Verona Man's Exploits in Civil War, Post-Civil War Texas Told in New Tome

Sometimes old musty documents and photos people inherit turn out to be curiosities with sentimental value and nothing more.

But in the case of William "Bill" Walsh of rural Verona, the documents turned out to be a virtual gold mine of information, after four years of background research.

"The Sharpshooter," the untold story of Hamilton Cobb Peterson, a resident of Verona, was just published in late September, listed on the cover as "The Untold Story" of Peterson, a U.S. Commissioner for the Justice Department in Laredo, Texas, post Civil War.

When Walsh's grandmother Evangeline died in 1952, she left Bill's father "a few newspaper articles and a couple of historical documents in regard to Hamilton Peterson," Bill said.

"My dad said it was about a guy who lived in the cowboy days."

That was all he could glean from his father.

There is a family connection as Walsh's grandmother was raised by the niece of the famous sharpshooter, Ethyl Claire (Peterson) Marlette. That makes Peterson Walsh's great-great uncle.

Walsh, a retired carpenter millwright for area nuclear power plants at Dresden, La Salle and Braidwood, was left the documents when his father died in 1979.

"The [book's] story starts in Verona and ends in

Verona," the author explained.

During the research, he called the Texas A & M University historical department, and asked about Peterson, talking to historian Jerry Thompson.

"He said to me, 'I don't know what you're talking about,'" Walsh said of the histo-

rian. "I said to my wife, How is this even possible?"

Walsh said this is a "huge story" and nobody knew about it.

Laredo in those days was

on the extreme western border and the railroad had not gotten that far yet, according to another historian.

The major break for Walsh came when he secured a copy of a book by N.A. Jennings published in 1899, "A Texas Ranger."

It tells the story of Jennings journeying to Texas and asking Peterson for a job. So Jennings rode with Peterson while Peterson was working for the Department of Justice, with the Freedman's Bureau in Caldwell, County, Texas.

Peterson's "job was to make sure the freed slaves got a fair deal," Walsh said.

But before Peterson served in the "Wild West" frontier in Laredo, he had enlisted in the U.S. Army as a sharpshooter during the U.S. Civil War, in the sixth Illinois regiment, along with two other shooters from Verona.

He later became a U.S. Army lawyer and "may have been one of the best pistol shots ever," Walsh said.

"He ended up in Sherman's Camp in Atlanta, Georgia," Walsh said, in one of the bloodiest campaigns at the end of the Civil War in which 3,000 men were slain in battle.

Walsh tried to take a trip to Laredo, Texas for research but said the trip was unfruitful.

However, he did obtain lots of data from the National Archives in Washington, D.C.

He also found a lot of material on the internet.

"I dug up his whole

career in the Army," Walsh said.

Peterson was born in Ohio in 1845 and moved with his family in 1853 to the Verona area in Illinois. From 1865 to 1870, he re-enlisted in the Army to take up his post as a Freedman agent.

"There were a lot of problems with former slave owners," Walsh explained. "The war was just over and the U.S. Army was the authority

in Laredo."

He said Laredo was under martial law, with the Army kicking out administrators and bureaucrats who were "not on board" with the Army.

It was not until 1870 that Texas was readmitted into the Union.

In the interim period after the war, black people were being gunned down in the street for no reason, Walsh explained.

"Peterson was capable of being a very dangerous person," Walsh said. "He took out a desperado gang in Caldwell County. I mean killed them."

The book is 248 pages long and lushly illustrated in color and black and white photos and illustrations.

He has not decided on a book marketing strategy.

Man Dies after Jumping into Oncoming I-55 Traffic

Dwight Homes, Vehicles Hit by Burglaries on Night of Oct. 5-6

Four homes and 12 vehicles were burglarized overnight Oct. 5-6 in Dwight, and the crimes remain under investigation, according to Dwight Police Chief Tim Henson.

It was mostly "during the early morning hours of Oct. 6 and was a one-night event," Henson said.

The burglaries to vehicles and homes occurred on the 100 block of Julie Drive, the 100 block of Karen Drive, the 400 block of

Morris Road, the 200 block of W. North Street, the 200 block of W. Waupansie Street, the 400 block of Clinton Street, the 400 block of Morgan Street, and the 200 block of Taylor Street, all in Dwight.

The thefts included cash in purses in cars, and prescription medications.

The Illinois State Police were called in to assist the ongoing investigation and crime scene evidence was sent to the Illinois State Police Crime Lab, Henson added.

Henson said the police

have "some good leads" but no suspects are in custody.

"For our residents, make sure all your garage doors and side entry doors are locked," Henson said.

Also he suggested people leave a light on at night to keep the neighborhood lit.

Keep all valuables in vehicles out of sight.

Finally, he asked that if residents see something suspicious, no matter what time of day or night, call 911 and "let the police check it out. Never think anything is too small to call in and report to police."

White, Madigan Warn Businesses of Statewide Corporate Scam

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White and Illinois Attorney General Lisa Madigan are warning businesses to beware of a scam targeting Illinois corporations.

A firm called Illinois Council for Corporations is contacting Illinois businesses in an attempt to collect a \$125 fee to fill out a corporation's "Annual Minutes Records Form." The Illinois Business Corporation Act does not require corporations to file a "Minutes Records Form" or pay such a fee with the state or any private entity.

There is no fee due to the state for annual minutes. The annual report fee is normally the only fee a corporation would pay to the Secretary of State Business Services Department. Illinois corpo-

rations should be on alert for this and other similar attempts to confuse Illinois business owners about state law.

White is recommending that corporations do not reply to the solicitation. He also recommends business owners who believe they've been targeted by this scam to file a complaint with the Attorney General's Office.

Addicts on Road to Spiritual Recovery Testify to Dwight Church Audience

When addicted to drugs or alcohol, a person can enter a rehabilitation facility on the journey to sobriety. But what guarantee is there the individual will not start using again?

Teen Challenge of Peoria, the men's division, explained Sunday, Oct. 4, to members of the New Life Assembly of God Church in Dwight and members of the public, how its program goes beyond rehabilitation as a discipleship program.

"These guys are doing one of the hardest things in their life," said Jason Stockton, intake coordinator of the program.

Teen Challenge is a faith-based 14 month residential program dedicated to helping men 18 years of age and older "find freedom from the destructive habits of drug and alcohol addiction and other life-controlling problems," according to the organization.

There are nine men at the center currently in various stages of phase one of the program. The next phase involves work at another location.

Three gave testimonials to the church.

"I had my first drink at eight years old and that was the beginning of a vicious downward spiral," said Connor Goode, 25, of Rockford.

At age 10 he watched his father become an alcoholic and drug addict.

During high school, after dislocating a shoulder during a football game, he became addicted to pain-killers.

But the pain killers got too expensive, "so the next best thing was heroin,"

Goode explained.

He tried to quit, went "cold turkey" and joined the U.S. Army, trying to reverse the bad habits. But he began drinking heavily which led to being kicked out of the military on a drug charge.

"I was so lost," he said. He was on heroin again for one and a half years, attempted suicide twice and called his dad to ask what he should do.

"He said 'Son, drop to your knees and pray to God.' And two weeks later, the doors of Teen Challenge were made available to me."

Stockton told the church gathering that if people stick out the 14 month program, which is described as "tough," they will likely remain sober going forward.

He said three people quit early and he was called by their families only to be told the men killed themselves or overdosed and died.

To be admitted to the program, a man must be 18 years or older, and must pay

a \$970 tuition fee. Some men are sponsored by area churches or obtain scholarships from donations.

The Peoria center, which opened in October, 2000, has

a record of 80% of its "graduates" remaining sober after five years, Stockton said.

"We can make a difference if we get involved in people's lives," said Dwight Pastor Victor "Randy" Randle.

"We've just got to let them know we love them and are in their corner."

Additional services available through the wellness clinic at additional fees include:

PSA (prostate specific antigen) prostate cancer testing for men; Thyroid (TSH) screening; and A1C screening for clients with diabetes.

Breast Cancer Awareness Month

Dr. Swink: Highest Risk for Breast Cancer Is Women Ages 40 to 50

TRAVIS SWINK, OSF Medical Group, Dwight, said women in the age group of 40 to 50 are in the highest risk group for breast cancer, but are also the busiest with family activities and are less likely to take care of themselves. Women in this age group should have annual mammograms even if they have no symptoms, he said.

Even if women ages 40 to 50 are having no symptoms and feel healthy, they should still have regular checkups for breast cancer.

According to Dr. Travis Swink of OSF Medical Group in Dwight's family practice, women in that age group should get annual mammograms.

"Those are also the busiest people," Swink said. "They are busy with family and kids and don't have time for themselves."

He said breast cancer is the one disease pushed back to women age 40, not 50, because of the high prevalence in that age group.

"You can have no symptoms and not have had a mammogram in four or five years," Swink added. "So they don't have a reason to see me."

He wants them coming in regularly, however, because 200,000 people are diagnosed with breast cancer every year. Of those 200,000, there are 40,000 deaths each year.

"It's the second leading cause of death for women," Swink explained.

"We have seen an increase in women in the 20 to 40 age group coming in with symptoms," Swink said, saying it was due to a higher awareness of the disease.

Women in the 20 to 39 age group are at risk of a more aggressive form of breast cancer which can lead to death, he said.

So, catching it early could save lives. Women 20 to 39 should see a doctor for a mammogram at least every three years.

"The sooner the better with the aggressive cancer,"

Swink said.

Roughly 67% of women in the risk groups are coming for exams, he said. OSF would like that to be 70% or more.

Years ago, the numbers were near 50% of high risk women coming in so there has been improvement with awareness campaigns.

Some symptoms are nipple discharge, enlargement of the breast, painful nipples or a mass (lump) found with a self exam.

The good news is exams use less radiation for X-rays, take less time than before, Swink noted.

"The exams are a lot less pressure, a lot less time, and we are very discreet with private rooms for each patient," Swink said.

If another test such as ultrasound is needed, it is done immediately while the patient is in for the mammogram.

He said the tests are two dimensional, and if a mass is found, an ultrasound is performed.

"And the results are immediate," Swink said.

There are also 3D X-ray exams now.

If the mass is cystic (liquid), a biopsy may be performed with a needle to check for cancer cells.

A biopsy is also performed for a solid mass.

If cancer is found, an MRI is performed and the doctor and patient consult on treatment.

Some things all women can do to reduce risk of breast cancer are cutting down on protein and eating more fresh fruit and vegetables; knowing their family history; stopping smoking; and limiting alcohol intake.

Three Steps to Finding Breast Cancer Early

Three steps for early detection of breast cancer are:

1) Schedule a yearly mammogram starting at age 40 and continuing for as long as you are in good health.

2) Get a breast exam by a doctor or nurse as part of your health exam every three years in your 20s and 30s and every year at age 40 and older.

3) Know how your breasts normally look and feel and report any change promptly to your doctor or nurse.

Some women, because of family history, a genetic tendency, or certain other factors – may need to be tested with MRI in addition to mammograms. Talk with your doctor about your history and the best course of action for you.

All women can get breast cancer, even those who have no family history of the disease.

The two most important risk factors for breast cancer are being a woman and growing older.

Women diagnosed with breast cancer early, when the cancer is small and has not spread, have a high chance of surviving it.

"Getting a mammogram is the best thing you can do to help find breast cancer early," according to the Estee Lauder Companies' Breast Cancer Awareness Campaign.

"If you notice any changes, tell your doctor without delay," the campaign said.

The campaign has donated nearly \$42 million to the Breast Cancer Research Foundation helping defeat breast cancer by funding 166 medical research projects over the past 20 years.

Morris Hospital Nurse Navigator Supports Women on their Breast Health Journey

It's a phone call that women pray they'll never get after a mammogram. The radiologist detected something suspicious. A biopsy is recommended. So many questions. So many concerns and feelings of uncertainty on where to turn for direction.

With the support of Morris Hospital's nurse navigator, women have someone who literally wraps her arms around them and guides them through the journey following an abnormal mammogram. Her name is Terri Jacob, and she is a veteran nurse of 24 years who brings a wealth of experience to Morris Hospital as a certified breast health navigator.

"When women come in for a mammogram and there's a finding, it's a time of anxiety," says Jacob. "I'm here to help explain the next steps, to tell them what to expect and how to take care of themselves, and to answer their questions and concerns. It's not about giving advice – it's about education and support so they can make informed decisions."

"As a nurse navigator, I get to be that single point of contact who helps coordinate the care while connecting patients and their families with community resources, support and health education. I can help with scheduling appointments and tests. I can help assure that important needs are met whether it's appointments with counselors, nutritionists or local support agencies. I can assist with any work-related or financial concerns patients may have."

"Essentially, I tell people I'm here to help them navigate the healthcare system – from discovery to recovery. Data does show that having

a nurse navigator working with patients every step of the way has a positive impact on outcomes."

Patients first get introduced to Jacob by phone after their physician has informed them that they need a biopsy. Over the phone, she explains what to expect during the biopsy. Patients are greeted by Jacob when they arrive at Morris Hospital for the biopsy, and she is the one who introduces them to the care team.

A few days after the biopsy, she follows up by phone to see how patients are doing and to make sure there aren't any signs of infection. She also collaborates with their physician on results and ensures patients know the next step in their care.

Another big piece of the nurse navigator's role is orchestrating the entire multi-disciplinary team, with every team member having an important role in the care of a single patient.

"We have radiologists who detect the abnormality, pathologists who analyze the tissue sample, primary care physician or ob/gyns






(continued from page 5) who ordered the mammogram, and the surgical and oncology team if necessary," says Jacob. "It takes the whole care team working together to provide the best outcome."

Agronomist: Area Corn Crop Suffered From Record Soggy Summer Rainfall

After several years of drought, now farmers are battling damaged crops from too much rain in June, the wettest June in Illinois history.

State climatologists said rainfall in June officially made the month Illinois' wettest June in state history, with records dating back to 1895.

The statewide rainfall total for June averaged 8.91 inches, topping the previous record June in 1902, at 8.27 inches.

As the 2015 harvest continues in the counties of

Livingston, Grundy, Kankakee and La Salle, University of Illinois Extension Agronomist Emerson Nafziger told *The Paper* last week too much rain in June, especially, hurt some locales, but the damage was more severe in northern Grundy County and eastern Kankakee County, he said.

"The crop is not too bad in the heart of the area," Nafziger said.

"In flat poorly drained areas where water stood, crops never recovered," he added. "The crop is beat up to some extent."

He said lots of fields never had a chance because of so much rain in June, July and August.

"But the Dwight area is better than expected," he said.

"Some fields' yields are down 20% from last year," he said. "Unfortunately, you don't have to go very far to find the worst crop yields."

Dwight farmer Tom Fox told *The Paper* last week his crop is "average" this year.

Merle Hendrix of Hendrix Town and Country, Herscher, said the Western Kankakee County area could

be as much as 20% lower in yields.

Nafziger said the Ransom area was the least hit in the area.

"The same thing applies everywhere," Nafziger explained. "If the crop didn't have standing water for long, the crop will have higher yields."

Yields could range from a low 30 bushels per acre to as high as 230 bushels per acre, he estimated.

The rain dumped as much as 30 to 40 inches in some locales in *The Paper's* circulation area in one month's time.

The worst month was June, Nafziger said.

"There was too much rain at an inopportune time," he said. "It just never stopped."

He explained the damage was done by the end of June in most cases.

By contrast, the Southern Illinois crop, which normally suffers from not enough moisture, will have relatively high yields this year, Nafziger said.

The United States Department of Agriculture said Oct. 7 that the Illinois crop is 50% harvested.

Top Ten Benefits of Conservation Tillage

There are many benefits to conservation tillage, but among the top ten are:

1. Reduces labor, saves time – As little as one trip for planting compared to two or more tillage operations means fewer hours on a tractor and fewer labor hours to pay...or more acres to farm.
2. Saves fuel – Save an average 3.5 gallons an acre or 1,750 gallons on a 500-acre farm.
3. Reduces machinery wear – Fewer trips save an estimated \$5 per acre on machinery wear and maintenance costs.
4. Improves soil tilth – A continuous no-till system increases soil particle aggregation (small soil clumps) making it easier for plants to establish roots. Improved soil tilth also
5. Increases organic matter – The latest research shows the more soil is tilled, the more carbon is released to the air and the less carbon is available to build organic matter for future crops.
6. Traps soil moisture to improve water availability – Keeping crop residue on the surface traps water in the soil by providing shade. The shade reduces water evaporation.
7. Reduces soil erosion – Crop residues on the soil surface reduce erosion by water and wind. Depending on the amount of residues present, soil erosion can be reduced by up to 90% compared to an unprotected, intensively tilled field.
8. Improves water quality – Crop residue helps hold soil

along with associated nutrients (particularly phosphorous) and pesticides on the field to reduce runoff into surface water.

9. Increases wildlife – Crop residues provide shelter and food for wildlife, such as game birds and small animals.
10. Improves air quality – Crop residue left on the surface improves air quality because it: Reduces wind erosion, reduces fossil fuel emissions from tractors, reduces the release of carbon dioxide.







Many of you have received various notices and other communications regarding the Syngenta lawsuit that is currently pending in the Minnesota State Court. I am working with lead counsel, which includes the firms Watts Guerra LLP, and Mauro Archer & Associates, PLLC, as well as Jeff Link. Lead counsel has advised that Syngenta will argue that if a claim is not filed with the Court by November 19, 2015, that the Statute of Limitations regarding your claim will bar any claim that you may have. A Statute of Limitations means that if a claim is not filed within a certain period of time, then that claim, although that claim may be valid, will not be honored since that claim was not filed within a certain period of time after the action accrued. Lead counsel does not believe that the Statute of Limitations alleged by Syngenta should apply, but the Statute of Limitations issue has not yet been determined by a Court of law. Therefore, to prevent your claim from being challenged and possibly denied because of a Statute of Limitations alleged, your safest action will be to file a claim prior to the possible Statute of Limitations date of November 19, 2015. A claim filed after that date may be subject to dismissal if the Statute of Limitations as argued by Syngenta prevails in Court.

Dwight Residents Look for Actions from Village Officials

Sales Tax Referendum Headed for March Ballot

(continued from page 16) revenue coming from visitors or passersby. With overwhelming opposition, Dwight residents turned down the referendum intended to add revenue for infrastructure improvements – initially focusing on street upgrades and repairs.

Village Officials were disappointed with the response and believe that lack of communication and understanding about the sales tax referendum led to the opposition. Village officials are hoping that educating voters about the sales tax referendum will be the key.

One of the most significant discussion points for a successful sales tax referendum is that, through sales tax, non-residents are then helping to fund a significant portion of the cost to improve and maintain village streets, sewers and sidewalks. It is stressed that no sales tax increase would apply to qualifying food and drugs, or to the sale of vehicles.

Without the additional money that could be garnered through added sales tax, Dwight residents will likely have to shoulder the burden to fix village streets, along with other infrastructure improvements, through property tax hikes.

Currently, Dwight's sales tax is 7.25 percent for the Livingston County portion of the Village and 6.25 percent for the Grundy County portion of the Village. A one percent increase would be the maximum allowable. The next primary election will be in March 2016.

The Village Board approved the hiring of two new Village employees. Dean Christensen was hired as Public Works General Maintenance III effective October 16. Christensen will come in at Step C with a salary of \$37,519. Sarah Scott-Tutterow was approved to fill the position of Waste

Water Treatment Plant General Maintenance III effective November 1. Scott-Tutterow is at Step A with a salary of \$38,364.

In another employee matter, the board approved a retroactive pay increase for Public Works Director Steve Kinkade. In March, the board officially approved Kinkade as the new Public Works Director filling a position which had been open since the retirement of Dave Bozarth in 2014. The retroactive increase will date back to January 1, 2015.

• the board approved a Trunk or Treat event to be held on October 23. The event will be held in the small Amtrak parking lot on Main Street from 5 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Area businesses will provide a car with a Halloween decorated trunk and candy or promotional items or both to hand out to children wishing to "Trick-or-Trunk".

In other business, the Board approved an Ordinance amending Chapter 12 of the Dwight Municipal Code to state "A late charge of ten (10%) percent bi-monthly shall be added to any billing which is not paid by the due date of such statement." This Ordinance change is effective immediately.

A second Ordinance change, this one to Chapter 16 of the Dwight Municipal Code was approved. This change was in regard to Dealers in Intoxicating Liquor and Personal Conduct. Classes added were Class F - Not-for-Profit Special Event License and Class G - Brew Pub License.

Recommendations from the Plan Commission met with Board approval. In the first matter, the board approved annexation by Faletti Enterprises Inc of approximately 4.56 acres of real estate located east of IL Route 47 and south of the former G.M.&O. Railroad right of way, common-

ly known as 406 N. Union Street, Dwight. Also approved was a pre-annexation agreement establishing the zoning a I-1, Industrial District. In addition, the board approved a Special Use Permit in the I-1 zoning to allow use of a portion of the property for a trucking company; to allow for a retail store to sell firearms, ammunition, and associated merchandise, and to operate an indoor shooting range.

In a second matter, the board approved the final plat for Seniw's Re-subdivision of Lots 9 and 10 of Dwight Industrial Park Subdivision. The property is commonly known as 1200 E. Mazon Avenue, Dwight.

The board also heard an update from Adam Dontz on the Greater Livingston County Economic Development Council.

The Dwight Village Board meets again on Monday, October 26 at 6:30 p.m. Meetings are open to the public.


