investments whose price has declined. Yet, when prices have dropped, it may actually be a good time to buy investments, not sell them, especially when the investments are still fundamentally sound.

- Chasing performance – In the investment world, the flip side of "fear" is "greed." Just as some investors are propelled by fear of loss, others are motivated by quick, big gains. They may pursue "hot" investments, only to be disappointed when the sizzle quickly fizzles. Instead of trying to "score" that one big winner, you may be better off spreading your investment dollars among a range of vehicles – stocks, bonds, government securities, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on. While diversification can't guarantee a profit or protect against loss, it may help reduce the impact of market volatility on your portfolio.

- Focusing on the short term – When the market is down, you might get somewhat upset when you view your monthly investment statements. But any individual statement is just a snapshot in time; if you were to chart your investment results over a period of 10, 15 or 20 years, you'd see the true picture of how your portfolio is doing – and, in all likelihood, that picture would look better than a statement or two you received during a down market. In any case, don't overreact to short-term downturns by making hasty "buy" or "sell" decisions. Instead, stick with a long-term strategy that's appropriate for your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon.

- Heading to the investment "sidelines" – Some people get so frustrated over market volatility that they throw up their hands and head to the investment "sidelines" until "things calm down." And it's certainly true that, when owning stocks, there are no guarantees; you do risk losing some, or all, of your investment. But if you jump in and out of the market to "escape" volatility, you may take on an even bigger risk – the risk of losing some of the growth you'll need to reach your goals. Consider this: If you had invested \$10,000 in a package of stocks mimicking the S&P 500 in December 1979, your investment would have grown to more than \$426,000 by December 2013. But if you had missed just the 10 best days of the market during that time, your \$10,000 would only have grown to less than \$206,000 – a difference of about \$220,000, according to Ned Davis Research, a leading investment research organization. The bottom line? Staying invested over the long term can pay off. (Keep in mind, though, that the S&P 500 is an unmanaged index and isn't meant to depict an actual investment. Also, as you've no doubt heard, past performance is not a guarantee of future results.)

Our emotions are useful in guiding us through many aspects of our lives, but when you invest, you're better off using your head – and not your heart.






### PREVENT FIRES

- Keep all sources of fuel (paper, clothing, bedding, and carpets or rugs) at least three feet away from all heat sources when cooking, or using alternative heating like a space heater.
- Provide constant adult supervision during cooking or in rooms with lit candles or fires.
- Do not leave burning candles unattended.
- Keep matches and lighters away and out of the reach of children.
- Teach young children to tell an adult if they see matches and lighters and not to touch them.
- Teach adolescents to resist peer pressure and not to play with fire if curious or bored.




### MAKE YOUR HOME SAFER

- Install a smoke alarm outside each sleeping area and on each additional level of your home. If people sleep with doors closed, install smoke alarms inside sleeping areas. Use the test button to check each smoke alarm once a month. Replace all batteries at least once a year.
- Install a new battery immediately if the smoke alarm chirps, warning that the battery is low.
- Teach children what the smoke alarm sounds like, and what they should do when they hear it.
- Vacuum over and around smoke alarms regularly. Do not paint over the smoke alarm.
- Never disable a smoke alarm.
- Have one or more working fire extinguishers in your home. Know how to use them.
  - Consider installing an automatic fire sprinkler system in your home.
  - Determine at least two ways to escape from every room of your home. Consider the proper use and storage of escape ladders for sleeping areas on the second or third floors.
  - Select a location outside your home where everyone would meet after escaping.
  - Practice and revise your escape plan at least twice a year. Fire Prevention Week is a great time to start!



### Safety Tips During A Home Fire

- Once you are out, stay out! Call the fire department from a neighbor's home.
- If you see smoke or fire in your first escape route, use your second way out. If you must exit through smoke, crawl low under the smoke to your exit. If you are escaping through a closed door, feel the door before opening it. If the door is warm, use your second way out.
- If smoke, heat, or flames block your exit routes, stay in the room with the door closed. Signal for help using a brightly colored cloth at the window. If there is a telephone or mobile phone in the room, call the fire department and tell them where you are.



## Mazon House Spooks Hanging Up Their Ghostly Attire after 2015 Season

This Halloween season is the final year after a 16-year run for the Mazon Dungeon of Terror-Maze of Terror Haunted House.

Proceeds from the haunted house have allowed the Mazon Fire Department, the sponsors of the spooky place, to purchase such items as a one-ton pickup truck in 2006 and a vehicle for off-road fires in 2007, according to Darryl Punke, who has been coordinating the haunted structure all 16 years.

"Those are all paid for with Haunted House money and no tax dollars," Punke said.

He said the Haunted House, located in downtown Mazon, is required by the Illinois Fire Marshal to have a sprinkler system installed. But the cost is prohibitive for the Mazon Fire Department at \$60,000 and Punke said it is not right to force the owner to shell out that kind of cash for the haunted house, either.

"I don't expect the owner to do it," Punke said. "We rent the building on an annual basis."

Over the years, many visitors to the Haunted House have exited the structure scared out of their wits.

Jan Clavey, acts as one of the "monsters" each year and has been with the project since the beginning.

"Sometimes it's hard not to laugh, people are so scared," she joked.

"I've gotten in some good scares over the years," she added.

Punke said he has seen 17-year-olds as well as 26-year-olds scramble out of the haunted house in terror.

"We have 13 access doors to get scared people out," he said.

Inside the maze, it is pitch black, as dark in daylight as it is at night.

Monsters are strategically located throughout the maze to scare the daylights out of the poor unfortunates who dare to risk making their way virtually blinded through the narrow corridors.

It takes an average of 20 minutes for a person to make their way through the maze.

A team of 50 volunteers runs the project each year.

For the timid, there are lights on matinees from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. on Sunday, Oct. 11 for the Team Megan (Bugg) fund-raiser and Sunday, Oct. 18 for the Zoe Coughlin fund-raiser. All funds those nights go to the families of the children who are ill.

Regular hours are Friday, Saturday, 7 to 10 p.m. and Sundays from 7 to 9 p.m.

On Oct. 24, there will be a special event from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m., admission is a donated food item for the food pantry and the Broadway Dancers will sing at 8 p.m.

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
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## Gardner Council Clarifies Position on Bookwalter Woods: They Pay Costs

- Smykowsky also asked about a condemned house on Pine Street, saying a person was living in it. The home had

Serena said the village is waiting on the Illinois Department of Transportation to get back to them and the road was to be patched that week, according to Commissioner Terry Jensen.

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


